AUGUSTA, Wednesday, January 4, 1905.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Laws of the State, the members of the House of Representatives elect assembled in the hall of the House and were called to order by W. S. Cotton, Clerk of the House of 1903.

The certified roll of Representatives elect was called by the Clerk and 148 members responded to the call and a quorum found to be present.

On motion of Mr. POWERS of Houlton,

Messrs. Powers,

Swain of Leeds, Baxter of Portland, Norcross of Winthrop, White of Levant, Purinton of Bowdoin, Mullen of Bangor,

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor, and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives elect had assembled in the Representatives Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. POWERS subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon the Governor, attended by the Council, came in and administered to the members elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and suite then retired.

On motion of Mr. HALE of Portland,

Webster of Chesterville, Sargent of Castine, Blanchard of Blanchard, Bunker of Anson, Copp of Cornish, Morey of Lewiston,

were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for Speaker.

The report was accepted, and Morrell N. Drew having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventy-second Legislature for the years 1905-1906.

The Speaker elect was conducted to the Chair by Mr. JOHN-SON of Waterville.

Mr. DREW said:

Gentlemen of the House: I accept the office to which you have elected me, appreciating the great honor and realizing to the full the many responsibilities that it brings. It shall be my aim to assist you in the orderly and prompt dispatch of the business of the House, and to accomplish this I must have your sincere co-operation. In the discharge of our sworn duty let us be loyal to our individual constituencies, yet ever remembering that our first duty is to our beloved State, the fairest flower in the garland of States that make up our nation. In our work let us be cautious, yet brave. In matters of appropriations let us remember that the only source of revenue of our State is taxation in some form. Let us strive to satisfy our own consciences, and to merit the approbation of all good citizens of our State.

Gentlemen, again thanking you, I await your pleasure. (Applause.)

The same information was conveyed to the Senate by Mr. NEWCOMB of Eastport.

On motion of Mr. HIGGINS of Limerick,

That gentleman conducted the Clerk and Assistant Clerk to the Governor to take and subscribe the necessary oaths to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties, and subsequently reported that he had discharged the duty assigned him, and that the Clerk and Assistant Clerk had taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Ordered, That the rules and orders of the last House of Representatives be adopted for the government of this House until otherwise ordered.

On motion of Mr. JOSSELYN of Portland,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House furnish a catalogue containing the names of members alphabetically arranged with the residence, postoffice address, boarding place, occupation, politics, number of seats and diagram of the House, and that the usual number of copies be printed and distributed.

On motion of Mr. SWETT of Portland,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to deliver to the Clerk of the House one copy of the Holy Bible, one copy of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary, one copy of the Standard Dictionary, one copy of Lippincott's Pronouncing Gazetteer, and one copy of Cushing's Manual.

On motion of Mr. GANNETT of Augusta,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be authorized to procure the services of a typewriter during the present session of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. LITTLEFIELD of Rockland,

Ordered, That J. S. Estes be official stenographer and A. H. Whitman assistant stenographer with the same compensation as at last session.

On motion of Mr. RUSSELL of Readfield,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with one copy of the Daily Kennebec Journal and two other daily papers printed in the State, such as each member or officer may select.

On motion of Mr. LITTLEFIELD of Rockland,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with postage stamps to the same amount furnished to the members and officers of the Seventy-first Legislature.

Came from the Senate, read and passed, with committee appointed as follows:

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 4. 15 Ordered, The House concurring, that the joint rules and orders of 1903-1904 be adopted as the joint rules and orders of this Legislature with the following amendments:

In Rule I strike out the word "telegraphs" from the line "railroads, telegraphs and expresses," so that the same shall read "railroads and expresses."

Immediately following, insert line, "On telegraphs and telephones."

Strike out the words, "public charities and State beneficiaries," and substitute therefor the words, "insane hospitals."

Strike out the words, "Reform school," and substitute therefor the words, "State School for Boys."

Strike out Rule 18, and substitute therefor the following:

"18. Every act, resolve or order, appropriating money, shall be referred to the appropriate committee for consideration, and no further action shall be had thereon in either branch until the same shall have been reported back by said committee."

The order was read and passed in concurrence.

Subsequently on motion of Mr. HIGGINS of Limerick, the action whereby the House passed the above order in concurrence with the Senate, was reconsidered, the order tabled, pending passage, and ordered printed.

Communication from Secretary of State transmitting the official returns of votes for Governor given in by the several cities, towns and plantations in the State on the twelfth day of September last.

Was referred to the Committee on Gubernatorial Votes in concurrence.

The Speaker appointed as pages of the House for this session Frank Fellows of Bucksport and Harold E. Weeks of Fairfield.

On motion of Mr. OAKES of Auburn, adjourned to meet tomorrow at 10 o'clock A. M.

Ordered, That a Joint Select Committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to receive proposals from the publishers of the Maine State Year Book for furnishing the State with a sufficient number of copies for the years 1905-1906.

Ordered, The House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn, they adjourn to meet on Wednesday, January 11, 1905, at half-past ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Were read and passed in concurrence.

Ordered, The House concurring, that a Joint Select Committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to consider the general matter of the State printing to ascertain in what ways, if any, the present volume of such printing may be reduced without detriment to State interests, what changes, if any, are advisable in the existing law, and what prices should be paid for the work under existing conditions, and to report by bill or otherwise. Came from the Senate, read and passed, with Messrs. Heselton of Kennebec.

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Messrs. Page of Appleton, Hastings of Bethel, Bliss of Bangor, were joined on the part of the House.

Mr. BRIGGS of Auburn subsequently reported that the Committee had discharged its duty and the Governor-elect was pleased to say that he accepted the office to which he had been elected and would meet the Legislature at such time as it might indicate to take and subscribe the oaths of office necessary to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Dunbar, Secretary of that body, proposing a joint convention to be held in the hall of the House of Representatives this day forthwith, for the purpose of administering to the Honorable William T. Cobb, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties and asking the concurrence of the House.

On motion of Mr. SEWALL of Bath,

The House concurred and the Clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of administering to the Honorable William T. Cobb, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of his office.

The hour for administering the necessary oaths to the Honorable Governor-elect having arrived, the Senate came in and a convention was formed, Honorable Forrest Goodwin, President of the Senate, presiding.

IN CONVENTION.

On motion of Mr. STETSON of Penobscot,

Messrs. Stetson,

Simpson of York, Stearns of Millinocket, Hastings of Bethel, Hagerthy of Ellsworth, Sewall of Bath, Kimball of Rockland, were appointed a committee to wait upon the Honorable William T. Cobb, Governor-elect, to inform him that the two branches of the Legislature were in convention assembled in the Representatives' Hall and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties and to receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make.

Mr. STETSON subsequently reported that the Committee had delivered the message with which it was charged, and that the Governor-elect had been pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the convention.

Whereupon the Honorable William T. Cobb, Governor-elect, attended by the Executive Council and heads of departments, came in, and in presence of both branches of the Legislature in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, Honorable Forrest Goodwin, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Byron Boyd, Secretary of State, then made the following

PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the twelfth day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State for Governor, the returns of which have been made to the office of the Secretary of State, having been examined and counted by the Legislature, which was declared that a plurality thereof were given to William T. Cobb, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the Legislature in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of that office, I, therefore, declare and make known to all persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that William T. Cobb is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The Governor then communicated to the convention by address information upon the condition of the State, as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and the House of Representatives:

The law-makers chosen by the citizens of a Christian State, conscious of the responsibility and dignity of their office, can enter upon the discharge of their duties in no more fitting manner than by asking the help of God, that His blessings may descend and rest upon the State and Nation.

You are the legal representatives of the people of the State of Maine, and are assembled here to exercise the legislative authority entrusted to your care. There is no higher test and privilege of good citizenship than the making of wise laws, and the power to make such laws now rests with you. That you will use this power delegated to you with prudence and forethought is the confident expectation of your constituents, and I venture to express the belief that no better fortune can befall you than to merit at the close of your labors here their approbation and respect.

The constitution of Maine, in prescribing the powers and duties of the governor, declares that "he shall from time to time give the legislature information of the condition of the State, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he may judge expedient." Having received this office from the people, profoundly grateful for their confidence, and wishing to conform to the custom observed by my predecessors, it becomes my duty at this time and place to comply with this constitutional requirement.

While the framers of the constitution dug deep for the future, and laid foundations strong enough and broad enough to support with entire safety the fabric of self-government as we see and enjoy it to-day, yet it was not possible for them to provide for or foresee the numerous and complex affairs that in time should come to be the State's duties and the people's privileges. Nor does this detract from the magnitude and power of their achievment. It is all the more a tribute to their wisdom, for their work begun and finished among conditions of life and material development comparatively simple was done with such thoroughness and along such comprehensive lines that later generations have neither desired not attempted fundamental changes, but have followed the spirit if not always the letter of their plans.

A few years more and Maine will have been a State a century. At the State's birth, and for many years thereafter, it was no dif-

ficult task for a governor, upon assuming office, to have a full and personal knowledge of every department of the State's government and affairs. The conditions of that day made such knowledge possible. The population was small, business limited and wealth infrequent. The State was rich only in the character and vigor of her citizens and in her natural but undeveloped resources. Public revenue was scanty and public expenditures consequently restricted. Public institutions were few in number and narrow in scope, and the State could render but slight aid in forwarding the great work of philanthropy and education. Capital and energy had been applied only in small degree to the development of transportation facilities and to the extension of commerce, and the State had not yet been called upon to exercise its right of control in these great fields of business and industrial activity. While the State never needed nor ever possessed men of more rugged honesty, keener vision or more commanding ability than those in whom the executive power was vested during those years of beginnings, it must be conceded that the machinery of State was simple, capable of being easily understood and readily explained.

But we face an entirely different situation today. During the last forty years the whole country has made a marvelous advance in material prosperity and in the elevation of humanity, and in this march of progress Maine has been no laggard. Railroads have reached her fertile valleys, her forests and waterways, have stimulated and encouraged both agriculture and manufactures, and have brought their products to a ready and profitable market. Electric railroads have brought suburban and even rural communities into closer touch with her cities and larger towns, and have contributed to increased property values and more comfortable means of travel. Her magnificent water powers no longer flow unharnessed, but science and skill have so controlled and managed them that commercial centers grow to-day where but a few years ago was wilderness and solitude. The scenic beauty of her shores, lakes and mountains, together with an invigorating climate, have attracted a steadily increasing number of health and pleasure seekers to her territory, and have been no inconsiderable factors in promoting and enlarging business activity. Her farms have increased in value, and almost all of her industries are flourishing and prosperous. Commerce has

expanded, the currents of trade have quickened and grown stronger, banks and other financial institutions have multiplied with profit and with safety, capital and labor have thrived together, and the wage-earner has not lacked opportunity to work or incentive to save.

The people of Maine have always been humane, public-spirited and generous. They early looked with pitying eye upon the helpless and unfortunate, and as early inaugurated methods for their support and relief. They saw that education was the foundation-stone of all progress and civilization, and began the upbuilding of a common school system whose natural sequence was the normal school, the library and the university. They knew that society required protection against the depredations of the criminal and evil minded, and they built prisons and jails. But these were not torture chambers, and better still, the wayward youth of both sexes were placed under a restraint-wholesome and implying no disgrace—that should incline their lives toward industry and sobriety. They realized that an inflamed public opinion might at some time threaten law and order, and they established a militia service that should make not only for the peace of the community, but that should aid the national government when the country was called to arms. They sought to protect and husband the natural resources of the State; to preserve its fish and game, to make public the most intelligent and efficient methods of forestry, to collect statistics relating to the progress of industrial development and labor, to check epidemics and to suggest ways of safeguarding the public health, to encourage and foster the pursuit of agriculture and kindred subjects, and to prevent contagion among cattle.

With the increase of wealth and the profitable expansion of business came the agitation and discussion of new questions affecting the economic welfare of the State. A commercial development was taking place that required far more capital than could be furnished by individual resources, and one that to successfully accomplish its purpose must ask and receive certain privileges that only the State can give. Corporations multiplied, and special and practically exclusive rights were granted by the legislature. To encourage this development along lines of safety, to protect the investor and not infringe upon the rights of the citizen, to aid the corporation and at the same time guard the physical and financial interests of the public, and all the while to secure for the State in taxes a fair and equitable compensation all these were vexatious problems requiring for their satisfactory solution the utmost care and ability and the keenest sense of justice. Such corporations in particular as railroads, savings banks, trust and insurance companies deal with the public generally, and in order that their proper relation to the State might be defined and fully understood, a comprehensive system of laws was adopted that should specify accurately the terms and conditions upon which they might enjoy certain rights and privileges.

While the State gradually assumed and exercised the functions here enumerated and many more, and did this in conformity to law, yet the passage of laws alone could not insure the transaction of this public business in a prompt and satisfactory manner. Executives and responsible heads were necessary, and so, contemporaneous in many instances with the laws themselves, and receiving authority under them, there came into existence the various official boards and commissions, whose duties, clearly defined and mandatory, consisted in managing these subordinate departments of the State's business and concerns. Inasmuch as every citizen has the right to know the business of the State, and it is assumed that he desires such knowledge, one of the most important essentials in conducting the affairs of these several departments is the element of publicity. It is the duty, therefore, of each official or official body charged with administration to make and submit to a higher legislative or executive authority, at stated and frequent periods, a full and complete report of all the business transacted during the interval of such periods. And with this there has grown, properly enough, the custom of embodying in these reports such recommendations bearing upon the future conduct and management of the business as in the judgment of those familiar with it may appear to be for the best interests of the State and for all concerned.

I believe that the officials to whom reference is here made have administered the affairs of their several departments with wisdom, economy and honesty, and that they possess a due sense of their responsibility to you and the public they serve.

Without pretending to have acquired a full and comprehensive knowledge of the State's many and diverse interests, I have examined and studied the reports in question, and with the heads of nearly all the departments have discussed in conference or correspondence the purposes and leading features of their work. As a rule they have displayed great care and conservatism in following the law, and tact and discretion in those instances where the law permitted the use of their own judgment.

The public acts of an official are properly subject to the most rigid scrutiny, and the official himself cannot hope or expect to escape criticism. My power as an executive will be used to aid and protect every official in his efforts to promote the interests of the State along the lines of his plain duty, and will be used as freely and firmly to check unwarrantable assumption or abuse of authority.

These reports are now before you or are at your command. Their contents supply information of value to every citizen. They not only disclose the logical and practical results of past legislation, but they furnish figures and facts showing substantially all that is being accomplished in the sphere of the State's endeavor. While, for reasons already indicated, I do not purpose at this time to present their details or even summaries for your consideration, I earnestly urge you to read and study them, that you may gain the knowledge to act intelligently upon their conclusions, suggestions and recommendations.

I do not mean to advocate the appropriation of any money in excess of the amounts absolutely necessary for the reasonable maintenance and operation of the institutions now supported or aided by the State. The State has been generous always in its concern for them, and there is no likelihood of a different course being pursued now. Every sentiment of humanity, justice and well-being demands that those institutions be furnished with reans sufficient to enable them to fulfil their legitimate purposes in a creditable and progressive manner. Due consideration also should be given to the constantly enlarging field of the State's charities, aids, and general public expenditures, and to the natural and proper desire of her citizens that work of this character should be commensurate to the public means.

Nor do I advocate at this time the appropriation of money for new institutions. It is a fact that many public-spirited men and women are considering the advisability of asking the State to provide institutions for the shelter, treatment, support and education of certain unfortunate ones, who, if afforded the opportunity to live even for a time under different conditions and surrounded by different influences, might be restored to health or might become useful members of society. There is much to be said in favor of these propositions, for they appeal alike to our sympathies and to our ideals of civic duty. But the time may not be altogether propitious for the inauguration and development of these plans. Their consummation must depend upon the ability of the State to provide the necessary financial support, and I am not prepared to say that the exigency is so urgent that the State should immediately respond.

While, therefore, it is to be assumed that you will examine the reports of the departments and institutions, and consistently provide for their needs and efficiency, yet so far as any unusual expenditure is concerned, either for those now in existence or for those in contemplation. I have preferred to refrain from making specific recommendations, but urge instead that this whole question be left for your consideration, and that your decision be made after you have heard each case discussed upon its merits, in accordance with the usual routine of legislation. There is no end to the demands made upon the State treasury, but there is an end to the ability of the treasury to meet those demands without imposing excessive burdens upon the tax-pavers. I am fully aware that in many cases involving public expenditure the State cannot afford to be unduly economical. There are too many pressing needs for that, and such a course would be too narrow and contrary to the spirit of progress and humanity. But there is a middle ground of true economy, not readily found nor easy to stand upon, but one which after all should be the goal and abiding place of financial legislation. I believe that the people of the State will not tolerate a lavish expenditure of public funds. and believe as fully that even our present splendid financial showing furnishes no sound reason to justify an expenditure of such character.

If appropriations are excessive new sources of revenue must be found or a debt incurred. If the energies of a legislature or of tax assessors are to be directed constantly toward seeking new sources of revenue for the purpose of keeping pace with extravagant appropriations, a grave injustice may be done to property owners. The equalization of values for taxation is second in importance only to the revenue itself, and under the circum-

stances just named, the tendency will be to lose sight of the principle of equalization and to increase the taxes upon classes of property peculiarly open to attack. It is true that the present State tax of two and three-quarters mills is neither large nor burdensome. But it is equally true that if it can be reduced consistently such reduction should be effected. One argument against a reduction of the State tax seems to be that at some future time it might be necessary to restore the old rate or even increase it, and that the attempt to do this would prove to be embarrassing to a political party or to an administration. But this is more an excuse than a reason. It is to be assumed that if a reduction is made, it is because it is right and necessary to make it, and the same as to an increase. In either case the legislature would give the matter most careful consideration, and the people of the State would surely have full knowledge of the facts and motives governing legislative action, and would render their judgment accordingly. The question of changing the tax rate is purely a business one, dependent for its solution upon existing conditions, and if we are agreed upon this proposition it is simply a truism to say that the authority to effect the change is in your hands and yours alone. I am of the opinion that the revenues of the State have grown to that point where if prudence is observed, and yet not parsimony, you can safely reduce the present tax rate and at the same time cause no unjust or unreasonable lessening of public efficiency. I believe, too, that such action on your part would meet with the prompt, cordial and very general approbation of the people of the State.

I recommend, therefore, that the State tax be reduced from two and three-quarters mills to two and one-quarter mills. The following figures are furnished by the treasurer of the State. They are presented in this brief and concise form to show the essential features of the financial condition of the State,—a most gratifying result of the financial policy pursued by the last administration,—and to indicate as well, the economic reasons upon which is based the recommendation for a reduced tax rate.

Cash balance on hand January 1, 1905, \$244,839.91; bonded debt, January 1, 1905, \$1,403,000.00; and in this place it should be stated that during the last two years, the bonded indebtedness has been reduced \$580,000.00. While since 1889 and prior to 1902, \$50,000 of the State bonds have matured each year, yet,

under the provisions of act of 1903, authority was given to the treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Governor and Council, to purchase additional bonds, if such a course was deemed advisable, and all bond purchases during the past two years in excess of the \$70,000 maturing annually for the past three years have been made under this act.

The last State valuation upon which the tax rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ mills was assessed was 352,228,897.00, and yielded for two years a revenue of 1,940,951.54. The present or new State valuation is 366,514,014.00, showing a gain in valuation of 14,285,117.00.

A tax rate of 2¼ mills on this new valuation will yield for two years a revenue of \$1,653,091.36.

The total receipts for the years 1903 and 1904, including \$228,-186.94, the amount received from the United States government, were \$4,858,359.30.

The total expenditures for the years 1903 and 1904 were \$5,052,412.07.

The estimated regular receipts for 1905 are \$2,249,707.00; the estimated regular receipts for 1906 are \$2,116,000.00.

The estimated regular expenditures for 1905 are \$1,997,-000.00; the estimated regular expenditures for 1906 are \$1,907,000.00.

Among the convictions held by our people which seem to be in entire accord with the theory and principles of self-government is the belief that every citizen is entitled to know the exact amount of the compensation received by State and county officials for the services they are called upon to perform, and that this knowledge should be obtained from open records. The law provides in many instances that those officials shall charge and collect fees in return for public acts and services rendered by them, and that all or part of the fees so collected shall be retained by them as a payment for such services. This plan of compensation may have had some merit in the past, and there may be some cases where its continued use is justified now, but upon the whole it seems to be contrary to the spirit of our institutions and to the wishes of our people. The reasons for this are obvious. The official is a public servant, with no authority other than that derived directly or indirectly from the people, and all money coming into his possession by the exercise of such authority is in a sense public funds and properly subject to an

accounting. His exact and regular compensation can never be determined if it depends upon the receipt of fees, and it often happens that he receives for his services annually a much larger sum than was contemplated when his office was created, and one far in excess of a proportionate or even liberal remuneration. It is not unlikely, too, that an unusual or unexpected diminution of fees might seriously and unfairly impair the income of an official who relied upon them to afford a reasonable salary. This question engaged the attention of the last legislature, and the two leading political parties in the State have publicly and formally declared themselves in opposition to the present method of paying certain State and county officials. I therefore recommen that the fee system, so-called, be abolished, and that in its place you establish by legislation a system providing for the payment of a fixed and adequate salary to all those persons who have been placed in office by the people or by the legislature, and who, in a public capacity, serve the State or counties.

In referring to the recent death of Ezra Curtis Stevens, late superintendent of public buildings, I am very sure that the many among you who knew him will recognize the propriety of using this occasion for the purpose of paying a brief but sincere tribute to his memory. Mr. Stevens was a most efficient State official. His term of service was long and in different capacities, but it was in the care and improvement of this building and these halls that he particularly exhibited his abilities as a competent, energetic and conscientious public servant. All who met him will recall his fine qualities of heart and mind, his gentleness and unfailing courtesy, and we whom a kind fortune made his friends will hold him always in grateful recollection.

It has not seemed to me necessary or expedient in this paper and at this time to present for your consideration "information of the condition of the State," except in most general terms. The reports submitted by the various departments, boards and commissions contain the complete and precise details of their operations and scope, and will undoubtedly receive your careful attention and thought. I have preferred instead to discuss somewhat in detail the questions of reducing the State tax and abolishing the fee system, and to make definite recommendations for their treatment at your hands. There are other matters of moment and importance that will appeal to your solicitude and judgment for decision. When these become the subjects of legislative inquiry and action, and both necessity and propriety seem to require an expression of my views, I shall venture to declare them in accordance with the privilege granted by the constitution to the Governor of the State.

But I do not mean to close this address without speaking of a public question that lies very close to the heart and conscience of thousands of the men and women of this State, and one that should, and I believe does, appeal to every law-abiding citizen for a prompt and righteous settlement.

I refer to the existing prohibitory law, so-called, and to the condition of its practical non-enforcement in many of our cities and towns. I cannot hope to bring to its discussion new ideas, nor by the aid of unfamiliar arguments to throw new light upon the cause I believe it my duty to sustain, but I can and do avail myself of this opportunity to ask you to look at the fundamental truths and facts of this question, stripped of the covering that prejudice, partisanship and selfishness have inevitably and continuously laid upon them, and to decide as citizens and legislators where your duties lie in the treatment of the greatest issue that ever confronted the people of this State. This is an appeal not for legislation, but for the exercise of good citizenship; not for party advantage, but for public welfare.

Here is a law that was placed upon the statute books in obedience to the voters' commands. Its main object and purpose was to improve the condition of society by limiting the opportunities to gratify an appetite whose possession may be one of the frailties of human nature. Its most earnest advocates never believed that it would entirely eradicate the evils against which it was directed, but once a law, they had the right—and they have it still—to expect that its enforcement would be attempted by sworn officials with the same energy, persistency and honesty that generally characterize the action of such officials in enforcing other laws. Has this always been done? Every intelligent citizen knows that it has not, and that in this statement is contained the reasons for past and present difficulties and the suggestion for a remedy.

A wholesome respect for law is the natural heritage of the people of Maine. A very large majority of those who favor the maintenance and enforcement of the prohibitory law do so

because they believe that in that law is provided the best method of repressing and correcting an undoubted evil. They are not wedded to it as such, alone, but advocate it simply because in their judgment it is the best available means to accomplish a certain and necessary end. They form the element in our bodypolitic that placed the law on the statute books and kept it there. These people are not fanatics. They are law-abiding, reasonable and sincere, and would be the last to claim infallibility and the first to respond to a sound suggestion for civic progress. But above all they respect law and realize that in its general and ready observance lies the hope and promise of good government. Their position briefly stated is this: They believe first that the prohibitory law furnishes a practical method of lessening the sale and consequent use of intoxicating liquors, and second that inasmuch as that law is on our statute books it should be enforced with vigor, determination and uniformity. The moral strength of their position lies in the fact that they are contending not for the adoption of a law, but for the enforcement of one already in existence. As to the first declaration, there is an honest difference of opinion among our people; as to the second, there ought to be absolute unanimity.

The estimate in which the prohibitory law is held in certain parts of the State, and by many of our citizens, is working an incalculable injury to the forces that make for law and order. A disrespect and disregard for all law is being nurtured that if allowed to grow unchecked and unassailed will weaken and destroy the very foundations of good government.

In reply to these assertions it may be urged that all these conditions would be improved if the law could be repealed or even resubmitted to the people. But such an answer is based wholly upon conjecture, and there are sound political reasons against such a course. The question has come to be the most important one in the politics of the State, and the dominant party is committed to the maintenance and enforcement of this law. If party professions are entitled to confidence, and if the votes of a very considerable majority of our citizens—registered as I believe in large part upon this particular proposition—furnish any indication of their wishes, by what code of political ethics can the representatives of that party justify themselves in favoring now any policy other than that of maintaining and enforcing this law? If the people of Maine ever abandon or materially change the prohibitory law, it will be done only after they have seen it enforced honestly and uniformly, in the same reasonable and persistent manner that other laws are enforced, and after they have become convinced that such enforcement has actually failed to accomplish the desired end. Enforcement may cause the law to be changed, but non-enforcement never.

This question has reached that stage of discussion and treatment where differences of opinion as to the wisdom of the law itself should be allowed to embarrass the situation no longer. This law must be enforced in order that all law may be vindicated, and to the performance of this duty every man, irrespective of party but united in the interests of good citizenship, may well direct his energy and influence. The task is not an easy one, and the practical difficulties that stand in the way of its accomplishment should be neither ignored nor underestimated; but an aroused and determined public sentiment standing for order and respect of law can force officials to do their duty, or failing in this, can fill their places with those who will.

In conclusion, gentlemen, permit me to express the hope that your services here will be satisfactory to yourselves and beneficial to the State, and to assure you of my earnest desire to co-operate with you to that end.

At the conclusion of the address the Governor and suite retired and the convention was dissolved. The purposes of the convention having been accomplished, the Senate retired and the House was called to order by the Speaker.

Paper from the Senate.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Dunbar, its Secretary, proposing a joint convention to be held this day forthwith in the Representatives' Hall for the purpose of electing a Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Assessor, State Printer, State Binder, Commissioner of Agriculture and seven Executive Councilors, and asking the concurrence of the House.

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On motion of Mr. KIMBALL of Rockland, the Clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition of the Senate for a joint convention to be held forthwith in the Representatives' Hall, for the purpose of electing a Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Assessor, State Printer, State Binder, Commissioner of Agriculture and seven Executive Councilors.

The hour for the joint convention for the election of a Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Assessor, State Printer, State Binder, Commissioner of Agriculture and seven Executive Councilors having arrived, the Senate came in and a convention was formed.

The purpose of the convention having been accomplished, the - convention was dissolved and the Senate retired.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Mr. REED of Portland addressed the House on a question of personal privilege, as follows:

Mr. Speaker, I arise to a question of personal privilege. On Tuesday last, at a hearing before your Committee on Legal Affairs, a witness was examined by me and by others on that committee in reference to what he knew in regard to the matter being then and there considered. The Portland Evening Express in its issue of February 15th has seen fit to comment on my behavior on that occasion in the following words:

"Portland Republicans who, with considerable enthusiasm and much unanimity, chose Joseph B. Reed to be one of their representatives to the Legislature, are amazed to find that gentleman acting in his official capacity as a member of the committee before whom a hearing is in progress, and as the special representative and counsel for the Democratic sheriff of Cumberland county, at that hearing." This, Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House, is practically a direct reflection upon me, and in effect a direct accusation that I have violated the rules of this House and that I have been guilty of conduct thoroughly reprehensible. This would be so if it were true. I brand the statement of the Express as an absolute falsehood. It is true in no way. I am not the attorney of the Democratic sheriff of Cumberland county, and never was. At that hearing I neither represented him nor anybody for him nor at the request of anybody for him for any purpose whatever. But I did, at that hearing, cross-examine one of the witnesses who appeared, for the purpose of bringing out, as I had a right to do, matters that I believed pertained to the question then at issue, for the enlightenment of the members of the committee.

If this charge were against me alone it would be unseemly and unbecoming in me to reply here to a newspaper; I never can get another chance; they have all the chance left in the worldit would be foolish. I recognize that. But the matter to which this insinuation alludes now lies upon the table of your Committee on Legal Affairs pending the report to this House; and I claim that this charge against me, one of the members of your Legal Affairs Committee, is a direct attempt on the part of a newspaper in this State to intimidate a representative of the people in the discharge of his official duty. It is on that ground that I arise here and claim your indulgence and your privilege. I brand this statement as false, and I demand here before you. the representatives of the people, that the Portland Evening Express retract this false and scandalous statement, and that they do it in as public a manner as that in which they have already stated it.

Just a word more, gentlemen. In the future, as I have endeavored to do in the past, while I remain a member of this House, without fear and without favor, unintimidated, and in the fear of God and in the fear of God only, I will ask of any witness who appears before any committee upon which I serve, any question that I honestly believe is pertinent to the occasion and that is for the purpose of honestly bringing before the committee on which I serve information in regard to the matter which they are to determine. Gentlemen of this House, I believe that you are in accord with me in this matter, and I believe that you will support me unanimously in the position I assume. (Applause.)

Mr. OAKES of Auburn: Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House, it seems fitting that as a member of the Legal Affairs Committee and as the chairman of the committee on the part of the House, that I should say a word in this connection. I believe that I should voice the sentiment of every member of our committee, and I think of every member of this House, in saving that we believe that no constituency is represented by any more faithful or conscientious member in this body than is the constituency of the city of Portland as represented by the gentleman who has just spoken. I believe that it is of the utmost importance, especially I will say with reference to the matter under discussion, relating as it does to one of the phases of the great question of enforcement which is before this Legislature, and which we are all anxious should be decided in a way which will be for the best interests of our State-I believe it is of great importance that both sides of every question before our committee, or any other committee, should be fully considered. I believe that the action of the gentleman from Portland before our committee was in accord with the highest interests of the committee and this House and of the city of Portland and of the State of Maine; and I think I voice the sentiment of our committee although I speak without consultation with them. I think that this should be corrected. I think that no such statement as this, attacking the position, attacking the honesty of the member from Portland, should be allowed to pass unquestioned; and I present at this time a resolution and ask that it be passed by this House:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this House that the charge against Representative Reed in the editorial columns of the Portland Evening Express of February 15, is entirely unjust and should be retracted.

Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of the resolution.

Mr. HOLMES of Caribou: Mr. Speaker, as a member of the Legal Affairs Committee I wish to heartily endorse everything that the gentleman from Auburn (Mr. Oakes) has said, and to second the motion; and I move you further that this resolve be passed by rising vote. The question being on the adoption of the resolution, a rising vote was taken.

Petition of P. E. Dupoint, rector of St. Joseph's church of Biddeford, for same;

Were referred in concurrence to the Committee on Temperance.

Report of the Committee on the Judiciary, reporting "ought not to pass" on bill "An Act to repeal sections 14 to 26, both inclusive, of chapter 29 of the Revised Statutes, relating to appointment of State liquor commissioner." The vote whereby the bill was passed to be engrossed in the House was reconsidered, Senate amendment "A" adopted in concurrence, and the bill was then passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate amendment "A" in concurrence.

Bill "An Act relating to the prevention, control and extinguishment of forest fires in plantations and unorganized townships." House Document No. 217,

Which was passed to be engrossed in the House, February 27, and sent to the Senate.

Came from the Senate, passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate amendment "A."

The vote whereby the bill passed to be engrossed in the House, was reconsidered, Senate amendment "A" adopted in concurrence and the bill then passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate amendment "A" in concurrence. The following communication was received and read by the Speaker:

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Seventy-Second Legislature:

The undersigned Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court have the honor to hereby submit their answer to the questions propounded by the House of Representatives, by an order passed on the twenty-seventh of January, 1905.

Before considering the question as to whether or not any of the provisions of the pending bill are in conflict with the amendment to the constitution establishing a debt limit for municipalities, it is sufficient to say generally, that in our opinion, the bill, if enacted, would not be in violation of any other provision of the State constitution. We have no doubt that it is within the power of the legislature, if the cities of Portland and South Portland have unreasonably neglected to perform their duty of maintaining the bridge referred to, a part of the public highway between these two cities, so as to comply with all regulations of law, both federal and State, to do so itself through any agency that the legislature sees fit to adopt, and consequently that it may establish the commission provided for in this bill, and may direct that commission to proceed forthwith to remove the present structure and to replace it with a new one, so constructed as to accommodate navigation at that point. More than this, we do not doubt that the legislature may impose the burden upon the cities named, in such proportion as may be fixed by the legislature, or as may hereafter be determined by appraisers appointed for that purpose, of assuming and paying the cost of the work contemplated by the bill, so that, as we have already said, we do not perceive that the proposed legislation is in violation of any other provision of our constitution.

. We come now to the important question, to which we have given much consideration, as to whether the fifth section of the pending bill contains any provisions which are in conflict with Article XXII of the Amendments to the Constitution. That amendment is as follows: "No city or town shall hereafter create any debt or liability, which singly, or in the aggregate with previous debts or liabilities, shall exceed five per centum of the last regular valuation of said city or town; provided, however, that the adoption of this article shall not be construed as applying to any fund received in trust by said city or town, nor to any loan for the purpose of renewing existing loans or for war, or to temporary loans to be paid out of money raised by taxation, during the year in which they are made." It is obvious that none of the exceptions in the amendment are applicable to the questions here involved, so that they may be dismissed from further consideration.

The bill provides that the cost of removing the present bridge and of replacing it with a new one, not exceeding the sum of four hundred thousand dollars, shall be met by the issue of bonds by the commission to that amount, the maturity of which may be extended by the commission, in its discretion, to any time not exceeding forty years. The payment of these bonds, as well as of the coupons attached for the semi-annual interest, is imposed upon the two cities, in the proportions to be determined later in the manner provided by the bill. The proportional part thereof to be assumed by the city of Portland, "shall constitute a legal obligation of the city of Portland and shall be met by taxation upon the property and polls within said city." It is assumed in the question submitted to us that the municipal indebtedness of the city of Portland is already in excess of five per centum of "its total valuation," by which is undoubtedly meant, to use the language of the amendment, "the last regular valuation of said city."

Clearly the city itself, under these circumstances, could not create any additional indebtedness, except for some of the purposes named in the proviso. More than that, the legislature could not authorize the city to create or increase its indebtedness. What the constitution has prohibited as to a municipality cannot be authorized by the legislature, since one of the very purposes of the adoption of a constitution is to limit the power of the legislature as well as that of other departments of government. But, it is said, that this constitutional provision is not applicable because it is not proposed that this indebtedness should be created by the city, even with the authority of the legislature, that this proposed indebtedness is to be created by the legislature and imposed upon a municipality without its consent, and that therefore it does not come within the inhibition of the constitutional amendment.

It is undoubtedly true that the proposition is not within the literal meaning of the words of the amendment. The debt is not to be created by the city. It is to be created and imposed upon the city by the legislature, acting through the commission established for the purpose of replacing the bridge and of providing the means of payment therefor. But is it not within the spirit and meaning of the constitution? And if within the spirit, although not within the letter, it is equally within the meaning. Is not the proposition one of the very mischiefs that was sought to be avoided and prevented by the framers of the amendment, and by the people in its adoption? We think that it is. Constitutional limitations imposed for the protection of the people, or a minority of them, against certain acts of government are not to be regarded as penal but as remedial and are to be so construed as to afford the protection contemplated.

The object of this amendment was to prevent municipalities from incurring large indebtedness, even if the majority of the citizens, or their representatives in the city government favored such indebtedness, and even if the legislature authorized it. It was to protect the minority against the extravagance and improvidence of the majority. It was to require municipalities to pay for improvements as the improvements were made, except to the extent of the limit of indebtedness allowed. It should not be easily evaded, but should, we think, be upheld according to its true spirit and the intent of its framers and of the people in its adoption.

It must be admitted that an act of the legislature which authorized a city to increase its indebtedness beyond the constitutional limit would be void, can it be otherwise, when instead of authorizing the creation of a liability, the legislature compels an

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increase of indebtedness beyond the prescribed limit. In other words, if this bill had provided that the cost of the contemplated work of removal and reconstruction should be paid in certain proportions by the two cities, and that the city of Portland might issue bonds to provide for the payment of its proportional part thereof, it would be clearly unconstitutional. Can the result be different because of the fact that the bill contains the word "shall" instead of "may." A provision of the constitution which could be so easily avoided would be of but little value.

If the legislature cannot authorize a municipality to incur indebtedness with the latter's consent, we do not think that it can compel it to become indebted, beyond the prescribed limit without or against its consent, even for the purpose of meeting the cost of public improvements, the duty of making which is imposed by the legislature upon the municipality. And here, in our opinion, is the line of demarkation between what the legislature may and may not do in this respect. It may impose the duty and burden upon a municipality, but the municipality, in the performance of that duty, must keep within the limitations of the constitution.

For these reasons, although we appreciate the force of the arguments contained in the answer of some of our associates, wherein they have arrived at a contrary conclusion, and have very carefully considered them, which accounts for the delay in submitting this answer, we are constrained to reply to the first question submitted that, in our opinion, the pending bill, entitled "An Act relating to the rebuilding of Vaughan's bridge," if the same should become enacted, would be in violation of Article XXII of the Amendments to the Constitution of this State. We have already given our answer to the other question submitted.

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Seventy-Second Legislature:

The following is our answer to the questions proposed by your Honorable Body by an order entitled House Document No. 17, respecting the constitutionality of the bill entitled, "An Act relating to the rebuilding of Vaughan's bridge."

For the purpose of answering the question proposed, we assume that Vaughan's bridge directly connecting the cities of Portland and South Portland, is a legal highway which the two cities are obliged by law to maintain and keep in repair. The proper maintenance of the bridge legally located involves the performance of a public duty which the State, through the legislative department, by virtue of its plenary powers over the discharge of public municipal duties, can enforce.

Revised Statutes, chapter 23, sections 56, 57, 58 and 59, specially provide for the maintenance and repair of highways and also the remedy for unreasonable neglect on the part of municipalities to keep them in repair. Section 59 is the one which prescribes the remedy in case of such neglect and reads as follows:

"If the town neglects to make the repairs prescribed by the commissioners, within the time fixed therefor in such notice to the town, they may cause it to be done by an agent, not one of Such agent shall cause the repairs to be made themselves. forthwith, and shall render to the commissioners his account of disbursements and services in making the same. His account shall not be allowed without such notice to the town, as the commissioners deem reasonable. When the account is allowed, the town becomes liable therefor, with the agent's expenses in procuring the allowance of his account, and interest after such allowance and said commissioners shall render judgment against the town in favor of the agent. If a town neglects to pay said judgment for thirty days after demand, a warrant of distress shall be issued by the commissioners to collect for the same." But this section is only declaratory of the sovereign power upon this subject, when not in conflict with any constitutional provision. With regard to legislative authority, our constitution, article 4, section 1, confers upon the legislature, "full power to make and establish all reasonable laws and regulations for the defence and benefit of the people of this State, not repugnant to this constitution, nor to that of the United States." But it may be said that this broad construction of legislative powers, confers upon the State, authority to compel municipalities to perform many other duties which, upon their unreasonable neglect, it can cause to be performed at their expense, and therefore invests the legislature with the power to impose upon municipalities, financial obligations for a variety of public utilities, for which the towns themselves could not provide. This may, in a measure, be true, but a sharp line of demarkation must be drawn with respect to the municipal duties, the performance of which, the State can and cannot compel.

This line of cleavage is found in the distinction, with respect to the public duties which the municipality is obliged to perform, as a legal obligation, and those duties which it may perform, when permitted by law, of a local nature. Of the former character, are the obligations resting upon municipalities to maintain highways, which of course include bridges; furnish school facilities, and provide a proper system of drainage. Of the latter character, are such public utilities, of great local value, as water works, electric lighting plants, city halls and public parks, all of which are convenient acquisitions, but not obligatory. While there may be other utilities belonging to each of the above classes, we have alluded to those enumerated simply by way of illustration.

It is evident that some power must exist to compel the performance of these public obligatory duties, else the very object of government would cease. An insignificant town could, by neglect or refusal to perform its legal duty, prohibit the use of a great public thoroughfare; or curtail the invaluable opportunities of educating the children; or subject the public health to danger and infection. Therefore, regardless of article XXII, of the amended constitution, it is almost too evident to require citation, that the inherent power resides in the State to compel the maintenance and repair of legally located highwavs and bridges. And it has given specific expression to this power, the constitutionality of which has never been questioned, in the summary method prescribed for executing it in section 59, chapter 23, Revised Statutes, above cited. As a corollary of the above proposition, it follows that the legislature can provide any method it may see fit to adopt, for the purpose of carrying into

effect its mandate, whenever on account of neglect or refusal of a municipality, it enjoins the performance of any public duty. Hence no objection can arise to the constitutionality of section I of the act in question.

In support of the above propositions, if any question is raised, we cite the following authorities. Respecting the general nature of municipal corporations, Judge Cooley says, "They are created for convenience, expediency and economy in government, and, in their public capacity, are and must be at all times subject to the control of the State which has imparted to them life, and may at any time deprive them of it. . . . They have their public or political character, in which they exercise a part of the sovereign power of the State for governmental purposes. and they have their private character, in which, for the benefit or convenience of their own citizens, they exercise powers not of a governmental nature, and in which the State at large has only an incidental concern, as it may have with the action of private corporations. .It may not be possible to draw the exact line between the two, but provisions for local conveniences for the citizens, like water, light, public grounds for recreation and the like, are manifestly matters which are not provided for by municipal corporations in their political or governmental capacity, but in that guasi private capacity in which they act for the benefit of their corporators exclusively. In their public, political capacity, they have no discretion but to act as the State which has created them shall, within constitutional limits, command, and the good government of the State requires that the power should at all times be ample to compel obedience, and that it should be capable of being promptly and efficiently exercised."

In I Dillon on Municipal Corporations, section 74, the author says, "Thus if there is no special limitation in the constitution, and the debt or liability is one to be incurred in the discharge of a public or State duty, which it is proper for the legislature to impose upon the municipality, it can constitute no objection to the validity of the act that the debt or liability is to be created without its consent. Accordingly, in the absence of constitutional restriction, it has been decided, and the decision is doubtless correct, that it is competent for the legislature to direct a municipal corporation to build a bridge over a navigable watercourse within its limits, or the State may appoint agents of its own to build it, and empower them to create a loan to pay for the structure payable by the corporation. Thus also, since municipal corporations are instruments of government, created for political purposes, and subject to legislative control, and since it is one of the ordinary duties of such corporations, under legislative authority, to make and keep in repair the streets and highways and bridges connected therewith, the Court of Appeals in Maryland sustained an act mandatory in its terms, which not only empowered but required the city of Baltimore in its corporate capacity to take charge of and maintain as a public highway a specified bridge within that city, and enforced the duty created by the act of mandamus."

In city of Philadelphia v. Field, 58 Pennsylvania street, 320, it was held, that the legislature could appoint commissioners to build a free bridge over the Schuvlkill river, to create a loan for that purpose and require the council of Philadelphia to provide for the payment of the loan. In the opinion, the court say, "The whole law making power of the State is committed to the legislature with certain restrictions and limitations imposed on that body by the constitution. In the exercise of this power, the legislature have dug canals, built bridges and railroads, and paid for them by money raised by loans and taxation. This power is indisputable, and upon its constitutionality depends our The legislature could undoubtedly build large State debt. this bridge over a navigable river at South street, and pay for it by moneys proceeding from loans or taxes, and in doing it they might employ commissioners to erect it. This must be conceded, and it is but one step further, to impose the cost of erection on the city and county."

In People v. Flagg, 46 New York 401, it was held that, the legislature has power to direct the construction of the highway in any town, to compel the creation of a town debt by the issue of its bonds, and to impose a tax upon the property of the town to pay the bonds, without the consent of the citizens or town authorities. The court sav:

"The making and improvement of public highways; and the imposition and collection of taxes, are among the ordinary subjects of legislation. The towns of the State possess such powers as the legislature confers upon them. They are a part of the machinery of the State government, and perform important municipal functions, which are regulated and controlled by the legislature. Private property cannot be taken for public use without compensation. But this principal does not interfere with the right of taxation for proper purposes. The legislature, in substance, directed certain highways to be made and constructed in the town of Yonkers, and imposed a tax upon the town to pay the expenses of the work, but to prevent too large a tax at one time, it directed bonds to be given, payable at different periods, so that no more than a limited sum should become due at one time.

The bonds to be given are town bonds; they are to be issued by town officers, and the tax to pay them is imposed upon the property of the town. If the legislature may authorize the town to incur this debt, why may it not direct it to be done? As a question of power, I am unable to find any restriction in the constitution. It is not within the judicial province to correct all legislative abuses."

In discussing the general grant of power under part 2, chapter 1, article 4, of the Massachusetts constitution, the purport of which is precisely like ours relating to legislative power, the court in Hingham & Quincy Bridge Corporation v. County of Norfolk, 6 Allen, page 358, say, "The statute was not designed as an exercise of the right of eminent domain, nor intended to prescribe a mode of determining controverted and conflicting rights between different counties and towns. It was framed under that clause in the constitution, part 2, chapter 1, article 4, which confers on the legislature full power and authority to enact all manner of wholesome and reasonable laws "as they shall judge to be for the good and welfare of this commonwealth, and for the government and ordering thereof, and of the subjects of the same." One of the main purposes of this general grant of power was to vest in the legislature a superintending and controlling authority, under and by virtue of which they might enact all laws not repugnant to the constitution, of a police and municipal nature, and necessary to the due regulation of the internal affairs of the commonwealth. It is obvious that the exercise of such a power is absolutely indispensable in a wisely governed and careful distribution of certain public burdens or duties. Of these a leading one is the construction, support and maintenance of roads and bridges. From the earliest history of this commonwealth, the legislature have always made ample provision to secure these objects.

Section 4 of the act provides for an apportionment of the expenses necessary for the erection of the proposed bridge, and appoints a tribunal for the determination of such apportionment. We apprehend that the authority of the legislature to apportion the expenses of such work, upon such taxing districts as will, in its judgment, most fairly and equitably distribute the proportions, will not be questioned; and when the proportion that each of the divisions or districts should bear is not clearly apparent to the legislature, it is entirely proper for it to provide for the selection of a tribunal to determine the equitable proportion of the whole expense each district should bear. Authorities upon these points are numerous and so far as we have been able to examine, uniform. Cooley on taxation, 2d edition, pages 149, 239, 682, 688, Dillon on Municipal Corporation, 4th edition, volume 11, section 737. Waterville v. County Commissioners, 59 Maine 80. Hingham 7 Quincy Bridge, etc., v. County of Norfolk et als., 6 Allen 353. Salem Turnpike & Salem Bridge Co. v. County of Essex, 100 Mass. 282. Commonwealth v. Newburyport. 103 Mass. 120. Freeland v. Hastings et als., 10 Allen 580. Jensen v. Board of Supervisors of Polk County, 47 Wis. Board of Park Commissioners v. Common Council of 313. Detroit, 28 Mich. 235. Gordon v. Cowes et al., 47 New York Supervisors of Will County v. People, 110, 111, 511. 608.

If the above conclusions are sound, then it must be granted that the State is invested with the authority to impose *in invitum* upon the two cities named in the act, the burden necessarily entailed in the erection of the proposed bridge, and with the power to compel the municipalities thus affected, to provide for the payment of the burden thus imposed. If any authority were needed upon this point, I refer to those above cited. Now if the last proposition is correct, then it is clear that the State through its legislative power has the authority, in case towns are derelict in their duty, to cause a bridge to be erected for such towns, create a debt or liability against them therefor, and to compel them to pay such debt or liability.

If we apply these principles to the case at bar, three propositions are clearly deducible. 1st. If the cities of Portland and South Portland have unreasonably neglected to establish and maintain Vaughan's bridge, the legislature has the undoubted power to appoint an agent, in behalf of the State to rebuild or repair the bridge, as the case may require. 2d. The legislature has ample authority in the exercise of its plenary powers, to create a valid debt against the municipalities for the liability incurred by the agent of the State in the performance of the duty imposed. 3d. The legislature can summarily compel the payment of such debt by the cities.

Now if the act before us, whose constitutionality is questioned, stopped right here, and did not provide for any method of payment of the debt created, it is then evident that it would fall in exact line with our general statute, which provides for the right of individuals to recover damages against towns, for injuries received through neglect in the maintenance and repair of the highways.

Under this statute, the legislature makes a town liable for its neglect for a judgment not exceeding \$2,000, without prescribing any method by which the town shall pay it. We have never heard the power of the State to impose this liability upon a town, questioned. This statute has been upon our books for years and has been construed a great many times, but no one has yet ever appeared with the ingenuity to question its constitutionality. We have alluded to this statute to show that the State has been doing for years just what the act in question proposes, so far as it relates to the creation of a debt or liability, and that, as far as such debt or liability is concerned, aricle XXII of the amended constitution is not in the least involved. It does not prevent the imposition of a debt and does not purport to.

For the purpose of applying the amendment to the exact situation before us, we will assume that the act in question, instead of an issue of bonds, provides for the assessment of a municipal tax to pay the debt in question as fast as it accrues; then it will not be contended that the constitutional amendment could be invoked to prevent it. Granted that the legislature can create a debt against these two cities for the erection of Vaughan's bridge as proposed in the act, then, under the above assumption, we come directly to the bight of the case: Can the legislature, after it has caused the debt to be created, provide, in view of the constitutional amendment, that, instead of the assessment of a burdensome tax in a single year, the debt created may be met by taxation extended over a series of years?

Up to this point it should be observed that the application of the constitutional amendment is entirely eliminated from every phase of the case except the method of paying the debt. So far as the creation of the debt is concerned the amendment "is only the water that has passed over the dam." Shall, therefor, a construction of the amendment be invoked now, which in no way interferes with the mischief to be prevented, the creation of a debt, but which may make oppressive the payment of a debt imposed upon these municipalities *in invitum*? It does not seem to us that it should.

Black, on the interpretation of laws, section 8, lavs down this rule: In interpreting all written instruments, the intent of the author is the goal we must strive to attain. Naturally we look for and expect to find that intention expressed in the language of the instrument, taking the words used in their ordinary, popular sense, unless obviously used in a technical sense. It is a cardinal rule in the interpretations of constitutions that the instrument must be so construed to give effect to the intention of the people who adopted it. This intention is to be sought in the constitution itself, and the apparent meaning of the words employed is to be taken as expressing it except in cases where that assumption would lead to absurdity, ambiguity or contradiction. When the meaning shown on the face of the words is definite and intelligible, the courts are not at liberty to look for another meaning even though it should seem more probable or natural, but they must assume that the constitution means just what it says."

Applying this rule, we find this plain and unambiguous language used: "No city or town shall hereafter create any debt or liability, which singly or in the aggregate with previous debts or liabilities, shall exceed 5 per centum of the last regular valuation of said city or town." It does not say that no debt, etc., shall be created by the State on account of a town or city by virtue of its paramount authority to compel the performance of public duties. By this language, nothing but the creation of a debt by the city or town is prohibited.

The very spirit and letter of this language is to prevent the creation of a debt beyond the limit named. It is absolutely

silent as to payment. We have already established the proposition that the State, regardless of the amendment, can in certain cases create a debt against the municipality. Now under the above language, shall we read into the amendment, "nor shall the State hereafter extend the liquidation of any debt which it may create against a municipality, beyond the payment provided by the assessment of a current municipal tax therefor." While it is true that whatever is necessary to render effective any provision of the constitution, whether the same be a prohibition or a restriction of the grant of a power, must be deemed implied or intended in the provision itself, yet, "when a law is plain and unambiguous, whether expressed in general or limited terms, the authors should be intended to mean what they have plainly expressed, and consequently no room is left for construction. Possible or probable meanings when one is plainly declared in the instrument itself, the courts are not at liberty to search for elsewhere." Cooley on Com. Lim., 4th edition, page 58.

It seems to us it would be straining the doctrine of implication beyond its limits to interpolate the above additional prohibition into article XXII. Nor is there any good reason why it should be incorporated in the interpretation of the amendment. Because the amendment, as already seen, does not purport and was not intended to hamper or curtail the power of the State in the discharge of its governmental functions. It accomplishes, we believe, under the interpretation herein given, a result which is consistent with its own language and in harmony with the purpose it was intended to subserve. It prevents the municipalities from creating any debt beyond the 5 per cent limit, either for the public utilities which it is obliged to maintain, or those local utilities which it would be convenient, but not obligatory to have.

It also prevents the legislature from either allowing the municipality to create any debt above the limit for any local utilities not obligatory, and, from creating any debt, itself, for such purposes; but, on the other hand, it leaves the State, when an emergency arises, free to act in the exercise of its governmental functions, with authority to create compulsory indebtedness with respect to the matters above specified. It is not an improbable view that the legislature expressly intended, by the language employed to give expression to the amendment, to still reserve, in the authority of the State, the power to compel the performance of these obligatory duties, as a supplement to the right, of which the municipalities, up to their debt limit, had been deprived.

Another important consideration to be employed in giving an interpretation to a constitutional provision and ascertaining the intention of its framers, is the history surrounding it and the purpose for which it was adopted.

It is a matter of history that the occasion for adopting the amendment article XXII, was the susceptibility of cities and towns in the years of development following the close of the Civil War, to pledge their credit to almost any amount to secure a line of railroad through or near their limits, or induce the establishment of some industrial institution which the people, in their enthusiasm, might be induced to believe would bring them prosperity and plenty.

The purpose of the amendment was to place an effective check upon further indulgence in this fatuous tendency on the part of cities and towns.

That the purpose was to prevent the State from imposing obligations upon municipalities, or regulating the manner of paying such obligations, when imposed, it seems quite clear was never thought of or intended. In fact the situation and circumstances existing at the time of the adoption of the amendment, either fairly point to an inference the other way, or to an express intention to leave the distribution of the burden imposed in the compulsory performance of municipal duties in the discretion of the legislature. This power in which the municipality has no voice, but is helpless and powerless, wherein the State not only can create the debt but provide the method of its payment, was existing at the time the amendment was adopted, and had existed from the very birth of the State, and is presumed to have been fully comprehended by the legislature and considered, *in pari materia*, in passing the resolve for the amendment.

Yet the legislature left in the sovereign power of the State this arbitrary, yet indispensable, power to compel the performance of certain municipal duties and create debts therefor. And is it not rather a fair presumption than otherwise in view of the fact that the amendment is silent, that the legislature, notwithstanding the amendment, intended to still leave within the right of the State the implied power to prescribe the method of discharging the obligations, which by positive power it permitted the State to create? Unless the constitution can be invoked to prevent it, the authorities for extending the payment of such a debt over a series of years, to make it less burdensome, are ample. Dillon on Municipal Corporation, 4th edition, volume 1, section 74. Tiedman on Municipal Corporation, section 15. People v. Flagg, 46 New York 401. Philadelphia v. Field, 58 Pennsylvania St., 320. Horn v. Town of New Lots, 83 New York, 105.

It has been suggested that the act in question does not disclose the fact that the municipalities affected thereby, have unreasonably refused or neglected to perform their legal duty, in maintaining or repairing Vaughan's bridge, but this is a question with respect to which we think we need not inquire. Our court has judicially determined after argument that the legislature is the sole judge as to what is reasonable in the exercise of legislative power and that the court cannot review the legislative judgment in that respect. Moor v. Veazie, 32 Maine, 343, 360. If the legislature should see fit to pass the act, it must be presumed that they have determined the preliminary facts in the affirmative as a pre-requisite to the passage of the bill. It is beyond the pale of comprehension that the State in the exercise of its sovereign power would impose a burden upon a municipality against its will, unless the reason for so doing was clearly and unequivocally made to appear.

It may be said that if the amendment does not intervene, the legislature will be flooded with petitions for public improvements, but as we have already observed, the plenary power of the State can be exercised with respect only to those general public utilities, the maintenance of which is obligatory upon the town and essential to the sovereignty of the State, and then only in *invitum*.

Buchanan v. Litchfield, 102 U. S. 278, a case which has been called to our attention, was a case involving the right of a city to create a debt and issue bonds for the installation of a water plant, under a constitutional provision entirely dissimilar to ours. It provided, "no county, city, etc., shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to any amount," etc.

But it seems to us this case is not an authority upon the question now under consideration, because the legislature of Illinois undertook to authorize the city to contract a voluntary indebtedness which was plainly a violation of the constitution. But even if the state had undertaken to impose this obligation upon the city of Litchfield, in invitum, which it could not do, by reason of the fact that water works is not one of the public utilities which a state can compel a town to establish, the court of Illinois, we think, would have been obliged to come to the same conclusion by virtue of the language of the constitution of that state, which prohibits a city from "becoming indebted in any manner or for any purpose," etc., while the constitution of our State only goes so far as to say "no city or town shall hereafter create any debt," etc. On the other hand, the case of Grant County v. Lake County, 17 Oregon, 463, is a case exactly in point, and on all fours with the interpretation herein contended for. The case arose under the constitutional prohibition which says, "that no county shall create any debts or liabilities which singly or in the aggregate, exceed the sum of \$5,000," language precisely the same as ours as far as the terms of the prohibition are concerned. The court say: "The circuit court seems to have assumed that a county could not legally become indebted in a sum in excess of five thousand dollars; that the fact of it owing more than that amount rendered the part thereof exceeding it illegal.

"This I think was erroneous. That no county shall create any debts or liabilities which shall singly or in the aggregate exceed the sum of five thousand dollars except to suppress insurrections or repel invasions, does not imply that all debts and liabilities against a county over and above that sum are necessarily obnoxious to that provision. To justify the court in finding the said conclusion of law, it should have found that the county created the indebtedness.

"Counties do not create all the debts and liabilities which they are under; ordinarily such debts and liabilities are imposed upon them by law. A county is mainly a mere agency of the state government, a function through which the state administers the governmental affairs, and it has but little option in the creation of debts and liabilities against it. It must pay the salaries of its officers, the expenses incurred in holding courts within and for it, and various and many other expenses the law charges upon it, and which it is powerless to prevent. Debts and liabilities arising out of such matters, whatever sum they may amount to, cannot be said in reason to have been created in violation of the provisions of the constitution referred to, as they are really created by the general laws of the state in the administration of the governmental affairs. Said provision of the constitution as I view it, only applies to debts and liabilities which a county in its corporate character and as an artificial person voluntarily creates."

With much stronger force this reasoning, we think, might be applied to a New England town or city which acts so often in its private corporate capacity to which the inhibition applies, and so seldom has liabilities imposed upon it by the state and then presumably only in case of necessity.

We are unable to discover any good reason why an interpretation should be given to the amendment in question, which neither by the express language, the history, the original purpose, nor by necessary implication, is required, and which in no way prevents the mischief that it is intended to reach. But to prevent the mischief, it seems to me, is the only good reason that can be assigned for an interpretation, which, instead of protecting the community, may unquestionably impose onerous burdens upon a municipality which it is powerless to resist or prevent.

Such an interpretation does not prevent the state from imposing the debt. But when the debt is once imposed, then, we submit, it is contrary to justice, equity and all business principles, that a community should be embarrassed and possibly ruined, by being compelled to pay it by a single tax levy, unless the constitution by necessary implication clearly enjoins such action or as clearly prohibits the extension of the time of payment beyond that prescribed by such summary method.

For the above reasons, our answer is, that the act in question, if it should become a law, would not be in violation of Art. XXII of the amendment nor of any other provision of the constitutions of the State.

Mr. Johnson: The members of this House early recognized you as the leader of the minority party in the Legislature. We have noted with satisfaction that the members of your party have served you with loyalty, and in the management of that leadership and in your intercourse with the majority party and with your fellow members you have gained not only the affection but the love of every member of this House; and I know that I voice the sentiment of this House when, as a slight token of their regard, I present in their behalf this dictionary which has been in the possession of the House upon the Speaker's desk during the session. I hope that you will accept it as a testimonial of our love and affection for you. (Applause.)

Mr. JOHNSON:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House: I think you will believe me when I say that I am sincere in saying that I am deeply touched by the words of the Speaker of the House and also by the action of the members of the House in bestowing upon me this token of your regard and esteem, which I know is so little deserved by me. I came here, as you all did, with the desire to discharge my duty well as I might see it, and I knew that in my intercourse with my fellow members I should find that kindly spirit, that touch of good fellowship which I have ever found to be charactertistic of the citizens of Maine. I thank you sincerely. (Applause.)

Now, Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House, one good turn deserves another. That is an old adage with which we are all familiar, and when I was called to the Speaker's desk I was not expecting this good turn and this manifestation of your good will and esteem. I stand here at the close of this very busy session extending over twelve weeks, during which time we have worked together, as I believe, for the best interests of the State of Maine, and to say now at this time as the session closes that we feel conscious that we have made no mistakes I think would be to arrogate to ourselves something that none of us would desire. But I think I can say that in all that we have done, all that we have endeavored to do here. I for my part have seen upon the part of every member of this House a sincere and honest desire to do his duty well. In the discharge of these duties, perplexing as they have been, and in the conduct of the business of this House, which has been of large volume during this present session, we have been ably assisted, and not only assisted but led by the gentleman who occupies the responsible position of Speaker of this House. (Applause.) I know that every one of you will fully sustain me when I say that we feel that we have had in him not only a Speaker, an official who has been chosen to preside over the deliberations of this body, but we have also had a personal friend; and that we shall carry away with us when we go to our respective homes a pleasant

picture which we shall often wish to call up with kindly manner of his executive ability, of the promptness with which he has discharged the duties of his high office.

And now at this time I wish not only on behalf of the minority party of this House but in behalf of its members, to offer this resolution:

Resolved, That it is the unanimous sense of this House that in Speaker Drew it has had a most efficient and impartial presiding officer, whose uniform courtesy and kindness extended to every member have sustained the dignity of his important office and secured for him the respect and esteem of all; that in the discharge of the duties of that office during a long and busy session he has by his thorough knowledge of these duties combined with rare executive ability, most successfully conducted and expedited its business.

I move the unanimous adoption of the resolution. (Applause.)

Mr. POWERS of Houlton:

Mr. Speaker: I rise to second the resolutions which have been presented by the gentleman from Waterville. I know that they voice the sentiment of every man in this House and it gives me great pleasure to second the resolutions that have been presented. In behalf of myself and in common with the other members of this House, I desire to express the deep sense of obligation under which you have placed us by the fairness and impartiality and the courteous manner in which your administration as presiding officer of this House has been discharged to its members.

Sir, the recollection of the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventy-second Legislature of Maine will live in our holiest remembrance. We feel that our every legal and parliamentary right has been abundantly guaranteed to us, and we cannot be less than doubly impressed with a sense of endless gratitude to you. (Applause.)

Mr. REED of Portland:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House: As we are about to separate and forego for a time these many pleasant associations which I feel we have all so generally enjoyed and go back to our every-day life, it is exceedingly pleasant, while we may have sometimes differed one from another, to join in this universal sentiment of respect to our common presiding officer, which I believe is shared by every member of this House. No man whose measure has succeeded can consider it as having been aided by any unfair help from the Chair; no man whose bill has failed can say that he has not received fair treatment from the Chair. All, the majority and the minority, have received prompt and uniform justice. I think no higher compliment could be paid to a presiding officer.

And I wish to call attention to what I may say is a most unusual circumstance, I cannot remember that a ruling of the Chair has, during the entire session, been once questioned. I am new at this business, but it seems to me that this is rather a remarkable record. Our business has been promptly dispatched, and we have had for the presiding officer of this House a man who is broad enough to fully and ably discharge his duty, friendly to us all; we who are new members, have been able to go to him for counsel and advice; and I am sure that every member of this House as he departs will retain a most kindly remembrance of our able Speaker. (Applause.)

Mr. OAKES of Auburn:

Mr. Speaker: It is a pleasant duty which comes to us at the close of our long and somewhat arduous session of labor for our State's welfare, labor which perhaps has not always been appreciated at what we deem its full value, to say a few words to each other in friendship as we come to the parting of the ways; and when we go to our several homes we shall carry with us, not a great amount of wealth, but we shall carry with us something after all which we shall always value as long as life shall last. It is pleasant to say a few words as we separate. It is pleasant for us all to recognize the value of the services of our leader since we came here strangers to each other, strangers very largely to the work which was before us, strangers to the way of doing business, uncertain very often where to turn in order to accomplish what we wished to do. It is pleasant to recall the way in which we have grown together, the way in which we have become acquainted with one another, the manner in which the work has been done, the way in which we have been helped and steered and assisted by the gentleman who has presided over us and whose experience has often filled our deficiencies.

I am impressed very often when I see how smoothly one of us does business so far as the records show. We get up and make a motion and we take a bill, so far as the record shows, through its various stages, add an amendment to it, get some things out of the way and adjust others, and after all when you come down to the real fact it is the Speaker who has taken the burden from our shoulders and smoothed the passage over these technicalities. We all of us realize how important it is that a body like this should have a gentleman at its head who is willing and competent and always ready to assist every member, to look ahead for the work of the House, to plan for it, to see that the work goes along smoothly; and we come to the point at the close of the session when we can look back and say that all our work has been pleasant, has been harmonious,—that we can come here at the close of the session having had our "scraps," having had our differences of opinion, and still feeling that after all, through it all and very largely owing to the successful administration of our leader here, we have worked together, we have worked together for the good of our constituents and the good of the State of Maine.

Now, members of the House, let us go home and take with us these pleasant recollections; and I think that one of the pleasantest of the recollections which we shall have is the opportunity which we take at the present time, as we all do, of testifying our high esteem for our presiding officer, our appreciation for his efficient work and our expression of our entire good will and hope for his future success.

It gives me great pleasure to second the motion. (Applause.)

Mr. SEWALL of Bath:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House: It seems to me that if the leader of the minority party is entitled to take part in the felicities of this occasion, I might claim just a word as the leader of a smaller minority on one fateful evening here when we first assembled, and in extending those felicities I beg you to understand for myself and in justice to all of you that those felicities as coming from me do not go back any farther than to the time "when I also ran." I had the pleasure and the honor of meeting our Speaker in those memorable days which I am trying to forget, on many a bloodless field; and I can testify well to his prowess in politics, his management of men and his broad dealings with all those questions with which all citizens ought to concern themselves; and I can testify to that prowess by the scars of nearly one hundred votes which I did not receive, and I beg now to pay my humble tribute and my few words of homage to any man who can be so skilled in the field of politics and vet when elevated to a supreme position, second only to the governorship of this State.—and I have heard that it is quite as hard to attain that position as it is to reach the governorship, and I can well believe it (laughter),-I want to pay my homage, I say, to a gentleman of those qualifications, such as our Speaker possesses, but who, when elevated to a position in which he sits supreme over all of us and holds in a way the fate of all our careers in his hand for the time being, can rise to the full measure of it and rank, as he can claim to rank, in impartiality, in fair dealing and in honest ability with any of his most distinguished predecessors in his high office. (Applause).

Mr. HALE of Portland:

Mr Speaker: As the session comes to a close I cannot help having a feeling of sadness. Brought together as we have been from every corner of the grand old State of Maine, we have in the last twelve weeks become welded into one great family. We have had our disputes and our troubles; we have locked horns in debate, and we have defeated each other's pet measure, and it has all been done in a friendly way. The credit for that is due in a great measure to the man at the helm. Whenever our eloquence has run away with us in any way and we have made personal remarks the sharp rap of the Speaker's gavel has brought us to order; whenever we have indulged in any horse play the same gavel has brought us up sharp and always the dignity of the House has been maintained, and at all times, Mr. Speaker, we have felt the hand of the master; and we, have liked it for we know that the master is our friend. How many of us who have been trying to get some matter through the House when we have not known just how to do it have dropped in on the Speaker for a little advice? And we have always got it. Kindly, patient and considerate, the least one of us has always been able to get the Speaker's ear and get the full benefit of his greater experience. Strict and impartial, Mr. Speaker, in the duties of your office, ready for every emergency and absolutely firm in your rulings, we think, Sir, that you have made us an ideal Speaker.

Now, as the time draws near when we must separate and go to our homes we want to give you something that you can remember us by; and in token of the high esteem which we have for you, we, the members of this House, now present to you this loving cup which is truly, as the inscription upon it reads, from your friends of the House. (Applause).

(The cup was placed upon the Speaker's desk).

The Clerk:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives: You have heard the resolutions as presented and read by the gentleman from Waterville, who moves that the resolutions have a passage. All those who favor giving the resolutions a passage will indicate it by rising.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The SPEAKER:

Friends and Gentlemen of the House: I sincerely thank you for the kind words that you have spoken and for the kind thoughts that are contained in the resolutions. When I accepted the honor to which you elevated me I did it with the full intention of striving to the best of my ability to serve you impartially, to assist if I might in your deliberations, and to make the pathway of all as smooth as possible. Whatever may have been my feelings in regard to any matter of legislation when out of the chair, I have striven while occupying the chair to deal fairly and justly with all. I assure you, gentlemen, that whenever there have been obstacles in my path, I have always found helping hands reaching out to assist me. Whichever way I might turn there I found friends, and loving friends.

This legislature which is about to close has been one wherein there have been sharp contests and differences of opinion, and yet I believe that no legislature in the past has been actuated with a more ardent love for the State of Maine or a keener desire for legislation in the interests of the whole people. I believe, gentlemen, that our constituencies will so think when they read over our deliberations and acts.

Now, for this beautiful cup, this beautiful testimonial of your love and affection, I thank you most sincerely. The knowledge that I have won your esteem and love is indeed a treasure that shall ever give me courage whatever my lot in life may be in the future. This cup shall remain with me till the end of my journey, and then it shall pass to my posterity; and I doubt not that it will be my son's greatest joy to know that his father won your friendship, esteem and love.

Again friends, I thank you one and all. (Applause).

Mr. SWETT of Portland:

I have been asked to contribute a little to the presentation of the testimonial which the House has arranged. I shall not consume your time by attempting to extend the sentiments which are contained in the little poem which I will read.

ON LENDING A PUNCH-BOWL.

This "punch-bowl" was, according to old family traditions, a caudlecup. It is a massive piece of silver, its cherubs and other ornaments of coarse repousse work, and has two handles like a loving cup, by which it was held or passed from guest to guest.

This ancient silver bowl of mine, it tells of good old times, Of joyous days and jovial nights, and merry Christmas chimes; They were a free and jovial race, but honest, brave and true, Who dipped their ladle in the punch when this old bowl was new.

A Spanish galleon brought the bar,—so runs the ancient tale; 'Twas hammered by an Antwerp smith, whose arm was like a flail; And now and then between the strokes, for fear his strength should fail, He wiped his brow and quaffed a cup of good old Flemish ale.

The reading of the poem was received with applause.

Mr. LITTLEFIELD of Rockland:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House: We are glad that the time is near at hand when we shall return to our own private affairs, but we are indeed even now sorrowful in the contemplation of the parting which that return involves; but before we have said good-byes it is fitting that we should acknowledge faithful, honest and conscientious service. It was my privilege, pleasure and honor, when I came to this House as a new member, to put in nomination for the position of assistant clerk a gentleman who was then contesting for a re-election to that office. Mr. STEVENS of Portland:

Mr. Speaker: It gives me great pleasure to second the resolution which has been presented by the gentleman from Rockland. It is a fact that the duties of the clerk of this House have been most faithfully and efficiently performed and this House was most fortunate in having a man in that position so well qualified as is our clerk. Mr. MERRILL of Skowhegan:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House: The hour has nearly arrived when we shall all go to our respective homes and again return to the every day avocations of our lives. We came here as it were but a few days ago, the most of us strangers to one another. In this short time we have become as it were members of one family, with a feeling of brotherly love extending from each to the other of the members of this House. And while some of us may have in heated debate said some apparently sharp things at the time. I do not believe there is a member in this body that will go away feeling that any member of this legislature has from his heart said an unkind word by which any other member could carry away with him any feeling of resentment. It is with gladness that we go and yet it is with a feeling of sorrow; and I hope, Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House, that we shall be permitted, perhaps not on occasions like this, but that we shall all be permitted to have the extreme pleasure of meeting each other in the days and years to come.

While there has been much said in appreciation of the magnificent manner in which our Speaker has conducted the affairs of this House, and how magnificently well have been performed the duties of our clerk, our assistant clerk, and the other employees of the House, each and every one has seemed to strive to do everything that was in his power to make pleasant the work and the labor of this House; and, Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pleasure to second the resolution extending a vote of thanks to the assistant clerk and employees who have so faithfully performed their duty. RULES.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

I. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS.

4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.

5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

MONITORS.

6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.

7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On ways and means,

On leave of absence,

On bills in the third reading,

On engrossed bills,

On elections,

To consist of seven members each.

On county estimates,

To consist of one member from each county.

On rules and business of the house,

To consist of three members and the speaker ex-officio.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.

11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.

12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.

13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.

14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.

15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.

16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.

17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.

18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.

19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason of such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.

21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.

23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.

24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial courts, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

25. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. Reports of committees.

6th. First reading of bills and resolves printed under the rules.

7th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.

8th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.

9th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendal of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration, and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.

28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but-

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on the table.

3d. For the previous question.

4th. To commit.

5th. To postpone to a day certain.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.

31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: *Shall the main question be put now?* No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.

32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.

35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.

37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.

38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.

39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.

40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.

41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.

42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.

43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.

44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.

45. A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.

46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, and all bills and resolves to be introduced in the house shall be endorsed with the name of the person presenting them, with the subject matter of the same, together with the name of the committee, to which the person presenting them desires the same to be referred, and shall be placed by the members presenting them in a box placed for that purpose in front of the clerk's desk. All such petitions, memorials, papers, bills and resolves which are deposited in said box before five o'clock in the afternoon of each day shall be removed therefrom by the clerk and shall be introduced and received in the house on the following day, at which time they shall be presented to the house by the speaker, or such other person as the speaker may request, and referred to the proper committees, unless the house shall otherwise order.

47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.

48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on such day subsequent to that of their first reading as the house may assign.

49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed. 50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.

51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.

52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.

53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.

54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.

55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, *Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor?* and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.

56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Reed's Rules shall govern the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless twothirds of the members present shall consent thereto.

58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

On manufactures,

On agriculture,

On military affairs,

On interior waters,

On state lands and state roads,

On ways and bridges,

On inland fisheries and game,

On shore fisheries,

On counties,

On towns,

On Indian affairs,

On claims,

On pensions,

On insane hospitals,

On state school for boys,

On state prison,

On public buildings and grounds,

On library,

On mines and mining,

- On temperance,
- On labor,

On taxation.

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.

3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly endorsed on the back of the same.

5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.

6. The title of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.

7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section I."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.

9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.

10. Every bill or resolve reported in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.

11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.

13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.

14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.

15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.

16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.

17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

18. Every act, resolve or order appropriating money, shall be referred to the appropriate committee for consideration, and no further action shall be had thereon in either branch until the same shall have been reported back by said comittee.

SENATE ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

Ist. House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. The reception and reference of petitions, and such other papers as require action by a committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. The first reading of bills and resolves printed under the rules.

6th. The reports of committees.

7th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

8th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

9th. Orders of the day.

When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but,

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To reconsider.

3d. To lay on the table.

4th. To postpone to a day certain.

5th. To commit.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, *near the bottom*, with the name of the county which he represents.

The senator presenting an *order* should put his name thereto, on the inside at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the name of the county which he represents.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

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- Rule 1. President to take the chair at time of calling to order-secretary to preside in his absence.
 - " 2. Journal to be read—president to ascertain whether quorum is present before such reading.
 - " 3. President to address senate, and senators address president, while speaking-senators to stand while speaking.
 - " 4. Members to be styled senators while speaking.
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 - " 7. Motion to adjourn always first in order.
 - " 8. Order of precedence in motions.
 - " 9. Motions to be in writing if desired-right to withdraw.
 - " 10. Right to the floor-senator to speak but once to same question.
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 - " 19. Consideration of bills by paragraph on second reading.
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 - " 21. Grants of money or land to be read on two several days.
 - " 22. Order of business-secretary to keep a calendar of bills-papers from house disagreeing with senate action.
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 - " 24. No debate after question is put to vote.
 - " 25. Unfinished business to have precedence.
 - " 26. No engrossed bills to be sent to house without notice to senate.
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RULES.

I. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president *pro tempore* be chosen.

2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.

3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.

4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.

5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.

7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.

8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged. Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the house shall have precedence of each other in the following order: to recede, to concur, to insist, to adhere. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time before the decision, or any amendment be made to it.

10. No senator shall address the senate until recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and not then more than three times without leave.

11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree. 12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.

13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.

14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.

15. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.

16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

17. Every paper shall be once read at the table before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.

18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.

19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.

20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.

21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

Ist. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers as require action by a committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. The first reading of bills and resolves laid on the table to be printed under the rules.

6th. Reports of committees.

7th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

8th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

9th. Orders of the day.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee on bills in the second reading, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the House, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.

24. After a question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.

25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.

26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.

27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.

28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.

29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of twothirds of the members present.

30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.

31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.

32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot,) and appointed by the senate.

33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading, On engrossed bills,

to consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.

35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.

36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.

37. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Reed's Rules, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

MEMORANDA.

- **1.** Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a *report* of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the *order* or other paper appointing said committee to consider the subject.
- .3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of _____," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be endorsed thus, "Petition of _____and others of the town of _____," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "Petition of _____," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county in which he resides.
- 7. The member presenting an order should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county in which he resides.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which *leave to withdraw* was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The *original*, however, may be taken from the files, and the *subject* presented *de novo*.
- 9. Bills and resolves refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.

10. The heading or caption of bills should be as follows:

13. All bills amending a statute, by striking out words from any section or independent clause thereof, or by adding or inserting other words and provisions, should recite the section or clause as it would read after being amended as proposed.

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
