AUGUSTA, WEDNESDAY, January 2, 1895.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Laws of the State, the members of the House of Representatives elect assembled in the Hall of the House and were called to order by W. S. Cotton, Clerk of the House of 1893.

Prayer by the Rev. C. S. Cummings of Augusta.

The certified roll of Representatives elect was called by the Clerk and 150 members responded to the call, and a quorum found to be present.

On motion of Mr. TWITCHELL of Bath,

Messrs. Twitchell,

Parkhurst of Bangor, Lane of Augusta, Lawrence of Lubec, Abbott of Bucksport, Stanley of Alfred, Winslow of Portland,

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties. Mr. TWITCHELL subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon the Governor, attended by the Council, came in and administered to the members elect, and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and suite then retired.

On motion of Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth,

The report was accepted and Hon. Llewellyn Powers having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Sixty-Seventh Legislature for the years 1895–1896.

The Speaker elect was conducted to the chair by Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent.

Mr. POWERS said:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:

I accept with unfeigned gratitude the office of speaker of this legislative body, which you have so generously tendered me. I appreciate not only the honor conferred but also the various duties

and responsibilities that must obviously attend the formation of committees and the presiding over your deliberations; and I earnestly bespeak from you all a charitable judgment and forbearance and your friendly assistance and support both individually and as an organization.

We have left our several avocations in life and have assembled here not merely to legislate for our own localities and our several districts or to gratify personal ends and aims but rather to be imbued with views broad enough to embrace what is best for all and to work for the progress, the advancement and the future prosperity of our great and noble State. Fortunately indeed no great emergency or crisis confronts us as a State or nation at this time. Peace, plenty and evidences of returning prosperity on every hand gladden our hearts and fill our hills and valleys with refined and happy homes. It might not be inappropriate for me at this time to state briefly what has undoubtedly already presented itself to the minds of you all, that it is our privilege and duty to assist in enacting only equal, just and wise laws; in caring for the unfortunate and suffering; in preserving order, individual security and personal liberty regulated by law; in righting wrongs, correcting abuses, promoting the welfare and the better education of all classes regardless of their conditions in life. These and kindred objects, which I will not trespass upon your time to enumerate, demand of us our wisest and best efforts as legislators, and we should conscientiously do whatever may be necessary to produce these beneficent results. The burden of taxation should be made as light as possible and should be so placed as to bear equally and equitably upon all classes and upon all the property and industries of our State. To this end every appropriation of money should respond to a well defined public need, and should be demanded by a wise discretion and a rigid economy.

Not every change in laws is necessarily an improvement. That people is not necessarily governed best that is legislated for most. Certainly the burden of proof is upon those who would initiate extraordinary legislation, or open new avenues to the treasury, to justify the wisdom and propriety of so doing. If I might be permitted here and now to indulge in a wish or hope it would be to express the desire that this Legislature so peculiarly constituted might not find itself compelled to create a new office or to increase

the salary of any office now in existence. It is eminently fitting and very desirable that the session here be as short as is consistent with the proper consideration of public legislation only. Let us, then, with this end constantly in view, strive to expedite and discharge the business that shall come before us in such a manner as shall meet with our own approval and the deserved commendation of our fellow citizens.

Trusting that all of your deliberations and debates will be characterized by an earnest desire to determine what is right and then resolutely to do it, and that the friendships and associations here formed may be pleasant and lasting, and thanking you most sincerely for this expression of your confidence and esteem I await the pleasure of the House. (Applause.)

The report was accepted and E. M. Thompson having received a majority of the votes cast was declared duly elected Assistant Clerk of the House for the Sixty-Seventh Legislature of Maine.

On motion of Mr. PLUMMER of Dexter,

That gentleman notified the Governor of the organization of the House, by the election of Hon. Llewellyn Powers as Speaker, W. S. Cotton as Clerk and E. M. Thompson as Assistant Clerk.

The same information was conveyed to the Senate by Mr. Lane of Augusta.

On motion of Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor,

That gentleman conducted the Clerk and Assistant Clerk to the Governor to take and subscribe the necessary oaths to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties, and subsequently reported that he had discharged the duty assigned him, and that the Clerk and Assistant Clerk had taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Thereupon W. S. Cotton, Clerk, and E. M. Thompson, Assistant Clerk, appeared and entered upon the discharge of their official duties.

Hammond be Assistant Mail Carrier, J. E. Frederic be First Folder, Chapin Lydstone be Second Folder, S. S. Holbrook be Third Folder, R. C. Noyes and Walter D. Bean be Door-Keepers and that the Speaker appoint the pages.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta,

Ordered, That the Rules and Orders of the last House of Representatives be adopted for the government of this House until otherwise ordered.

On motion of Mr. TWITCHELL of Bath,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House furnish a catalogue containing the names of members alphabetically arranged with the residences, post office address, boarding place, occupation, politics, number of seat and diagram of the House and that the usual number of copies be printed and distributed.

On motion of Mr. COFFIN of Bangor,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with two daily papers, printed in the State, such as each member or officer may select.

On motion of Mr. McCULLOUGH of Calais,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to deliver to the Clerk of the House one copy of Worcester's Quarto Dictionary, one copy of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary, one copy of the Holy Bible, one copy of Lippincott's Pronouncing Gazetteer and one copy of Cushing's Manual.

On motion of Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth,

Ordered, That the Rules and Orders of 1893 be the Rules and Orders of the House until otherwise ordered, excepting Rule 56 which is hereby amended by striking out the words "Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions" and inserting in place thereof the words "Reed's Rules," so that the section as amended shall read as follows: The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Reed's Rules, shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House, and the joint rules of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Pending passage the order was tabled on motion of Mr. Lane of Augusta.

The Speaker appointed as pages of the House for this session, Edward W. Delano of Abbot and Henry J. Mitchell of Springvale.

On motion of Mr. PACKARD of Blanchard adjourned to to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Snyder of Augusta.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Mr. Furbush of Lewiston informed the House that Mr. Frank L. Noble of Lewiston, a member elect, had appeared and was ready for qualification.

Mr. Furbush was charged with the duty of conducting Mr. Noble to the Governor for the purpose of taking the required oath, and subsequently informed the House that he had discharged the duty assigned him, and Mr. Noble appeared and took his seat in the House.

On motion of Mr. LAWRENCE of Lubec,

Ordered, That the sum of twenty dollars and usual mileage be allowed and paid to J. Wallace Blunt, Page of the last House, for services rendered at this session.

On motion of Mr. LEIGHTON of Columbia Falls,

Ordered, That the sum of twenty dollars and usual mileage be allowed and paid to Ralph I. Morse, Page of the last House, for services rendered by him during the present session.

On motion of Mr. JENNINGS of Wayne,

Ordered, That the sum of thirty dollars and usual mileage be allowed and paid to B. F. Maxim for services rendered by him at this session as door keeper.

On motion of Mr. GILBERT of Canton,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to furnish each member of the House with postage stamps to the amount of ten dollars.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House furnish each member and officer of the House with one copy of the Daily Kennebec Journal during the session.

On motion of Mr. WHITE of Rockland,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be instructed to invite the clergymen of Augusta, Hallowell and Gardiner to officiate at the opening services of the House during the present session.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to furnish the Speaker with one copy of Reed's Rules and the Clerk of the House with six copies for the use of the House.

Was read and passed.

Subsequently on motion of Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor, the vote whereby the order received a passage was reconsidered.

Same gentleman then offered amendment "A" which was adopted and the order as amended was read and passed.

On motion of Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston,

Ordered, That the time for the reception of petitions and bills for private and special legislation be limited to Thursday, January 31st, 1895, and that all petitions and bills presented after that date be referred to the next legislature, and that the Clerk of the House cause this order to be published in the Daily Kennebec Journal, Bangor Daily Whig and Courier, Bangor Commercial, Portland Daily Press, Daily Eastern Argus, Lewiston Evening Journal, Lewiston Morning Sun, Portland Evening Express, Biddeford Daily Journal, Bath Daily Times, Aroostook Republican, Farmington Chronicle, Phillips Phonograph, Rockland Daily Star, Ellsworth American, Rockland Opinion, Damariscotta Herald, Oxford Democrat, Piscataquis Observer, Somerset Reporter, Machias Republican, Eastport Sentinel, Calais Times, Calais Advertiser, Pemaquid Messenger, Westbrook Chronicle and Sanford Ledger.

Pending passage Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor moved to amend the order by striking out all enumeration of papers and inserting "All daily and weekly papers printed in the state."

The amendment was adopted and the order as amended passed, and was sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta, the following order was taken from the table and given a passage:

Ordered, That the Rules and Orders of 1893, be the Rules and Orders of the House, until otherwise ordered excepting Rule 56, which is hereby amended by striking out the words "Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions" and inserting in place thereof the words 'Reed's Rules,' so that the section as amended shall read as follows: The rules of parliamentary practice composed in Reed's Rules, shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House, and the joint rules of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Ordered, That a committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join, be appointed to wait upon the Honorable Henry B. Cleaves, and inform him that he has been duly elected Governor of the State of Maine for the current political years 1895 and 1896.

Mr. Knowlton subsequently reported that the committee had discharged its duty, and that the Governor-elect was pleased to say that he accepted the office to which he had been elected, and would meet the Legislature at such time as it might indicate, to take and subscribe the oaths of office necessary to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Dunbar, Secretary of that body, proposing a joint convention to be held in the Hall of the House of Representatives this day, forthwith, for the purpose of administering to the Honorable Henry B. Cleaves, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and asking the concurrence of the House.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta the House concurred, and the Clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of administering to the Honorable Henry B. Cleaves, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of his office.

The hour for administering the necessary oaths to the Honorable Governor-elect having arrived, the Senate came in and a convention was formed, Hon. George M. Seiders, President of the Senate, presiding.

IN CONVENTION.

On motion of Mr. SAVAGE of Androscoggin, Messrs. Savage,

> Engel of Penobscot, Larrabee of Portland, Milliken of Old Orchard, Singer of Thomaston, Rodick of Eden, Farrow of Belmont.

were appointed a committee to wait upon Honorable Henry B. Cleaves, Governor-elect, to inform him that the two branches of the Legislature were in convention assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and to receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make.

Mr. Savage subsequently reported that the committee had delivered the message with which it was charged, and that the Governor-elect had been pleased to say that he would, forthwith, attend upon the convention.

Whereupon Hon. Henry B. Cleaves, Governor-elect, attended by the Executive Council and heads of departments, came in, and in presence of both branches of the Legislature, in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, Hon. George M. Seiders, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Nicholas Fessenden, Secretary of State, then made the following proclamation:

PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the tenth day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for Governor, the returns of which have been made to the office of Secretary of State, having been examined and counted by the Legislature, which has declared that a plurality thereof were given to Henry B. Cleaves, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the Legislature in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge

the dutics of that office, I therefore declare and make known to all persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that Henry B. Cleaves is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The Governor then communicated to the convention, by address, information upon the condition of the State, as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

By the suffrages of the people, the legislative authority of the State has been committed to your care. That the power will be wisely exercised, in the interest of good and progressive government, is the confident expectation of those who have conferred on you these important responsibilities

STATE FINANCES.

The financial condition of the State, as shown by the excellent report of the State Treasurer, is most gratifying. The receipts from all sources for the year ending December 31, 1893, including the balance in the treasury January 1, 1893, were \$2,169,598.35. The disbursements during that time were \$1,833,881.71. The receipts for the year ending December 31, 1894, including the balance in the treasury January 1, 1894, were \$1,986,689.01. The disbursements during the year were \$1,528,493.16. There was a balance in the treasury on the first day of January, 1895, of \$458,195.85.

Without special reference at this time to our financial history and the valor and patriotism of our people during the war for the preservation of the Union and the years that closely followed, it will be observed that the net indebtedness on the thirty-first day of December, 1874, after deducting the amount in the sinking fund, was \$5,570,876, nearly all of which was incurred for war purposes, and on which amount the annual interest charge was \$334,252. During the follow-

ing twenty years there was paid on this debt \$3,167,876, reducing the bonded indebtedness of the State, on the thirty-first day of December, 1894, to \$2,403,000, and reducing the annual interest charge from \$334,252 in 1874, to less than \$76,000 at the present time. This excellent financial history marks the intelligence and wisdom of our people and their representatives.

The outstanding bonds of the State, bearing interest at three per centum, command a premium. Our cities and towns, in making their temporary and permanent loans, are negotiating their securities on a four per centum basis, and in many instances for less. The bonds of the State and of her municipalities are among the choicest investments, and are in quick demand, not only by our own people, but throughout the financial centers of New England and the Middle States. high financial credit of our State and of her various municipalities rests upon a permanent basis, and will be secure in the future under the operation of existing constitutional provisions, limiting the obligations to be incurred by the State, and placing a restraint upon the power of our municipalities to create an indebtedness beyond the limit expressed in the Consti-It is undisputed that these judicious constitutional tution. safeguards are the underlying forces that give us our great financial strength and stability, and permanency in the high values that attach to our securities.

TEMPORARY LOAN.

There was outstanding against the State on the first day of January, 1893, a temporary loan of \$300,000 that had existed for several years. This loan had reached the constitutional limit of the power of the Legislature to create indebtedness, except for suppressing insurrection, repelling invasion or for purposes of war. Not only our financial credit, but a safe and conservative monetary policy for the future, required that this loan should be paid, and paid from our receipts without increasing State taxation. This imperative necessity was

upon us, and some deserving measures, requiring appropriations of money at the last session of the Legislature, were compelled to yield to this demand.

I am pleased to state to you and the people, that during the past two years the entire temporary loan of \$300,000 has been paid from the receipts of the treasury. In addition to this, \$103,300 has been paid from the treasury during that time on our bonded indebtedness, thus reducing the State debt during the years 1893 and 1894, \$403,300, and our interest charges not less than \$17,000. On the first day of January, 1895, as before stated, the unexpended balance in the treasury was \$458,195.85; more than sufficient to meet all our outstanding current liabilities.

STATE TAX.

The State tax for the year 1893, was two and three-fourths mills on a dollar. The levy for 1894 was on a basis of two and one-half mills, making a reduction in the State tax for the past year, of \$77,634. From a careful examination I am satisfied there will be a decrease in our receipts the present year, from the various sources of revenue outside of the direct tax levy; and you may find, as the session progresses, that the necessary expenditures of the State government will require a levy for 1895, nearly equal to the reduced assessment of last year. I can, however, safely recommend that for the year 1896, the State tax be reduced by you to two mills on a dollar. On the revised valuation this rate would reduce the tax to be levied for State purposes, on the cities and towns for 1896, \$162,239.16; and with other receipts would still yield sufficient revenue to meet all necessary requirements.

Upon this basis there will be a tax of only twenty cents on every one hundred dollars of the assessed valuation of the property of the State, and one-half of this, under a statute that has existed for more than twenty years, will be devoted solely to school purposes. Deducting this school tax, which is distributed to aid in maintaining our schools, the rate of taxation for the support of the State government will be only ten cents on one hundred dollars; the lowest rate of taxation for that purpose, that has existed since Maine was admitted into the American Union as an independent State. This can easily be accomplished and every need of the State properly provided for. If a gradual reduction of the State tax is continued by judicious legislation, it will in the future be a comparatively light charge upon the people.

MUNICIPAL TAXATION.

The Legislature has imposed upon cities and towns the necessity of fulfilling certain public duties, and has conferred upon them the authority to raise and appropriate money Under our system of government they must construct and maintain roads for the convenience of public travel, they must provide for those who fall into distress, and relieve them from want and suffering, they must aid in establishing and maintaining public schools, and are charged with many other important public trusts. The welfare of society depends upon a proper execution of the duties imposed. The performance of these obligations requires taxation, and the principal portion of all taxes levied upon the inhabitants of the various cities and towns in the State, is for the purpose of maintaining their city and town governments, and of fulfilling the duties they owe to the public. The assessment of taxes to raise money to be expended for these necessary purposes, will continue in some form, as long as the government exists.

The theory of our law is that all our citizens shall bear, according to their ability and means, a just proportion of the burdens necessary for defence, for the support of our institutions, and for any other public purpose. It is recognized, that taxation does not always fall with perfect equality upon every citizen. It will be found difficult to devise a system that in its practical operation, will accomplish this desirable result. As stated by a distinguished Chief Justice of the

United States Supreme Court: "Absolute equality in taxation can never be attained. That system is best which comes the nearest to it. The same rules cannot be applied to the listing and valuation of all kinds of property; railroads, banks, partnerships, manufacturing associations, telegraph companies, and each one of the numerous agencies of business which the inventions of the age are constantly bringing into existence, require different machinery for the purposes of their taxation."

Before any radical changes shall be made in our methods of valuation and taxation, it will be the duty of the Legislature to give the subject the most careful and exhaustive investigation, considering in advance the effect of any proposed laws. It has been the policy in the past, to pursue a course of legislation on this question that would promote and advance the agricultural, the industrial, the commercial and mechanical interests of the State. A policy that would invite capital to aid in the development of our great resources, and not repel it or drive it from us. Let thorough investigation, deliberation and conservatism, with a due regard for the best interests of the State, govern your efforts upon this topic.

The report of the State Board of Assessors calls to your attention the propriety of amending our laws relating to the taxation of several classes of property; of amending the law relating to taxation of collateral inheritances, and urges greater uniformity in assessors' books. The recommendations made by the State Board involve no radical legislation, and are in harmony with the wise policy heretofore pursued by the State.

AGRICULTURE.

When we consider that there are sixty-five thousand farms in Maine, containing 6,552,578 acres, and of an estimated cash value of \$102,557,615, producing farm products in 1893 of the value of more than twenty-two million dollars, we can fully appreciate that this great interest should never have a secondary place in our efforts to advance the prosperity of the Commonwealth.

The State Board of Agriculture, organized and endowed for the purpose of holding farmers' institutes, has been unusually successful in its work, and its meetings have been more fully attended during the past two years, and greater interest has been manifested than ever before. We have two State Agricultural Societies, one State Pomological Society, and over fifty county and town agricultural societies, paying out annually more than \$73,000 in premiums. Throughout the State, organizations of the Grange are quickening the public mind, and inaugurating advanced and improved methods in agriculture, which will surely lead to a higher prosperity, and more productive results to the husbandman.

The Secretary of the State Board informs me, that at no time since he became familiar with our agriculture, has it shown such unmistakable signs of progress as are now apparent. While during the past year many branches of business have been depressed, in agriculture it has been a year of more than usual productiveness.

A good market, easy of access by rail or convenient roads, is one of the important elements in the advancement of the farming interests of the State; and continued harmonious combination of effort on the part of our industrial, agricultural and other interests, will be beneficial to all.

The investment of capital in the development of our vast water ways, the erection of new mills and manufactories, the creation of new industries, opening up a wider field for the employment of labor, will create new homes, build up communities, and establish a permanent home-market for the products of the farm. Diversified industry will encourage our agricultural progress and make us stronger, greater, and more powerful as a State. All of these important interests, upon which the well being and prosperity of so many people depend, should have a full measure of attention at your hands.

The protection of the live stock of Maine against contagious diseases is of great importance, and any neglect of this duty may entail upon the owners very large losses. The appropri-

ation for this purpose for the past few years has been insufficient to meet the expenditures that were necessary to properly guard this interest and fully protect the public health. The sum appropriated having been exhausted in July last, the Governor and Council authorized the Commissioners to expend an additional sum of \$1,000 in carrying forward their necessary work, which amount has been paid from the treasury.

We are now appropriating large sums of money to protect our fish and game, and certainly we should not neglect to make an adequate appropriation for the protection of our herds and flocks.

EDUCATION.

Education is the great bulwark of defense, stronger than standing armies and the most powerful navies. It directs public sentiment in the paths of peace, right and justice, is the foundation of pure and good government, and the enemy of wrong and oppression. The organic law of the State recognizes that a general diffusion of the advantages of education, is essential to the preservation of the rights and liberties of the people.

A State tax of one mill on a dollar is annually assessed for the support of our common schools. In addition to this, one-half of the savings bank tax is devoted to the same purpose, as well as the interest on the permanent school fund, making the aggregate amount appropriated by the State for common school purposes, for the school year ending April 1, 1895, \$541,599.14. There is deducted from this fund an appropriation of \$27,200 for teachers' meetings, normal and training schools. The balance of \$514,399.14 is distributed among the several cities, towns and plantations by the State Treasurer, according to the number of scholars as the same shall appear from the official returns made to the Superintendent of common schools, for the preceding year. In 1894, two hundred and eighty-five towns and plantations received from the State a larger

amount, in the form of school money, than their entire State tax; the cities and larger towns contributing to this fund.

The State has also expended during the past year, \$97,640 for free high schools, academies, industrial schools and other educational purposes. The entire expenditures for the school year, from State and municipal funds, for our common schools, were \$1,501,180; and from the same sources the sum of \$257,207 has been expended for free high schools and other educational work, making a grand total for the year of \$1,758,387. It is a proud record of devotion to our common schools, and they should be sustained and guarded by our people for the future honor and greatness of our State.

The valuable and interesting report of the State Superintendent of Schools will be presented to the Legislature.

The superior educational advantages of our colleges and other advanced institutions of learning, have received deserved recognition from all sections of our country. Our normal schools, academies and free high schools, are aiding in our educational progress as a people, and theirs is a grand example of successful work.

In this connection it is my duty to call your attention to the demands for an additional school building at the State Normal School in Farmington, and I recommend an appropriation therefor. The attendance is constantly increasing, and the existing structure does not afford sufficient accommodations; unless remedied the efficiency of this State institution, in its educational work, will be impaired.

The dormitory of the State Normal School at Gorham, was destroyed by fire during the past year; and it will be your pleasure to give due consideration to the recommendation of the Trustees, relating thereto.

EDUCATION OF THE DEAF, DUMB AND BLIND.

For several years the State annually appropriated twenty thousand dollars for the education of the deaf, the dumb and the blind. In 1893, this appropriation was reduced to fifteen

thousand dollars. In view of the increased number desiring the advantages of this special training, that sum will be inadequate to properly provide in the future for the free education of these unfortunate children.

A school for the instruction of the deaf and dumb was established at Portland in 1876, commencing with three pupils. At the present time fifty-five children are being educated at this excellent and progressive institution, under the supervision of the accomplished principal, Miss Taylor. Several scholars are attending the American Asylum at Hartford, Connecticut, the oldest school for the deaf and dumb in the country. Great advancement has been made in the Portland school within the past few years, and the pupils are making admirable progress. Heretofore no opportunities were given them for mechanical and industrial training, but at the opening of the fall term such benefits were conferred. These beneficiaries of the State, gathered together as one family among our own people, excite the deepest interest; and I am confident you will not hesitate in providing means that will enable them to receive the training and instruction that will open up to them a new and brighter life.

A suitable home should be established, where these little helpless children, during their school years, may be constantly under the care and guidance of the teachers of the school. The cost of a building adapted to this purpose, would be comparatively light.

The State is educating twenty-one blind children at the Perkins Institute, South Boston, Massachusetts. Suitable provision must be made for their future welfare. I think an annual appropriation of \$22,500 is necessary for the education and care of the deaf, dumb and blind. Any unexpended balance of the appropriation for this humane object, will be covered into the treasury.

The amount of funds received for school purposes is rapidly growing, having increased during the past five years from \$416,619.13 to \$541,599.14; and it will continue to

enlarge in the future. The expenditure for the deaf, dumb and blind is purely for educational purposes, for the benefit of school children of our State. It seems just that the appropriation for their education should be a charge upon the school fund and paid from that source, and not be appropriated from sums received by taxation for general purposes. I believe every municipality in the State would cheerfully recognize the propriety and justice of such legislation, permitting these children to share in the general fund set apart for educational purposes.

LABOR.

The cause of labor should always receive the highest consideration at the hands of the legislative branch of the government. Ameliorating laws have been enacted in the past, and no effort should be spared in the future to conserve and promote this great cause. Friendly relations should be maintained between the employer and employed, a spirit of confidence and good will should be fostered, for *industrial peace* is the strongest promoter of the welfare of labor and the State.

We are being constantly warned that a great danger threatens our free institutions and the well being of the industrial workers of our country, by the tide of immigation that is flooding our shores.

We welcome the industrious immigrant, who comes as a friend and not as an enemy of the Republic; who comes for the purpose of making a home and becoming a good, lawabiding citizen, ready to uphold the Constitution and laws in times of peace and defend their majesty in time of war. We had a conspicuous illustration, from 1861 to 1865, of the loyalty and devotion to our flag of the adopted citizens of our country, and they were found in almost every regiment and brigade of the Union Army. A different class are now seeking our land from foreign countries. The civilized society of America should not tolerate the presence of anarchists and nihilists who come as the destroyers of our institutions, and who would substitute rioting, violence, lawlessness, bloodshed and anarchy for good government.

STATE INSTITUTIONS.

I have visited the various institutions of the State, and find them in good condition. The reports of the Trustees and Superintendents, of the Boards and Commissions established by the State, will be transmitted to you, and your attention is invited to the recommendations and suggestions contained in the same.

STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND MECHANIC ARTS.

The State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is a part of our free educational system, and its claims upon the State should be recognized. The law of Congress, under which the College was endowed, provides that its leading object shall be to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and mechanic arts, and without excluding other scientific and classical studies. This institution offers an opportunity for a practical and advanced education, at a reasonable cost. The attendance during the past two years has steadily increased, and the number of new students in 1894, was more than double that of the preceding year.

A new course in electrical engineering has been established, enabling our young men to gain a systematic training in the use of electricity, which is destined in the future to bear an important part in the development and utilization of the immense water power of the State for manufacturing and other purposes.

Instruction in pharmacy has also been introduced, and two courses established. In addition to the full course in agriculture, shorter courses have been arranged to meet the convenience of those desiring instruction in this important branch, but who are unable to devote the time for a full course.

The General Government also requires that instruction in military science shall be given, and in October last an encampment was held by the students at Portland. They exhibited marked proficiency in drill, thorough discipline, and their gentlemanly bearing won the commendation of thousands of citizens who had an opportunity to observe them while in camp. This department is under the direct supervision of Lieut. Mark L. Hersey, U. S. Army, who in addition to his duties at the College, has rendered valuable service to the Maine National Guard.

REFORM SCHOOL.

Two thousand one hundred and two boys have been admitted to the Reform School since its establishment. The number in the school December first, 1894, was one hundred and forty. The State should not treat this as a penal institution alone, but as a branch of the educational work of our State. Many of the inmates are of tender years, whose young lives have never been blessed with the kind and refining influences of a happy home and a devoted mother and father. Many of them when arrested and arraigned before the magistrate, had no conception that they had committed any wrong or any crime against society. Here they are receiving a moral, intellectual and industrial training, which will fit them for useful employments and good citizenship.

The superior advantages of the cottage system have been fully demonstrated; and the institution should receive a cordial support.

THE INSANE.

That there may be no misapprehension as to my views relative to making appropriate provision for the insane, you will allow reference to a former communication, addressed to the Legislature in 1893, upon this important subject, wherein it was stated: "The insane are entitled to the special care of the State. Their lot is the saddest that can befall humanity. To the great credit of our State, you have never reluctantly or stintingly bestowed your public favor upon this unfortunate class, and we should continue to make appropriate provision

for their care. Many, with proper treatment, can be restored to their families, to society and activity in the business world. The incurable should have the kindest restraint consistent with public safety."

At the last session of the Legislature, two committees of that body, the Committee on Finance and the Committee on Insane Hospital, acting jointly as a special committee, had this subject under consideration and were practically unanimous in their decision that additional accommodations should be provided for the insane. Two reports were made to the Legislature by this committee; in the final report a majority recommended an appropriation of \$150,000 to erect a new hospital at Bangor, and a minority recommended an appropriation of \$110,000 to be expended in adding two new buildings to the hospital at Augusta.

Under a resolve of the last Legislature directing the Governor and Council and the Trustees of the Insane Hospital "To ascertain the exact number of idiotic and demented persons now in the hospital, and to report their condition, and to further examine into the expediency of constructing additional wings or buildings, and the cost of the same, for the accommodation of the above classes, on the grounds of the Maine Insane Hospital, in Augusta, and report to the next Legislature," Ex-Governor Frederick Robie, of Cumberland county, Honorable F. M. Simpson, of Penobscot county, and General R. B. Shepherd, of Somerset county, were appointed a committee to investigate, consider and report upon this subject.

The resolve, under which the committee acted, related solely to the present hospital, and the result of their inquiries will be submitted to you. The investigations have been exhaustive. While the report suggests "That two additional wings of the same style and character of those already constructed could be erected and connected thereto by corridors," or, "That new buildings could be constructed on the grounds of the hospital, at Augusta, of sufficient capacity for the care of the present existing surplus at said hospital," no opinion

is expressed as to the advisability of adopting either of such methods, nor is any recommendation made; but the report of the committee leaves "the matter for the wise consideration of the Legislature, with the full belief that the best interests of the State will be conserved, and the large and ever increasing population of its insane will be humanely and benevolently provided for."

It is fully recognized that the present accommodations are inadequate, and the duty will devolve upon you to provide some measure of relief for the future. Controversies and disagreements as to the location where the insane of the State shall be provided for, should not result in withholding suitable and necessary provision for their care. Differences of opinion may naturally be entertained, discussions may arise, but I urge upon you the importance of reaching a harmonious and satisfactory decision.

The claims of the insane upon the State are such that you cannot regard the question entirely in an economic sense, but must consider what means will afford the best opportunities for the care and treatment of those upon whom this sad misfortune has fallen.

From the most impartial information I have been able to obtain, I believe the best interests of the insane would justify the erection of a new hospital. If upon full and thorough investigation you are in accord with this expression of belief, I recommend that a reasonable appropriation be made by the Legislature with this object in view, and that you appropriately provide for the beginning of the work of construction. The State owns a suitable site in Bangor, purchased some years since.

In dealing with a matter of legislation so important to those who cannot come here to present their cause, not only their welfare, but the interests of the State will be best subserved and promoted, by considering this subject entirely freed from and independent of, all other questions, as association with other measures may imperil the most deserving.

CRIMINAL INSANE.

Experience has fully justified the establishment, by the last Legislature, of a separate department at Thomaston, for the care of the criminal insane. No appropriation was made for the support of these patients for the years 1893 and 1894. The Warden of the prison has provided for their care, and it will be necessary for the Legislature to make provision for this expenditure, and for their future support.

STATE PRISON.

The condition of the State Prison will be fully shown by the reports of the officers having supervision of that institution.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

The bounty bestowed by the State upon the Industrial School for Girls, is for a worthy object. Its history affords numerous examples of the reclamation of young girls from unfortunate surroundings, who are now living useful and upright lives.

BATH MILITARY AND NAVAL ORPHAN ASYLUM.

The Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum on the first day of December, 1894, had forty-eight children under its care. The institution merits the favor of the State.

LIBRARY.

On a former occasion attention was called to the great advantages that would be secured to the cause of education, by the establishment of a free public library in every town in the State. There was some legislation at the last session, in this direction; and several of the cities and towns have granted aid to library associations, with the free use of the library to the inhabitants. During the past two years many new public libraries have been established, and there are now more than two hundred in the State.

The additions to the State Library, during the two years ending December first, 1894, were five thousand four hundred books and pamphlets. Many educational and public institutions are soliciting an exchange of publications, and the National government is supplying us with valuable works on special topics. The law department of the library has received large additions. The reports of the decisions of the highest courts of all the states, with three exceptions, and the English Equity Reports, are now complete. Full reports of the decisions of the Circuit and District courts of the United States have been secured, and also the codes and statutes of many of the states.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

The result of the prosecutions instituted in behalf of the State in the different counties for violation of our laws, and the condition of the civil business of the State under the charge of this important department, will be found in the report of the Attorney General.

SAVINGS BANKS.

The report of the State Bank Examiner shows a gratifying condition on the part of our savings banks, trust companies, loan and building associations. The entire resources of the fifty-one savings institutions on the twenty-fourth day of November, 1894, were \$57,761,918.46. The increase of deposits during the past year was \$1,269,914.38. The gain in number of depositors was seventeen hundred and eighty-two.

LABOR BUREAU.

An investigation of the summer resort business of the State was made by the Commissioner of the Bureau of Industrial and Labor Statistics in 1893, by direction of the Legislature; and the results are most interesting and satisfactory. The report for 1894, has reference to our various industrial interests, and contains statistics and information of great value.

RAILROADS.

The report of the Board of Railroad Commissioners will inform you of the superb condition of our railroad system.

FISH AND GAME.

The State has expended during the past ten years more than one hundred and twenty-seven thousand dollars in the restoration, encouragement and protection of its fish and game. The time is approaching when more protective legislation must be enacted, and greater vigilance exercised, if this great public interest is to be properly cared for in the future. Numerous and well grounded complaints have come to me during the past year, of the wanton slaughter of our large game, and the illegal taking and destruction of food fish in our waters. The remedy will not be found in more stringent legislation, unless proper provision is made for no enforcement.

The sea and shore fisheries of the State are an important industry, giving employment to more than fifteen thousand people. With necessary legal restrictions, constantly enforced, they may be preserved for the future. It is claimed by many that the amount appropriated by the Legislature for the protection of this branch of our fishing interests, is disproportionate to the amount appropriated for the protection of our inland fisheries. Evidently the sum is inadequate to enforce, along our extended line of sea coast, the provisions of law guarding this industry. The entire subject of properly protecting our fisheries and game is worthy the earnest efforts of the Legislature.

IMPROVED HIGHWAYS.

Some well considered policy should be adopted for the improvement of our highways. Our excellent railroads furnish rapid and easy methods of transportation for passengers and freight, and improved carriage roads would afford addi-

tional facilities and further aid in the development of the There seems to be an earnest sentiment for some recognition by the Legislature of the growing demand for improved highways. It is a subject in which many people are taking a great interest. It is claimed that under a well regulated and uniform method of expending the money now appropriated, with the advance already made in road construction, our highways could largely be improved without any material increase of taxation. If the State is to inaugurate a permanent system of road improvement, the subject should have thorough and careful investigation by men of experience, in order that the wisest course may be determined upon; otherwise we may involve ourselves in a system of internal improvements more burdensome than the people would care to bear. The subject should receive your careful consideration.

FIRE INSURANCE.

Our people are largely dependent upon foreign fire insurance companies to do their fire underwriting, and the average annual tax paid by these companies to the State amounts to sixteen thousand dollars. It appears by the last report issued by the Insurance Department of Maine, that the entire amount of risks written in the State for the year 1893 was \$109,881,591, and more than ninety-eight per centum was written by foreign companies.

The Legislature has continued to pass laws upon this subject until our statutes have become a mass of seeming contradictions, difficult of interpretation or comprehension; rates to the people for fire insurance have continually increased, fire losses are multiplying, and during the past two years, fourteen fire insurance companies, representing a capital of more than five million dollars, have discontinued their business in Maine and withdrawn from the State. It is estimated that the annual fire waste to our State is two million dollars. This destruction of values is of serious consequence to the material interests of the State. Numerous measures have been adopted by

several states, with good results, tending to reduce this vast and unnatural destruction of property, and securing to the assured cheaper rates and absolute indemnity for loss. The time has arrived when sufficient protection against fire cannot be obtained by our people, in sound insurance companies authorized to do business in our State.

The subject requires the careful attention and thought of the Legislature; and I call your consideration to the suggestions of the Insurance Commissioner, who has given the matter much investigation, and trust you will approach the questions involved with the greatest fairness, recognizing the importance to our people of sufficient and sound insurance at fair rates.

SHIPPING.

American ships for the American merchant marine, will aid our ship building industry, give encouragement to American ingenuity and skill, employment to our labor, and preserve our independence as a nation. We should neither be dependent upon foreign nations for our navy nor for the ships comprising our merchant marine. Maine has occupied a conspicuous position in the building of the American navy, and the first steel sailing ship built in America was launched the past year, from a Maine ship yard, bearing the proud motto of our State. It is confidently asserted by many of our leading ship builders and ship owners, that if our Government shall retain for this industry the protection accorded by our wise navigation laws, Maine in the near future will be producing as much iron and steel tonnage as she has heretofore of wood.

We may well view with alarm the proposed free admission to American registry of ships built in foreign countries, for it must be detrimental to our State, and to the shipping and business interests of its citizens.

An expression from the Legislature to the Congress of the United States upon a subject so vital to the State, will be appropriate.

In this connection allow me to call your attention to the method of taxation applicable to shipping. A comparison of the taxes levied by our State, with those levied by the leading maritime nations of the world and some of the states of the American Union upon this industry, will impress upon you the propriety of placing this great interest on an equality with similar property in other localities, and thus enable our ship owners to meet the competition which lower rates of taxation in those communities afford.

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

I commend the National Guard for its excellence and efficiency. Recognizing the importance of placing the military organizations of the State on a more permanent basis, the Legislature of 1893, authorized the Governor to appoint a commission to revise and consolidate the laws relating to our military forces. The commission appointed consisted of General Selden Connor, General John Marshall Brown, General Samuel D. Leavitt, General Winfield S. Choate and Colonel Victor Brett; the result of their faithful and valuable services is embodied in the provisions of Chapter 266 of the Public Laws of 1893.

There has been practically a reorganization, during the past two years, and the National Guard now consists of two regiments of infantry, of eleven companies each. The law contemplates that each regiment shall be composed of not less than twelve companies; but this desirable object could not be accomplished without exceeding the appropriation, which was not deemed advisable. A successful encampment was held at Augusta, in August last, highly creditable to the officers, the men and to the State.

Captain Charles B. Hall of the United States Army, was detailed by the Secretary of War, for duty in the State, and rendered three months efficient service. In his report to the War Department, he gives deserved recognition of the great improvement in the National Guard during the past two years.

The military organization is composed of active and intelligent young men, devoted to the service, and is entitled to the support of the State.

I recommend that the regular appropriation for the support of this branch of the service be made equal to one-tenth of a mill on the valuation, instead of one-twelfth, as now provided. An increase in the appropriation for military purposes will be necessary if we are to maintain an efficient National Guard.

While we can rely upon the intelligence and sound judgment of the people of Maine to preserve good order and the public peace, yet, should any unfortunate conditions arise, demanding the services of armed troops, we should be prepared to act promptly and effectively. The National Guard of Maine can be relied upon in any emergency.

The able report of the Adjutant General, will give you complete information of the condition of this important organization.

THE VETERAN SOLDIERS.

During the years that have intervened since the close of the great conflict for the preservation of the Union, the soldiers of Maine who participated in that struggle, their widows and orphans, in their hour of need, have had the protecting care of the State. The people are still loyal to the assurances then given, and will continue to recognize the services rendered and the sacrifices made by those gallant men. The usual appropriation for this purpose for the past few years has been from sixty thousand to sixty-five thousand dollars annually. It is paid out through the municipal officers of the various cities and towns of the State, under the direction and supervision of the Governor and Council and the Pension Agent.

From my observation during the past two years in the disbursement of this sum, I doubt if any appropriation of an equal amount made by the Legislature, serves a more useful and deserving purpose. It relieves the homes of many of the unfortunate from want, and numerous households from suffering. Advancing age and bodily infirmities have caused an increased demand upon this fund for the past two years, and some urgent and meritorious calls could not be favorably answered. I therefore recommend an increase in the appropriation of five thousand dollars, for each of the years 1895 and 1896.

The State has declared that it will bear the necessary burial expenses of every destitute citizen of hers, who served in the army, navy or marine corps of the United States, during the rebellion and was honorably discharged. The present statute requires the Legislature to appropriate the necessary money therefor. The sum now devoted to this purpose is insufficient, and I recommend an annual increase of one thousand dollars, in the appropriation.

SUFFRAGE.

The right of suffrage, the right to have a voice in the affairs of the Government, is one of the highest privileges bestowed upon the citizen. The established method that existed in our State for generations, of permitting the expression of political preferences at the ballot box by an open ballot, was superseded by the Legislature of 1891, after a full discussion.

The tendency of popular government is in the direction of a higher and more advanced intelligence and greater individual responsibility in the exercise of this important right. We need not go beyond the limits of our own State to find a recognition of this principle. The people of Maine, by a constitutional amendment adopted in 1891, decreed, with certain limitations and exceptions, that "No person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the Constitution of this State, who shall not be able to read the Constitution in the English language and write his name."

It is conceded that many defective ballots were cast at the last election. This may be attributed in many instances to the change adopted in 1893, in the method of marking the ballot. A fixed and permanent system of voting seems to be desirable; constant changes in the mode of exercising that

right, only tend to confusion and increase mistakes. If intelligent voters have been disfranchised for want of attention, it certainly would be an anomaly in legislation, to undertake to provide a remedy for such inattention, by legislative enactment. The people of the State should be given a fair opportunity to test the measure. There can never be a fair and satisfactory test, if the Legislature, succeeding every election, prescribes a different manner of marking the ballot, for that will only lead to additional confusion.

While it may be desirable to enlarge somewhat the authority of election officers in assisting the voter desiring information, and provide for a uniform interpretation of the law respecting the counting of the votes, I believe all radical changes should be avoided at the present session. The statute exists, and should have a fair trial under favorable circumstances. If it does not then prove satisfactory, the voters of the State will speedily find a remedy.

STATE LIQUOR AGENCY.

The State has for many years authorized the maintenance of a liquor agency "to furnish municipal officers of towns in this State, and duly authorized agents of other states, with pure, unadulterated, intoxicating liquors, to be kept and sold for medicinal, mechanical and manufacturing purposes." With the continued advance of the cause of temperance in our State, and under the influence of a strong public sentiment, aroused and strengthened by our various temperance and Christian organizations, the city and town agencies have been gradually reduced, and in 1894, in the four hundred and thirty-eight cities and towns in the State, only twenty-three agencies were in existence. It appears, however, from official returns, that during the past three years intoxicating liquors were sold through the State Commissioner to the established city and town agencies, amounting to \$338,801.71.

The statute regulating this immense traffic seems to be inadequate in many respects. The law formerly required

that the commissioner should have a place of business in Maine; but under existing statutes, it is only required that he "shall reside and have his place of residence in this State." Under the practical interpretation of the present statute, liquors may be shipped direct from other states to the city and town agencies, without ever going into the possession of the commissioner; and necessary tests by a competent assayer, to determine the purity of such liquors after they reach the State, are not obligatory.

The law compels the person assuming the duties of this position, to purchase of the retiring commissioner the entire stock of liquors on hand, yet the State does not retain the power to control the purchases or sales of such commissioner, or to limit the amount of stock to be carried.

It will be observed by a further examination of the statutes, that the State has carefully relieved itself from nearly all responsibility, except the authority to finally pass upon the numerous applications for liquor commissioner; a position to which an annual salary of only fifteen hundred dollars is attached, and requiring, as now regulated, an invested capital of from twelve thousand to fifteen thousand dollars. It will also be seen that the State disclaims all liability upon any contract made or obligation created in connection with the business carried on, but still takes its profits on the sales made by its agent.

If the State is to continue the maintenance of a State agency, and authorize city and town agencies, more stringent legislation regulating the same should be enacted; we should recognize that these agencies are established solely to provide pure liquors, strictly for the purposes contemplated under the law sanctioning their creation. As now permitted, the State is a silent partner, sharing in the profits. If it is to authorize the source of supply in the future and receive its percentage on sales, it should assume direct supervision and control of all purchases, and of all sales to the city and town agencies. I recommend that either the State liquor agency be abolished,

or that appropriate legislation be enacted in the direction indicated.

The municipal officers of cities and towns have the right, under existing law, to establish city and town agencies, and are now required to purchase their stock of liquors through the State agency. Under a former statute, the municipalities were authorized to supply such agencies independent of a State liquor agency. With the large number of these agencies then maintained throughout the State, the legal restrictions surrounding this method were not considered sufficiently rigid to prevent an abuse of the authority conferred upon cities and towns, and the Legislature abolished the system, and established the State agency. A report, subsequently made by a legislative committee upon this subject, indicates that the latter method did not then entirely "meet the approbation of the friends of law and good order."

Should you deem it advisable to discontinue the present method, and still continue to authorize city and town agencies, other questions will naturally arise. If it is impracticable for the State to assume the direct responsibility of supplying such agencies, then you may be called upon to consider, whether it will be judicious to confer independent authority upon the municipalities. Permit me to suggest, if legislation be contemplated in the latter direction, it should be guarded by the most inflexible legal restrictions; regulations should be established for proper tests as to the purity of the purchases, after their arrival in this State; the profits of the cities and towns should be limited to a sum not in excess of the actual cost of maintaining the agency; such agencies should be continually subject to inspection by a competent assayer; and absolute power should be conferred upon the courts to summarily close any agency, should it be found, upon investigation, that it was not being conducted strictly in accordance with the intention of the statute.

Whatever action you may deem it wise to take, it should be with a purpose to promote the cause of temperance in the State, and remedy existing conditions. No reflection whatever is intended upon anyone connected, either now or in the past, with the management of the State agency, or the various city and town agencies. My criticism refers solely to the law governing the same, and to that the remedy should be unhesitatingly and vigorously applied.

SPECIAL AND PRIVATE LEGISLATION.

The people have ordained by explicit constitutional provisions, that "the legislature shall, from time to time, provide as far as practicable, by general laws, for all matters usually appertaining to special or private legislation," and that "corporations shall be formed under general laws, and shall not be created by special acts of the legislature, except for municipal purposes, and in cases where the objects of the corporation cannot otherwise be attained; and, however formed, they shall forever be subject to the general laws of the State."

This requirement has been practically disregarded by many legislative bodies, since its adoption. Our statutes are burdened with enactments, clearly at variance with the intention and spirit of these plain provisions. While special and private legislation is not prohibited in absolute terms, the law-making power is commanded to make provision, as far as practicable, by general laws, for matters of this character.

The constitutional provisions bearing upon this question are somewhat elastic, leaving much to the discretion and judgment of the Legislature. Its provisions are especially adapted to a State so vast in territory as our own, with so many interests requiring legislation, at times, to aid in development. Among the numerous matters that will come before you for consideration, you will find many that can be beneficially provided for by general and uniform laws. Other subjects will come before you where safer and better results can be reached, and more advantageous to communities and the people, by discreet special legislation applicable to the

same, and where it would be unwise and injudicious for the Legislature to surrender, by general laws, its power of control.

At its last session the Legislature, appreciating the importance of limiting, to some extent, the growing tendency of special legislation, authorized the appointment of a board of three commissioners to take into consideration the subject of private and special legislation, to investigate and ascertain what subjects might properly be provided for by general laws, for which special legislation had heretofore been asked. Under the resolve, Honorable Leroy T. Carleton, of Winthrop, Honorable Fred H. Appleton, of Bangor, and Honorable William H. Fogler, of Rockland, were appointed. They have given the subject a patient and extended investigation, and the result will be placed before you. gestions and recommendations deserve the favorable consideration of the Legislature, and you can, by general laws, relieve the legislative branch of the government of much private and special legislation, which will result in shortening the session, lightening your labors and reducing the public expenditures.

STATE FLOWER.

The National Garland, to be composed of flowers selected by the different states of the American Union, will appropriately represent, not only their independent sovereignties, but a great and free Republic. The selection of Maine's flower for this garland, under the direction of the Maine Floral Emblem Society, of which Miss Janet L. Dingley, of Auburn, is President, has been submitted to a popular vote, and a very deep interest is manifested in the choice. Later in the session the society will ask of you appropriate legislation, which you will cheerfully grant.

COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION.

The report of the Board of World's Fair Managers, of the State's prominence in the World's Columbian Exposition, will be placed before you. Maine's exhibit was highly satisfac-

tory, and the services of the entire Board, and of the Executive Commissioner, General Mattocks, are fully appreciated by the State. An unexpended balance of the appropriation, amounting to six thousand dollars, has been returned by the Treasurer of the board to the State.

MAINE.

Notwithstanding the depressing influences that have surrounded many of our industrial enterprises and the interests of labor during the past two years, our State has steadily increased in population, in valuation of property and material wealth. Our enterprising people have constructed more than two hundred and eighteen miles of new railroad, penetrating and opening up in various sections of the State, a territory rich in natural resources, with fields as productive as any that can be found under Southern skies or on Western prairies.

We look with pride on the permanency of our great business interests, and Maine is destined in the future, to assume a more prominent place in the industrial and agricultural progress of the country.

We view with satisfaction the soundness and stability of our financial institutions; our national and savings banks, trust, loan and building associations, towering in strength and safety amid the storms of broken confidence, financial distrust and disaster, that have overtaken and submerged so many institutions of a similar character, in other sections of our country.

Maine's progress in the past, is her best encomium; her advantages for future development are everywhere recognized, and her people are appreciating that concentration of effort and capital will bring forth the grandest results. Employment of labor and production at home, should be the sentiment of our people; loyalty and devotion to Maine's interests, will enable us to reach the coveted goal of industrial achievements; the present is only the beginning of the great future that awaits her, and the harvest will certainly

come. In our legislation we should look to the advancement and material welfare of the *whole* State. Every measure before you for consideration, whether applicable to one section of our State or another, will deserve impartial consideration and should rest upon its own intrinsic merits. Industrial development and growth, improvement and advance in any section of the State, will add to the great aggregate that makes up a prosperous Commonwealth.

APPROPRIATIONS.

We enter upon our duties at a period when the people expect and have a right to require of us, the most cautious management and the most conservative legislation in the affairs of the State. This is not a time for excessive appropriations or for the enactment of experimental laws. The excellent financial condition of our State, and the unusually large amount in the treasury at the beginning of the new year, should not incite us to seek out new and unexplored avenues for the expenditure of the people's money.

All reasonable appropriations, looking to the present and future care of the insane, for the proper support of our beneficent, charitable and correctional institutions, for the great cause of education, for the aid and care of the unfortunate, for the relief of the old soldier and his dependents, and for other necessary public purposes, will meet with a hearty and approving response from our people, for they have always willingly and cheerfully responded to every necessary call.

The absolute power to appropriate money is with the Legislature. The authority is given you, and under the Constitution the responsibility rests where it should, with the Honorable Senators and Representatives. It is a responsible position, because you are to deal in making appropriations, with the revenues that come by taxation directly from your constituents, to the public treasury. It will be your duty, before the session closes, to fix the rate of taxation upon the farms and other real and personal property

of the State, to meet in part the expenditures authorized by you. The entire matter is within your control, and the tax for State purposes must depend upon the appropriations here made. That you will exercise this important power with the utmost care, with prudence and discrimination, I have no doubt. If this shall be done, the State tax will be such as to command the approval of those who have honored you with these public trusts.

In assuming the responsible duties of the office to which I have been re-elected, allow me to express to the people and the press of Maine, irrespective of party, my appreciation of the cordial and generous support I have received from them, in the administration of the affairs of the State government. It will be my purpose in the future, to administer this great public trust for the promotion of the interests of the entire State. With harmonious relations, we enter upon the important work assigned us. We should guard against too much legislation; it is more dangerous than too little; and in all laws enacted, we should carefully protect the rights of every citizen of the State.

The party in control of the State government is responsible for all legislation, and for every expenditure of the public money. It will be held strictly accountable, and should it be unfaithful to the great trust with which it is charged, should it use its vast powers otherwise than for the public good, the people will not be slow in making known their 'disapproval.

In entering upon the discharge of our official duties, let us invoke the blessings of the Divine Power upon our State, her people and institutions; and may we serve her with a patriotic devotion to her great interests.

HENRY B. CLEAVES.

Executive Department, Augusta, January 30, 1895.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

I have the honor to transmit herewith the Report of the Cattle Commissioners of the State of Maine. The law of 1893, authorizing the printing of certain State reports, makes no provision for the printing of the report of this board, and I therefore submit the same for your action.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Gentlemen—Whereas, the legislature of 1893, referred a bill entitled "An Act relating to taxation of vessel property" to the Board of State Assessors and "that they carefully examine the subject and make their report to the next legislature."

The Board of State Assessors, realizing the importance of the shipping interests of the State, have spent much time and expense in visiting the several ports of entry and in consultation with vessel owners, thus obtaining all the information relating to this class of property, possible.

The bill referred to us we find upon examination is open to serious objections and its application we believe would be unsatisfactory and would yield but a small and uncertain revenue to the towns and the State. In consideration of the fact that the vessel property of the State has diminished materially within the two years past, we believe some action should be taken by the legislature, to arrest the decline and encourage this important industry, and we therefore return the bill to the legislature and submit the same in a new draft which we commend to your consideration.

The following communication was received from the executive department:

Executive Department, February 27, 1895.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

You will permit me to submit to you a communication received from the State Treasurer, with accompanying statement, prepared by him, of appropriations made by the Legislature and approved, a detailed statement of the appropriations pending before the Legislature, an estimate of the appropriations now before committees of the Legislature, and a statement from the Treasurer of the estimated receipts for the year 1895.

I also have the honor to submit to you some suggestions relating to the financial affairs and condition of the State. It appears that the appropriations already made for the year 1895, amount to the

sum of \$1,298,057.59, and show an increase over the appropriations for the year 1893, for the same objects, of \$53,633.87. Extraordinary appropriations for 1895, relating to subjects for which no appropriation was made in the corresponding legislative year of 1893, have already been passed and approved, amounting to the sum of \$86,175.04. For the year 1896, extraordinary appropriations, not made in the corresponding year 1894, have also been passed and approved, amounting to the sum of \$85,500; showing a net amount of such appropriations for the years 1895 and 1896, of \$171,675.04, in addition to the \$53,633.87 above referred to. Further regular appropriations will be required for State purposes for 1895, as shown by the estimate of the Treasurer, amounting to \$223,715.04. When these shall be added to those already approved for the present year, the aggregate will be nearly equal to the entire appropriations for State purposes for the legislative year of 1893, exclusive of the appropriation made that year to be applied on the temporary loan.

In addition, you have pending before you, favorably reported by committees, bills and resolves, some of which have been passed to be engrossed, calling for large appropriations and amounting in the aggregate to \$158,657.56, many of which are for ordinary and regular State purposes.

Applications for appropriations are also pending before committees, including the appropriation for the reform school, and for the protection of fish and game, amounting to \$183,239.73. The aggregate of these various amounts, with the appropriations already approved and others for State purposes not yet presented, will nearly, if not equal, the entire estimated income of the State for the present year and the surplus in the treasury.

Our estimated net income for 1896, will be comparatively the same as that of 1895, \$1,471,218.00. If the large surplus now in the treasury should be exhausted by the appropriations for 1895, there will necessarily be a large deficit when the next Legislature shall convene in 1897. It has been the policy of the State to have in its treasury a reasonable amount of money at the commencement of the year. During the past five years the following balances have been in the treasury on the first day of January of each year:

The receipts of the State treasury were largely increased during the year 1893, by the receipt of more than \$180,000, on account of overdue State taxes. Increased revenue from this particular source will not be available in 1895-6. During the present year, by reason of a reduction of the State tax, our receipts from that source will also be reduced \$78,471.51. We shall be compelled during the years 1895 and 1896, to rely upon our present surplus and our ordinary receipts to meet the expenditures authorized at this session of the Legislature.

I recognize that it is for you to consider where necessary appropriations end, and where excessive appropriations begin. The line may be narrow, but it nevertheless exists. I assure you it is not my purpose to trench a single hair's breadth upon the authority conferred by the constitution and laws on the legislature. I appreciate that it is for you to investigate the actual needs of the State, and of her beneficent, educational, charitable and other institutions. Appropriations cannot always be made to meet every call. With the varied demands made upon you for aid, you cannot always appropriate the sum that is claimed can be profitably expended, but are at times, as the representatives of the people and acting in the interests of the State, required to consider what sum will reasonably meet immediate requirements; and in some instances you may feel it your duty to consider, whether the demand is so urgent that it cannot be postponed for future legislative action.

I had the honor to recommend to you at the beginning of this session, a reduction of the State tax for 1896. The retiring State Treasurer, who has been identified with the management of the financial affairs of our State for a period of more than six years, in his final report to the Governor and Council, says: "The tax rate of two and one-half mills will, I am sure, be amply sufficient for the year 1895, and, if no unusual appropriations are made by this Legislature, the tax for 1896 can be assessed on a still lower basis;" and the present efficient State treasurer entirely concurs in this opinion. That there may be no

misunderstanding as to my views upon this point, you will permit me to renew my recommendation for a reduction of the State tax for the year 1896. With \$458,195.85 in the treasury on the first day of January last, a larger amount than we have had, with one exception, for very many years, I believe you will be able to deal fairly and justly with every institution and every interest of the State, and still reach this desired result. If excessive calls shall be resisted, and reasonable needs made the measure of every appropriation, it can yet be accomplished.

It is conceded that many demands are now being made upon the public treasury. Never in the history of the State have the calls been more numerous and extraordinary than at the present session. If all of these measures, or even a major part of them, calling for money, are to be granted to the full extent claimed, the large surplus now in the treasury will speedily disappear, taxation must be increased to meet future expenditures, and in the meantime, we must avail ourselves of another temporary loan, or embarrassment in the management of the financial affairs of the State, by your treasurer, will inevitably follow. If this grave contingency is to be avoided, retrenchment in appropriations and authorized expenditures should commence at once, and admits of no delay.

Fully appreciating the responsibility resting upon us, and without alluding to any particular measure or any special appropriation now before you, but speaking in the interests of the whole State, I re-affirm the suggestion contained in a former communication addressed to your Honorable bodies, that "this is not a time for excessive appropriations, or for the enactment of experimental laws. It will be your duty, before the session closes, to fix the rate of taxation upon the farms and other real and personal property of the State, to meet in part the expenditures authorized by you. The entire matter is within your control, and the tax for State purposes must depend upon the appropriations here made." As has been frequently demonstrated in the history of the legislation of our country, the Executive is powerless without the co-operation of the legislative branch of the Government. I trust this will be accorded.

To His Excellency, the Governor of Maine:

In compliance with your communication, I have the honor to transmit herewith a statement showing appropriations approved to and including February 25, 1895, for the year 1895, also an estimate of a portion of the further necessary regular appropriations for 1895, also the appropriations acted on and reported by the committees, and now pending before the Legislature. Through the courtesy of the secretaries of the committees of the Legislature, I am able to give herewith an estimate of the amount of the appropriations for the year 1895, asked for and now pending before committees, but not yet reported to the Legislature. net increase of \$53,633.87 in the appropriations already made for the year 1895, as compared with those of 1893 for the same purposes and the extraordinary appropriations for 1895, already made and not appropriated in 1893, amount to \$86,175.04. The appropriations already passed for the year 1896 exceed the appropriations made in 1894 for similar State purposes by \$20,250. extraordinary appropriations for 1896 not made in 1894 amount to \$85.500.

I also include, as requested, an estimate of the receipts for the year 1895 made on the basis of the present State tax of two and one-half mills, showing a total of \$1,506,218. There is included in these estimated receipts \$35,000, the amount received for dog licenses, which can not be considered an available asset, as it is all refunded to the towns. The receipts for 1896 as estimated will be substantially the same.

I much regret not being able to furnish this statement sooner but sickness in the office has caused an unavoidable delay.

Now whether my friend from Van Buren got my name in there to give character to his accusation against Mr. Burleigh or not, I don't know, but I wish the reporters would correct it.

Mr. Keegan of Van Buren, in order that his friend from Caribou might be set right on the record, moved that the clerk of the House be requested to make a special record that Mr. Teague at any rate for one citizen of Caribou is in favor of this bill.

The Speaker: The chair would state that Mr. Teague was simply making a personal explanation on a question of privilege. The records show who signed the majority report and who signed the minority report.

Mr. Keegan withdrew his motion.

Mr. Daigle of Madawaska, said he agreed with the gentleman from Caribou that the mistake should be rectified, for this reason; by placing Mr. Teague on the minority report it apparently leaves me on the other side of the question. And I would furthermore say that I have no more desire to appear on the majority side of

this question than the gentleman from Caribou has to appear on the minority side.

Mr. Hume said: It gives me pleasure to introduce to this House a delegation from the Massachusetts legislature, consisting of members of the Senate and House of Representatives, all of whom are natives of Maine. [Applause.]

The Speaker: It gives this House very great pleasure indeed to welcome the gentlemen from Massachusetts who are members of the Massachusetts legislature. It gives us double pleasure to do so because they were formerly natives of our grand old State of Maine. [Applause.]

Mr. Jordan of Salem, on behalf of the visiting delegation, said: How vanish the lines of arbitrary demarcation between two districts of this glorious Union, when a former son of Maine, now a resident of Massachusetts and a member of the great and general court of that commonwealth can stand upon the floor of the House of the State of Maine and address the Speaker. I assure you that it is one of the honors of a lifetime and a distinguished privilege which I shall ever remember. Our visit to this capital was not prompted by any idle curiosity or any desire to travel to the State of Maine at the expense of the commonwealth of Massachusetts, for like all true sons of Maine, we have paid our way. It was inspired by the feeling of a son who wishes to return to the scenes of his boyhood to revive the memories of the past and to associate with those whom he may meet of those he has known in former years. We came to Maine numbering about eighteen members of the present legislature, who, as the Senator has informed you, were all originally sons of Maine; and our sentiments in regard to Maine are, as they were when we were here and as we come, to-day, can be no more fittingly expressed than these words in the inaugural address of your own Governor:

"Maine's progress in the past, is her best encomium; her advantages for future development are everywhere recognized, and her people are appreciating that concentration of effort and capital will bring forth the grandest results. Employment of labor and production at home, should be the sentiment of our people; loyalty

and devotion to Maine's interests, will enable us to reach the coveted goal of industrial achievements; the present is only the beginning of the great future that awaits her, and the harvest will certainly come."

Mr. Jordan read a communication from the Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives to the chairman of the committee on arrangements in regard to this trip, expressing his regrets at not being able to join the party.

Mr. Speaker, the sons of Maine, now residents of Massachusetts, went forth from their native State not as prodigal or wandering sons. They return to-day with pleasant memories of the past and to revive whatever associations there may be connected with this visit with those whom we have seen in former days. And I assure you, Mr. Speaker, that so long as memory endures, so long as this native State of ours shall hold the remains of those who are near and dear to all of us and our common ancestors, so long will we treasure the memory of this as a most enduring pleasure.

Mr. Dickey of Fort Kent: As a mark of respect to ourselves and to our former citizens who have become residents of the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and have been honored by seats in their legislature, I now move that the House take a recess for fifteen minutes that we may become personally acquainted with the gentlemen.

The motion prevailed.

At the expiration of the time the House was called to order by the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. LAWRENCE of Lubec, Resolve in favor of the Maine State prison, was taken from the table. The pending question being on adoption of House amendment "A" offered by Mr. PARKHURST of Bangor, Mr. LAWRENCE raised the point of order that the amendment was not germane to the question.

The Speaker said: This resolve appropriates money to furnish suitable working capital for manufacturing industries in the State prison. The gentleman from Bangor offers an amendment that none of the articles manufactured there shall be sold at retail. The money is being appropriated for the purpose of manufacturing. The chair will rule that anything that pertains to the disposition of what is there manufactured must necessarily be germane to the question.

The amendment was rejected by a vote on division 27 to 56. The resolve was then read the second time, passed to be engrossed and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. HOWE of Milo, Resolve in favor of North Yarmouth academy, was taken from the table, read the second time, passed to be engrossed and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. KINGMAN of Hancock, bill "An Act to amend section 21 of chapter 30 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter 303 of the Public Laws of 1885, as amended by chapter 92 of the Public Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 248 of the Public Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 95 of the Public Laws of 1891, relating to close time on partridges,"

Mr. Keegan: The rule is undoubtedly that the person must have voted with the majority.

The SPEAKER: The chair will say that it has never felt it a part of its duty to raise a point of order when no member of the House raises it. If gentlemen desire to raise points of order the chair will rule. The gentleman from Augusta made his motion to reconsider the vote of yesterday. The gentleman from Canaan moved that Tuesday of next week be assigned for its consideration. That motion was declared carried. Nobody made any objection. Afterwards the gentleman from Canaan moved to change his motion and to assign Wednesday, and while we were considering that the point of no quorum was raised. When a question of no quorum is raised, what has been done up to that time is not affected. The motion had been made by the gentleman from Augusta and the House had assigned Tuesday for its consideration before the question of no quorum was raised.

Mr. Gilbert withdrew the point of no quorum, and moved to reconsider the vote assigning Tuesday of next week for consideration of the motion to reconsider the vote by which reports "A" and "B" of the Committee on Towns, relating to incorporating the town of Oldpoint, was assigned for consideration.

Mr. Fairbanks of Bangor, moved to adjourn.

The Speaker ruled that the gentleman from Greene had a right to make his motion.

Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor, moved to adjourn.

Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor: Mr. Speaker, I rise to a question of personal privilege.

THE SPEAKER: The gentleman will state his question.

I rise to a question of privilege to explain my position in reference to the bill known as Senate Document No. 136, which is the Bangor bridge bill. I am not satisfied with that bill—the people of Bangor are not satisfied with it, but at this late time in the session, it has been thought best that no further effort be made to stay the hand of the proceedings which have been taken. I simply rise to state to this House that I have not receded from my position, but believe still there is some objection in that bill. So with this explanation, first, that I have never wished from the beginning to interfere with any rights which may be vested in the bridge owners; second, that I believe the bill is too sweeping and gives too much power to that corporation.

Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth, presented the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, A grateful and united nation recognizes that Abraham Lincoln was the savior of his country as Washington was its defender, and,

Whereas, His exalted leadership as President of the United States through the darkest hours of the nation's life has rendered his name immortal by his distinguished services for union and liberty; therefore be it

Resolved, That the people of Maine, by its Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, earnestly ask that by an

act of Congress, the twelfth day of February, the birthday of Abraham Lincoln be made a national holiday.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent by the Secretary of State to each member of our delegation in Congress.

Mr. Hamlin said: On the fifteenth of April, 1865, our Nation was plunged into the deepest grief it has ever felt. Abraham Lincoln, our President, the man who issued the proclamation declaring the freedom of the slaves; the man who had guided this Nation through the strains of our Civil War, on the morning of that day quietly breathed his last. After he had performed so great duties under terrible anxieties, and while we were about to enter the era of peace and happiness where his wisdom and his influence would have accomplished so much toward reconcilation without bitterness or revenge, he was suddenly taken from us. He met his death in a manner most abhorrent to American people, at the hand of an assassin. Expressions of sympathy poured in upon us from all parts of the world, and a tribute was paid to him greater than was ever paid to any man—and it was not too great. A lapse of thirty years has taught us better to appreciate this man and his deeds and has shown us that the estimation formed of him at the time of his death was none too high. Indeed too much has never been said in praise of this noble man. No greater lover of liberty or of his country ever lived. In honesty, character, wisdom and ability combined, America has never produced his equal. plause.) Subjected to the severest trials he was ever found true and never found wanting. All in all, he was to us the ideal type of a true American. With all his greatness, his simplicity in life and in manners kept him in the closest touch with all the people. Greater than Washington in some respects he was second to him only, if to anybody, in the hearts of all the American people.

But, Mr. Speaker, I do not rise to make extended remarks. We are now in the closing and busy days of the session. Others perhaps may desire to say something upon this matter, and I think I know full well the unanimous sentiment of this House touching the resolutions which I have introduced. The birthday of our great Washington is observed as a national holiday, and I think it is eminently fitting that the birthday of our great Lincoln should be similarly observed. I therefore beg leave to introduce these resolutions somewhat in line with those which have been passed by

New York, Illinois and some other states. I ask that the resolutions be read, and I make all necessary motions for their adoption and to secure their early passage. (Applause.)

Mr. KEEGAN of Van Buren said: I wish to second, from the bottom of my heart, the resolution presented by the gentleman from Ellsworth. (Applause.) I am thankful that on this question, at least, there can be absolute and cordial unanimity and sympathy between every man and every party; that upon the question of honoring the great and noble Lincoln, there is only one voice and one sentiment in this body, as there is in the country. (Applause.)

Mr. PARKHURST of Bangor said: Mere words uttered on the floor of this House cannot add luster to the ever brightening fame of Abraham Lincoln. All of us are familiar with the momentous events that surrounded his administration of national affairs at Washington. The heart of every member of this House must thrill with reverential admiration at the mention of his name. Nevertheless the introduction of the resolutions offered an opportunity for paying tribute not only to the memory of Abraham Lincoln, but to that grand and noble son of Maine upon whom he leaned during all the trials and dangers of the Civil War, Hannibal Hamlin (applause,) for it should be remembered that the agitation which seeks expression in these resolutions and has already caused their adoption by several of the state legislatures, sprang from a speech delivered by Hannibal Hamlin, at a banquet given on the anniversary of Lincoln's birthday in New York, some four years At that time Hannibal Hamlin argued that as Washington was the father of our country, so Lincoln was its savior and that both should be alike honored, expressing at the same time an earnest desire that he should live long enough to see Congress make Lincoln's birthday a national holiday. His death has made this impressive.

At a banquet given by the Union League Club last February in honor of Lincoln's birthday, a distinguished son of Hannibal Hamlin, Gen. Charles Hamlin, again took up the subject and in an eloquent speech advocated action by Congress. The press has widely circulated Gen. Hamlin's speech and success is now certain. All of us living as we do in the after glow of Lincoln's greatness,

are familiar with his life and his great works. We do not need this holiday to recall him to our minds; but as the succeeding generations come and go they will not have such a distinct personal knowledge of his life and character; for that reason we should give to our children's children so long as our Republic shall endure, this continual recurring reminder of our martyred President so that his memory may forever inspire Americans. Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House, I hereby second the motion of the gentleman from Ellsworth. (Applause.)

Mr. HILL of Portland said: Wherever, upon the earth, man exists, there may be found and there flourishes to some degree the feast, the festival or the holiday. These are as natural to him as the air he breathes or the food he eats, and to nothing can we turn to ascertain with greater accuracy his traits and characteristics than to these. They are the certain standard that show his tendencies, his progress and his social condition.

The primitive holidays were occasional and prompted only by unusual event of domestic or tribal life. A study of these reveal a people in the lower strata of civilization. Ascending the scale to higher types of men, of more social and political importance, the number and variety of its holidays increases and the power and influence exerted by that people are correspondingly greater. Going still higher, we note the change from the occasional to the periodic festival or holiday, and here forms the bud that later develops into the flower of our modern civilization. Thus we see from the least civilized to the most enlightened races and nations, what is adopted and expressed in a holiday is something of permanent interest, as indicative of the degree of civilization of that race or nation and of the progress of humanity.

If, then, holidays in a sense are typical of a people, to what or to whom would we prefer to call the attention of this and future ages than to the life and example of Lincoln? No man ever represented more fully the beginning, the rise and the general qualities of this nation than he. A plain man, industrious, persevering, fair-minded and self-reliant, he rose rapidly to the highest office in its gift. On modest foundations his fame rests, but the structure itself is as enduring as history. Emerson has well said: "In four years—four years of battle days—his endurance, his fertility of resources, his magnanimity, were sorely tried and never found

wanting. There, by his courage, his justice, his even temper, his fertile council, his humanity, he stood an heroic figure in the centre of an heroic epoch. He is the true history of the American people in his time."

What event, then, means more to us than the birth of Lincoln? Every feeling of gratitude and patriotism appeals to us and every consideration of unity and national pride marks it as a day worthy of our attention. Only Washington can compare with him in fortune, and side by side, in the same month, their names should be enrolled on the calendar of our holidays. (Applause.)

We have far too few, if any, holidays that can be called national, and the present seems to me a favorable opportunity to ask for national legislation to that effect. We need now and ever shall need to bind us more strongly together, national days, and these to aid us in throwing off the fetters of locality and to thrill us with grander and more patriotic emotions.

It gives me great pleasure to further second the motion of the gentleman from Ellsworth. (Applause.)

Called by the Legislature to the important position of adjutant general in Januuary, 1861, he brought to that office a knowledge of military affairs that proved invaluable in the difficult duties that immediately In the arrangement and execution of the vexed devolved thereon. details consequent upon the arising and moving of troops and by his patriotic vigor and comprehensive appreciation of the important duties of his office, he was during the entire war period a tower of strength to the Chief Executive, and to his reports the State is now indebted for its most comprehensive and exhaustive history of the part it bore in the war and for its most eloquent memorial to its brave sons.

Resolved, That the clerk of the House be directed to enter these resolves in the Journal of the House.

Mr. FAIRBANKS said:

If I should let this opportunity pass without saying a few words in support of these resolutions, I should be derelict of an important duty.

I knew General Hodsdon personally, serving for a time as a recruiting sergeant for the Thirtieth Maine Veteran Volunteers. His suavity of manner, his kindly voice and presence, his smile of approbation when satisfied with the reports presented to him, restored the timid and encouraged those in his service.

He came to fill the office of adjutant general thoroughly equipped for the position. His mind was broad and comprehensive, and at each new exigency and demand of the service, consequent of the great war, he was ready and in advance of the requirements. The old soldiers of '61 and '65 appreciate and know the value of his services.

Many a household has felt the goodness of that master hand in the unrivalled reports which stand first in comparison with those of any other state in the Union.

Let us never forget the great value of this man to this State in the effort to suppress the Rebellion. Let us write in the archives of this State in letters of gold the name of John L. Hodsdon. Let us hand his name down to our children and ask them to keep in grateful remembrance the inestimable value of General Hodsdon to the State during the war.

When we shall have passed these resolutions, when we shall have done all in our power, still the debt of gratitude will never, never be paid to that noble, patriotic soul. (Applause.)

Our appropriations are now very large. In former years when the appropriations and expenditures were comparatively small the committee of accounts of the Governor's Council could give all bills careful attention. It is now impossible. The council meets but once a month and at each meeting have many duties to perform. They cannot give attention to the details of accounts. Further, if a bill is rendered the day after the council adjourns it cannot be audited for thirty days and an injustice is done to the State's auditor.

The proposed law should provide that the auditor shall be an expert accountant and that he shall keep a complete set of books.

The council changes every two years and many old and rejected bills are presented which a new council can know nothing about and thousands of dollars would be saved in this class of accounts alone.

It now costs at least seven hundred dollars a year for a committee to examine the accounts of the State treasurer. This expense would be avoided by the appointment of an auditor.

There is a great looseness in the expenditure of contingent funds in the hands of State officers, boards of trustees, commissions, etc. A careful examination of all bills rendered to be paid out of these funds would save the State thousands of dollars.

The report was accepted in concurrence. Statement ordered printed in concurrence and referred to the next legislature in concurrence.

Was read and passed in concurrence.

Bill "An Act to relieve the inhabitants of the town of Cape Elizabeth from the inequalities of burdens imposed by chapter 216 of the Public Laws of 1893," which passed to be enacted in the House, March 25th, came from the Senate indefinitely postponed.

On motion of Mr. COLE of Cape Elizabeth, the House voted to adhere, and the papers were returned to the Senate.

Bill "An Act to exempt from taxation the property of all agricultural, horticultural and mechanical associations, so long as held and used solely for exhibition purposes," which passed to be enacted

in the House March 26th, came from the Senate, enactment refused.

On motion of Mr. WINSLOW of Portland, the House voted to adhere and the papers were returned to the Senate.

Bill "An Act additional to chapter 122 of the Revised Statutes, relating to offences against public justice;"

Resolve providing for the collection of the necessary data for a history of the Maine troops in the War of the Rebellion;

Were reported from the Committee on Engrossed Bills as truly and strictly engrossed, bills passed to be enacted, resolves finally passed, were severally signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.

PRESENTATION OF A PORTRAIT TO THE SPEAKER.

Mr. PEASLEE of Wiscasset said: Realizing the very able and dignified manner in which you, Mr. Speaker, have presided over our deliberations, and desiring to show you that we appreciate you in the position which you have held, we wish to express to you our appreciation of your services so that you may be reminded of that appreciation on our part from time to time. Not desiring to take up any time this morning, as some of us wish to go on the next train, I now have the pleasure in behalf of the members of the present House of presenting to you this picture; and we ask you that when you gaze upon it you not only see the reflection of your own very pleasant, familiar countenance to ourselves, but that you also see in it the reflection of the feelings of the members of the present House and remember that we hold you in high esteem and wish you every honor and success in the future. (Applause.)

The Speaker said: I desire to state to the gentleman from Wiscasset and to the members of this House of Representatives that I accept with sincere gratitude the present which they have so gener-

ously tendered me, and that I shall keep and preserve it not so much for its intrinsic worth as a memento of that friendship and good feeling which has existed between myself as presiding officer and the members of this House during the present session, and which I trust will ever continue to exist as time goes on. I feel toward every member of this House very kindly. I feel that every member of this House has treated me with great consideration and I can sincerely state that whenever in the future I shall have the pleasure of meeting with and of grasping the hand of any one of you, it will be a delight. I will not trespass longer on the time of the business of the House. (Applause.)

PRESENTATION OF A CHAIR TO MAJOR DICKEY.

Mr. PLUMMER of Dexter said: The many friends of the gentleman from Fort Kent, the nestor of this House, whom we all respect so highly, constituting the entire membership of this House, nearly all of whom train in a party different from that which the gentleman from Fort Kent is connected with, have felt that they could not allow the closing hours of this Sixty-seventh Legislature to pass without giving some concrete expression to their kindly feelings, their feelings of friendship and of respect for the venerable gentleman from Fort Kent who has served his district and his State so many terms in this legislature, and who, in his old age, contrary to the general course, has become broadened and liberal instead of narrow and conservative; a man who upon due occasions can rise above party, who has considered the educational interests and the internal improvements of the State first, last and all the time during his remarkable course as a member of this body. These friends of his, I say, remembering all these things, have thought it well and have taken great pleasure in providing for him for his comfort and rest during the remaining years of his life this easy chair, which in their behalf I now present to him; and, Major Dickey, the worst wish that any member of this House of any party has for you is that you may live many, many more years to occupy it and to take your comfort in it. (Applause.)

Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent said: I am in no condition to talk this morning, but I return to the members of the House who have so kindly remembered me my sincere thinks. There are in the presen-

tation of that chair perhaps two important points which are brought home to me. One is that we are declining in age. That is to many, and it is to me, a sad thought. But I accept the chair with a great deal of thanks and so long as I shall live I shall not only enjoy sitting in that chair but I shall enjoy the thoughts of those who have presented it to me so kindly. It is true that I have been in the legislature for many years. There is no school in this State that is so good for our young men as the legislature. It is a wonderful school, and its influence extends all over the State. The members carry home with them all that they have learned of human nature. I thank the members who have presented this chair to me many, many times, and with these few remarks and feeling as I do, nearly sick, I will close by thanking you anew. (Applause.)

On motion of Mr. PLUMMER of Dexter, the House took a recess until 10.30 o'clock.

AFTER RECESS.

House called to order by the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. LANE of Augusta, rules were suspended, resolve read twice, passed to be engrossed and was sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth, the House took a recess until 12 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. COFFIN of Bangor, rules were suspended, resolve read twice and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

WHEREAS, The Granite State Provident Association of Manchester, N. H., doing business in this State, have invited the bank examiner of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, New York and New Jersey to make a thorough examination of the condition of said corporation and its methods of doing business, and having agreed to pay all expenses for the same, therefore

Ordered, That the bank examiner be authorized and directed to make such examination and report to the Governor and Council.

Was read and passed in concurrence.

Resolve relating to copying plans of Maine towns, on which the House, March 26th, voted to adhere, came from the Senate amended by Senate amendment "A" and passed to be engrossed as amended.

On motion of Mr. HAINES of Waterville, the vote whereby the House adhered to its former action in finally passing the resolve, was reconsidered.

On motion of same gentleman the votes whereby the resolve was finally passed and engrossed were reconsidered, Senate amendment "A" adopted in concurrence and resolve as amended passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth said:

I desire personally to thank every member of this House for their kindness and courtesy to me throughout the session. I further desire to thank the Speaker for his many personal attentions both upon the floor of this House and elsewhere. It was my pleasure at the beginning of the session to nominate the Speaker. It is now a grateful pleasure to me to say that all the good things I then said of him were true. They have been verified. His conduct in presiding over this House has demonstrated their truth. We shall when we adjourn carry with us feelings of respect and of friendship for the Speaker; and while we shall be sorry perhaps to part from one another, we do it with the kindest feelings, and I think the recollections of our associations in this House will ever be pleasant. Before we adjourn finally I wish to offer the following resolve:

Resolved, That the thanks of the members of this House are due to the Speaker for the courtesy, dignity and impartiality with which he has presided over the deliberations of this House. I move the passage of the resolve.

Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent said:

I second that resolve, and should like to make more extended remarks but my health will not permit. I wish to say, however, that we have been together some three months, and I believe that there is not a member present or absent but who would cheerfully second and vote for that resolve. It seems to me that we have never had a Speaker who has done better for the interests of the House than our present one. And above all, I thank him for his great courtesy to the minority of this House. I have been here under various Speakers and I have never yet been with one, from Jonathan Cilley down, that I thought had more of the love of the House than our present Speaker. It is true we have had some presiding officers who threw on more dignity, for instance, Robert P. Dunlap, as President of the Senate; but very few Speakers have we ever had that have been so closely allied to the members of the House as our present Speaker, and I cheerfully second the resolve, and I know that it will have a unanimous passage.

Mr. HAINES of Waterville said:

I cannot add anything, perhaps, to what has been said, but I want to say a word seconding the resolve. I appreciate the kindness with which the Speaker has conducted the business of this House during this session, and the work that we have done shows that it has been done with dispatch, more than could have been expected, to my mind. The nervous energy of this man who is our Speaker has been a constant impulse in this session to push us along and keep us at work. We would have adjourned perhaps two weeks later if we had not had a man in the Chair whose disposition is to move on and to do business. I want to thank the members of the House for the courtesy I have received at their hands. We have been a business legislature. We have had no political contentions, we have had no party issues; we have been here legislating for the people upon business issues. We have differed in our opinions upon many of these measures, but there has been no bitterness in our differences to mar our work this win-To my mind the highest type of civilization, the highest type of man, the highest type of a legislative body, is where 151 members can come here as we have and legislate upon different matters and have different opinions, and still have everything finally come out harmonious and everybody be satisfied and gracefully submit to the will of the majority. Life consists in meeting and parting which is sometimes painful; it also has its pleasures. And while we part and say the last goodby, yet we shall carry to our homes pleasant remembrances of the pleasant days we have spent here during this session. (Applause.)

Mr. WINSLOW of Portland said:

Coming here as I did, a stranger to legislative proceedings, and feeling in a degree somewhat inadequate or unfitted to meet the responsibilities placed upon me, I thought it a great pleasure to be cordially greeted by the Speaker of this House and all the officers associated with him; and I shall go to my home and resume my avocation in life with very pleasant recollections of this Sixtyseventh Legislature. I have here formed many pleasant acquaintances and it will ever be a satisfaction to me in the future to look back upon this winter and upon all the pleasant associations connected with it. We cannot all think alike, it is utterly impossible; but I believe if we are true to our honest convictions and whenever we cast a vote our conscience goes with it, we have performed a duty that rests upon us to the best of our ability, and I believe that is the record of all present here. We shall return to our homes with the consciousness that we have acted up to the light that was given us and performed the duties which devolved upon us as representatives of the people in a way that we shall be always pleased to reflect upon. So I desire to take this occasion to thank the Speaker of the House, the clerk and his assistant, the reporters who have patiently listened to what has been said, and all the messengers and all connected with this body I thank for their uniform kindness and courtesy to me, coming as I did among you a stranger. (Applause.)

Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston said:

I heartily indorse the sentiments so impressively uttered by those who have preceded me. Our work is accomplished and engravened into law for the future guidance of this State. How well and faithfully we have served the people who have commissioned us as their representatives, who have entrusted us with the important work of legislating in their behalf, they alone must determine. And yet I

feel that there is one fact which stands out here prominently above all others, and that is that we have deliberated here for the State and not for any party; that party lines have not been drawn here; that party feelings have not been displayed here; that party rancor has not assailed these walls as in former years. And if the end crowns the work as has been stated, then I trust that the crown of our labors will be the uplifting and dignifying of our State among the sisterhood of states and the permanency and perpetuity of this greatest of earth's republics.

To the clerk—a valued officer of this House and a still more valued friend of mine, I believe I express the wish and the thought of every member of this House when I say that you, sir, have been faithful to duty through the long, unremitting labors of this session. Your work has been carried on in the silent watches of the night. We have been thoughtless, perhaps, in regard to it; and yet, sir, we know that you have kept up with the business of the House, pace by pace, step by step, and that to-day you have the satisfaction of knowing that you have been a faithful servant and that no neglect or infidelity lies at your door. And to the Speaker—I realize in some degree the important responsibility which rests upon you in the government of this House. We should indeed be but a mere stock arena or school yard but for the fairness, the dignity, the impartiality which presides over the deliberations of this body. I believe, sir, that you have done all to the utmost of your ability to preside courteously and fairly and in a spirit that would carry forward the work of this session. Your rulings have been unchallenged and sustained by the body of this House. have lent kind assistance to the untrained members of this body in helping them on to their feet for the first time and in drawing forth their latent powers of debate. I believe that you will carry to your far home in Aroostook the affection and the love and the respect of every member of this House.

And now the hour of parting is at hand, an hour eagerly sought for as returning us to our homes and the pressing engagements of business, and yet an hour which now at hand we would gladly turn back on the dial of time. The true eloquence of this occasion now becomes the eloquence of silence, the eloquence of full hearts and of tender memories. The old dramatist of human nature has well said, "The friends thou hast, grapple them to thy soul with hooks

of steel;" and as I look about me on the eve of final adjournment, and into the faces of these, my brother representatives, I feel that while I have gained much in knowledge and experience in the arts of debate, in the diplomacy of politics, the highest gift that I shall carry home with me is the gift of your friendship, more fragrant than the breath of the morning, sweeter than the perfume of the lily or the rose, richer than the mines of Solomon and more enduring than our own native granite. The thought which lies last in my heart and which I now wish to finally express before I take my seat is this, that each one of you as you return to your homes may take this sentiment for your future guidance, that we live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not words; in feelings, not in figures on the dial. We shall count time by heart throbs. He most lives who feels most, feels the noblest, acts the best. Gentlemen, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Clerk, I did you all adieu. (Applause.)

Mr. PATTEN of Bath said:

I rise to second this resolve on behalf of the members of this House from Sagadahoc county. I think every member of the House from Sagadahoc has been eminently satisfied with his treatment and with the treatment of every member of the House by our presiding officer. Sagadahoc is small in area, but in Republicanism she is the largest county in this State. (Applause.) And sturdy little Sagadahoc hopes yet to see our presiding officer holding the highest office within the gift of the people of this State. (Applause.) And she hopes moreover to see our faithful clerk yet promoted to a higher office, that of Secretary of State. (Applause.)

Gentlemen, so far as I am concerned, I have to say that this winter has been to me not only a most valuable experience but a most pleasant one, and feel for you each and all the most hearty friendship, which I hope is reciprocated. (Applause.)

Mr. LARRABEE of Portland said:

I desire to add a word to the sentiment contained in the resolution presented by the gentleman from Ellsworth. I feel under great obligations to our distinguished Speaker, not only for the constant and unvarying courtesy and kindness which he has shown to me, but for the great fidelity and ability with which he has discharged the duties of his position and dispatched the business which has

come before this House. We have daily assembled here for nearly three months, and I presume that each of us believes that we have been fairly fatihful to ourselves, to our duties and to the interests of our constituents. And yet there are few if any who can say that they have been in their seats through every session of this legislature. I have not been present in this House when the distinguished gentleman whom we now honor did not open the business of the House and direct it at every session that we have had this winter. Can any stronger proof of fidelity to your interests and to the interests of the State be shown? Of the ability with which he has discharged the duties of his office results attest. The legislature of 1895 is of the same duration to a day as was the legislature of 1893. The volume of business which this legislature has transacted is far in excess of that transacted by previous legislatures; and that we have been able to accomplish so much more in exactly the same length of time is largely due to the dispatch with which business has been handled at the Speaker's desk. I can say no kinder thing to our distinguished friend than that I hope he may live long to enjoy that perfect health which has enabled him to be so constant and faithful to our interests and to the interests of the State. And while we say goodby to him, I do not forget that we are to say goodby to each other. Men who have hearts, men of honest purpose and thought who have been associated together as long as we have been, when they are about to return to their homes and break the associations of the past few months cannot fail to have mingled feelings of pleasure and regret, feelings much more keenly felt than can be plainly stated. I can only say that I am sorry to leave, yet I am glad to go. You have been very kind to me; I shall bear from this hall the kindest recollections of our associations. I hope it may be the lot of each of you to bear equally kind recollections with your associations with the other members. (Applause.)

Mr. LANE of Augusta said:

I would not mar the beauty and the eloquence of what has been uttered by an attempt to add a word to what has been said by the gentlemen who have preceded me, did I not realize that at the close of this session I complete my 14th official connection with the legislature of Maine. And I have to say that during all those

years when I was favored with the courtesy and pleasant acquaintance with the different members who have occupied seats in this House and the other body, there is no session that I look back upon with more pleasant recollections than upon the one now about to close. To the Speaker and to every member of this House who have borne so patiently with my infirmities and listened so kindly to all I had to say, I offer my most sincere thanks, especially to you, Mr. Speaker, who have uniformly accorded to me every courtesy and every consideration which it was possible for the Chair to give. (Applause.)

Mr. HOOPER of Castine said:

I rise to say one word and heartily endorse what has already been said. I have lived now fifty-four winters. I hope to live fifty-(Applause.) For several years I was cast to and fro four more. on the bosom of the ocean; several winters I laid in the Virginia mud; twenty-nine winters I have stayed at home; but I have never spent such a pleasant winter as I have this winter here in Augusta, and I am proud that I am a member of the Sixty-seventh Legisla-It has been a great school to me and I have learned a great I have listened with much interest to the remarks of my friend Keegan, who is not here now. He has told us time and time again where Aroostook was and where Van Buren was and what it needed. I have listened with much interest to my friend from Dexter, Mr. Plummer, and also to the noble gentleman from Lewiston. I also found out from our friend from Bangor, Mr. Fairbanks, how we can get a bridge without paying for it. also found out from my friend, Mr. Haines of Waterville, how we can run a State college. I also found out at the first of the session why an insane hospital should not be built at Bangor, from my friend from Lubec. It was on account of the price of coal. could be laid down cheaper in Augusta than in Bangor, and for that reason the insane asylum should not be built in Bangor. all these things I am thankful to the different members of this House, for this schooling which I have received.

Now gentlemen, Mr. Speaker and officers of the House, if you ever come to Castine, you ask the child from three years old to a person eighty years old where Charles Hooper is, and they will find me for you and we will paint the town red. (Applause.)

Mr. COFFIN of Bangor said:

I arise without any preparation whatever, and while we have been entertained by so many fine speeches, it ill becomes me to attempt to make a speech at this late hour; but I feel that I should not do justice to myself, my inner feelings, did I not express my gratitude to the Speaker and to the officers of the House, to the reporters of the House, and all with whom I have been associated for the continued courtesy which has been extended to me as a member. I also rise at this time to thank the members of the House for the kind treatment they have extended towards our section of the State. We feel that you have treated us very liberally, very generously, and we appreciate it fully; and I assure you that I shall leave this House with the kindest feelings towards every member. I wish to thank you all for your kindness and courtesy not only on the part of the Speaker and officers of the House but of every member. (Applause.)

Mr. McCULLOUGH of Calais said:

So much has been so eloquently and ably said on the floor of this House this morning that words from me would be superfluous. I simply wish to thank the Speaker, the officers of the House and the members for their uniform kindness and courtesy to me, and I trust we may all return to our homes and families and find them enjoying good health, and if we ever return to this House that we may part in as kindly a spirit as we do this morning. (Applause.)

The resolutions received a unanimous passage, by a rising vote.

The Speaker: I believe it has not been the custom for the Speaker to make any extended remarks on this occasion. Permit me to express to you one and all my heartfelt gratitude for the kind things that you have said, for the resolutions you have passed. I know that it is an honor to be elected a Speaker of the House of Representatives and to preside over a legislative body here, and I believe it is especially an honor to have presided over this legislature; for having been associated in legislative experience on six occasions with the House of Representatives, I am confident that this legislature contains as much, aye, more, of marked ability than any other that has ever assembled here, and that it will go down in history as one possessing marked ability and that there

are men in it who will be heard from in the not far distant future. I believe also that it will go down into history as a legislature that though peculiarly constituted, having scarcely any of the minority party in it, has conscientiously and fearlessly discharged its duties to the State without any fear or favor, treating all its interests, liberally but justly, and that you will all take with you to your homes the satisfaction that while here, acting for the best interests of our noble State with a view to its future progress and prosperity, you have fully recognized its needs and have been equal to the occasion. Gentlemen, again thanking you most sincerely for your expressions of satisfaction, I bid you, I suppose, at this time, as a body, my final adieu. (Applause.)

Mr. LANE of Augusta said:

Perhaps no one realizes better than myself the arduous duties which devolve upon the clerk of this House; and I present the following resolutions which but feebly express the views which I know every member of this House entertains:

Resolved, That the thanks of the members of this House be tendered to W. S. Cotton, clerk, and to E. M. Thompson, assistant clerk, for their uniform patience, courtesy and ability in the performance of their respective duties.

Mr. FAIRBANKS of Bangor said:

For sixty-seven years Maine has had a legislature. I doubt if a single session has ever passed where the record has not been read in detail at some stage of the proceedings. I wish to call the attention of the House to the fact that so much confidence has been reposed in the able clerk of the House that every member was willing to take his record without having it reviewed first. It strikes me that it is unprecedented. Two years ago he acted in an able manner, giving entire satisfaction. During the present session I had occasion to go over his journal of two years ago carefully, and I could not find a single error. I hope to see him some day honor another position for which he is eminently qualified. He is worthy of it.

Just a word in parting from the gentlemen here. If there is anything in the world that inspires confidence it is the image of God which is placed in the face of an honorable man or woman.

My heart throbs at the sight of such faces, my voice will go out to meet them more than half way. To all of you I extend my most cordial thanks, and I hope in a better land than this we may join hand and heart in long and happy associations.

The resolve received a unanimous passage, by a rising vote.

Mr. RODICK of Eden presented the following resolve:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered to the messengers, mail carriers, folders, door keepers and pages of this House for the faithful, efficient and kindly manner in which they each and all have discharged the duties of their respective offices.

The resolve received a unanimous passage.

Mr. PLUMMER of Dexter presented the following resolve:

Resolved, That the thanks of this House are due and are hereby tendered to the official reporters and the members of the press who have been in attendance upon the sessions of this House, for the marked accuracy and fairness with which they have reported the proceedings of the Sixty-seventh Legisluture of Maine.

The resolve received a unanimous passage.

On motion of Mr. HAMLIN of Ellsworth,

Ordered, That the gavel used by the Speaker be presented to him.

A message was received from the Senate through Senator Mitchell of York, informing the House that it had transacted all business before it and was ready to adjourn without day.

On motion of Mr. HAINES of Waterville, that gentleman was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body that the House had transacted all business before it and was ready to adjourn without day.

Papers from the Senate.

Ordered, That a committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to wait upon the Governor and inform him that both branches of the legislature have acted on all matters referred to them and are now ready to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

The papers were returned to the Senate.

Mr. PATTEN from the committee, subsequently reported that the Governor would soon communicate with the House, through the Secretary of State, and would transmit a list of acts and resolves passed by the legislature, which had received his approval, and that he had nothing further to communicate.

Forthwith, a communication was received from the Governor transmitting a list of the acts and resolves passed by the legislature and approved by the Governor, numbering 493 acts and 134 resolves, the titles of which are as follows:

RULES.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house:

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the

absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS.

- 4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.
- 5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

MONITORS.

- 6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.
- 7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On ways and means, On leave of absence, On bills in the third reading, On engrossed bills, On elections,

To consist of seven members each.

On county estimates,

To consist of one member from each county.

On business of the house,

To consist of three members.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

- 10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.
- 11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.
- 12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.
- 13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.
- 14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.
- 15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.
- 16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.
- 17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.
- 18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.
- 19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason of such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.
- 20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.
- 21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.
- 22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house

for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.

- 23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.
- 24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

- 25. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
 - 1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.
 - 4th. Orders.
 - 5th. Reports of committees and first reading of bills or resolves.
- 6th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.
 - 7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.
 - 8th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except, by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

- 26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration, and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.
- 27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.

- 28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but—
 - 1st. To adjourn.
 - 2d. To lay on the table.
 - 3d. For the previous question.
 - 4th. To commit.
 - 5th. To postpone to a day certain.
 - 6th. To amend.
 - 7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.
- 29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.
- 31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.
- 32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.
- 33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.
- 34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.
- 35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- 36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be

withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.

- 37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.
- 38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.
- 39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.
- 40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.
- 41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.
- 42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.
- 43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.
- 44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.
- 45. A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.
- 46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall be endorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.
- 47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.
- 48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.

- 49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.
- 50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.
- 51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.
- 52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.
- 53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.
- 54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.
- 55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor? and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.
- 56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions, shall govern the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.
- 57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless twothirds of the members present shall consent thereto.
- 58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

JOINT RULES.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

On the judiciary, On legal affairs, On financial affairs, On federal relations, On education, On railroads, telegraphs and expresses, On commerce, On mercantile affairs and insurance, On banks and banking, On manufactures, On agriculture, On military affairs, On interior waters, On state lands and state roads, On ways and bridges, On inland fisheries and game, On shore fisheries, On counties, On towns, On Indian affairs, On claims, On pensions, On insane hospital. On reform school, On state prison, On public buildings, On library, On state college of agriculture and the mechanic arts, On mines and mining,

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the House, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

On temperance, On labor.

2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the House, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.

- 3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.
- 4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be brieffy endorsed on the back of the same.
- 5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.
- 6. The title of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.
- 7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section 1."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

- 8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.
- 9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.
- 10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, and every bill or resolve appropriating money, or disposing of state lands or other state property, reported in either house by a committee. or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.
- 11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate

and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

- 12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.
- 13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.
- 14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.
- 15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.
- 16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.
- 17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

SENATE ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. The reception and reference of petitions, and such other papers as require action by a committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. The first reading of bills and resolves printed under the rules.

6th. The report of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

7th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

8th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

9th. Orders of the day.

When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but,

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To reconsider.

3d. To lay on the table.

4th. To postpone to a day certain.

5th. To commit.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the name of the county which he represents.

The senator presenting an *order* should put his name thereto, on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the name of the county which he represents.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

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- RULE 1. President to take the chair at time of calling to order—secretary to preside in his absence.

 - " 3. President to address senate, and senators address president, while speaking—senators to stand while speaking.
 - " 4. Members to be styled senators while speaking.
 - " 5. President may call a senator to the chair during brief absence.
 - " 6. President shall rise to put a question-declare all votes.
 - 7. Motion to adjourn always in order.
 - " 8. Order of precedence in motions.
 - " 9. Motion to be in writing if desired-right to withdraw.
 - " 10. Right to the floor-senator to speak but once to same question.
 - " 11. Different subject, under color of amendment, out of order—amendment ingrafting general provision of law upon private bill out of order.
 - " 12. Amendment of amendments—reconsideration of vote—special time assigned.
 - " 13. Precedence of motion to reconsider.
 - " 14. Questions of order.
 - " 15. Division of questions.
 - " 16. Filling up blanks.
 - " 17. Reading of papers.
 - " 18. Bills in second reading to go to committee—their duty.
 - " 19. Consideration of bills by paragraph on second reading.
 - " 20. Engrossment of bills.

RULES.

- 1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president *pro tempore* be chosen.
- 2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.
- 3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.
- 4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.
- 5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.
- 6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.
- 7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.
- 8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.
- 9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time before a decision, or any amendment be made to it.
- 10. No senator shall address the senate until recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and not then more than three times without leave.
- 11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree.
- 12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no

senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.

- 13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.
- 14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.
- 15. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.
- 16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.
- 17. Every paper shall be once read at the table before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.
- 18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.
- 19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.
- 20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.
- 21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.
- 22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
- 1st. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers as require action by a committee.

- 4th, Orders.
- 5th. The first reading of bills and resolves laid on the table to be printed under the rules.
- 6th. Reports of committees, and if accompained by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 7th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 8th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.
 - 9th. Orders of the day.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the House, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

- 23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.
- 24. After a question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.
- 25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.
- 26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.
- 27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.
- 28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.
- 29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of twothird of the members present.
- 30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.
- 31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.
- 32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot), and appointed by the senate.

33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading. On engrossed bills.

to consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

- 34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.
- 35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.
- 36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.
- 37. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Reed's Rules, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

MEMORANDA.

- 1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a report of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the order or other paper appointing said committee to consider the subject.
- 3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of———," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be indorsed thus, "Petition of——and others of the town of——," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "Petition of———," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county in which he resides.
- 7. The member presenting an *order* should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county in which he resides.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which leave to withdraw was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The original, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented de novo.
- 9. Bills and resolves refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.
- 10. The heading or caption of bills should be as follows:

13. All bills amended by statute, by striking out words from any section or independent clause thereof, or by adding or inserting other words and provisions, should recite the section or clause as it would read after being amended as proposed.

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
