In testimony whereof I have caused the Seal of the State to be hereunto affixed at Augusta, this third day of January, A. D. eighteen hundred and ninety-three and of the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and seventeenth.

The certified roll of Representatives elect was called by the Clerk and 147 members responded to the call, and a quorum found to be present. On motion of Mr. SHAW of Portland,

Messrs. Shaw,

Libby of Carthage, Day of Dixmont, Carleton of Winterport, Chamberlain of Bristol, Sylvester of Lisbon, Cahill of Brunswick,

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr SHAW subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon the Governor, attended by the Council, came in and administered to the members elect, and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and suite then retired.

On motion of Mr. MITCHELL of Kittery,

Messrs. Mitchell,

Holmes of Caribou,

Gower of Winthrop,

Light of Appleton,

Abbott of Bucksport,

Gates of Winn,

Powers of Norridgewock,

were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for Speaker.

Mr. MITCHELL subsequently reported

The report was accepted and Hon. Albert R. Savage having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Sixty-Sixth Legislature for the years 1893–1894.

The Speaker elect was conducted to the chair by Mr. BIRD of Portland.

#### Mr. SAVAGE said :

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:

Permit me at this time to return to you my sincere thanks for the honor you have conferred upon me. It is indeed a high honor to be called upon to preside over the deliberations of the House of Representatives of Maine, and I should enter upon these duties with unfeigned diffidence did I not know that I can rely upon your cordial support and kind indulgence.

It may not be inappropriate here to say that the office of good government is to promote the welfare of the people. It is the office of this branch of the government so to legislate as to foster the comfort, the happiness and the prosperity of all; the weak and the strong, the rich and the poor, so that all may participate in equal benefits, and that the unavoidable burdens of government may be laid equitably and justly.

So far as lies in my power I will assist you in making this a short and business-like session, so that while we are giving due deliberation to the various important matters committed to us, we may at the same time expedite our business so as to make our stay here as brief as it can be consistently with the interest of the public.

Hoping that our deliberations may be pleasant and profitable, and that our work may receive the approval of our fellow citizens, and again thanking you for the high honor you have bestowed upon me, I await the pleasure of the House. (Applause.)

The report was accepted and E. Maynard Thompson having received a majority of the votes cast was declared duly elected Assistant Clerk of the House for the Sixty-Sixth Legislature of Maine.

On motion of Mr. SHAW of Bath,

That gentleman notified the Governor of the organization of the House by the election of Hon. Albert R. Savage as Speaker, W. S. Cotton as Clerk and E. Maynard Thompson as Assistant Clerk.

The same information was conveyed to the Senate by Mr. Lane of Augusta.

#### On motion of Mr. MARSTON of Skowhegan,

That g ntleman conducted the Clerk and Assistant Clerk to the Governor to take and subscribe the necessary oaths to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties, and subsequently reported that he had discharged the duty assigned him, and that the Clerk and Assistant Clerk had taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Thereupon W. S. Cotton, Clerk, and E. Maynard Thompson, - Assistant Clerk, appeared and entered upon the discharge of their official duties.

Ordered, That William J. Smith be Messenger, George H. Fisher b: First Assistant Messenger, Fred A. Stevens be Second Assistant Messenger, Walter I. Neal be Mail Carrier, L. H. Hammond be Assistant Mail Carrier, J. E. Frederic be First Folder, Chapin Lydstone b: Second Folder, S. S. Holbrook be Third Folder, Benjamin F. Maxim and Walter D. Bean be door-keepers, and that the Speaker appoint the Pages.

On motion of Mr. BIRD of Portland,

Ordered. That Rev. D. B. Randall of Portland act as Chaplain of this House until otherwise ordered.

On motion of Mr. DREW of Fort Fairfield,

Ordered, That the Rules and Orders of the last House of Representatives be adopted for the government of this House until otherwise ordered.

On motion of Mr. EMERSON of Portland,

Ordered, That the Cle k of the House furnish a catalogue containing the names of members, alphabetically arranged, with the residences, post office address, boarding place, occupation, politics, number of seat and diagram of the House, and that the usual number of copies be printed and distributed.

On motion of Mr. ALDEN of Union,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with three daily papers such as each member may select.

Mr SPRAGUE of Monson moved to amend by striking out the word "three" and inserting in place thereof the word "two." The amendment was lost.

Mr. LANE of Augusta moved to amend by inserting the words "printed in this State," the amendment was adopted, and the order as amended read and passed.

Papers from the Senate :

Ordered, The House concurring, that the Joint Rules and Orders of 1891 and 1892 be adopted as the Joint Rules and Orders of this legislature except that there shall be a Committee of Inland Fisherics and Game and a Committee of Shore Fisheries, instead of the Committee on Fisheries and Game and that these rules and orders shall remain until otherwise ordered,

Was read and passed in concurrence.

Ordered, That a Joint Select Committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may j in, be appointed to contract with some suitable person or persons to do the State printing and binding for the political years 1893 and 1894, subject to the approval of the legislature, came from the Senate, read and passed with committee appointed as follows:

The order was read and passed in concurrence and the following committee joined on the part of the House:

To the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives:

In accordance with the provisions of chapter 109, Resolves of the Sixty-fifth Legislature, providing for an educational qualification of voters, I have the honor to report that the lists of votes received in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, on the second Monday of September last, it being the twelfth day of said month, upon the proposed amendment, having been made and returned to the office of the Secretary of State, were examined and counted by the Governor and Council and found to be as follows, to wit:

Twenty-five thousand, seven hundred and seventy-five votes for, and eighteen thousand and sixty-one votes against said proposed amendment.

In accordance with the provisions of chapter one, section three of the Revised Statutes, on the thirteenth day of December last, I issued a proclamation declaring said amendment adopted and that the constitution of the State shall be amended accordingly, to take effect on the first Wednesday of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

Ordered, 'That a committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join, be appointed a committee to wait upon the Honorable Henry B. Cleaves, and inform him that he has been duly elected Governor of the State of Maine for the current political years of 1893 and 1894.

This order came from the Senate read and passed, with

Messrs. Mallet of Cumberland, Swanton of Sagadahoc, Jackson of Waldo,

appointed on its part.

The order was passed in concurrence, and

Messrs. Morrill of Portland, Mathews of Berwick, White of Rockland, Carleton of Winterport, Holmes of Caribou, Isaacson of Lewiston, Boody of Jackson,

were joined on the part of the House.

Mr. Morrill subsequently reported that the committee had discharged its duty, and that the Governor elect was pleased to say that he accepted the office to which he had been elected, and would meet the legislature at such time as it might indicate, to take and subscribe the oaths of office necessary to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Dunbar, Secretary of that body, proposing a joint convention to be held in the House this day, forthwith, for the purpose of administering to the Hon. Henry B. Cleaves, Governor elect, the oaths required by the Constituti n to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and asking the concurrence of the House.

Cleaves, Governor elect, to inform him that the two branches of the legisla ure were in convention assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discha ge of his official duties, and to receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make

Mr. Seiders subsequently reported that the committee had delivered the message with which it was charged, and that the Governor elect had been pleased to say that he would, forthwith, attend upon the convention.

Whereupon Hon. Henry B. Cleaves, Governor elect, attended by the Executive Council and Heads of Departments, came in, and in presence of bo h branches of the legislature, in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, Hon. Albert M. Spear, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Nicholas Fessenden, Secretary of State, then made the following proclamation:

#### PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the twelfth day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for Governor, the leturns of which have been made to the office of Secretary of State, having

been examined and counted by the legislature, which has declared that a plurality thereof were given to Henry B. Cleaves, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the legislature in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of that office, I therefore declare and make known to all persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that Henry B. Cleaves is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

#### GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The Governor then communicated to the convention, by address, information upon the condition of the State, as follows:

#### Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives :

I need not come, at the beginning of the new year, to apprise the Legislature of the State of Maine, that the skies are bright with promise for the future of our commonwealth.

I unite with you in the abiding faith and interest that is being manifested in our general prosperity. We welcome those from beyond our borders, who come and join with us in utilizing the great natural advantages with which our State is endowed. While we may look with pride upon the advancement already made, yet our productive power in agriculture, in manufactured articles and other products, may be largely augmented, until the beneficial effects shall penetrate every section of the State.

During the past two years, many millions of new capital have been invested in the State of Maine, in the enlargement of existing industries, and in creating and advancing new enterprises, thus giving employment to many thousand, additional, laboring people. We are making greater progress than ever before, and yet, we have only partially developed Maine's enormous wealth. Our magnificent water-powers, unlimited in capacity and extent, are being rapidly utilized. New and important lines of railroads are being constructed within our limits, and additional avenues of trade are being Private capital, to a large degree, has ceased its opened. westward flow to build up and enrich other states, and is now more generally seeking investment at home, in the development of Maine's resources, with advantage both to the investor and the people. Maine is rapidly attaining a position to give employment to all, and to retain within her own territory the enterprising young men and women of the State, who have too often, in the past, sought other fields. We have an industrious people, a productive soil and extensive waterways; our harbors are unsurpassed, our advantages for commerce unequaled and our facilities for manufacturing unrivaled. We have here, within our own domain, all the elements that attract men of enterprise and business, seeking new and desirable locations.

Let every citizen enjoying the protection of our laws, and the freedom of our grand institutions, omit no opportunity to commend and advance the community in which he lives. There should be individual effort among our people to encourage every legitimate enterprise and industry, great or small, on our own soil. They give employment to labor, and increase the prosperity of our State. Every waterpower developed along our rivers and streams, every manufactory or industry built up, adds to the well-being and wealth of the people.

Those interested in Maine's growth must take broad and progressive views. No reasonable opportunities should be neglected to direct the attention of our own citizens and those from abroad, to the favorable and extraordinary advantages found here, for the investment of capital. 'The policy pursued by other states in making known their resources, has been drawing from our surplus wealth, and we have contributed more than our proportion of capital and men to build up other communities. Our interests should center in the advancement of our own State. We need only to put our capital at home in motion, and during the next decade with national legislation not unfavorable to our industries —we shall achieve a greater advance than ever before.

Let us encourage the young men of the State in their efforts. Many may be without large capital, yet they possess the intelligence, the industry and the enterprise that make prosperous states; they believe in Maine and desire her advancement. Let us also remember that the young men of to-day are to guard in the future, the progress, the glory, the honor and the greatness of our commonwealth.

The national government deemed it fitting that the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America should be commemorated by an exhibition of the resources and development of the United States and of the progress of civilization in the new world. It was designed that this exhibition should be of an international character, permitting not only the people of our Union and of this continent, but those of all nations to participate.

The Legislature, at its last session, considering it important that the resources and progress of our State should be made known at such exhibition, made an appropriation of forty thousand dollars, and created a commission designated "The World's Fair Managers of Maine," to assume charge of the interests of the State and its citizens, in the World's Columbian Exposition of eighteen hundred and ninety-three. Much interest is being manifested in this exposition. It is of great importance to the State, that there should be a favorable representation of the products of our soil, of our forests and of the sea, of our manufactures, industries, educational advantages and general development. Nor should we neglect to call the attention of the world to the beauty of our scenery and the healthfulness of our climate, where greater attractions for the summer traveler can be found than in any other favored spot in our country.

The sum designated in the appropriation for the erection of a State building at Chicago, was found inadequate for the purpose; but our own citizens, by voluntary gifts in money and materials, have provided the additional amount required for the erection of a building commensurate to the importance of the State, and constructed, principally, of Maine material. The State appreciates the liberality of those of its citizens who have so cheerfully and generously given from their own means in aid of this worthy object.

A creditable representation at this exposition will be a source of gratification to the sons of Maine throughout the country, and every citizen of the State will feel a natural pride in her progressive spirit, that she is maintaining her advanced position among the other states of the Union.

> "Sail on, thou prosperous ship of State! Sail on, O Union, strong and great! Sail on, nor fear to breast the sea! Our hearts, our hopes, are all with thee."

The restraining influence of our laws upon the sale of intoxicating liquors, has had a marked and beneficial effect. The people of Maine have, repeatedly, re-affirmed their adherence to all reasonable provisions for the suppression of intemperance; and the educational, moral and religious influences, constantly being exerted to maintain a healthful public sentiment, have had a controlling force in repressing the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within our State. There must be an active public opinion in support of the laws; and whatever advance can be made in this direction will tend to lessen the blighting influences of intemperance, and command general approval.

The educational interests of the State should be among the first in the hearts of the people. The strength and stability of our great republic lies in the enlightenment of its citizens. "Popular education is the pledge of freedom and the pride of nations." The children of every citizen of the State should have an opportunity, at the public charge, to

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lay the foundation for future advancement and good citizenship. The State owes this to its children. It is, therefore, with pleasure that we notice the growing interest in our common schools, the great safeguard of our civilization. Their streams of light and wisdom make our homes happier, and the State more prosperous.

The favorable sentiment manifested for a more extended education than can be acquired in our common schools, has found expression in the excellent free high school system of the State. The Normal Schools, successfully fulfilling the purposes designed, are in a most excellent condition and constantly improving in efficiency. The County Educational Conventions are having an advantageous effect, and the public schools are feeling the good influence of these organized associations. Our colleges, seminaries, academies and other institutions of learning are among the most advanced in the Union.

The great, additional educational advantages that would be secured by a public library in every town in the State, may well enlist our attention. A small, annual appropriation by the several towns, with the pecuniary aid and encouragement that would be rendered by the citizens, would within a short period secure the possession of a public library free to all. No one could seriously question the wisdom of a law that will give substantial encouragement in opening up these channels of intellectual thought and improvement. In the generous maintenance of our educational system, our State stands almost unrivaled, and her history is an eloquent tribute to the cause of free education. We should continue in our efforts to elevate the standard to the highest possible limit.

The agricultural interests of the State form the foundation of our growth. While the average yield of some portions of our soil may not equal that of other sections of the country, it exceeds in net income to the farmer, the fertile fields of the West, because of our superior markets, continually broadening by the rapid development of our manufacturing and commercial interests. The valuable discussions as to the treatment of the soil and its adaptation to particular products, now being successfully promoted by the grange, the farmers' institutes, and other agricultural societies, in connection with the excellent work being accomplished by the State College, are having a beneficial effect; and the contributions of science in promoting agriculture are being brought into requisition. I shall be pleased to co-operate with you in such just measures as shall recognize and forward these important interests of Maine.

Judicious legislation looking to the preservation of our vast areas of forest growth and the promotion of forest culture will tend to our material welfare.

The awakening interest that is being manifested in improved highways, insuring better means of communication, is worthy the consideration of the law making power. Every citizen who travels, every farmer desiring to reach the best markets for his products, appreciates the value of good public roads. A former census report of the United States, shows that in some of the most fertile sections of our country, "it costs the farmer more to carry two bushels of wheat a mile, than it does the ordinary railroad to carry a ton." And practically the same ratio will hold good as to his other commodities. These disadvantages are severely felt by every producer removed from rail or water communication, and the equalization of such conditions, so far as possible, is certainly desirable. Improved roads will be beneficial to the consumer as well as the producer, and will promote public convenience.

The legal rate of interest in this State, in the absence of an agreement in writing, is six per cent, annually. Some instances have come under my observation where excessive and exorbitant rates, amounting to more than thirty-six per cent, per annum, have been exacted on small loans, secured either upon the small farm, or the dwelling or household goods of the laborer. The amount denominated in the bond has often been demanded regardless of the distress following its enforcement. The force of public opinion condemning such extortion, does not afford adequate relief, and it can only be found in positive law. I recommend such legislation, in the direction indicated, as will prevent this oppression.

More than six thousand persons are employed by the railroads within the limits of the State. The nature of their employment is hazardous, and much depends upon their care and vigilance. They serve the public with fidelity, and many of them, at times, with great peril to themselves. We should not withhold any proper legislation that will tend to throw about them and the public additional safeguards.

The fishing interests of our State deserve your careful consideration. They are a source of great revenue, and give employment to many of our citizens.

Our shipping interests are among our important industries. That our enterprising people are not to be surpassed in the construction of ships of iron and steel is already evident.

The relations between the employed and the employers, in nearly all our industries, have been harmonious and of a satisfactory character. We have been free from the disastrous disturbances and conflicts that have been so common in some other commonwealths. It is a tribute to the high intelligence and character of the industrial people of Maine.

A great danger menaces the interests of legitimate labor from the indiscriminate immigration that is flooding our country. Though our institutions are founded upon the theory that our shores may be the refuge of the poor and the oppressed of other nations, yet they do not contemplate a welcome to the corrupt and vicious, the paupers, the degraded and criminal classes, nor to those escaping from the pestilential atmosphere of any foreign country. It will in time, if not properly guarded, not only corrupt our own national life, but diminish, if not destroy, the great advantages that surround the existing conditions of labor, and endanger the health, the happiness and safety of our own people. The official reports for the years 1891 and 1892, relating to the institutions under the care of the State, with the reports of various officers and commissioners will be laid before you. Many of them relate to matters that will require legislative attention, and the information and recommendations contained in the same should have attentive examination.

The State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is showing commendable progress in its educational work; it is maintaining a high standard of efficiency, and is in a prosperous condition. This institution is annually sending forth a body of young men fitted by actual training to aid in the development of our various industries.

The Military and Naval Orphan Asylum should receive your encouragement. There are now forty-nine children under the care of this deserving institution.

Many of the friendless children of the State find a home in the Industrial School for Girls, where by kind and gentle treatment, and under the influences of intellectual and moral training, they are restored to ways of industry and useful employment. The gratifying results of the past, justify the continued aid of the State.

The Reform School merits your favor. Reclaiming young boys from crime and evil associations, bestowing upon them an education and fitting them for useful employments, may well command the support of the State.

We should accord to the deaf, the dumb and the blind, the advantages of a good education, and the Legislature should make suitable provision in their behalf.

The insane are entitled to the special care of the State. Their lot is the saddest that can befall humanity. To the great credit of our State, you have never reluctantly or stintingly bestowed your public favor upon this unfortunate class, and we should continue to make appropriate provision for their care. Many, with proper treatment, can be restored to their families, to society and activity in the business world. The incurable should have the kindest restraint consistent with public safety.

A joint committee of the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives will have an opportunity to visit the State Prison and observe the workings of its various departments. The Legislature in 1887 passed an act regulating the employment of the convicts. The division of their labor in the different manufacturing departments should be such as not to compete, injuriously, with any industry in the State. The general and financial condition of the prison is clearly and favorably shown in the report of the Warden.

Executive elemency is frequently asked in behalf of convicts in our prison and jails. The interests of justice require that some representative of the government, familiar with the case, shall be present at the hearing. I recommend that provision be made by law for the attendance of the County Attorney of the county from which the prisoner was sentenced.

We recognize the beneficial work being accomplished by the State and local Boards of Health. Their united action in the enforcement of all sanitary precautions deemed necessary for public safety, will give us additional guaranties of immunity from contagion.

The sacred assurance that fell from the lips of the patriotic people of Maine, more than a quarter of a century ago, that the State would never fail her sons who would go forth to uphold the honor of the American republic upon the field of conflict and of death, has been observed and faithfully kept by our people. We should continue this just aid in behalf of the deserving "boys in blue" and the needy loved ones of those who have gone beyond.

The volunteer militia of the State should receive the encouragement which it so well deserves. Public interest and safety require that a voluntary organization shall be sustained and that it shall maintain the best possible standard. The force should not be so large as to create a disproportionate expenditure of the public moneys. It is anticipated that in the near future the entire expense of maintaining the volunteer militia of the different states will be assumed by the national government, and we should be in a position to avail ourselves of the full advantages to be derived from such anticipated legislation. Our militia is composed of brave and patriotic young men engaged in peaceful pursuits, who are loyal to our State and its laws, our country and its flag. We should not hesitate in making suitable provision for the maintenance of an efficient organization, such as the Constitution of the United States declares to be "necessary to the security of a free State."

The reports of the various officers connected with this branch of the service will be laid before you, and you should determine what modification must be made in the existing militia laws of the State to conform to United States regulations. They should undergo a careful scrutiny, and all interested in the service should have an opportunity to be fully heard.

The prosperous condition of our savings banks furnishes pronounced evidence of the fidelity of those charged with the management of these institutions, and conveys to us the gratifying assurance that the accumulations of industry are constantly increasing. The resources of our fifty-three savings banks, on the thirty-first day of October, 1892, amounted to the magnificent sum of fifty-six million, eight hundred thirty-eight thousand, two hundred sixty-three dollars and sixty-eight cents. The increase of deposits for the year, 1892, was three million, one hundred nineteen thousand, four hundred ninety-six dollars and seventy-one cents. By the report of the State Bank Examiner, it appears that more than half of the entire deposits are invested outside of the State. While these investments are safe, and afford ample security to depositors, it is to be regretted that so large a portion of the people's money is invested in securities beyond our borders. If we are to have continued prosperity, if we are to

reach the great possibilities in agriculture and industrial growth that by continued effort, await us, we should create a public sentiment that will resist the flow of our capital to other fields. The earnest co-operation of our savings institutions in steadily encouraging investments at home, where it can be done with safety to the depositor, is certainly desirable.

We have in the State thirteen trust and banking companies with a capital stock of one million, sixty-nine thousand, eight hundred dollars. Their aggregate deposits amount to more than three million dollars, and their total resources are four million, eight hundred sixty-six thousand, three hundred twenty-four dollars and sixty-seven cents. They are in a thriving condition.

The twenty-nine loan and building associations of the State, created for the purpose of encouraging the building of new homes, indicate a marked degree of prosperity, and their beneficial effects are already manifest.

Permit me to call your attention to that portion of Chapter forty-seven of the Revised Statutes, applicable to the old state banking system. While I do not entertain the belief shared by some, that the repeal by Congress of the tax on the circulation of state banks would authorize the revival of any of the old state bank charters, yet I am constrained to say, the provisions of the present law applicable to such institutions are not complimentary or creditable to the high financial standing and credit of our State. Whatever banking laws we may have, whether state or national, should be practicable and safe, securing to the public absolute safety and protection, and so well guarded that no suggestion of loss or evil can ever arise.

The people of Maine believe in an honest and untrameled ballot; they believe that every voter should have a free opportunity to cast the ballot that represents his convictions; and in the exercise of this right every necessary safeguard should be thrown about him. Our election laws should enable all entitled to the right of suffrage, to express their choice in the most direct manner and without unnecessary

delay. Nearly all the voters of the State, embracing all shades of political opinion, in exercising the right of suffrage are governed by political considerations. It is a preference of a political nature that they desire to express, and it is expressed by more than ninety-five per cent of our voters, by casting their ballots for the entire ticket of the party with which they are allied. If so large a majority of the voters of the State can express such political preference, under the existing system of voting, by placing one cross (X) upon some portion of the party ticket, it would hardly seem advisable to require more of them. The present method may be substantially preserved, and at the same time intelligent provision may be made for the voter of any political party, to exercise the privilege of expressing his individual preference for any name or names upon his ballot, without compelling the great body of electors who desire to vote their party ticket, to go through the unnecessary formality of placing a cross (X) opposite the names of individual candidates.

The purity of an election depends as much upon an honest count as upon an honest ballot. During times of great political excitement, individual members of parties sometimes distrust each other. The canvassing and counting of the votes on election day should be such as to inspire the greatest public confidence, and remove all causes of suspicion. The several political parties should be represented at such count, and whatever may be necessary to accomplish this desired purpose I submit to your favorable action.

I recommend the repeal of section twenty of chapter one hundred and two, of the public laws of 1891, authorizing the division of towns of more than four thousand inhabitants and wards of cities, into separate and several polling places, and the appointment of additional wardens and clerks to perform the duties of presiding officers in such detached voting precincts. Some of its provisions are of doubtful constitutionality, and the practical operation of the remaining portion of the Statute, at the last State election, demonstrated that this section is entirely unnecessary.

With our large and diversified interests, some private and special legislation will be found necessary, but I trust you will guard it with a vigilant hand and confine it to its appropriate limits. An amendment to our Constitution, adopted by the popular vote of the people, in 1875, required the Legislature to provide, as far as practicable, by general laws, for all matters usually appertaining to special or private legislation. The Legislature, from time to time, has exercised this power imposed upon it by the Constitution, but it has wisely retained its authority over the organization of some corporations exercising important franchises.

A careful examination of the laws of 1887, 1889 and 1891, discloses the fact that more than four hundred and fifty pages in each volume, are devoted to private and special legislation; and a large portion of such legislation relates to business corporations, for the incorporation of which ample provision existed under the general laws of the State, at the time of granting such charters. The Constitution clearly and unmistakably prohibits the creation of corporations by special acts of the Legislature, except for municipal purposes, if the objects can be attained under the general law. We should all constantly bear in mind this plain constitutional provision, and upon all applications for special charters, first consider and determine whether the objects desired can be attained under the general laws of the State. If they can, the time of the Legislature should not be consumed in their consideration, nor should the general public be subjected to the constantly increasing expense attending legislation of this character. If the objects desired cannot be attained under the general law, and are subjects of special legislation, it will be your pleasure to give the measures full consideration. Proposed legislation of this nature should, before final action thereon, have the careful examination of the law officer

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of the State, and the attendance of the Attorney General upon the Legislature at stated times during the session is desirable and recommended.

In granting charters conveying special privileges, and in some instances authorizing the taking of private property for public uses, the greatest care should be exercised by the Legislature in protecting public interests, and ample provision should be made to fully compensate all who suffer damage by reason of the exercise of the powers granted. Special franchises should not be granted, unless the Legislature is fully satisfied that those, upon whom these special privileges are conferred, actually intend to enter upon and prosecute the business included in their charter. These great privileges are not granted by the Legislature to be held in abeyance, or to prevent others from prosecuting the business intended nor are they granted to be bar-The law contemplates that the public interests tered away. shall be subserved, that the people at large shall be more than compensated by the resulting benefits.

I recommend that existing laws be so modified that all acts of incorporation hereafter granted, carrying special privileges and franchises, shall become void in two years from the time when the same take effect, unless such corporations shall have organized and actually commenced the business contemplated under their charters. These chartered rights involve the interests of the people and frequently relate to public improvements within the limits of our cities and towns. If no progress is made by those enjoying these privileges within the time suggested, the public welfare requires that they shall no longer be permitted to enjoy this special favor of the State and obstruct the public improvements that other enterprising citizens might be willing to undertake.

The right of taxation is a sovereign power, and it is for the government to judge in what manner and upon what subjects the authority shall be exercised. The fundamental idea of taxation is that all property, movable and immovable, visible

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and invisible, shall bear its fair and equal proportion of the public burdens. It contemplates a uniformity of rate, and that the valuation of the different classes of property shall be uniform. "Taxes are the enforced proportional contribution of persons and property, levied by the authority of the State for the support of government and for all public needs." Our Constitution provides that "all taxes upon real and personal estate, assessed by authority of this State, shall be apportioned and assessed equally, according to the just value thereof." The exercise of this important power is subject to your discretion and control, and it is for you to determine upon what subject matter taxation shall be imposed, having reference however, to a proper exercise of the authority granted under the Constitution. It is important that this power shall be wisely exercised, relieving any inequalities that rest upon the people. You cannot expect to attain absolute equality; you cannot hope in dealing with a question of this magnitude, affecting the varied interests of the people, to command in your action unanimous approval. Your purpose should be to pursue a policy that shall result in placing this public charge "so that it will bear, as nearly as possible, equally upon all."

The greatest elements in the progress of our State lie in the prosperity of its agricultural and industrial interests. Property of this character is so situated that it cannot escape the exactions of the tax gatherer. Though it may not be over-valued, the tax is disproportionate and unequal if other property is not contributing its just proportion of the public revenue. There is no subject to which you will more willingly give careful attention, than to these great interests that have contributed so much to the progress, growth and dignity of our State and in upholding its institutions.

The manifest dissatisfaction expressed during the past few years, that the railroad interests of the State, the wild lands, the telegraph, telephone and some other corporate bodies, together with large amounts of personal property, were not bearing their equal proportion of the public assessments, is not without foundation. An advance was made in the creation of a State Board of Assessors, but so far as many of the corporate interests are involved, that Board is without power.

The rate of taxation on railroad corporations and on all corporations, companies or persons doing a telegraph or telephone business within the State, is fixed by existing law. Under the present statute, the State tax against thorailroads is in the form of an excise for the privilege of exercising their franchises within the State. There is no direct levy upon the actual revenue, but the gross transportation receipts of each company, constitute the means of ascertaining the value of the privileges exercised and form the basis of the State tax. The buildings of every railroad company, whether within or without the located right of way, and its lands and fixtures outside of its located right of way, are subject to taxation in the cities and towns where the same are situated. The taxes levied under the foregoing provisions preclude all further taxation upon the railroad, its property and the capital stock.

We are not insensible to the great advantages resulting to our people from the excellent railroad facilities extending from our western borders through the various sections of our State, furnishing easy and rapid means of communication and aiding in the development of Maine's agricultural and industrial pursuits. And we may well congratulate ourselves that the active management of the principal portion of our railroad system is at present in the hands of Maine men who believe in the progress and development of our State. These roads are under the protection of our laws and share the benefits of good and stable government.

After a most careful consideration, I am satisfied that a portion of the railroad corporations of the State are not bearing their just and equal proportion of the public expenses; and I recommend to the legislative branch of the government a substantial increase of the revenues to be derived from such corporations exercising their franchises within the territorial limits of the State.

The method to be employed for reaching this desired result is for your determination. It may not, however, be improper for me to suggest that the existing Statute applicable to the taxation of railroad corporations, after more than eight years of litigation, has been declared by a majority of the Supreme Court of the United States to be valid and not in violation of the Constitution of this State or of the United States, and the manner of raising revenue under the present Statute is within the taxing power of the State. The existing method will not excessively burden new roads, nor cripple those of limited earning capacity, but it can be so adjusted as to impose increased taxation upon those that can well afford to bear it. You should also carefully consider the laws relating to the taxation of the telegraph, telephone and other interests, and ascertain if they are bearing their equitable proportion of the public charges. Questions of so grave importance to the people should have the early attention of the Legislature, and not be left to the hurried consideration that marks the closing hours of the session.

The report of the State Treasurer will inform you of the financial condition of the State. The bonded debt on the first day of January, 1893, was two million, five hundred six thousand, three hundred dollars. Fifty thousand dollars of this indebtedness is being paid annually.

The rate of State taxation for the past two years, has been two and three-fourths mills on a dollar, yielding an annual income of eight hundred fifty-one thousand, seven hundred forty-one dollars and ninety cents. This includes the annual levy of one mill on the valuation of the State for school purposes; consequently the State tax levied specially for the support of the State government, for the past two years, has been upon an annual basis of one and three-fourths mills on a dollar, or at the rate of seventeen and one-half cents on each one hundred dollars of

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the valuation of the State. The present law requires that a tax of one mill on a dollar, shall annually be assessed upon all the property of the State, according to the valuation thereof, for the support of common schools; that it shall be distributed to the several cities, towns and plantations according to the number of scholars therein; and that such sum as shall not be distributed or expended during the financial year, shall, at its close, be added to the permanent school fund.

You must determine the additional amount necessary to be assessed upon the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for the purpose of carrying on the government. The people do not ask that we shall cripple the institutions of the State by withholding proper and needed appropriations, nor that we shall refuse to pay those in the State's employ, a reasonable compensation for their services. They do require, however, that we shall exercise the sound judgment that governs discreet men in their own business transactions, and conduct the affairs of the State in a prudent manner, resisting any tendency toward extravagant appropriations and increased salaries in the public service. The whole subject is within your control and should be free from all partisanship. It concerns every citizen of the State; it is your good judgment that must govern; and every measure should be considered upon its own intrinsic merits. It is your department of the government that hears, investigates and determines.

It will be observed by reference to the report of the State Treasurer for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December, 1890, that the Treasurer was obliged to make a temporary loan of three hundred thousand dollars to meet the liabilities occasioned by special appropriations and that loan is still outstanding.

The current expenditures should be kept within our income. This safe and salutary rule should always be adhered to, otherwise, we shall be annually creating a debt against the State, which must finally be met by increased taxation upon the people.

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If prudence and economy are exercised, I can safely recommend that the State tax be reduced from two and three-fourths mills to two and one-half mills on a dollar of the valuation. With a tax levy of two and one-half mills, including the additional revenue from other sources, if no extraordinary appropriations are made by this Legislature, the receipts of the Treasury for the next two years, should provide for the school mill fund and for the ordinary expenditures of the government, while the temporary loan can be largely reduced, if not entirely canceled; and in the near future a further substantial reduction of the State tax will be assured.

There are certain fixed charges and liabilities in the administration of the State government that must be met by specific appropriations; but upon all bills and resolves asking for special or extraordinary expenditures of money, I urge upon you the most deliberate consideration. Though generous harvests have given their reward to industry and labor, though our manufacturing, commercial, mechanical and industrial interests are moving forward with a quickening pace, yet every unnecessary appropriation of money from the public treasury, creates an unjust burden upon the people, serves to retard our general progress and development, and should not be countenanced.

It is appropriate that we should recognize in this public manner the illustrious and patriotic services of a distinguished Ex-Governor of our State, Hon. Hannibal Hamlin, who died in Bangor on the one hundred and fifteenth anniversary of the Declaration of the Independence of the United States of America. He was conspicuous in his public service for a period of nearly sixty years. He stood by Lincoln's side during four of the darkest years in the life of our republic. He rests among the people whom he loved, sincerely mourned by the State and the Nation.

In approaching the performance of the duties delegated to us by the suffrages of our fellow citizens, we come with reliance upon the Divine Being, infinite in power to comfort, guide and strengthen, invoking His care over the homes of our beloved people. We assume the responsibilities that attach to all positions of public trust. We are here by the will of the people and they will review and pass upon our acts. They are the sovereigns and have a right to demand our earnest effort, our best thought, our unprejudiced judgment; and we owe to them a conscientious performance of all the duties committed to our care.

# HENRY B. CLEAVES.

At the conclusion of the address the Governor and suite retired and the convention dissolved.

#### Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor said,

"Mr. Speaker, I am in hearty sympathy with the spirit of that resolve and ask the House to give the resolve a unanimous passage. General Butler, an eminent citizen, lawyer and soldier, did for the cause of American liberty what no other man could have done. His grip with which he took hold at New Orleans was one of the potent factors in breaking down the power of the southern confederacy, and I believe that this House in sympathy with the spirit of this resolve should accord it a unanimous passage.

## Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth,

"Mr. Speaker, I arise at this time to express the desire that there shall be placed on the record of this House a partial expression of our sympathy in regard to a matter which has been and is in the minds of us all. For many days, Mr. Speaker, we have watched with strained anxiety for any bit of cheerful news coming from the bed side of our distinguished citizen who now lies ill at the national capital; and while so watching, it is with sorrow that we have learned that the strong hand of death has taken home a distinguished citizen of another state. It is needless for me to say, perhaps, that I refer to the Hon. Rutherford B. Hayes. Born in the year 1822, he died on the 17th day of January, 1893, in the 71st year of his age. His career as a citizen, as a lawyer, as a soldier, as a statesman, is one of which not only his relatives and friends but the nation may well feel proud. As a young man he was a diligent student, and later in life became eminent in the practice of his profession as a lawyer. As a citizen he was upright and noted for his benevolent and philanthropic spirit, having been connected practically all his life-time with many of the leading benevolent and other similar institutions of this country. As a soldier his deeds of personal bravery, skill and coolness at South Mountain where he remained upon the field of battle with a shattered arm; at Winchester and other places; will always cause him to be remembered as long as those places themselves shall exist. As a statesman we see his record in the pages of public history, thrice Governor of the State of Ohio, twice member of the National House of Representatives, President of the United States, and as holding other positions of honor and of trust he filled them with credit to himself and with honor to those whom he served.

Among the things for which he will always be remembered were his pronounced views in favor of anti-slavery in those trying days just before the war. Further, we remember him as steadfast and firm in insisting that every debt and every obligation of this government should be paid in honest money; further still, that every treaty which this government had made should be faithfully and truly kept and should not be wrongfully violated. He was a strong advocate, also, of the doctrines of civil service reform, and here he endeavored to rise above the plane of party prejudice, and endeavored to serve the interests of the country at large. In this respect he did not follow always the lines which his intimate friends wished him to follow; but now that he is gone I think there are none that will not admire his honesty, his sincerity, and the courage of his convictions.

I did not rise to make any extended remarks. The many good things which may be said of our late friend, I leave to others to say who know them better, and who perhaps can say them better than I. He has passed quictly away from us; he died peac fully and happily in the love and esteem and confidence of those who surrounded him, in the confidence and love and esteem of us all. It is with profound respect for the noble qualities of this man that I offer for passage the resolves which I will now read:

Resolved, That the Legislature of Maine place upon record their expression of unaffected sorrow at the death of the late Hon. Rutherford B. Hayes, ex-President of the United States.

Resolved, That in his death we recognize and deeply mourn the loss to the nation of an upright, benevolent and Christian citizen, an eminent jurist, a noble and patriotic soldier, and a distinguished statesman.

*Resolved*, That these resolutions be extended upon the record and a copy thereof be sent to those of the family of the deceased who survive him, and to whom we tender our full sympathy and condolence in this their time of bereavement.

Resolved, That as an additional mark of respect to the memory of the deceased, the House do now adjourn.

The question being taken by a rising vote the resolutions were unanimously adopted and sent to the Senate.

## STATE OF MAINE.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, AUGUSTA, January 27, 1893. }

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

For weeks, the eyes of the American people have been turned toward the capital of the nation. This morning at eleven o'clock James G. Blaine, the match'ess debater, the brilliant orator, the eminent statesman, died in the city of Washington.

In these halls, he began his distinguished public career. We recall with pride his patriotic utterance, in early life, to the people of Maine, "perish all things else, the national life must be saved."

He loved his State, and believed in her people. Political affiliations have never estranged the deep affection entertained for him by his countrymen. Men of all parties mourn his death; but this great loss is most keenly felt by our people, for they claimed him as their own.

I have directed that the national flag be at once displayed at half mast, upon the public buildings of the State, and during the funeral service all the departments of the executive branch of the State government will be closed.

I trust the legislature will take appropriate action in honor of the memory of the deceased.

*Resolved*, That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the Speaker and Clerk, be presented to the family of the deceased as an expression of our respect and esteem.

Mr. Blaine was pre-eminently a typical American. No man since Abraham Lincoln has been more closely in touch with the hearts of the people, and no man's death will be or has been more sincerely mourned than his. No leader save Henry Clay, whose fortunes his resemble in more features than one, has been so idolized, trusted and loved by the masses of his party. Though dead he yet lives in the grateful memory of his countrymen who have watched for weeks past with unfeigned sorrow his brave struggle for life, who with trembling hands and anxious, aching hearts, have scanned the daily press and the telegrams from Washington, hoping for better news when all grounds for hope had fled.

Of his broad statesmanship and great public services it is indeed unnecessary for me to speak in this presence, and I shall not strive to do so His official career, his public acts, are as household words, well known, cherished and familiar to you all; they need not be recalled by me. Neither shall I endeavor to deliver any fitting eulogy upon his life and character. Other and abler men will do this. The noblest tribute that most of us can pay to a great man, is to understand and obey his teachings, imitate his virtues and not essay to praise him.

Mr. Blaine was ardent and true in his patriotism, broad in his views, strong and earnest in his convictions. During the transition period through which our country has recently passed, which

wrought such radical and beneficial changes in our constitution and government, he held high places in the national councils, and excited a marked influence for good. He was a co-worker with Lincoln, with Grant and with Garfield. He ever championed the weak against the strong, the right of the slave and the oppressed against the master and the oppressor. He helped to solve and settle in the interests of humanity and progress those issues that have made us truly a nation, not a confederacy. All along the line of his public career are monuments which he helped to erect, celebrating party triumphs in the interests of progress and good government, and consecrated to liberty and union These monuments marked the triumph of freedom over slavery, union over disunion and rebellion, reconstruction and order over military rule, anarchy and violence, sound finance and national credit over vague theories and repudiation.

He leaves to us a bright example of eminence attained by personal power and effort, and the ability to intuitively apprehend and grasp the correct solution of the great national problems of his time He was ever equal to the emergency, matchless in debate, brilliant, eloquent, aggressive for the right, magnetic.

He had no especial advantages of birth, education or fortune. In short, he was the architect and builder of his fame; a Pennsylvanian by birth, a citizen of Maine by adoption and choice; in early life a school teacher in Kentucky; then an editor and a member of the legislature of our State. These walls have listened with rapture to his convincing and enchanting eloquence; that Speaker's chair he has honorably filled. Elected to the national Congress his ability was conspicuous in the several Houses of Representatives possessing such able men as Thaddeus Stevens, Henry Winter Davis and Roscoe Conkling. He was soon recognized as the peer of any of them. In private life his suavity of manner and brilliant conversational powers soon crystalized around him a host of friends and admirers. Recognized as an able parliamentarian and leader, he was three times chosen Speaker, the third office in the United States in point of rank. His wonderful power in guiding and governing that turbulent body, never surpassed if equalled by any other, has been the admiration of political friends and foes. Since then he has represented this State in the national Senate and has been Secretary of State in the cabinets of Garfield and Harrison. As a Presidential candidate he

led his party in the great political contest of 1884. It was no fault of his that it failed to achieve a victory.

Maine has produced many eminent men of whom she is justly proud, who have passed to the great majority beyond, whose reputations and fame are not confined within our State borders, whose names shine brightly in the national galaxy, men whose hearts were large enough and whose views were broad enough to embrace what was best for, and just to, every part of this great country, who have honored our State and made its name known and respected in the land. Among the illustrious names we recall with pride an Evans, a Fessenden, a Morrill and a Hamlin; yet I sincerely doubt if any of them had so strong a hold on the hearts and feelings of the people as the adopted son whose death we this day mourn.

Mr. Blaine believed in the Republican party and in the triumph of its principles. The declaration that all men were born free and equal and the equality of all men before the law, were, in his political creed, something more than glittering generalities. He believed in protection for American industries and American labor against foreign industries and pauper labor. In brief, his patriotism preferred his own country and own people to some foreign country and alien people. His diplomacy while Secretary of State commanded for our flag consideration and honor, and for our citizens safety and respect everywhere. He helped to rock the cradle of the Republican party in its infancy, guided and directed it in its manhood and vigor, and as its principles of right and justice are as eternal as the everlasting hills

> "Men may come and men may go, But they go on forever."

His reciprocity views embraced the welfare of the people of the Western hemisphere. It is to him and this policy that we are indebted largely for the several commercial treaties and benefits to trade resulting therefrom, and also for that splendid promise of continental unity and good feeling, the Pan-American Congress.

He had enemies; a man who has none is not usually deserving of friends. He has been reviled. vilified, traduced, defamed; so were Washington, Lincoln, Grant, and a host of other great and good men. He will live and be remembered and honored when his traducers and their slanders shall have received the charity of a merited oblivion. He made no claim to saintship or to a monopoly of all the cardinal virtues; I do not make it here and now. He had limitations, passions, perhaps faults; in short, he was human, like other men. Men without these are usually of very little account in the world.

History and a grateful country will remember his noble deeds and pay a just tribute to their worth. A loving husband, a kind, gentle and indulgent father, a broad statesman, a noble man, an honored citizen, has gone to his final resting place and reward—has departed to that "undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveler returns." His memory is honored by his State and nation, his grave bedewed with a people's tears, and while we leave that of him which is mortal in its silent resting place, and mingle with the busy, bustling world around us, we can hopefully and truthfully say that we are consoled with the belief that he is of "the few, the immortal few, that were not born to die."

### Mr. MORRILL of Portland said:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House :- To pause amid the active duties and absorbing cares of busy life to offer tribute to the memory of those who have entered upon the life beyond is a pious act, useful and salutary to the living as well as respectful to Here in the Capital of this State where he resided, here the dead. in this Representative hall where James G. Blaine began his illustrious career, it is fitting and proper that we pause to reflect upon the suggestive lessons which his life and character impart, and to do homage to his great name. It is said that Lord Bacon, in his last will and testament made this strange and pathetic bequest: "My name and fame I leave to the people of other countries, and after a lapse of some time to the people of my own country." The great English lawyer and philosopher was aware of the exceptious character and ingratitude of contemporaries. That is usually the fate of the great and the good to be long in their graves before their merits are acknowledged or their worth is appreciated. Not so with him whose name, achievements and fame are our theme It is not his to wait for history and tradition to do him to-day. The nations of the earth, with perhaps England alone justice. excepted, resound with his praise. Yet the people of the present generation who have seen him in his daily walks and conversation, who have co-operated in his austere labors, who have wept around his bier and followed in his funeral train, are too near to see the lofty height to which he towered. It is from a distance that we

must look up to the mountain in order to appreciate its grandeur. The people of succeeding generations will stand at such a distance, and before their wondering gaze, stretching back across the lapse of years, the grandeur of his life and character and public services will loom above the clouds into the region of eternal sunshine.

He came into public life at the beginning of an epoch that was destined to test the experiment of our forefathers, and demonstrate the capacity of the American people for self government. In his day the dismal forebodings that had disturbed the peace and tranquility of the older statesmen assumed material shape in the Gorgon horror of a civil war. The wizzard hand of Clay could not pacify, the matchless logic of Webster could not reason down the mexorable spirit of slavery, secession and rebellion. The sage of Marshfield viewing with melancholy alarm the lowering aspect of the political skies, devoutly prayed that his eyes might never behold "the states dissevered, discordant, belligerant, or rent with civil strife or drenched in fraternal blood." Heaven mercifully vouchsafed the boon. As if in tenderness to the great expounder that gruesome spectacle was reserved for the men of a younger generation among the most conspicuous of whom was James G. Blaine.

I am most impressed to-day with the part he bore in that most exigent period of our country's history. It is due to the enlightened statesmanship and Christian philanthropy, of which he was a chief exponent, that out of a Union of weakness, constantly menaced with disruption, we have wrought a reconstructed, consolidated, integral Union, infinitely stronger and better than the old ; that in place of a constitution sullied by disgraceful compromises. we have an amended constitution without compromise, guaranteeing to all men without regard to race, color or previous condition of servitude, equal political and civil rights and equality before the law; that blind animosities and local prejudices have softened to friendship and melted to love; that messages of peace and good will like that which fell from the eloquent yet death touched lips of Henry W. Grady at Boston are coming up to us from the new South, recently chaffiing under its fancied wrongs. His great life was worn out in awakening the public conscience to the advancement of the public good, and in striving to achieve victories of peace, victories less splendid and startling than these of war, but as beneficent, as permanent and as grand. While the names of Grant, Sherman and Sheridan will go down in history suggesting and illustrating the great battles of the republic, the names of Seward, Sumner and Blaine will illuminate its pages with their civic triumphs. My friends, men of eminent talents and public di-tinction reflect lustre upon the communities in which they reside. Many an obscure country village has become historic as the birthplace of some celebrated general, author or statesman.

No stranger visits Fryeburg without being reminded that Daniel Webster once taught its academy. The renowned and cultured men and women who have made Boston their home have distinguished her as the Athens of America. The city of Augusta in the beautiful valley of the Kennebec has acquired an extraneous interest as the home of Mr Blaine, and his mansion standing here within sight of this Capitol will be pointed out as the Monticello of New England.

I second the resolutions so fittingly presented by the gentleman from Houlton.

Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent said :

I wish to say but a word on this subject. "What a piece of work is man, how noble in reason, how infinite in faculties, in form and moving how express and admirable, in action how like an angel, in proportion how like a God."

When I first became acquainted with James G. Blaine he was sitting at this reporter's desk and Chief Justice Fuller was sitting there (pointing). That was about thirty-six years ago. We became very intimate as youngish men at that time. James G. Blaine was admired by me as a young man at that time and as I grew older he was admired by me as being one of the most wonderful young men in conversation and in every day deportment that I ever met. He was different from Fuller ; Fuller was thoughtful and reserved, with a legal mind; Blaine aspired to political life, and was perhaps one of the most astute and wily politicians that Maine has ever produced, by adoption or by birth. I have been acquainted with him and have called at his house almost every week when we have both been here He had almost a magic charm in conversation, and he always endeavored to do his friends good instead of harm. If he had any information he was willing to impart it to others; and his advice was always of great assistance to me. Though we differed in politics, yet as men we never differed. There is no man that I ever became acquainted with whom I loved more.

I saw him go from this reporter's desk here into this House as a member of the Legislature. His course in the Legislature attracted the attention of the State and the next year he was made Speaker, and conducted himself with wonderful skill, affability and with great honor to himself. He then went into Congress, and I watched him with the greatest solicitation; having formed his acquaintance as I did I often had conversations with him. I always found him a true man and always willing to do for his country all that his magnetic power would enable him to do. He was much like Clay as I remember Clay in my younger days. Both aspired to the Presidency, they both failed; not because they were not admired by the country and by their constituents throughout the United States, but by certain circumstances they were both defeated. Perhaps it is all in the wisdom of Providence and all right, but for me I felt that I could shed no tears if Blaine was elected President of the United States.

Being here so much I became familiar with him in his family relations. I always found him one of the most affectionate fathers and husbands; as a man, in every way, I admired James G. Blaine. No man can stand higher than he with the South, the West, the North and the East. He was a statesman, and became a nation's man, but he was an Augusta man. I wish to close these few brief remarks by saying, "His life was gentle and the elements so mixed in him that nature might stand up and say to all the world, "This was a man.""

### Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor said :

Mr. Speaker—I arise to second the resolutions in behalf of the loyal citizens of Bangor, whose hearts throb with sympathy at this hour.

In the battle of life a great man has fallen. For many years James G. Blaine has been regarded as the wisest living statesman of these United States. This estimate did not come from a partisan standpoint, and while in some measure others were not always in full accord with his views, still no one could ignore his sagacity, wisdom and patriotism. Of his ability others have eloquently and appropriately spoken.

I may be allowed to notice the deep affection which was in his heart, not only for his wife and children, but for others not intimately connected. While on a steamer which plies between Bar Harbor and Mount Desert Ferry a few years ago, a man spoke to him and presented his daughter, a mere child. He took her by the hand and delighted her with his questions full of sunshine from his great heart. As the boat neared the wharf he sought out the little girl and bade her a sweet good bye.

This was a simple act, but the reflex of his whole life, which has so endeared him to the responsive hearts of his countrymen.

When thinking of the great men that have passed away, I am thankful to have been allowed to live in the same period of time with a Lincoln, a Grant, a Sherman, a Sheridan, a Garfield, and a Blaine. The fullness of their lives is the history of our country for the past thirty-five years; but they have gone to the land unknown, leaving the one simple lesson so fitly told when we remember that:

> "Our lives are rivers gliding free To that unfathomed boundless sea, The silent grave !"

> "Thither all earthly pomp and boast Roll, to be swallowed up and lost In one dark wave."

### Mr. PURINGTON of Minot said :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives-It is with feelings of sadness, mingled with a sense of sad pleasure, that I have listened to the resolutions offered by the gentleman from Houlton, and the eulogies so eloquently and fittingly pronounced on our dead statesman. I feel that nothing I can say or do will add to the interest of the occasion. Yet I cannot forbear to say that we, the common people of the section of the State that I represent, honored and loved Mr. Blaine no less than the people of any other section of the State. We rejoiced in his prosperity, we were justly proud of his great achievements, we exulted that our State should be able to furnish one, who by his counsels, wisdom and eloquence was able to achieve so much of good to our nation. During his long and painful illness we have waited and watched for good news from his bedside, hoping against hope that his useful life might be spared to his friends and the nation. But he has gone from among us, and we, in common with the people of the country, deplore ours and the nation's loss. We can but remember with pride his illustrious achievements, his many and great virtues, and we extend our heartfelt sympathies to his bereaved family.

Mr. Speaker, with pleasure I second the resolution offered by the gentleman from Houlton.

## Mr. SCOTT of Patten said:

"There is a reaper whose name is Death, And with his sickle keen He reaps the bearded grain at a breath, And the flowers that grow between."

That Reaper has of late been gleaning among the choicest of earth, and last of all he has garnered in one whose name and fame are known throughout this world, one who was held in love and esteem that almost amounted to worship by the millions of his fellow countrymen. To the party he so brilliantly led, to the State whose favorite son he was, to the family he loved and cherished, his loss is almost irreparable. And though, like all men of marked personality and strong convictions, he had resolute opponents as well as devoted friends. yet in the presence of the new-made grave, remembering only the man of genius, remembering only the man of giant intellect, remembering only the statesman to whose fame the highest office in the gift of the American people could have added nothing, remembering only the kind-hearted friend and neighbor, remembering only the loving and devoted husband and father-all animosities disappear, all heads are bowed in sorrow, and all join in this last sad tribute of respect to their departed countryman and friend.

If it is the disgrace of American politics that public men are often so shamefully traduced, it is the glory of the American people that when the heat of political strife is over, they are swift to recognize and appreciate the ability and the patriotism with which all of our public men are possessed in generous proportion.

In the death of Mr. Blaine a striking figure and a strong force is forever removed from American politics. From the storm-beaten coast of the Atlantic to the calm waters of the Pacific, from the icebound lakes of the North to the tropic shores of the Gulf, the voice of the mourner is heard. And to-day we all devoutly pray that the wealth of good which his long and varied public services enabled him to accomplish may be gathered into the treasury of our republic and become the common heritage of the American people, and that it may be to him a monument purer than marble, more enduring than brass, more symetrical than the finest work of Grecian art.

#### Mr. SPRAGUE of Monson said :

Mr. Speaker—With the expiration of the life of James G Blaine passed from earth one of the grandest figures of this grand century of ours. Few men have ever lived in this world who have so impressed themselves upon their countrymen as did he. For nearly a quarter of a century he has had more to do than any other single person in moulding the thought, controlling the policy and dictating the action of the political party that has dominated the affairs of this republic, that was responsible for its legislation, and which, if it deserves censure for any of its adversity, is certainly entitled in a degree to praise for its prosperity. He will live in the history of his country as he lives now in the hearts of every true American.

This country has never seen a statesman who so entirely typified true Americanism as did Mr. Blaine. Whatever was unAmerican Whatever would inspire confidence in our system he discarded. of government, whatever would develop a love for our institutions, whatever would kindle in the breasts of his fellowmen an ardor for their country, her traditions, her achievements, and her advancement, he adopted and advocated with all his brilliant powers. He is the only American who ever arrested the marked attention and thoroughly aroused the fears and jealousies of the nations of Europe. He dreamed of uniting every government and every people on this continent. His plan was so comprehensive and universal in its scope that in its incipiency it was misunderstood and feared and called dangerous by the smaller minds. Yet was in fact the broadest and grandest type of statesmanship that our country has ever known. While his creed was ever America for Americans it was not confined to narrow limits. He was among the first of his party to realize that a condition existed which demanded larger trade for the industrial welfare of our people. His great mind grasped the situation. He inaugurated a policy which in my judgment will prove not only a wise one but will be permanent. Its principles will be lasting. Misunderstood, envied, and often cruelly traduced by many in the higher walks of life, he was never misunderstood, never doubted, never hated, but always loved by the common people. Instinctively they realized that he was their friend and their champion, and they followed him through all the storms of his eventful career with a zeal and devotion that

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has been the fortune of but few leaders of men in the world's history. He has wrought for himself a high place in the annals of the times in which he lived, and his name will rank in history with the most famous of his countrymen. The peer of the earth's greatest men, he distinguished and brought fame to our State, and it is eminently fitting that we, as its representatives, should add our humble tribute on this occasion as a meagre token of the vast debt of gratitude which we owe to his memory for his grand life work.

Mr. Speaker, I take profound pleasure in seconding the resolutions and in concurring with the eloquent speakers who have preceded me.

## Mr. SPILLANE of Lewiston said :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen—I cannot hope to add anything to the tributes of love and affection that have been showered upon the illustrious dead. But I deem it most fitting and proper that I also should offer my small share of appreciation for him whom while living I admired, and whose fragrant memory I shall ever respect and cherish. The death of James Gillespie Blaine was not unexpected and yet it was sudden. Not only from the states of this Union, not only from the people of this continent, but even from across the boisterous Atlantic and the deep Pacific, from north to south, from the orient to the occident, from all civilized lands have come words of sympathy and messages of condolence to his saddened wife and sorrowing children.

He was gathered like the beautiful flower for admiration and study while it was shedding around its sweetest fragrance. His labors and struggles are over. His deeds, acts, works and words do and ever will survive.

The future historians must analyze and judge him with the justest judgment that trained and accurate intellects can command. His career, as a journalist, a diplomat and a statesman, forms a galaxy of glory, of splendor and of power that demands our greatest admiration and unstinted praise.

Neither birth nor wealth made easy his early career, but like a Hercules he cut his way amidst his enemies, overcame by his indomitable will all obstacles, and by his genius, intellect and labor made himself a man to be respected. The soundest judgment, courage unexampled and qualities and forces unequalled, formed a career unmatched in the history of 100 years.

Along with the speeches of our Hortensean Evans and our Demosthanic Prentiss, who carried fame and honor to a distant state, the words of James G. Blaine will be a source of refreshment and study to all generations.

The names of Washington, Jefferson and Hamilton, of Adams, Monroe and Jay, of Madison, Morris and Livingston, form the bright cluster of our early history. A few years later we find as the luminous stars a Jackson and a Harrison, both warriors and both statesmen. And do not Clay, Calhoun and Webster form the grandest trio of eloquence, oratory and power that any State, any age, any people or any nation ever honored, or ever will honor? In the period of rebellion and reconstruction we revere the honored names of Lincoln and of Grant, of Sherman and of Sheridan, of McLellan and of Seward. But the career of James G. Blaine is, for its brilliancy and power, so dazzling, that all others in this generation pale into insignificance when compare is made with his.

A scholar deep and logical, a debater ever ready and in combat like a "plumed knight," fearless and unconquerable, an orator with few superiors and possessing a magnetism of such power that the greater the distance the greater was the intensity of the attraction, with a memory marvelously retentive, all these qualities made him necessarily a leader among the famous men that we love to honor and to claim as ours.

He was not a warrior but a statesman. He fought men with his intellect and not with the sword, though well he knew the use of the scimeter of ridicule, of irony, and of deadly sarcasm.

Fortified with irresistible logic, protected with the shield of indomitable courage, and armed with the battle-axe of Parliamentary Law, he never knew defeat.

The literary works that he had planned death has stopped and we are the losers. The last four years of Mr. Blaine's life were crowded with the flowers of sorrow and of sadness. And as he lay upon his bed of pain, and heard the breakers dashing on the shores of "that mysterious sea that never yet has borne on any wave the image of a homeward sail" and as ever and anon there were borne to his listening ears the sounds of immortality he could

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hear the voices of his loved ones, his dear ones, his sons and his daughter asking him to come to them and live with them in the eternal mansions of perfect bliss, and, as Thomas Reed has said, "in that great unknown beyond the tomb where all impurities and imperfections are done away, we trust that he has become that perfect being that he seemed to be in the tender memories of mankind." As long as one atom of matter shall exist. as long as the earth revolves around the glowing sun, as long as life shall permeate, invigorate and beautify man, so long shall the people of this Union, so long will our sister republics and independencies of the Western hemisphere cherish the sacred memory of him who was their friend. Mr. Speaker, I can close with no words more fitting than those found in that beautiful emblem "that as long as green grass shall cover his grave, blue skies bend over it or sweet birds sing near it, that place will be hallowed ground; yet greener than the grass, fairer than the skies, sweeter than the birds and more hallowed than the grave itself, will be his fragrant memory, enshrined and preserved forever in their heart of hearts."

Mr. Speaker, the city of Lewiston is honored in seconding the resolutions presented by the honorable gentleman from Houlton.

Mr. MARSTON of Skowhegan said :

On behalf of the Somerset Delegation and in behalf of my fellow citizens of Somerset, I take pleasure in seconding the resolutions that have been offered.

Therefore be it resolved by this Council,

That while we humbly accept the dictation of the Divine Providence, and bow in submission thereto,

We deeply deplore the death of this, one of the greatest and most successful statesmen in the nineteenth century;

That in the death of James G. Blaine this country has lost a citizen of the most sterling worth, possessed of the greatest zeal and highest patriotism, a man among men, and a peer among fellowmen in everything that goes to make a true man; a genuine patriot and a grand statesman, and whose light and fame will shine for the admiration of men until history shall cease and time shall be no more.

That this council, in unity with the rest of the country, sincerely mourns the great loss to this country in the death of James G. Blaine, and extends its sympathy to the family of the deceased and to the country at large.

That this council, as a mark of proper respect and condolence, and in token of its sorrow hereby stands adjourned for this day, that these resolutions be spread in full upon its records, and that copies of the same be furnished to the family of the deceased, to the Secretary of State of the United States, and to the Secretary of Pennsylvania, the State wherein the great man was born, and to the secretary of State of Maine, the State of the adoption of the peerless statesman—known in life as James G. It is a sweet and decorous instinct of our common humanity that our dead should find their final sepulture where in life they were best known and most honored and beloved.

Throughout all our history as a nation the names and the fame of the men who have made that history glorious have been most conspicuously and intimately identified with the states that gave them to their country; and when death has closed their living service, the instance is rare wherein those states did not receive back the hallowed dust to its sleep among the people whose love and loyalty they first won and then held unswervingly to the illustrious dead.

Mt. Vernon, Monticello. Quincy and Marshfield, Ashland, the Heimitage and Springfield are now among the holiest shrines held sacred by American patriotism. Maine has hers in the graves of her Fessenden and Hamlin. Is it not eminently fitting that James G. B aine, the last, yet not the least, of that great triumverate, should be sepulchered within her own soil, and that to her capital city, which first gave him to the State and then to the larger service of the republic, be committed the solemn trust and privilege of loving, keeping and guardianship? Therefore be it

Resolved, That the Legislature of Maine, speaking in the name of its people, remembering with proud admiration the public and private life of its great statesman and affectionately reverencing his memory, does most earnestly desire that the State he represented and honored through a third of a century of distinguished service, should, now that service is ended, be also honored as the chosen repository of his mortal remains.

Resolved, That the Governor of the State be requested to communicate this expression of our desire to the family of Mr. Blaine, and present to them such further considerations towards its realization as in his judgment may be necessary and becoming.

Resolve in favor of Booth Brothers and Hurricane Isle Granite Company;

Resolve in aid in rebuilding bridge in Hamlin plantation;

Resolve in favor of the town of Moscow;

Resolve in favor of additional appropriation of two hundred dollars for repair of roads across Indian township;

Resolve authorizing the Land Agent to sell and convey all the interest of the State of Maine in and to Lot 29 in Moro plantation;

Were reported from the Committee on Bills in the Third Reading, severally read the second time, passed to be engrossed and sent to the Senate.

Resolve in favor of the town of Bradford,

Was reported from same committee and pending passage to be engrossed, tabled on motion of Mr. HIGGINS of Limerick and statement of facts ordered printed. Resolve in aid of building a road in Jerusalem township in Franklin county,

Was reported from same committee and pending passage to be engrossed, tabled on motion of Mr. SPRAGUE of Monson.

The majority and minority reports of the Joint Special Committee on Eastern Maine Insane Hospital reporting "ought to pass" and "ought not to pass" respectively on "Resolve in favor of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital," came up as a special assignment.

On motion of Mr. ADAMS of Bangor the reports were recommitted to the Joint Special Committee on Eastern Maine Insane Hospital and sent to the Senate.

Bill "An Act to amend chapter 445 of the Private and Special Laws of 1885, incorporating the People's Trust Company," came up as special assignment. House amendment "A" was adopted and bill read a second time. On motion of Mr. SHAW of Portland rules were suspended, bill read the third time, passed to be engrossed as amended and sent to the Senate. Bill "An Act to incorporate the Auburn and Mechanic Falls Railroad Company," which was passed to be enacted in the House February 9, was returned to the House accompanied by the following communication:

### STATE OF MAINE.

## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, AUGUSTA, February 15, 1893.

#### Gentleman of the House of Representatives :

I have examined the act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Auburn and Mechanic Falls Railroad Company," and am constrained to withhold my approval, if for no other reason than to afford the legislature an opportunity to give the subject matter further consideration.

I have given to its various provisions a most careful consideration, for I observe that the charter members of the proposed organization are among the leading citizens of the State, interested in its progress and advancement. Some of its provisions do not afford sufficient security to the public, unduly invade private rights, and are against sound public policy.

Permit me to call your attention to some of the objections. The provision contained in section two, limiting the remedies of parties injured in their person and property, to the conditions and limitations in the general statutes applicable to towns, does not afford sufficient protection to the traveller upon a railway. Highways are maintained for the free use of the traveling public; railroads carry for hire and should not be relieved, in their occupation of the streets, from the ordinary obligations resting upon carriers of passengers.

Section 9 provides that the "provisions of the thirty-first chapter of the Revised Statutes, relative to the foreclosure and redemption of mortgages, and the rights, duties and liabilities of bondholders and trustees," shall be made applicable to the bonds and mortgage deed of trust of this corporation. It will be seen that the provisions of the thirty-first chapter of the Revised Statutes have no reference to the foreclosure and redemption of mortgages or the rights, duties and liabilities of bondholders or trustees, but relate to dealings between the principal, factors and agents in mercantile transactions. If this allusion to chapter thirty-one is a clerical error, and a reference was intended to chapter fifty-one of the Revised Statutes, which is applicable to railroads and to the foreclosure and redemption of mortgages thereon and the rights and liabilities of bondholders and trustees thereunder, then it would seem to be intended to give such bondholders and trustees the power, in case of default on the bonds, to organize as a railroad corporation, and still, under other provisions of the bill, they are exempt from the further obligations imposed upon railroads under chapter fifty-one.

Section 10 of the proposed act authorizes the corporation in carrying out its purposes to take and hold "by virtue of the right of eminent domain, any real or personal estate or water power and privileges which it may find necessary and convenient."

While I have no doubt this power would be wisely exercised under the management of the promoters of this enterprise, the provision referred to is so broad and sweeping in its terms that it might permit an unwarrantable exercise of the constitutional provision authorizing the taking of private property for public uses. The proposed legislation would unreasonably jeopardize the rights of private land owners and mill owners and the possessor of water power and privileges upon which industries may already depend.

Section 13 seems to be somewhat contradictory of other provisions of the charter, uncertain in its operation and involving legal propositions the judicial determination of which may injuriously affect the interests of the State and the people.

Under the provision of section 1 this corporation is authorized to "construct, equip, maintain and use a railroad with convenient single and double tracks, side tracks, switches, turnouts and stations." The board of railroad commissioners of the State is constituted the appellate tribunal to review the decisions of the municipal officers of any city or town in respect to any matters arising under The railroad commissioners constitute the board to deterthis act. mine the conditions on which this railroad shall cross any other railroad. While this corporation is given even greater powers than are ordinarily accorded to steam railroads, yet we find in section 13 of the act, the declaration that "said railroad shall not be deemed to be a railroad within the meaning of that term as used in the railroad statutes and Public Laws of this State." While this section may not have great force in law, it practically declares that this railroad with its extraordinary grants, shall be a railroad with all the rights and

privileges which our laws guarantee, and still not be a railroad, but exempt from those provisions of law that provide for the safety and care of the traveling public upon the railroads of the State.

Or if the purpose be to declare this to be only an association, to enable the corporators to run a street railroad as they might run a stage coach or an omnibus for private advantage and free the corporation from the obligations of a railroad as common carriers, and its duties and obligations to the public as a railroad, then it seems to be unwise if not unconstitutional, to grant to such organizations the exercise of the State's right of eminent domain, expressly reserved by our constitution for public purposes.

The declaration, contained in section 14 of the bill, that the object of the corporation cannot be attained under the general laws relating to the organization of railroad corporations, seems to invade the province of the judicial department of the State, and I apprehend would not be regarded as conclusive.

In view of the great interest manifested in legislation involving special charters, you will again allow me to call attention to the provisions of article four, part third of the constitution of the State, directing that "The legislature shall, from time to time, provide, as far as practicable, by general laws, for all matters usually appertaining to special or private legislation." This provision in our constitution embodies the deliberate expression of the people of Maine, and it will be observed that it is positive, direct and mandatory; and the duty is enjoined upon us by this constitutional declaration to confine legislation of a private and special character to the narrowest limits consistent with the public weal.

The constitution also provides that "Corporations shall be formed under general laws, and shall not be created by special acts of the legislature, except for municipal purposes and in cases where the objects of the corporation cannot otherwise be attained." If the legislature deems the objects of those desiring special charters and privileges practicable, and existing laws are not sufficiently comprehensive to permit the accomplishment of the purposes desired, it may provide the remedy by additional public laws and thereby avoid the burdens of private and special legislation constantly increasing and pressing upon its attention.

In obedience to the constitutional provisions before referred to, a former legislature determined that it was practicable to provide by general law for the organization of railroad corporations. It is certainly desirable to provide by general laws for the organization of all railroad corporations desiring to construct, maintain and operate railroads for public use, except perhaps where they cross tide waters, the State having determined that it will retain within its control jurisdiction over all the tidal waters of the State, and that they shall be subject only to legislative action.

If it is practicable to permit the organization of steam railroads under the general laws, and to allow them to exercise the right of eminent domain, it would seem that it is also practicable to provide by general laws for the organization of electric or street railroads. If existing general laws are insufficient, and they are so deemed by many, if they are defective, if they do not furnish sufficient security to the investors of capital desiring to aid in the development of these enterprises, we shall be conforming to the people's demand and expectation, embodied in their constitution, by making them sufficiently broad and liberal to meet all requirements. We are all desirous that nothing shall be done to hinder whatever may encourage enterprise and industry, and we should offer, by liberal enactments, every inducement that will aid in developing our broad acres, in building up our own industries and manufactures, and in making the people more prosperous.

Our supreme court has recently held, that the construction and operation of a street railway in the streets of our cities and towns, is not a new and different use of the land from its use as a highway. Laying down rails in the street and running street cars over them for the accommodation of the public may be a change in the mode of using the way, but not in the actual use; it is still used for a highway.

The legislature of the State, representing the public, if there be no constitutional inhibition, has the paramount power over all public ways, subject to property rights and easements of the abutting owner, and may delegate the authority of permitting the location, construction and operation of lines of street railway to the local authorities.

The history of these enterprises has clearly demonstrated the propriety of conferring upon the cities and towns the right to exercise some voice in a matter of so much consequence to them; and in more than ten of the States of our Union constitutional provisions have been adopted depriving the legislature of the power to grant the right to construct and operate street railways in any city, town or village, without the consent of the local authorities. In many of the States of the Union, where no constitutional provision exists upon this subject, provision has been made by law investing the cities and towns with the right to permit the use of their streets for street railroad purposes and determine the conditions under which the privileges shall be enjoyed.

Some of these various constitutional and statute provisions provide that no law shall be passed by the legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or village, or upon any public highway, without first requiring the consent of such city, town or village having con rol of the streets or highway to be occupied by such street railway; and in many of the states it is provided that the franchise so granted shall not be transferred without similar assent first obtained.

The control and supervision of our public highways is vested in the local authorities. While it may be said they are held in trust by the State for the public, they are controlled by municipal instrumentalities. The land owners adjoining the same and the public are interested in having them maintained in a condition to meet the public demands. There is a growing sentiment that special franchises and privileges should not be granted to private incorporators, to unduly burden the public easement, now enjoyed by the people of the various cities and towns in their highways, without the consent of the municipality interested.

I believe it is safe and practicable to provide by general laws for the organization of street railways and avoid in the future the great time and expense that has been incurred in the past in considering and granting these special charters. It is a matter that is entirely within the province of the legislature to determine. The executive is powerless to afford a remedy without the co-operation of the legislative department of the government.

It is not a pleasant obligation to withhold my signature to an act that has received the unanimous approval of the co-ordinate department of the government, but a sense of duty compels me to return the same to the branch in which it originated, without my official approval. HENRY B. CLEAVES.

Paper from the Senate :

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, AUGUSTA, February 14, 1893.

#### To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Seven bills, duly enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, relating to the protection of fish in various ponds and streams of the State, are before me for approval. I have already approved five acts during the session applicable to the same subject matter, three of which are repealing acts, and two of the same repeal acts passed at the last session of the legislature. The history of this legislation shows that many of these special acts are passed at one session of the legislature and repealed at another. This legislation is accumulating so rapidly that I deem it proper to suggest to the consideration the propriety of providing legislature for by general laws for the regulation of matters of this character. provision There is under our constitution express for such legislation. The commissioners on inland fisheries might properly be authorized upon petition by a certain number of citizens, and after hearing, to regulate the time of taking fish in the various waters not now subject to existing laws, and the enforcement of such regulations may be secured by appropriate penalties. These special acts in the past have been frequently enacted without the general knowledge of the community affected. Under the proposed method those in the vicinity would have an opportunity to be heard, and more satisfactory results reached than under the present course of legislative hearings held so far distant from the communities to be affected that they cannot incur the expense of attending such hearings. The course proposed would give all citizens in the vicinity of the waters designed to be protected an opportunity to be fully heard.

The executive will be pleased to co-operate with the legislature in any reasonable measures that will relieve us from this mass of special legislation, and at the same time carefully guard the interests of the public and fully protect the inland waters of the State.

# AUGUSTA. TUESDAY, February 21, 1893.

Met according to adjournment.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Sargent of Augusta.

Journal read and approved.

Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor moved that the journal of Friday be approved.

The chair stated that the record showed that the journal was approved yesterday. If that be so, the motion of the gentleman wou'd not be in order.

Mr. Fairbanks of Bangor: I rise to a point of order. Yesterday, after the speaker *pro tem* occupied the chair, the point of order was made of no quorum, and that point was not decided. Subsequently a motion was made to approve the journal of Friday The point having been made of no quorum, I contend that we had no right to approve the journal.

The chair must be governed by the record. The record does not show that any point of no quorum was raised until after the journal was read and approved. If the gentleman desires to get at the matter, I apprehend the way must be by the correction of the record.

Mr. Lane of Augusta: I would suggest that the fact was the point of order of no quorum was withdrawn

Mr. Drew of Fort Fairfield: I had the honor yesterday to be Speaker pro tem, and I will state for the benefit of the House that the gentleman from Bangor (Mr. Fairbanks) no doubt intends to state the matter correctly, but he, himself, was not present during all the proceedings. After the organization of the House, the gentleman from Limerick (Mr. Higgins) raised the point of no quorum, after which he withdrew his point, and then the records were approved, there being no objection. I think that under those circumstances, the objection having been withdrawn of no quorum, the Speaker pro tem was right in concluding that a quorum was present, and the records were approved.

### TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 21.

Mr. Higgins of Limerick: As I understand the proceedings of yesterday, after the Speaker *pro tem* had taken the chair, they proceeded to read the record. The point I raised was that there was no quorum present, and consequently, there being no quorum present, the journal could not be read, and if it could not be read it could not be approved. Upon that the Speaker *pro tem* ordered the yeas and nays. To make the record all right I withdrew my motion at the request of the gentleman from Augusta (Mr. Lane) who said it was proper to inform the Governor and Council and the Senate that a Speaker *pro tem* was elected.

The Speaker: The chair rules that the record now showing that the journal was read and approved, a motion now to approve the journal is not in order, and that the only way to get at it is by the correction of the journal of yesterday's proceedings.

Mr. Fairbanks: I move that we correct yesterday's journal.

The Speaker: Will the gentleman reduce his motion to writing? Mr. Fairbanks: I move to reconsider the vote whereby the journal of yesterday was approved.

Mr. Lane of Augusta: Evidently there was no quorum yesterday, but it was the desire of those present to proceed with the simple routine of the House which would have advanced the business of the legislature one day, and I submit that there is a quorum unless an objection is made, and I understood yesterday that the gentleman withdrew his point of order. If he did not, I stand corrected upon that point and am willing to submit to whatever the gentleman states

Mr. Higgins of Limerick: I did withdraw the motion for the purpose of allowing the gentleman from Augusta to inform the Governor and Council and Senate that we had elected a speaker *pro tem*, and only for that.

The Speaker: The record shows that the motion was withdrawn.

Th  $\cdot$  clerk here read the record of yesterday.

The Speaker: The gentleman from Bangor (Mr. Fairbanks) moves to reconsider the vote whereby the journal of yesterday was approved.

Mr. Fairbanks: As the gentleman from Limerick states that he withdrew his point of no quorum, I make no further objection and wi hdraw my motion.

## (Discussion ensued.)

Mr. POWERS of Houlton, raised a point of order upon the bill and amendments and the form in which it shall be after it receives the amendments, by calling attention to House rule 14, found on page 89 of the Year Book, "when any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by a reconsideration, and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days notice is given to the House of which the mover is a member." Mr. Powers said he claimed that the whole matter, from beginning to end, was out of order under this rule. The same subject matter has been rejected by this House. At this late day in the session, to spring upon us any measure of this kind, seems to me to be very unwise.

The gentleman from Bath, Mr. Twitchell, says he desires that druggists may sell intoxicating liquors legally, and if I understand his reason he says he desires it because they are all now selling illegally as a medicine I never supposed that the men who are persistently violating the law were the best friends of that law. His reasoning would be, "Wolves kill lambs illegally I will introduce a bill so they may kill them legally hereafter." I do not believe in class legislation. I believe that a proper and a fair administration of the town agency system would accomplish all that is contemplated under this bill. I do not know who desires this law. I do not know that temperance people ask for what is presented here. I do know that I have received many letters opposed to it, and before our committee there have been many remonstrances against any druggists' bill.

It seems to me at this late hour, at the very close of this session, when we have had one druggists' bill before us which has been defeated, to spring upon us any legislation of this kind and especially any class legislation of any kind and attempt to put it through this House under the whip and spur, is wrong. I protest against this way of legislating. I know this, that any druggists' bill I

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have examined I have serious objections to I hope the motion to indefinitely postpone will prevail. I raise the point of order on the bill and amendments.

The Chair must d cide on this question on the spur of the moment, without a thorough examination of the matter, and will decide that the measure is properly before the House; and principally for the reason that while the gentleman from Houlton raises the question that it was not properly before the House, he entered upon a discussion of the merits of the bill.

Mr. HIGGINS of Limerick, moved the previous question which was ordered.

Amendment "A" offered by Mr. TWITCHELL of Bath was rejected.

Amendment "B" offered by Mr. GOWER of Winthrop was also rejected.

# STATE OF MAINE.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, AUGUSTA, March 2, 1893.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

In compliance with the constitutional requirement applicable to the executive, you will permit me to submit, for your consideration, some suggestions relating to the financial condition of the State; and I also submit herewith a communication from the State treasurer, a statement of appropriations already made at this session, amounting to the sum of \$1,184,514.80; also an estimate from the State treasurer of the additional regular expenditures required for the year 1893, amounting to the sum of \$410.020.74; also a statement of proposed appropriations for 1893, reported by committees and now pending before the legislature, amounting to the sum of \$169.425.86; and also a statement of the estimated additional appropriations asked for and now pending before committees, that have not been finally adjudicated upon, amounting to the sum of \$86,500.00, making an aggregate of \$1,850,461.40

I also have the honor to submit herewith an estimate from the State treasurer, of the receipts for the year 1893. It is based on general laws as they existed on the first day of January last.

An additional revenue of some thirty-five or forty thousand dollars will be received from the railroads, by reason of increased taxation upon these corporations; but sixty per cent. of the additional revenue received from the Maine Central Railroad must be refunded to the various cities and towns, and also quite a per cent. of the additional revenue received from the Boston and Maine Railroad, and a very large portion of this increased revenue comes from these two corporations.

One-half of whatever additional amount of revenue may be received from the savings banks will be distributed to various towns for school purposes. These two items constitute the principal portion of the additional revenue secured by recent legislation. It will therefore be observed that while all of this increased revenue, in the first instance, is paid into the State treasury, it is not entirely available to meet appropriations made by the legislature, for existing laws provide that a large portion of the same shall be used for other specific purposes.

The appropriations for the year 1891 amounted to the sum of \$1,657 936.47. Two hundred thousand dollars, on account of the temporary loan, was included in such appropriations

The first appropriation bill passed at this session of the Legislature, also included two hundred thousand dollars, on account of such temporary loan, but if excessive appropriations are to follow, the treasurer will be required to renew this entire loan, and use the money appropriated for this specific object, for other purposes.

Our existing temporary loan of three hundred thousand dollars reaches the constitutional limit. We are precluded by the Constitution, from creating "any debt, or debts, liability, or liabilities, on behalf of the State, which shall singly or in the aggregate, with previous debts and liabilities hereafter incurred at any one time, exceed three hundred thousand dollars, except to suppress insurrection, to repel invasion or for the purposes of war."

This loan of three hundred thousand dollars has existed since 1890, and it is certainly desirable that a payment shall be made on the same, and the funds appropriated for such purpose should not be diverted to meet other liabilities, created by special appropriations hereafter made.

And in this connection, you will also permit me to refer to the report of the State Treasurer, for the year 1892: It will be observed upon examination, (Page 49) that in the year 1887, our expenditures exceeded our receipts \$6,563.42; for the year 1888, the excess of expenditures over our receipts was \$40,004,62; for the year 1889, \$306,105,00; for the year 1890, \$107,712.24; the report shows that for the year 1891, our receipts exceeded our expenditures, \$34,937.43. While

during the year 1891 there is an apparent excess of receipts over expenditures, yet there is included in such receipts, \$357,702.10, refunded to the State from the United States Government, on account of the direct tax; and except for this item of revenue, there would have been an excess of expenditures over receipts for the year 1891, of \$322,764.67. The year 1892 shows an excess of receipts over expenditures of \$107,166.08, and is the first time during the past six years that our ordinary income has been equal to our expenditures.

Sound financial and business principles absolutely require, that our expenditures shall not exceed our receipts, and that the State should have a surplus at all times available in its treasury.

It is a duty that is imperative upon us, in the administration of the affairs of the State to practice frugality, to carefully scrutinize all appropriations, and confine them to the narrowest limits consistent with the welfare of the people, the State and its institutions, and endeavor to reduce the rate of State taxation. While we are striving to secure new and additional revenues to the State from various sources, it will be of little avail in relieving the tax payers of the State, if it serves only to encourage appropriations which are not absolutely necessary.

The legislature determines the amount of appropriations, after investigation and hearing. No other department of the Government has the right to exercise that authority. The discretion and power rests where it should, with the chosen representatives of the people; and as I have suggested in a former communication to the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives, the whole subject is within your control "It concerns every citizen of the State; it is your good judgment that must govern: and every measure should be considered upon its own intrinsic merits."

And before the session closes, in the performance of the constitutional duties committed to you by the suffrages of the people, you will determine the rate of taxation for State purposes, for the coming two years, upon the valuation of the State; and that rate must depend upon the good judgment and wisdom of the legislature, in making appropriations from the public treasury.

The Supreme Court of the State of Maine has held "That the power of taxation for the defense and benefit of the people' is limited only by the good sense and sound judgment of the legislature." Our court has also held that "It is not for the judicial department to determine where legitimate taxation ends." It is the province of the legislature.

I do not favor illiberality toward any of the interests or institutions of the State. I would deal with them justly, even liberally rather than penuriously; but we should, in considering all of these questions, constantly remember, that it is the money of all the people we are appropriating, that appropriations of money demand taxation; and that the little streams of revenue flowing from all sections of our State into the public treasury, from which these appropriations are made, are the fruits of industry and toil, and should be guarded as vigilantly as the sagacious man would protect his private means.

I carefully refrain at this time from expressing any opinion for or against any of the proposed appropriations before your honorable bodies for consideration, but I have deemed it my duty to present to the legislature the accompanying statements from the treasury department, with the foregoing suggestions.

The people have imposed a great trust upon the legislature and the executive, and I earnestly urge the utmost conservatism. Our appropriations should be governed by the actual needs; we should strive to keep our expenditures within reasonable limits; then, we shall have conformed to the imperative demands of the occasion, and fulfilled the confident expectations of our constituents.

#### To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

In view of the growing tendency towards excessive legislation of a private character, the prevailing feeling of uncertainty and doubt as to the scope that should be given to this class of legislation, under the prohibitory clauses of our constitution applicable to this subject, it is apparent that some effort should be made to limit within reasonable bounds the private legislation that is constantly increasing with each succeeding legislature. It unnecessarily encroaches upon the time of the legislature and has a tendency to divert our attention from legislative matters that more intimately concern the public interests of the State. A thorough and exhaustive examination of this subject will require much care and attention. With the great accumulation of public matters requiring the attention of legislative committees during the session of the legislature, they do not have the necessary time to devote to this special subject.

The legislature will permit me to suggest the desirability of providing for a committee or commission to take into consideration the general subject of private and special legislation, to ascertain what subjects of this character may properly be provided for by general laws, and report to the next legislature, with necessary drafts of bills applicable to such subjects. The whole matter can in this way be placed before the legislative branch at the commencement of the next session, and such general laws can be passed as are deemed advisable; then the legislature can properly relieve itself from considering a large mass of subjects that should be provided for by such laws.

From the information I have been able to obtain bearing upon our expenditures in this direction, if suitable provision can be made by public acts for such subjects of private legislation as may appropriately be provided for, it will reduce future State expenditures at each session of the legislature, at least twelve thousand dollars.

I am satisfied, from an examination of previous legislation, that the enactment of such general or public laws, applicable to special and private legislation as are contemplated under the provisions of our constitution, requiring that the legislature shall provide as far as practicable by general laws for all matters usually appertaining to special or private legislation, and for the formation of private corporations, will dispense with a very large portion of the private and special acts that will in the future require legislative attention, better conserve the people and business interests of the State, curtail the enormous expense attending legislation of this character, and shorten the sessions of future legislatures by several weeks.

I believe there is a general demand that a movement in this direction should be inaugurated, and if any other method more desirable to secure this purpose, suggests itself to the legislature, I shall be pleased to co-operate with you in its accomplishment.

The Speaker declared a recess and requested the members to retain their seats; then turning to the Rev. Mr. Randall, Chaplain of the House, said:

Mr. Randall, I have been asked by your many friends in the House to perform what is to me a very pleasant duty. You have been, for now many years, associated with the legislature of Maine in your present capacity. Your services have always been very gladly and profitably received. The members of the legislatures gone by rem mber with grateful pleasure your efforts in their behalf. The members of this legislature from day to day have listened to you as you have asked for them the blessings of the Divine Being; and in behalf of your many friends, I now present to you this token of their regard. Take it, with their be-t and most heartf lt wishes; and as this shall measure the days and the hours as they pass, it is the wish of your friends that in the evening of life the sun may descend very slowly for you in the western horizon.

Rev. Mr. Randall responded as follows: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House-Language is inadequate to express my emotions at this time. To say I thank you, that I heartily thank you, is but a tame expression; and yet my heart, my whole be ng says I thank you heartily. I thank you for this beautiful gift, walued in itself, but more valuable as it expresses the feelings of the members with reference to myself, personally. This is the sixth session that I have had the privilege-for I deem it suchof being the chaplein of the House of Representatives. I have universally received the kindest attention from the members of the I have received as their expression shows, the kind atten-House. tion and the good wishes of the members of this House. I esteem this a valuable present not only for its intrinsic value but for the feeling it express s on the part of the members of the House, and b cause it comes from the members of the House of Representatives of this noble State of Maine-my adopted State-I could almost say my native State. It will be sixty-five years next August since I became a resident of Maine. I have watched the progress and improvement of this State during all these years. This State was but eight years old when I became a resident of it. Ι have known personally nearly all of its Governors, I have known personally and have claimed and have received as my friends most of the prominent citizens of the State. I have watched the progress of the reforms of the State and have been identified with There are but few gentlemen of this House who can them remember the past as I can. I say I have witnessed with interest the great progress that this State has made in all its departmentsits educational interests, its commercial interests, its financial interests and every department of the State; but, Mr. Speaker and gentlemen, this State has only just begun its progress. There are higher and nobler and more glorious things in reserve for this State. Horace Greeley said "young men, go West." That was very wrong. Too many have accepted his advice, but now young men are staying in this State, and if this State goes on in its energy and its improvement as it has since my acquaintance with it, it will not only be as it is now, one of the most moral and best states in New England, but as its motto says it will lead the states of the Union.

I did not intend to extend my remarks as I have, but my heart throbs with interest for the welfare of the State of Maine. This is my last service as chaplain of the House. When dying I will look with interest upon the welfare of the State and what little I have done towards that welfare.

Again thanking you, sir, for the very fitting and yet undeserved manner in which you have presented this, and again thanking this legislature for this beautiful and valuable gift, I say as I said in my prayer, "God bless this legislature, God bless the people of Maine," and as you sha'l separate from each other, may you so live as to meet in that higher temple above. [Applause]

Mr. BIRD of Portland said:

This legislature is now about to close and I have no doubt that the heart of every member throbs with delight at the prospect of returning once more to the joys of domestic life and the ordinary cares of business. But with this gladness we feel aggrieved that we must part from these members who are our acquaintances and our friends, and an acquaintance and a fr endship which we never under like circumstances can renew—for never can we meet again as we meet now. But there is one among us all who, from the eminent position which he occupies in this House, stands in a peculiar position, and in parting from this friend I believe our grief is more poignant than in regard to any other. He who presides over the deliberation of a House like this must recognize the claims of the majority, while in a'l respects he is just to the minority. He must be prompt without haste. He must be firm without severity, and his courage must be as undoubted as it is calm and dispassionate. To him is confided the keeping of the dignity of the House. I believe in the Speaker who has presided over our deliberations we have had such an one. He has well maintained the dignity of the House, he has presided over these deliberations with courage and with fairness, and in all the affairs of this House I do not remember that he has given vent to one hasty expression or marked with passion one act. As a member of the minority, and in speaking for them, I believe I voice the feelings of every member of this House. I deside to offer in recognition of his services, a resolution:

Resolved, That in just and grateful recognition of his unfailing courtesy, strict impartiality and eminent abilities, this House tenders its thanks to the Hon. A. R. Savage for his distinguished services in presiding over its deliberations.

# Mr. SPRAGUE of Monson said :

Mr. Clerk: The last moment in all that is earthly is certain to come in every human experience. The sadness of parting, the bitterness of farewell, is a part of the web and woof of human life. We came together here, most of us, as strangers. We came from different parts of the State, representing different interests, often conflicting interests. We have had animated debates, we have had matters of vast interest to us and our constituents, but yet through it all, I believe that a spirit of harmony and of the most kindly feeling has prevailed; and I think that very much of that is owing to the very kindly spirit which has emanated from the Speaker's chair. I believe that the Chair has not only been dignified. but extremely courteous, and kini and friendly and fair to all. I desire simply to second this resolution, and not only to thank the Speaker for his courtesy and kindness to me throughout this session, but to every member of the House I feel under great obliga ion for the kindness with which I have been treated; and it is a sad thought for me that this is the last time that we shall ever meet together in this capacity. Gentlemen, I bid you all farewell. 1 hope you will safely return to your home and that a pleasant and happy future may be yours.

### Mr. SCOTT of Patten said :

This legislature is about to pass into history. The making of that history has been our work. Whether or not that work merits

praise or blame is for others, not for us, to determine. In the conflict of many and varied interests it has not been possible that every good measure should succeed, or every bad measure should suffer defeat. In our many and sometimes heated conflicts keen thrusts have been given and received, but no go d, honest fighter ever harbors ill will for blow or wounds received in fair and open battle. As our conflicts have been conflicts of ideas and not of persons the keen thrusts of our opponents have left no sting behind, and as one who has trespassed often upon the patience of this House, I desire to thank you one and all for the unfailing kindness, courtesy and consideration which I have always received at your In behalf of every member of this House, especially of hands. the misority of this House, it is my pleasant duty to second the resolution of the gentleman from Portland. To the dignity with which our Speaker has pre-ided is due the decorum with which the House has transacted its business. To his impartiality is due the fact that no member, whatever his views or however inexperienced or diffident, has been denied a hearing. To his high cha acter, his ability and kindness is due the confidence and esteem in which we all hold him.

In past years the Speaker's chair has been but the stepping stone to higher honors which have been worthily worn. We count our Speaker no less worthy than his illustricus predecessors, and it is our wish and hope that his public career may not be ended with his services as Speaker of this House, but that his course may ever be onward and upward; and we can wish for him in the future nothing better than that whatever position he may be called to fill he may fill it with the same credit to himself and the same benefit to the public with which he has filled that Speaker's chair.

## Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor said :

Mr. Clerk: The hour for final adjournment of this House is near at hand. Our labor is done, and we are to return to our several avocations of life and meet the voters who sent us here. How well we have performed the tasks set before us the future must attest when our works have been scrutinized. That this has been a working body none will question, when they view the vast number of propositions that have been presented to us. We have found our hard duties tempered with pleasure which has come to us from the bright and cheerful countenances which we soon learned to recognize after organizing. To me your faces have been an inspiration through the long hours of our deliberations and I am thankful for this sunlight which God in his wisdom planted in the faces of mankind.

The business of this House has been manly and deliberative. It is creditable to the people of the State, whom we represent, and it is not a boast on my part, when I declare that the people did well when they sent you here to represent their interests. Our presiding officer has been unusually satisfactory. Never too slow, and always giving a member opportunity to be heard if he desired. Day after day you have watched for his pause, after declaring a vote to ascertain if any member objected. This alone has marked him the fair and impartial man we believed him to be when elected to the honorable and important position of Speaker of this House. May his years of life be many, achieving with each cycle new and higher recognition of his abilities from the people, as a just reward. Your faces, your many expressions of kindness, will leave a lasting impression upon my heart, and while

"'Tis grievous parting with good company,"

I may be allowed to add that

"Hereafter, in a better world than this, I shall desire more love and knowledge of you."

#### Mr. SYLVESTER of Lisbon said :

Mr. Clerk: Amid the many meetings that have occurred along the pathway of our lives, one of pleasant remembrance will be this Sixty-sixth Legislature that has brought us together as the representatives of the people that we love, the people of our beloved State of Maine.

We came here as the people's choice, and how good or bad that choice, our acts here this session, after being passed upon by the people, will prove. While some doubt may exist as to the correctness of some of our acts, if we have acted with a desire of doing the best we knew, we shall have no regrets, unless it shall be the regret born of that noble desire for that higher knowledge which shall keep us from all mistakes. The hope that our meeting here will add somewhat to the happiness and prosperity of our people must be the desire of each of us. With our pleasures has been mingled the gall of bitterness—death. To what degree each of us has tasted of that bitter cup is known only to ourselves and is measured by the love that we bore those that are gone and the shadow of sorrow is as deep in our hearts as was the love and friendship that we bore them. If I have any wish to make for the future, it is that we may be honest to ourselves and hold to those principles that are upheld by truth and justice, those principles that ever have and ever will survive all else, rather than to act and do those things that are questionable for the sake of influence and power. For all wrong things must have an end. Strive to be better to day than you were yesterday, is the motto that I would ask you to adopt. And this is a good motto for all mankind and will do good to those who will adopt it.

Mr. Speaker: I believe I but express the feelings of all the members of this House when I say we feel to thank you for the kindness and courtesy you have shown us all. I believe we owe to you that friendship which is of the highest order, that friendship which a friend owes to a friend. Accept it, for friendship and love are among the riches of this life that cannot be bought or sold.

Friend Cotton: You who have shown us all courtesy as clerk of this House, I must but express the feelings of all of us when I say from thankful hearts we thank you.

Fellow Representatives and Attendants of the House: Our meeting has been a pleasant one and our parting has in it that measure of sadness for each one of us, in that same degree that our meeting together has been a pleasure to us. I now thank you all that have made this session so pleasant and I hope your remembrance of me may be no alloy to your future happiness. I wish you all a God bless you.

# Mr. SHAW of Portland said:

In rising to second the resolution I desire to add my approval to the able and impartial manner in which our presiding officer has performed the duties incumbent upon him. The length of the session indicates many delicate positions in which he has been placed and the points which he has decided, but, I think, to say that he has been impartial will only voice the sentiment of the House. As the session draws to a close and we break the pleasant associations we have made, the breaking of no tie will be more severe than our parting with him who has so ably and efficiently filled the high and honorable position he now holds; and I hope that when this vote is taken that it will be by a rising vote and unanimous.

# Mr. SPILLANE of Lewiston said :

For many days we have looked forward in happy anticipation to the hour when this House will adjourn. To-night we part, but that separation is one only in reality and not in spirit. By the union of two great forces, memory and imagination, we can have the absent present; for memory can traverse with lightning like rapidity space and distance, imagination can annihilate time, and the absent are before us. Again we can feel the hearty clasp of friendship. Once more kindly and honest eyes will look into In regard to him who has so ably presided over our delibours. erations I have no language to express what I would. I can assure you, gentlemen, who have ever been kind and courteous. that the parting to me is sad. May heaven shower upon you all its choicest blessings, may the pathway of your life and of those you love be strewn with the flowers of peace and happiness. To the clerk who has so ably performed his duties, and to all the officers of the House, the House as a whole extends its kindest regards. It affords me pleasure to second the resolutions that have been present d.

### Mr. BOOTHBY of Saco said :

I should be untrue to my own feelings if I did not detain the House for a moment to heartily endorse the resolution that has been presented. One of our number, since we have assembled here at this session, has passed away. We shall ever cherish his memory and regret that his pleasant associations with us were so unexpectedly severed. He occupied this seat, but he exchanged the seat for a place at the right hand of God.

It seems to me that there a e no words that can expression appreciation of the valuable services of our Speaker. I doubt not but what he has already that reward which the consciousness of duty well, performed always brings to the soul; but to that we wish to add this feeble tribute of our respect and appreciation for his services. We part to-night to meet again not on the shores of time. My carnest wish is that blessings rich as heaven can bestow may always be yours.

Mr. LANE of Augusta said :

It is always my fortune to get down pretty well on the list so that whatever I would have said is covered by those who precede me; but I heartily second the resolutions offered by the gentleman from Portland. Named for Speaker by the unanimous voice of the dominant party of this House, the ability, dignity and courtesy with which the duties of the Chair have been performed, have merited the unanimous approval of the House. The decisions of the Chair have been always correct—never arbitrary; and while firm in adherence to the rules, they have been tempered by that tender sympathy for the members which have rendered the decisions rather the promptings of a friend to guard against possible error, than the rulings of the Chair.

It has been my fortune for many years to observe the progress of legislation, and especially the conduct of affairs by the presiding officers by both branches of the legislature. I detract nothing from the ability accorded to the eminent gentlemen who have presided over this House in the years past, when I say that among that long line of distinguished men, the Speaker of this House has never had a The uniform courtesy and kindness, the patient insuperior. dulgence which you, Mr. Speaker, have always accorded to me, merits my most sincere thanks. And while I am glad that you, gentlemen of this House, have discharged your duties and are ready to go home, I shall be glad to see you again, and if you are not to come here as members of this House I trust that you all, who do not come here as members, will be promoted to that more lucrative body, the lobby. Gentlemen, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Clerk, and all of the officers of the House, accept my thanks for your uniform courtesy.

### Mr. WOODBURY of Deering said:

I am conscious of the fact that there is no member who is under so great a debt of gratitude to the Speaker of the House as I am. I am well aware that my voice has been heard more often than you wished it might, more often than I wished it might, but I am not aware that I have ever addressed the Speaker and seen a scowl upon his face when he has observed that the one who addressed him was up here in the center of the House.

I wish to thank the members of the House for the great kindness and courtesy which they have habitually shown me. I do not like to say good-bye; it is a hard word to say. I am sorry to go out from here. We have made good friends here, and I trust that we shall carry the recollections of this session with us to our homes and that we shall cherish them, and that the friendships formed will not be for a few months alone but that they will be abiding friendships.

I want to say a single word in regard to the officers of the House. I have no doubt that if any two of us had been called away, the legislature would have gone on just the same ; but I question whether we could have got along if our clerk and assistant clerk had been called away. I question if we could have got along without our messengers. I should have voted to adjourn without day if our pages had been called away. Let me say in all sincerity that the service which has been rendered to the House by these officers has been perfect service. I wish to say a word about another class of I have occasionally been met by my friends who have conofficials. gratulated me upon something I had said here in the House. Ι have been somewhat surprised until I looked at the newspaper, and, when I read the paper I myself have been somewhat astonished at what I said; and I wish to convey my gratitude to the reporters who have taken some of the remarks I have made and worked them up into a very good speech and have sent them out to the world. What some of us owe to these reporters is more than we care to acknowledge.

I am sorry that the hour of parting is come, but I trust that the parting will not be a parting that shall be permanent, but that the friendships made here will be friendships made for all time. Mr. Clerk, I would add my second to the resolution which has been presented in relation to our Speaker. I would say to you with all my heart that I appreciate the kindness and courtesy you have uniformly shown. I approve the discretion you have used, I approve the course in which you have directed this legislature and I wish you personally all of the prosperity which the highest ambition could desire.

Mr. SHAW of Bath said:

I would not like to leave this body without saying a few words to express my appreciation of the gentleman who has so ably presided over this House. I know that I echo the sentiments of this House when I say that the Speaker, by his courteous bearing and gentlemanly conduct has won the respect and esteem of all the members of this House. When the announcement was made that he would be a candidate for the speakership, I was more than gratified; for having had a personal acquaintance with him for years, I knew that he would fill the position with honor to the State and with credit to himself. That he has done so, all of us here can testify; and we shall leave here with best wishes for his future prosperity and happiness. As we are about to part I wish to convey to you all, the Speaker, the clerks and the other officers of the House, my best wishes for your prosperity. I heartily second the resolution that has been offered.

# Mr. DREW of Fort Fairfield said :

I feel I would do violence to my own feelings if I did not rise to second this resolution. When we met here three months ago, I being a member of the majority party and having served the last House with our present Speaker it became my pleasant duty to place his name in nomination as Speaker. I then promised you that he would preside with despatch, with dignity, impartiality and kindness. I feel that he has so kept every promise I then made that we all have not only great respect but even tender affection for the Hon. Albert R. Savage.

### Mr. PRATT of Turner said :

Mr. Clerk: I should violate my inclinations and be recreant to what I feel to be my duty, did I not at this time join in the kind expressions of gratitude to our distinguished Speaker, and the heartfelt appreciations of the able and courteous manner in which he has presided over our deliberations. These testimonies are not mere words, formal and meaningless, but sincere expressions of genuine gratitude and esteem. Always prompt, courteous and impartial, our honorable Speaker richly deserves this generous bestowal of honest praise. Although citizens of the same county and of adjoining towns, I can hardly claim to have been acquainted with him previous to the assembling of this legislature, and I desire here and now to unite with those who have preceded me in thanking him for the uniform friendliness with which he has ever greeted me, and for the valuable assistance which he has so often and so freely given To the other members of this honorable body, I desire to say me. that the acquaintances which I have here made I shall always highly prize. As has been said, we met as strangers-I trust we part I believe we can justly claim to have done what seemed as friends. to us our duty to do.

To the clerks and other officers of the House, I desire to say that I am heartily in accord with the words of appreciation and respect which have been so eloquently expressed; and I desire to second the resolutions offered by the gentleman from Portland.

#### Mr. MARSTON of Skowhegan said:

When I came into this House to-night, I came with a firm determination that I would not say anything, but would leave it to these better qualified to do the talking than I, but I feel that I should be delinquent to my duty did I not try to find words to express my feelings at this time, therefore I simply rise to heartily concur in and to second, the resolution offered by the gentleman from Portland. Being privileged to sit in the legislature two years ago with our Speaker, I felt that I knew him, and when I received a communication saying that Albert R. Savage was to be a candidate for Speaker of this House at this session, it took but the next mail to carry my feelings back that no better man could be found. I felt that I knew him; I knew his worth; I knew his ability; I knew his courage, and it is with pleasure, gentlemen, that I am privileged to stand here and thank the honorable Speaker for the courtesies that he has extended to me, the aid he has rendered me in my feeble endeavors to do my duty.

Fellow members, I will say just a word to you. We met here in January last, the most of us as strangers. We were sent here with a duty to perform, and whether we have performed that duty well or not, is for the verdict of the people to determine; but let us hope and trust that that verdict shall be such that we can point with pride to the history of this session, and feel that our duty has been faithfully and intelligently performed. The acquaintances I have made here this winter, the associations I have formed, the kind acts and courtesies I have received at your hands, will always be remembered by me. They shall be written upon memory's tablets in letters of gold. We met as strangers but we part as friends. We have entered into debate on the floor of this House which has brought out the fire and the ardor of the members, but not an unkind word has ever been spoken in the heat of that debate; nothing but kindly feelings has been expressed. We part to night never to meet again in this capacity, and as we go out upon our varied walks of life, it is my most sincere wish that God will speed, that He will give you success and happiness and good health for you and yours, and at last, when He calls you to the great beyond, that He will then care for you as we know He will.

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Mr. HIGGINS of Limerick said :

Although almost physically unalle to speak at all I should regret very much if I allowed this opportunity to pass without taking occasion to express my high esteem for the Speaker of this House. I think if there is any gentleman in this House who is able to judge of the difficulties of the position that the Speaker occupies, I am the one; and that has been so strongly impressed upon my mind that I wish now to say that I am thankful that I have had the opportunity of being a member while the present Speaker presided during my membership.

I wish to extend to every member of this House my heartfelt thanks for the courtesy I have received at their hands, perhaps sometimes undeserved, and I would join with my friend from Patten in saying that the wounds we have received in battle have left no scar behind.

# Mr. EMERSON of Portland said:

I should do injustice to my own feelings if I did not state here that among the pleasantest memories I take back with me to my home is that of the presiding officer of this House, not only as the distinguished citizen of the State, not only as the just, fair, impartial presiding officer, but as the genial, loving and lovable friend; and I cordially second the resolutions of my colleague.

#### Mr. COFFIN of Bangor said :

I have resisted many temptations to speak before this House, but at this time I feel that I should not do justice to myself if I did not say a word to express the feelings I have for the courtesy we have always received at the hands of our Speaker and the fellow members of the House. I feel that there is nothing new which I can add to what has already been said on the subject, but I feel that there is much that cannot be said, even by those who are gifted in speech. There are many sentiments that we cannot find words to express, and among those is the sentiment that comes from the hearts of each one of us, as we are about to part to meet no more in this But we all hope to meet one another from year to year, capacity. and it will always be a pleasure to remember our being here in 1893, when many came together as strangers from all parts of our State, with different interests in our minds, with different views in our hearts; but we have come together and have recognized one

another in friendly greetings, we have recognized one another in friendly discussion and debat<sup>o</sup>, and it seems to me that we have come in the best of feeling towards all of our fellow members. It seems to me that we have the best possible feeling towards the Speaker who has so ably presided over us, and we also have the best possible feeling towards all of the officers of this House, who have treated us so kindly in all our relations with this legislature.

### Mr. POWERS of Houlton said :

I desire to express my hearty and sincere approval of the resolutions offered by the gentleman from Portland. I also endorse most cordially and heartily the sentiments that have been expressed by the various speakers upon the floor of this House in reference to those resolutions and our Speaker. I knew when he was elected that he would prove all we wished, that his ability, his integrity and his honesty were unquestioned; and I know, since I have been here, that his patience has been very great. I have mingled myself somewhat in various debates, and I wish to say here and now that if at any time I have seemed to trench upon or to speak harshly in reference to any member, I desire that they will attribute it solely to the heat of debate. With reference to every person in this House, with reference to every one of the officers connected with this House, I wish to say that I entertain nothing but the most kindly feelings. I hope if we never all of us meet again as a body, as we probably never shall, that we may frequently meet individually, and I assure you, gentlemen, one and all, that it will be to me a great pleasure to meet you here or elsewhere, at any and al I heartily second the resolutions. times.

# Mr. LAWRENCE of Lubec said :

Although I can add nothing to the remarks that have been made, I do not feel as though I should do my duty if I did not express my heartfelt thanks for the kindness that has been shown me, not only by the Speaker but by the members of this House. I came here a total stranger, I met you as friends—I met you as warm friends. I wish to heartily thank our honorable Speaker, not only for his kindness and courtesy as a presiding officer, but as a teacher, as a counsellor. When I have been in doubt I have sought his advice and it has been most kindly given. If you ever come to the last place on earth, Lubec, and call upon me, you will find the latch-string out and you will receive a most hearty welcome. Mr. PARKER of Danforth said :

I would hardly be doing myself justice if I did not heartily endorse the sentiment expressed in the resolution offered by the gentle-In looking over the past and thinking of the man from Portland. many measures with which I have had to do, and perhaps with some degree of earnestness, it seems to me strange that there has not been some word spoken here either by myself or some other member, which has caused some hard feelings. But I believe there has not been a hard word spoken, or an unkind one. As for the presiding officer, I have thought a great many times that I should see a scowl upon his face when I have addressed him, but as has already been said, we have been treated with courtesy to a great degree, and I wish to thank him for the courtesy which he has extended to me, and also to each member who has used me so kindly I wish to express my heartfelt gratitude.

Mr. ROBERTS of Norway said :

As others have remarked, it was not my intention to say anything. When we are so soon to leave these familiar scenes, when we are to pass out of these halls and down these broad steps and out under the silent stars, and be scattered to the various parts of the State, to go to the homes we love so well, to engage again in the varied pursuits of life. I could not remain silent without rising to express my thanks to the Speaker of this House, to the officers and to the members, for the high consideration they have ever accorded me. The days we have spent here, although they have been days of work, have been pleasant days. We shall always remember them with glad feelings and with feelings of regret, also that we can never all meet again in this world.

#### Mr. BEAN of Mason said :

I have not the ability to make such a speech as those that have been made, but I rise merely to second the resolutions of the gentleman from Portland.

#### Mr. LITTLEFIELD of Poland said:

I do not rise to attempt to do more than simply second the resoluions that have been offered, and also to heartily endorse all that has been said of our Speaker, our clerks and the other attaches of the House, and I would add more to what has been said if my

ability was sufficient to enable me to do so; but all that I could think of has already been said in regard to the eminent and able services that have been rendered by our Speaker and the other officers and attaches of the House. But to the members of this House I owe some words of thankfulness for the kindness and courtesy with which they have treated me ever since I became acquainted with them. Thrust upon your notice by circumstances beyond my control, I have felt that I was made unpleasantly conspicuous and that sometimes the words I have used must have been annoving to you. and I thank you all for the kindness and courtesy with which I have always been met and the consideration that has always been accorded me whenever I have seen fit to say a few words in this House; and although as has been said, we may never meet again as a body, yet I hope to meet you all in the various walks of life, and that we shall recall the scenes we have passed through this winter with mutual pleasure. And now, should any of you ever honor my humble home with your presence, rest assured that you will meet there a hearty and an honest welcome.

# Mr. ADAMS of Bangor said :

I fully realize that a page has no right of speech upon the floor of this House, but I ask unanimous consent to allow me to heartily endorse every word that has been said.

#### Mr. ABBOTT of Hollis said:

I am not a public speaker and I have no words to express my emotions and feelings touched as they are in view of our near separation; but I wish to thank the members of this House for their true courtesy and kindness to me during this session. I came to this House with no experience in legislative life, but you have regarded my feelings and suggestions in matters of legislation with more consideration than I should have dared to hope or expect. As we go from this House to-night I know it is doubtful if I shall meet you all again in this life, but I shall ever remember our pleasant associations. My acquaintance with you at this session is an acquaintance that I trust will be renewed in that higher, broader sphere of life that God has promised us. I thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your fairness, and I believe I voice the sentiment of every member of this House when I say that your conduct as presiding officer has been uniformly fair and impartial.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

#### Speaker SAVAGE said :

Gentlemen of the House and my Friends: I should be wanting in sincerity if at the present time I did not say to you that I am deeply touched by these generous words of your commendation. I said to you three months ago, when you chose me to preside over your deliberations, that the office of Speaker was a responsible one, and during the weeks that have passed by my sense of the re ponsibilities has constantly increased. I then begged your indulgence, that where I was weak, by your help I might be made strong; where I was lacking that you might make it up, that the work of the House might go on. I have felt sustained in all these weeks by your sympathetic support; and it is due more to your cordial and friendly support of your presiding officer, that personal, friendly relation which has grown up, I believe and trust, between you and myself, that I have been enabled to perform my duties with such a degree of success as you may bear witness to.

The work of the legislature of Maine is constantly increasing. It is significant of the prosperity which now seems about to take our beloved State out of the lethargy in which she has slept for so many years, and she seems now ready to spring forth like a giant in her strength, and take her proper place in the galaxy of states. From the beginning to the end of this session it has been a busy and hardworking one. What the verdict of our constituents may be on our labors we cannot tell; but as I look into your thoughtful, earnest faces to-night, I know this—that every vote which has been given and every word which has been said, has been given and said with a desire singly to promote the interest and the welfare of the State of Maine.

And now, my friends, the hour which severs such friendly associations as ours have been, is a sad one; especially when those associations have been so peculiarly friendly as during this session, a session in which there has been earnest struggle and warm debate, though no passionate debate. There has not been left, I believe, even a shadow of bitterness in the minds of any of us here. We go out from here, some cf us to again resume our private lives; some of us to be continued in the service of the State and to be returned here in future years. And now, as you go to your homes, I trust that prosperity and blessings will attend you all; and when I shall say to you "Good-bye" it will carry with it the meaning of the old Saxon phrase from which the expression was derived, "God be with you."

A life-sized portrait of the Speaker was brought into the House and placed in front of the clerk's desk.

Mr. SPILLANE of Lewiston, said :

For the last three months we have been associated together, and in those associations ties have been formed that the future will only strengthen and make pure and golden. Upon me has devolved the pleasing task of presenting to you, Mr. Speaker, this gift, symbolic in but a small degree of that high regard which each and every member of this House feels for you; and, gentlemen of the House, I feel like congratulating the majority party that they selected as their speaker one than whom there is none more worthy, more able or more fair. As high a regard as the majority party has for you, Mr. Speaker, we assure you that we of the minority hold an affection for you not less than theirs.

• We are about to part, and it is but fitting that we should give to him who has presided so honestly and so fairly, a gift by which he may remember us; and as you gaze upon that picture, Mr. Speaker, I know that ever and anon your memory will go back to this House and to this night, and I can assure you that in those scenes we again will part in spirit, for our hearts with yours will throb when that sympathetic chord is touched that sounds the symphony of love The gift is small but still it is priceless because of the and aff. ction. love that accompanies it. It is the wish of this House that you and yours may ever prosper and be happy; and, Mr. Speaker, may your friends be true, sincere, and in number, legion. May the pathway of your life be ever strewn with the flowers of love and of happiness. Again, Mr. Speaker, the House thanks you for the uniform kindness you have ever shown us and it trusts that no cares will ever burden your life or make it sad, and we trust that no wrinkle of care or sorrow may ever furrow your brow. May peace be ever yours.

THE SPEAKER: I cannot multiply words of thanks. I am deeply sensible of your kindness to me, and I shall take this gift to my home, and as often as I look upon it I shall remember the kindness of the House of the sixty-sixth legislature of Maine.

Under the leadership of Mr. Shaw of Bath, the members of the House arose and gave three cheers for the Speaker.

THE SPEAKER: Again I am under renewed obligations to the House.

Mr. KNOWLES of Parkman, presented the following:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered to the messengers, mail carriers, folders, door keepers and pages of this House for the fai hful, efficient and kindly manner in which they each and all have discharged the duties of their respective offices.

Mr. DAY of D x mont presented, the following:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered to the reporters of this House for their efficient work in giving to the public through the newspaper press the proceedings of this House during the entire session.

The resolves received a unanimous passage.

On motion of Mr. MARSTON of Skowhegan,

Ordered, That the gavel which has been used by the Speaker during the present session be presented to him.

A message was received from the Senate through Senator NICKERSON of Lincoln, informing the House that it had transacted all business before it and was ready to adjourn without day.

On motion of Mr. SHAW of Bath that gentleman was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body that the House had transacted all business before it and was ready to adjourn without day. Papers from the Senate :

Ordered, That a committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join. be appointed to wait on the governor and inform him that both branches of the legislature, having acted on all matters before them, are now ready to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

This order came from the Senate, read and passed with a committee appointed on its part as follows:

Messrs. Thatcher of Penobscot, Seiders of Cumberland, Hersom of York.

The order was read and passed in concurrence, and the committee was joined on the part of the House by

Messrs. Lane of Augusta, Knowles of Parkman, Buck of Orland, Morrill of Gray, Libby of Pittston, Abbott of Hollis, Pinkham of Lincoln.

Mr. LANE from the committee, subsequently reported that the governor would soon communicate with the House, through the secretary of State, and would transmit a list of acts and resolves passed by the lexislature, which had received his approval, and that he had nothing further to communicate.

Forthwith, a communication was received from the governor, transmitting a list of the acts and resolves passed by the legislature and approved by the governor, numbering 485 acts and 106 resolves, the titles of which are as follows:

An Act to amend chapter 234 of the Public Laws of 1889, relating to Fraternal Beneficiary Organizations.

An Act relating to Highway Ditches and Drains.

An Act to amend chapter 6, section 52 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Taxes on Telephone Companies.

An Act in relation to the Collection of Taxes.

An Act relating to Procedure in Equity.

An Act to amend chapter 86 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Trustee Suits.

An Act to fix the salary of the County Attorney for the County of Lincoln.

An Act in relation to the sale of Blooded Stock.

An Act to amend section 76 of chapter 86 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Judgments against Trustees.

An Act to amend chapter 284, Public Laws of eighteen hundred eighty-five, relating to Foreign Surety Companies.

An Act to define the age of children allowed to attend public schools.

An Act amendatory of sections 8 and 22 of chapter 63 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Registers of Probate Courts.

An Act to amend section 6 of chapter 51 of the Revised Statutes, relating to the extension of time of filing variations in the location of Railroads.

An Act for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

An Act to amend section 42 of chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Taxation of Railroads.

### RULES.

### DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

### DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

#### CHAPLAINS.

4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.

5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

### MONITORS.

6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.

7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

### COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon :

> On ways and means, On leave of absence, On bills in the third reading, On engrossed bills, On elections, To consist of seven members each. On county estimates, To consist of one member from each county. On business of the house, To consist of three members.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

### RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

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10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.

11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.

12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.

13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.

14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.

15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.

16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.

17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.

18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.

19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.

21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.

23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.

24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

### PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

25. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. Reports of committees and first reading of bills or resolves.

6th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.

7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.

8th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except, by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration, and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.

28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but— 1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on the table.

3d. For the previous question.

4th. To commit.

5th. To postpone to a day certain.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.

29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.

31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of onethird of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.

32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.

35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be

withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.

37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.

38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.

39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.

40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.

41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.

42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.

43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.

44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.

45. A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.

46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall be endorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.

47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.

48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.

49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.

50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.

51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.

52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.

53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.

54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.

55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, *Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor?* and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.

56. 'The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions, shall govern the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless twothirds of the members present shall consent thereto.

58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

On manufactures,

On agriculture,

On military affairs,

On towns,

On Indian affairs,

On claims,

On pensions,

On insane hospital,

On reform school,

On state prison,

On public buildings,

On library,

On state college of agriculture and the mechanic arts, On mines and mining,

- On temperance,
- On labor.

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.

3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the senate, or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly endorsed on the back of the same.

5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.

6. The title of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.

7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:

"Be it enacted in the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section 1."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.

9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.

10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, and every bill or resolve appropriating money, or disposing of state lands or other state property, reported in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.

11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.

13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.

14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.

15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.

16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.

17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

# Senate Order of Proceedings and Debates.

After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. The reception and reference of petitions, and such other papers as require action by a committee.

4th. The report of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but,

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on table.

3d. To postpone to a day certain.

4th. To commit.

5th. To amend.

6th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, *near the bottom*, with the county which he represents.

The senator presenting an *order* should put his name thereto, on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county which he represents.

# RULES OF THE SENATE.

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- " 2. Journal to be read—president to ascertain whether quorum is present before such reading.
- " 3. President to address senate, and senators address president, while speaking—senators to stand while speaking.
- " 4. Members to be styled *senators* while speaking.
- " 5. President may call a senator to the chair during brief absence.
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- " 7. Motion to adjourn always in order.
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- " 18. Bills in second reading to go to committee-their duty.

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- " 22. Order of business-secretary to keep a calendar of bills.
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- " 33. Standing committees of senate.

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### RULES.

1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president *pro tempore* be chosen.

2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.

3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.

4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.

5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.

7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.

8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time before a decision, or any amendment be made to it.

10. No senator shall address the senate until recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and not then more than three times without leave.

11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree.

12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no

senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.

13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.

14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.

15. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.

16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

17. Every paper shall be once read at the table before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.

18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.

19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.

20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.

21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.

4th. Reports of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc., offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.

5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the house, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.

24. After question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.

25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.

26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.

27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.

28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secreey.

29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of twothirds of the members present.

30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.

31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.

32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot), and appointed by the senate.

33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading.

On engrossed bills.

To consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.

35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.

36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.

37. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

## MEMORANDA.

- 1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a *report* of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the *order* or other paper appointing said committee to consider the subject.
- 3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of \_\_\_\_\_," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be indorsed thus, "Petition of \_\_\_\_\_ and others of the town of \_\_\_\_\_," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "*Petition of* ——," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]

- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, *near the bottom*, with the county in which he resides.
- 7. The member presenting an *order* should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county in which he resides.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which *leave* to *withdraw* was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The *original*, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented *de novo*.
- 9. Bills and resolves *refused a passage*, *rejected or postponed indefinitely* by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.
- 10. The heading or caption of *bills* should be as follows:

13. All bills amended by statute, by striking out words from any section or independent clause thereof, or by adding or inserting other words and provisions, should recite the section or clause as it would read after being amended as proposed.

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
