JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

AUGUSTA, WEDNESDAY, January 7, 1891.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and the laws of the State of Maine, the Senators elect to the Sixty-Fifth Legislature convened in the Senate Chamber and were called to order by Charles W. Tilden, Secretary of the Senate of 1889.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Williamson of Augusta.

The following communication was read by the Secretary:

And a quorum of the Senators elect was present.

On motion by Mr. WALTON of Somerset,

That Senator was charged with a message to the Governor and Council, informing them that a quorum of the Senators elect is present in the Senate Chamber, ready to take and subscribe the oaths of office required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Walton subsequently reported that he had delivered the message with which he was charged, and the Governor was pleased to reply that he would attend upon the Senators elect forthwith for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon the Governor, attended by the Council and Heads of Departments came in, before whom the Senators elect took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution.

The Governor and suite then withdrew.

On motion by Mr. MOORE of Cumberland,

Messrs. Moore of Cumberland,

Hunt of Waldo and

Mehan of Knox

were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for President of the Senate.

Mr. Moore, from the committee, subsequently reported as follows:

The report was accepted and Hon. Charles F. Libby declared duly elected President of the Senate for the term consisting of the political years of 1891 and 1892.

Mr. Libby was conducted to the chair by Mr. Poor of Cumberland and Mr. Sherman of Knox, and thereupon addressed the Senate as follows:

I desire to express to the members of the Senate my appreciation of the honor of being called to preside over your deliberations. Mindful as I am of my lack of experience in this office, I feel that I must claim your indulgence and can only offer the assurance of my disposition to perform its duties to the best of my ability.

The experience of the last few sessions must satisfy everyone that the amount of business before the legislature has increased since the change to biennial sessions and that many matters have failed of adequate consideration for want of time. The danger of modern times seems to lie in too much rather than too little legisla-Enactments which change rules of property and impose new liabilities and duties; which enlarge the scope of legislative control in matters previously left untrammelled, should receive the deliberation and care due to their far-reaching effects. Better, by far, no legislation than hasty and ill-considered legislation. amount of new and important matters will be presented at this session which will require your patient and careful consideration. This, I doubt not, they will receive; and I have confidence to believe that the outcome of your deliberations will be such as will meet the approval of the sober judgment of the people of the State.

Thanking you for the kindly feeling and consideration which have attended my election to office I now await the pleasure of the Senate.

Ordered, That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to invite the clergymen of Augusta, Hallowell and Gardiner to officiate as Chaplains, in rotation, during the present session.

On motion by Mr. GRINDLE of Hancock,

Ordered, That the Messenger be directed to have open wood fires kept in the fireplaces in the Senate Chamber during the present session of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. SPEAR of Kennebec,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to place in the hands of the Secretary of the Senate, for the use of the Senate, four copies of the Revised Statutes of the State of Maine, one copy each of Webster's International and Worcester's Unabridged Dictionaries, Lippincott's Pronouncing Gazetteer, and Cushing's Manual, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate to have the same returned to the Secretary of State at the close of the session.

Mr. Hunt of the foregoing committee subsequently reported that the committee had waited upon the Governor-elect and informed him of his election, and he was pleased to reply that he accepted the office and would attend upon the Legislature at such time as may be assigned, for the purpose of taking and subscribing the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him for the discharge of his official duties.

On motion by Mr. WADLIN of Waldo,

Ordered, The House concurring, that there be a Joint Special Committee consisting of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, to take into consideration the subject of equalization of taxation, and report to this Legislature, by bill or otherwise.

Which was read, and, on motion by Mr. RYDER of Penobscot, laid on the table.

On motion by Mr. HAINES of Kennebec,

Ordered, That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to furnish each Senator one copy of any daily paper published in this State, as each Senator may select, in addition to any papers that have already been provided for said Senators by any other order.

Which was read and passed.

On motion by Mr SMITH of Lincoln,

Ordered, That the time for the reception of petitions and bills for private and special legislation be limited to Saturday, January 31, 1891, and that all petitions and bills presented after that date be referred to the next Legislature, and that the Clerk of the House cause this order to be published in the Daily Kennebec Journal, Bangor Daily Whig and Courier, Portland Daily Press, Eastern Argus, Lewiston Daily Journal, Bangor Commercial, Portland Evening Express, Biddeford Daily Journal, Bath Daily Times, Aroostook Republican, Somerset Reporter, Rockland Opinion, Ellsworth American, Piscataquis Observer, Machias Republican, Farmington Chronicle and Oxford Democrat,

Which was read and passed.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. NASH of Washington,

Ordered, That a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a convention of both branches of the Legislature forthwith in the House of Representatives for the purpose of administering to Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

The President directed the Secretary to convey the message.

Subsequently a message was received from the House by Mr. Cotton, its Clerk, concurring in the foregoing proposition.

The Senate then proceeded to the Representatives' Hall, where a convention was formed.

IN CONVENTION.

On motion by Mr. RYDER,

Messrs. Ryder of Penobscot,

Mallet of Cumberland, of the Senate.

Messrs. Penley of Auburn,

Plummer of Brunswick,

Webb of Deer Isle,

Crocker of Machias,

Deering of Waterboro', of the House,

were appointed a committee to wait upon Hon Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor-elect, to inform him that the two branches of the Legislature were in convention assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make.

Mr. Ryder subsequently reported that they had delivered the message with which they were charged, and the Governor-elect was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the convention.

Whereupon Hon. Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor-elect, attended by the Executive Council and Heads of Departments, came in, and, in presence of both branches of the Legislature, in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Oramandal Smith, Secretary of State, then made the following proclamation:

PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the eighth day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for Governor, having been examined and counted by the Legislature, which has declared that a plurality thereof were given to Edwin C. Burleigh, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the Legislature in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of that office, I therefore declare and make known to all

persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that Edwin C. Burleigh is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The President of the convention than announced to the Governor that they were prepared to listen to any communication which he desired to make.

Thereupon the Governor addressed the convention as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

At the beginning of the important and exacting duties which, as the chosen representatives of the people of Maine, will devolve upon you during the next few months, it is my pleasant privilege to welcome you to more commodious and convenient quarters than have been enjoyed by your predecessors.

The increased health and comfort thus secured to you will, it is hoped, go far towards facilitating the labors of the session.

FINANCIAL.

On the first day of October, 1869, when bonds were issued under the Act of 1868, in payment of the Municipal War Debts assumed by the State, the total bonded indebtedness of Maine reached its highest point, amounting at that time to \$8,100,900. Deducting from this the accumulations then in the Sinking Fund, amounting, at their par value, to \$972,530, it will be seen that the total net indebtedness of the State was \$7,128,370. This debt was bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, and the amount due for interest in 1870 was \$486,054.00.

The total bonded debt of the State at the present time is \$2,602,300. Of this amount \$118,300 is drawing interest at five per cent. \$150,000 at four per cent. and \$2,334,000 at three per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, being just

one-half the rate which the State had been paying for the previous twenty years. During the past year the sum of \$50,000 has been paid on the principal of the public debt.

Briefly stated, the financial operations of the State from 1869 to the present time are as follows:

This interest account will be growing less from year to year, as the annual payments upon the principal of the debt are made under the Refunding Act of 1889.

A comparison of these figures will clearly show to the people of Maine what has been accomplished during the last twenty years, and how carefully and prudently her financial interests have been managed during that time.

In 1865 the rate of taxation in Maine was fifteen mills on the dollar of the State valuation, and the State tax assessed upon the County of Cumberland alone was larger, by nearly fourteen thousand dollars, than the entire State tax for 1890. Indeed, the State tax for 1865 was only \$126,000.00 less than the entire amount of the bonded debt of the State at the Within the last decade the rate of taxation present time. in Maine has been reduced from five mills in 1880 to two and one-quarter mills in 1890. If we take from this the one mill that is levied directly by the State, under the Act of 1872, for the support of Common Schools, and is distributed by the Treasurer of State to the several cities, towns and plantations, there remain but one mill and a quarter to be used for general State expenses,—the lowest State tax that has been levied during the past thirty years.

This tax would not be a burden to any one, were it fairly assessed upon all the property of the State, at its full value. The benefits derived from a State Government, the protection of person and property which renders possible increased production, through the division of labor, cannot be overestimated. Nowhere else do we secure so large returns from so small an expenditure of money.

Of all the public burdens resting upon the people of Maine, the State tax is to-day the least onerous. The total amount levied during the past year was \$531,697.17, of which more than \$400,000 were returned directly to the people for school purposes, leaving but about \$130,000 of the amount thus assessed to be used towards defraying the expenses of the State Government. During the present year 287 towns and plantations will receive from the State more money on account of the School Fund and Mill Tax alone than they pay into its Treasury. In a large number of the remaining towns the difference between the amount to be paid the State, and the amount to be received from it on this account, will be exceedingly small.

By virtue of the Act of 1872, known as the Mill Tax law, all the property of the State is assessed one mill upon every dollar for the support of Common Schools. Under this system of taxation, which has given eminently satisfactory results, the cities and wealthy towns are obliged to materially aid in lightening the burdens of the less prosperous communities. It will therefore be readily seen that the burdens resting upon the people to-day will be found largely in what may be termed municipal or town taxation and that, in seeking ways to lighten these burdens, this important fact should not be lost sight of. While the State tax for the year 1890, including the one mill levied for the benefit of schools, is only two mills and a quarter on a dollar, or twenty-two and one-half cents on one hundred dollars of the State valuation, the municipal or town taxes, levied for all purposes, average one and seventy-one hundredths cents upon the dollar of as-

sessed valuation, and are always, outside of certain absolute requirements, just what towns or municipalities may themselves determine and authorize.

In my address two years ago, I expressed the opinion that the State tax might safely be reduced in 1890 from two and three-quarters to two and one-quarter mills upon the dollar of the State valuation, thus lifting an annual burden of \$117,799.94 from the tax payers of Maine. An order directing such reduction passed the House of Representatives on the thirteenth day of February, one month before the final adjournment of the Legislature. Subsequent to the passage of this order, the following appropriations were made entirely outside the usual items of State expenditure:

While there was a very general agreement among the members of the last Legislature as to the necessity and justice of these appropriations, it is altogether probable that a further decrease of taxation would not have been voted had their number and scope been clearly foreseen when the order for such reduction was given a passage. The Treasurer has found it necessary to make a temporary loan in order to meet the expenses occasioned by these special appropriations. It must be borne in mind, however, that the State still retains the value of \$291,400 of the \$361,400 thus appropriated, in permanent property added to its possessions.

Whether the low rate of taxation, which has existed during the past year, is to continue in the future, will depend largely upon the action of the present Legislature in the matter of establishing a new State valuation, and the economy practiced in the appropriation of public moneys. With the passage of measures that shall secure a fair and full valuation of all the property of the State, there appears to me no reason why that rate should not be maintained. Indeed, under the beneficent operation of such legislation, I believe it will be a question of only a few years, at most, when the State will be in condition to make a still further reduction in the tax rate.

Two years ago I pointed out the discrepancies between the State valuation of 1880 and that taken by the United States Census, and expressed the opinion that the latter came nearer doing us perfect justice. The valuation accorded us by the United States Census was considerably more than double that taken by the State. As I then said, "Our own State valuation finds too large a proportion of our property in the farms of the State, and makes the farmers pay an undue share of the general taxes. On the other hand, the valuation of the United States Census takes cognizance of the less tangible but more profitable investments which escape their fair share of the common burdens." This kind of property has been easily discerned by the United States Enumerators but has remained strangely invisible to local officials. to be hoped that you will be able to bring a large amount of it within reach of the taxing power.

Another reason for the difference between the State and Federal valuations, is found in the practice, which exists in some parts of the State, of assessing taxes upon partial property valuation. The report of the Tax Commission shows that during the year just closed, in making returns for the use of the State Valuation Commissioners, 198 towns in Maine returned their property at less than the "just value thereof" required by the Constitution of the State. In some instances assessors felt that they had fulfilled the requirements of their

office when they had assessed the property of the town at one-third of its "cash value." It is apparent to all that the establishment of the lowest practicable rate of taxation is impossible while such methods are in vogue. To secure it, the valuation of property must be uniform throughout the State and such uniformity can be secured only by rendering it imperative upon assessors, under severe penalties, to return all property at its full value.

REFUNDING THE PUBLIC DEBT.

In 1889 occurred one of the most remarkable financial transactions in the history of the State, the results of which were directly felt by every tax payer in Maine. By virtue of the Act of March 13, 1889, providing for refunding the public debt, the Treasurer of State, immediately thereafter, taking advantage of the condition of the money market at that time, issued proposals for the sale of three per cent. bonds to renew the six per cent. bonds falling due on the first days of June and October of that year. \$1,676,000 of the bonds bearing date June 1, 1889, and \$708,000 dated October 1, 1889, were sold, the former yielding a premium of $103\frac{1}{2}$ and the latter 103, or a total on both loans of \$79,900, which sum was applied directly to the payment of the public debt, reducing, to that extent, the total amount of the new bonds issued.

The prompt and successful manner in which the matter was conducted by the Treasurer, reflects great credit upon that officer and must be a source of pride and satisfaction to every citizen of the State. Had the initiatory steps in this transaction been delayed until near the time of the maturity of the old bonds, no such favorable negotiation could have been made, and it is altogether probable that the new bonds could not have been sold at par.

TAXATION.

For a number of years the opinion has prevailed that the tax laws of the State are not equitable in their operation;

that there is altogether too great a discrepancy between the portions of the public burdens borne by real and personal property.

Under a resolve of the last Legislature, a Commission was appointed "to inquire into the system adopted by other states to raise revenue for State, County and Municipal expenses, and to provide for a more equal, just and equitable system of taxation of all kinds of property in this State."

That Commission has faithfully attended to its prescribed duties. The general question of taxation has been closely studied. Other states have been visited and their tax laws carefully examined to ascertain in what respects, if any, they are superior to our own. The able and exhaustive report of the Commission will be laid before you. I commend it to your careful consideration.

It has been quite a common experience, among the various states of the Union, that movements for tax reform have been exceedingly slow in arriving at definite results. One Legislature, despairing of reaching a satisfactory solution of these perplexing problems, has passed them over to its successor, and thus the desired relief has, oftentimes, been long postponed. With you there will be no occasion for such a course. The report of this special Commission furnishes you at the start with the groundwork for legislation of this character.

It will be your duty to examine into the whole system of taxation, to ascertain what new sources of revenue are available, and whether any class of property is bearing less than its fair share of the public burdens, and, if so, to apply whatever remedy may, in your judgment, appear best. The importance of this matter would seem to require its careful consideration by a special committee of the Legislature.

STATE ASSESSORS.

I heartily concur with the recommendation of the Tax Commission for the appointment of a State Board of Assessors, whose duty it shall be to exercise a central supervision over our tax system, and "to equalize the valuation of the State biennially, in order that the taxes voted by each Legislature shall be assessed upon a new valuation."

A decade is altogether too long a time to elapse between valuations. Ten years bring vast changes in the creation and distribution of wealth in a State which is growing even more rapidly industrially than in the number of its inhabitants. valuation in all respects equitable at the beginning of a decade might, in many ways, work gross injustice at its close. Only by a frequent adjustment of values can substantial justice be done I am of the opinion that this commission should be chosen by the Legislature, in which alone is vested the constitutional right of levying taxes. At the same time it is highly desirable that such Board of Assessors should be, so far as possible, non-partisan and non-sectional. I am convinced that the work of such a Board would result in a large annual saving to the State and do much to secure a just distribution. of the public burdens.

DIRECT TAX BILL.

Under the Act of Congress approved August 5, 1861, known as the Direct Tax Act, Maine paid to the general government the sum of \$357,702. A bill was passed by the United States Senate during the last session of Congress authorizing the refunding, to the several states, of the money thus paid the general government, and the same is now pending before the House of Representatives.

It would be very advantageous to the State if this bill should become a law, and it is to be earnestly hoped it will be given a passage.

HON. SILAS C. HATCH.

On the twenty-seventh day of July last, Hon. Silas C. Hatch, Executive Councillor from the Sixth District, died at his home in Bangor. He was an able man, possessed of high-minded integrity and devotion to principle. He served the

State as its Treasurer and in the Executive Council and Legislature for a period of sixteen years. No man had a clearer insight into its affairs than he. Maine may well hold in honored remembrance the record of his distinguished services.

SAVINGS BANKS.

The Savings Banks of the State will be shown by the able and interesting report of the Bank Examiner, to be in a The total deposits now amount to prosperous condition. This is an increase of \$3,804,081.81 over \$47,781,166.90. the amount at the close of the year 1889. The total number of depositors is 140,521, a gain from last year of 8,329. total amount of State tax paid in 1890 was \$323,549.98, an increase of \$27,738.38 over 1889. The total amount of municipal taxes paid in 1890 was \$13,517.13. The Bank Examiner finds that, as a rule, a wise and conservative policy prevails in the management of our Savings Banks. the condition of the market that has prevailed during the past few years, the temptation has been very strong to secure greater returns at the risk of safety. This temptation cannot be too strongly guarded against. No part of the securities of our Savings Banks should be of an uncertain or speculative character. The deposits intrusted to these banks represent the accumulations that have grown out of the industry and enterprise of the State, and should be watched over with jealous care.

AGRICULTURE.

Agriculture is Maine's foremost material interest. Upwards of eighty thousand of our citizens are actively engaged in its pursuits. Whatever can be done, therefore, to further promote this important industry of the State will contribute directly to the general prosperity of our citizens. During the past decade a substantial advance has been made by our farmers in the use of labor-saving machinery, and in the adoption of improved and scientific methods of cultivation.

The gratifying growth of manufacturing centers in Maine, during the past few years, and the strong reason we have to hope for still further development of this character, are full of encouragement to our agricultural interests. With an enlarging market for home products there is reason to believe that the pursuits of husbandry may become more remunerative to the large number of our citizens engaged in them. An important factor in the advancement of agriculture has been the Grange, with nearly 17,000 members. Its discussions and interchange of views have been of great benefit to farmers both industrially and socially.

A desire has been felt among the farmers of the State to have the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture given an increase of salary and assigned permanent quarters at the State House, thus enabling him to devote his whole time to the important duties of his office. Such a change appears to me in all respects desirable, and I commend it to your favorable consideration.

STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

On the thirtieth day of August last, a bill was passed by the Congress of the United States, appropriating a portion of the proceeds of the public lands to the more complete endowment and support of the colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts, established under the provisions of an act of Congress approved July 2, 1862. By virtue of this act, the Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts will receive the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for the year ending June 30, 1890, and an annual increase of the amount of such appropriation for ten years by an additional sum of one thousand dollars over the preceding year, until #t amounts to twenty-five thousand dollars, at which annual sum it will remain thereafter without further increase.

In addition to this, the general government supports the Agricultural Experiment Station, located at this college, at an annual expense of fifteen thousand dollars. This wise and

generous action on the part of the national government will place the college in good financial condition and will be a material relief to the tax payers of the State.

As no part of the appropriations to be made by Congress under the act of 1890 can be used for the erection of buildings, the Legislature will be called upon to replace the one known as Wingate Hall, which was destroyed by fire in February last. Other needs of the institution will be made known to you through the reports of its officers, which will soon be laid before you.

LABOR BUREAU.

The Labor Bureau, created, as the law plainly indicates, for the benefit of the working people of the State, is doing a valuable work, as the reports of the Commissioner will demonstrate. These bureaus, including that of the United States, now number twenty-two in the whole country. The importance of their work in collecting statistics relating to the various departments of labor, and inquiring into violations of the statutes providing for "the regulation of the hours of labor and the employment of women and children," have caused them to become recognized as indispensable national and state institutions, and entitle them to a liberal outlay for their support and maintenance.

PROHIBITION.

The past year has been an important one for the temperance interests of our State. For the first time since the adoption of the prohibitory amendment to our Constitution, the people of Maine have been afforded an opportunity to pronounce at the polls upon a movement looking to its repeal, and the substitution of the high license system. There was no uncertainty in their decision. By an emphatic majority they declared their belief that the best interests of temperance in this State, and the highest welfare of all our citizens, demand the maintenance of prohibition.

It cannot be denied that the law for the suppression of the liquor traffic is often violated, and that officials charged with its enforcement are frequently derelict in duty. But it is undoubtedly true that this condition of affairs is mostly confined to our cities and larger villages. In other places the law appears to have been faithfully and successfully administered. During the past two years I have personally written the officials in the various counties upon whom was devolved the duty of enforcing the law, urging the vital importance of the suppression of the dram shop. I did this that such officers might clearly understand that they would have the support of the Executive Department of the State in all their efforts to enforce prohibition.

That the various officers of the State, upon whom devolves this duty, have accomplished a great deal in the enforcement of the law, is everywhere conceded. It is, nevertheless. necessary to the highest success of prohibition that there should be in every community a strong temperance sentiment demanding a vigorous enforcement of the law and sustaining the officers in their efforts to secure it. When the sentiment against the liquor traffic is as universal and emphatic as against other forms of crime, the violations of the prohibitory law will be no more numerous than those of other penal That prohibition has accomplished a vast work for temperance in this State no candid man will deny. liquor traffic is no longer respectable. It is under the ban of popular condemnation. Those who engage in it are criminals in the sight of the law. The open dram shop with its flaunting signs and alluring windows, is no longer a feature in our State. The rumseller is forced into dark corners. He has been obliged, like other criminals, to resort to concealment and stealth, where, before the advent of prohibition, he pursued his traffic with openness and ostentation. whole traffic has been forever relegated to the furtive ways of crime. It is not easy to estimate fully the great temperance work which this change has wrought in Maine.

there still remains much to be done in so educating publicsentiment that it shall everywhere insist upon the faithful enforcement of the laws. Maine stands, by the emphaticdeclaration of her citizens, in the very van of temperance states. In keeping her there, the friends of prohibition must. spare no effort or shrink from no responsibility.

BALLOT REFORM.

I am firmly convinced that the time has come for Maine to adopt the Australian system of voting. Two years ago this method of balloting was largely viewed in the light of a doubtful innovation. Many members of the Legislature felt that the results which had followed its adoption by a few states of the Union were too meagre to furnish a proper basis for action in this State, especially as they were achieved under the temporary disadvantages naturally attendant upon the introduction of a new law effecting such important changes.

There is no longer reason for this conservatism. The Australian system of voting has safely passed its experimental era in this country. Its wisdom has been clearly established. To-day it is the law in more than one-third of the states in the Union, and there is reason to believe that the time is not far distant when its adoption will become general.

It is the sacred duty of popular government to maintain, in every possible way, the purity of the ballot. The nearer our elections come to fairly registering the personal convictions of each individual voter, the closer will they conform to the true spirit of our institutions. It is the concurrent testimony of those states which have made a trial of it, that the Australian ballot system comes nearer securing this desirable result than any other yet devised. There is no reason to doubt that, under its wholesome operation, intimidation and bribery will be practically unable to influence elections, and voters will be freed from unpleasant espionage at the polls. Another benefit that will accrue from the adoption of this

system of voting, will be found in the powerful incentive given political parties to nominate honest and capable candidates. The subject is one that calls for careful thought, and I commend it to your earnest consideration.

PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

Our system of public instruction includes three separate and yet related groups of schools: viz,—the Common Schools, the Free High Schools and the Normal Schools. For the support of these three groups during the last year, there have been expended the following sums:

Financially considered, therefore, this system is among the most important interests of the State. Considered with regard to the purposes which it is set to subserve—the training of intelligent, virtuous, order-loving and law-abiding citizens, it is one of the paramount interests of the State. Such a system may rightly demand our most careful, constant and intelligent consideration.

While the statistics and statements of the report of the State Superintendent of Common Schools show the Free High and Normal Schools to be in a most prosperous and satisfactory condition, they do not show as much for the more important Common Schools. These latter, the support of which is compulsory by law in every town in the State, and attendance upon which is also compulsory, should be so organized and managed as to give every child in every town equal privileges; to impose equal burdens for their maintenance; to be in the highest practicable degree efficient for the ends for which they were established; and to be least wasteful of public moneys. It is claimed by the Superintendent that the system, prevailing in nearly three-fourths of our towns, is defective in all

these particulars, and he recommends that, to remedy these defects, a law be enacted abolishing the school districts and giving the entire management of the schools to committees consisting of three or more members according to size of town. I bespeak for these important matters your most considerate action.

ENLARGEMENT OF STATE HOUSE.

The report of the Commission on enlargement of the State House will soon be laid before you. The extension is constructed throughout according to the most approved methods of fire-proof architecture. It is important that an appropriation to properly furnish it be made at an early day. I am of the opinion that a sufficient sum of money should also be appropriated to make the old State House fire-proof, and put it into condition to properly correspond with the new extension. I commend the subject to your favorable consideration.

During the year that has just drawn to a close, Hon. Lewis Barker, a member of the Commission, has passed away. No man took a deeper interest and pride in its work than he. To his sound judgment and practical grasp of affairs is due, in no small degree, whatever measure of success has attended its efforts. Mr. Barker served his State in many honorable positions and always with conspicuous faithfulness and ability. His memory will be tenderly cherished.

THE STATE LIBRARY.

Now that the State Library will soon be moved to its more convenient quarters in the new extension, I believe that the time has come to unlock, and render immediately available, all its vast treasures of information, by the adoption of the card system of cataloguing used in most of the larger libraries of the country. I am convinced that by the adoption of this system the practical utility of the Library would be enhanced fifty per cent. In an address sent out by the Association of State Librarians, an organization formed at St.

Louis in May, 1889, the functions of a state library were thus succinctly stated: "A state library should not only be a complete reference library for all branches of the government, executive, judicial and legislative, and the repository of all materials for local history and biography, but it should also contain and furnish abundant facilities for using all desirable books of information relating to special industries and pursuits of the state, or calculated to lead to the introduction of industries and pursuits suited to it, but hitherto neglected. In short, it should be fitted to serve all interests of the state by infusing into their conduct the highest intelligence and skill."

With the card system of cataloguing, a library conducted upon these lines may be made of great value to the State. The introduction of this system into a library containing 40,000 volumes, will, necessarily, involve a vast amount of work and considerable additional expense, but, once established, more cards can be placed in the alphabetical cabinets, as new books are added to the library, and thus the catalogue be, at all times, a complete index of its contents. I recommend that an additional appropriation be made for the temporary employment of extra help, specially skilled and experienced in this method of cataloguing, and for the purchase of such cabinets and other material as may be necessary to its adoption.

THE STATE MILITIA.

A gratifying advance has been made during the past few years in the character and efficiency of the State Militia. Both officers and men have worked with commendable zeal for the improvement of the service. At the annual muster in July last, the State was honored by a visit from Hon. Redfield Proctor, Secretary of War. A drenching rain storm, which was in progress during his stay at the camp, prevented him from reviewing the troops. He expressed himself as much pleased with the ground and its arrangement.

The money appropriated by the last Legislature for procuring a permanent muster ground, was expended in the purchase of the field used by the State for encampment purposes during the late war, and known as "Camp Keyes." It would be difficult, indeed, to find a place more admirably adapted to this purpose. The field contains something over sixtythree acres. It is an almost level stretch of table-land, situated upon a high elevation and commanding an excellent view of the surrounding country. Its soil is light and dry, with fine natural drainage. The sanitary conditions are all that could be desired. It was thought best to provide this field with such permanent buildings as would be required at Accordingly, a store house, four headquarters each muster. buildings, twenty-three cook houses, two commissary buildings and four horse stables were constructed there in a tasty and substantial manner. The expense of these buildings, together with the cost of improvements upon the land, amounted to \$8,762 60 and was taken from the military appropriation. These permanent improvements will result in a large annual saving of expense to the State.

Maine is one of the very few states in the Union whose Adjutant General is elected by the Legislature. I am convinced that this is wrong and contrary to the best military usage. There appears to be no sufficient reason why the Governor of the State should not be permitted to select his own chief of staff through whom all his orders, as Commander-in-Chief, must be given official utterance. I recommend that the Legislature submit to the people of the State, at the next election, an amendment to the Constitution authorizing the filling of the Adjutant General's office by executive appointment.

PENSIONS.

Two years ago I recommended that the request of the Grand Army Posts of Maine for an increase in the State pension fund, should be granted. For the years 1887 and 1888, the sum of \$70,000 was devoted to the worthy work of

the Pension Office. For the past two years the sum of \$125,000 has been expended by it, an increase of \$55,000 over the two preceding years. It would be difficult to estimate the great good that has been accomplished through this generous treatment of the sons of Maine who were disabled in the defense of the Union.

The patriotic people of the country were rejoiced at the enactment by Congress of the dependent pension law on the twenty-seventh day of June last. Its wise and liberal provisions have already been of vast benefit to the worthy veterans of the late war and those dependent upon them for support. It will doubtless accomplish a still larger work of good in the years to come.

THE GETTYSBURG MONUMENTS.

The monuments in honor of the sons of Maine who fell at Gettysburg, in the heroic defense of the Union, were dedicated upon that historic field, with appropriate ceremony, on the third day of October, 1889. The occasion was favored with perfect weather, and its sad and solemn exercises will never be forgotten by those who attended them.

The battle of Gettysburg marked the great crisis of the Rebellion. It was here that the armed hosts of treason were forever beaten back from loyal soil. In that mighty contest, so fraught with moment to our national life, no troops bore a more honorable part than did those from Maine. Well may the State cherish, in her heart of hearts, the immortal memory of their glorious defense of country in its darkest hour of peril. The beautiful monuments that mark the spots where they yielded up their lives, that the Nation might live, are but our feeble attempt to give material and visible expression to the deep and abiding love we cherish for their memories. We may confidently believe, that, centuries after these temporary tokens of affection shall have crumbled into dust, the heroes of Gettysburg will still live in the grateful remembrance of a united and prosperous people.

MILITARY AND NAVAL ORPHAN ASYLUM.

Within the past two years I have twice visited the Military and Naval Orphan Asylum at Bath. The Institution is under excellent management and doing a most worthy work. It is in every way deserving of generous support.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

The past two years have witnessed a general and gratifying industrial awakening throughout the State. industries have been established, and many old ones, which had long lain idle, have been invested with a new lease of The great natural resources of the State are coming to be more and more appreciated as affording excellent opportunities for the profitable investment of capital. Our healthful climate, and the rugged beauties of our long sea coast, are winning wide reputation, and a constantly increasing tide of summer travel is a growing source of revenue to our At no time since the war has the future of Maine looked brighter. Increased industries mean increased employment for labor, which, in turn, means an increased market for products of all kinds. Thus, every new impulse given our industrial life conduces to the general prosperity. last census did not show as large a growth in population as had been hoped for, it nevertheless showed a substantial gain. Close observers are of the opinion that nearly all this advance was made in the closing years of the decade, and that a census taken in its opening years would have shown a loss. If this be true, it gives good promise of a far better showing in the future. Now that the exodus of our citizens has been stayed, and we have fairly started upon an encouraging era of home development and growth, we may confidently look forward to rapid progress in all the material interests of the State, and to a corresponding increase of prosperity growing out of the enlarged demand for labor and its products. will be your duty and privilege to assist, in every way possible, in fostering and furthering this movement, so full of promise to our people.

THE WORLD'S COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION.

Before the convening of the next Legislature the arrangements for the great World's Fair to be held in Chicago in 1893, will have been practically completed. It will devolve upon you, therefore, to determine what part Maine is to take in that important exposition. Whatever place we may take there should be in every way worthy of the State and representative of its material prosperity. While it will be your duty to exercise a wise and prudent care of State expenditures, I am convinced that it would be a false and short-sighted economy that would place Maine before her sister states, and the world, in a position less strong than her industries and resources entitle her to hold. I regard this matter as one of great importance and recommend the appointment of a special committee to consider it in all its bearings.

RAILROADS.

The condition of the various railroads of the State will fully appear in the able and exhaustive report of the Railroad The statistics and recommendations which Commissioners. it contains are worthy of your thoughtful attention. erable has been done during the year in the construction of new roads and the improvement of old ones. The State is now fairly supplied with railroad communication. There is, nevertheless, a field for further enterprise in this direction. Nowhere is this more apparent than in the great fertile county of Aroostook, whose varied products are now forced to seek a market over Canadian soil. A direct line over Maine territory, affording Aroostook a convenient outlet to the great markets of the country, would give a mighty impulse to the development of the county and materially increase the prosperity of the whole State.

INSANE HOSPITAL.

The condition and needs of the State Insane Hospital are worthy of careful consideration. The welfare of the unfortunate people who are under its care should be zealously looked after. The new buildings, provided for by the last Legislature, have been erected under the careful supervision of the Board of Trustees and are in every way creditable to the State. The number of patients admitted to the institution the past year has been larger than during any former year of its history, necessitating the immediate completion and furnishing of these buildings at an expense somewhat in excess of the legislative appropriation. I would recommend that a sufficient amount be appropriated at an early day to liquidate this, and every other bill, which enters into the proper administration of the affairs of the Hospital. duties incumbent upon the officers of this institution are annually becoming more laborious. I feel justified in renewing the recommendation I made two years ago that the salary of the Superintendent be somewhat increased.

The Commission appointed under a resolve of the last Legislature to purchase a site for a new Insane Hospital has attended to its duties and an eligible location in the city of Bangor has been secured.

FISH AND GAME.

The valuable and interesting reports of the Commissioners of Fisheries and Game will be laid before you, and I earnestly commend the recommendations therein made to your careful attention. Everything possible should be done to sustain the Commissioners in enforcing the laws against those who wantonly violate them. Whatever the Legislature may be able to do to secure the better protection of fish and game, will advance the material interests of the State and merit the just approval of all its citizens.

THE PRESERVATION OF FOREST GROWTH.

The preservation of forest growth is a subject which is now attracting much attention. Its importance has brought about the formation of a number of worthy organizations for furthering this work. At the last meeting of the American Forestry Association at Quebec, in September last, the State of Maine was very ably represented by Hon. George F. Talbot of Portland. When it is considered that there is an annual loss by fires of growing timber in the United States equal to an area half as large as Maine, and that a very large per cent. of such fires are due to carelessness, the importance of this matter is at once apparent. It will merit your careful attention.

INDIANS.

The affairs of the Indian tribes appear to be in excellent condition. Moral and treaty obligations alike demand that these wards of the State should have our watchful care and protection.

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

This department is doing a most excellent work and has fully justified the wisdom of its establishment. The good results that have attended its well directed efforts in the interests of the public health are generally known and appreciated. Outside of a very few towns there has been no great prevalence of infectious diseases within the State during the past two years. It is of the highest importance that each town should be taithful in its observance of the health laws. The circulars of the State Board, and all other papers and blanks for the use of local boards of health, are furnished free to all the towns and cities of the State. In addition to these, specially important circulars for general distribution have been printed in large editions and freely circulated in most of the towns. It is highly important that there should be in the State an official registration of births and deaths.

Maine is behind all other New England States in failing to make proper provision for securing such vital statistics. The matter is one that deserves prompt attention.

THE STATE PRISON.

The affairs of the State Prison will be shown, by the report of its Warden, to be in excellent condition. In the sixteen years prior to 1886, the State appropriated \$297,287.21 for the support of the Prison, exclusive of salaries of its officers. Since that time it has received no appropriation from the State save for its pay-roll. In all other respects the Prison has been self-supporting. It begins the present year free from debt and with a balance of \$7,820.29 in its favor. The introduction of reformatory methods into the administration of its affairs has been attended with gratifying results. Everything that can be done towards reclaiming men from the ways of crime and making them respectable members of society, will merit the cordial approval and co-operation of all who have at heart the highest interests of the State.

THE STATE REFORM SCHOOL.

The highly creditable work which has been done by this institution is shown by the fact that about seventy-five per cent. of the boys who have gone forth from it have become respectable and law-abiding citizens, a record that speaks more eloquently than words for the excellence of its management. There have been 159 boys in the school during the past year. The present number is 114. Good health has prevailed among them, no death having occurred there during the year.

In 1889 there was erected a building 96 by 48 feet designed to accommodate fifty boys. This enables a good beginning to be made in the introduction of the cottage system, which permits the classification of these youths into family groups. The adoption of this system in other states has been attended with most satisfactory results. By a purchase in 1889, twenty

acres of land were added to the school farm, making a total of about 184 acres.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

The Industrial School for girls continues to do a most successful and worthy work. Its efforts are upon a broad, humane and philanthropic plane. The large measure of success that has attended them in the past entitles the School to continued encouragement and support.

STATE REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN.

An effort was made during the session of the last Legislature to secure an appropriation for the establishment of a State Reformatory for Women. The matter was finally left in the hands of the Governor and Council, with instructions to investigate it and report to the next Legislature. have accordingly given a public hearing, at which various friends of the project appeared and urged many forcible reasons why the State should have such an institution. report upon the matter will soon be laid before you. There are many grave objections to the custom now in vogue of keeping female prisoners in the various jails of the State, where proper provision has not been made for them, and where the associations are demoralizing. The enlightened moral sentiment of society demands a considerate treatment of women, even when they incur the penalties of the law. There can be no doubt that a State Reformatory under competent female management would result in vast good.

CONCLUSION.

The details of many of the subjects I have thus briefly touched upon, and of others which do not require specific mention at this time, will fully appear in the various public documents that will be placed before you.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives: As we turn to the important work of the session, we must

bear clearly in mind the fact that we are here not as the representatives of any special interests or sections of the State, but as the representatives of all interests and all sections. Let us act fearlessly and conscientiously for the furtherance of whatever, in our judgment, may be for the highest good of the whole State. At the same time, we should invoke, in all our deliberations, strength and guidance from Him who is the source of all wisdom. It is my earnest hope that, with the blessing of God, our labors here for the welfare of our beloved State may be crowned with such success as shall permanently advance its interests and make for the lasting benefit of all its citizens.

The following communication was received from the State Valuation Commission:

To the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives:

In reply to the joint Resolution of the Legislature, approved January 27th, 1891, directing the State Valuation Commission to report "without further delay," it has to say that the Commission entered upon the discharge of its labors at as early a day as practicable and has prosecuted them as promptly as possible under the The Commission is required, by the act and resolve under which it was appointed, to examine the valuations of the five hundred towns, cities and plantations for the years 1887, 1888, 1889 and 1890. The Commission has adjourned from time to time as circumstances seemed to warrant. Being required to examine the returns for 1890 the Commission was unable to enter upon that part of its duties earlier than Nov. 4th, having met in August when they were unable to proceed as but few of the assessors' returns for 1890 had then been received; that on the assembling of the Commission at that date a large part of the assessors' returns for 1890 had not been forwarded as required by law, though each city, town and plantation, had been specially requested to forward the returns at an earlier day and on blanks furnished for that pur-The Commission has used all reasonable pose early in the season. diligence to obtain the returns, and all have not yet been received.

The last return received by the Commission was on the twenty-second day of last month.

The Commission was obliged to return quite a number of the inventories for 1890, as well as for previous years, for explanation or correction, and in a few instances to require the presence of the assessors to explain. In about one hundred and fifty cases, assessors or others have appeared for hearings as to towns and cities, before the Commission.

These hearings could not be properly had until the valuation for 1890 was received. In addition to the towns and cities and plantations, the Commission has had at least four hundred pieces of wild or timber land containing about eight millions of acres, equal to three hundred and ninety one townships of twenty-two thousand and forty acres each to inquire in regard to, in order to ascertain their location, nature of the soil, kind and amount of growth; the distance from floatable water; expense of driving and value of stumpage, in order to fix their values to compare with other property.

The Commission has had at least seventy-five hearings in regard to timber lands involving the question hereinbefore indicated.

The Commission has investigated, in order to fix the value per spindle, twenty cotton mills, containing eight hundred and seventy-nine thousand eight hundred and seventy spindles, involving several lengthy hearings, also one silk mill, and forty-six woolen mills containing three hundred and twenty-four and one-half sets of cards and machinery, the sets of cards ranging from thirty-six to sixty inches in length. These investigations have required much time and great care, in order to fix an equitable valuation so far as possible. The extending of railroad facilities has stimulated new industries in some localities which have sprung up and which have required the special attention of the Commission.

Water and electric light companies and pulp manufactories have commenced operations in many places, which have required special effort, and the returns and much of the information concerning these enterprises, have not been obtained without much care and the exercise of unusual patience.

A large number of building, loan and trust companies have been organized which have required special attention.

The foregoing contains but a brief summary of the labors of the Commission. The Commission hope, in the progress of their labors,

to be able to make, within thirty days, a report which shall fix and equalize the values of the taxable property in the State as nearly as it is possible for them to do in the exercise of their best judgment, having regard to the evidence of values so far as they have been able to obtain them.

Every hotel on the coast of Maine, from Old Orchard to Eastport, that I have seen is a like tinder box.

The coast of Maine offers to the summer visitor peculiar attractions. He has come to stay and to draw others after him. He should not be roasted.

It seems to the writer that legislative action should be had in your State requiring and *enforcing* the erection of adequate fire escapes.

I have written to the Governor of your State on this matter and address you as a resident not only of the State but of Bar Harbor.

STATE OF MAINE.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, AUGUSTA, February 16, 1891.

To the Senate and House of Representatives:

It becomes my sad duty to announce to you the death of General William Tecumseh Sherman at his home in New York,

Saturday afternoon at 1.50 o'clock. The event is one that will be sincerely mourned by all patriotic citizens. It removes from our midst the last of that great trio of generals who won world-wide distinction in the great War of the Rebellion and whose names and achievements will be as enduring as the history of the great republic, whose integrity and free institutions they did so much to preserve and insure.

The career of General Sherman was a conspicuously honorable and patriotic one. He rose to great emergencies and became master of them. No man went before him in love of country. He died full of years and honors, in the warmest love and esteem of his fellow countrymen.

The whole nation mourns him. It is fitting that Maine should give expression to the profound sorrow that this sad event has brought to the hearts of her people.

Mr. RYDER of Penobscot said:

Mr. President and Senators: The nation has again been called upon to mourn over the death of one of its heroes; one whom, for more than a quarter of a century, they have loved to honor and have learned to love.

It is but fitting that we pause for a moment from the business in which we are engaged, to render homage to the dead hero, to pay tribute to his memory, and to show our appreciation of the services which he rendered his country.

It has ever been a custom, at all times and among all peoples, to render homage to dead soldiers; and our own country and our own people have not been exceptions to this rule of other countries and other peoples. For, in almost every village in this broad land, monuments are standing to-day as witness of our appreciation and our love for the memories of those men whose names are inscribed upon the rolls of honor beneath, and who sacrificed their lives for the preservation of their country and for the maintenance of its institutions. These things are as they should be; for, when a man is willing to sacrifice everything that is dear to him, home, friends, ambition, aye, and life itself if necessary, in the interest of his country and for future generations, he has created in his favor a debt that all the honors that may be heaped upon his memory fail to cancel.

A whole nation is to-day bowed with grief, recognizing the fact that the last of that galaxy of heroes whose true loyalty and consummate statesmanship brought the Rebellion to a successful close, is dead. Every Legislature in the land has paid, or will in some form pay just tribute to his memory. Therefore, I say, Mr. President, it is but fitting that the people of Maine, through their representatives here, show that they are not unmindful of the services which Gen. Sherman rendered his country while living, and pay that respect and homage to his memory which true loyalty and patriotism deserve.

It is not my purpose to review the life of the great general. has become part of the history of the country. Although educated a soldier, he had, prior to the war, abandoned military life; but we have every reason to believe that if he had not re-entered the army his superior qualities would have won him distinction in whatever pursuit he had followed. Recognizing the fact that his country had a claim upon him, he was one of the first to offer her his services. His far-seeing mind discerned clearly the magnitude of the struggle that was before the nation, and he knew that it was the beginning of a conflict that 75,000 men could not quell. In addition to his military training he brought with him into the army a fertile mind and a broad intellect, capable of seizing opportunities and of planning and carrying out successful campaigns. His successes are familiar to you all—at Shiloh, at Vicksburg, at Chattanooga—where his services were recognized by Congress-at Memphis and Atlanta his achievements are familiar to you all, and are matters of history. Gen. Grant was called to take charge of the armies of the Union, he was placed in that position which enabled him to carry out those great campaigns which have made his name famous wherever the science of war is known.

After he came out of the army, unlike many others, he preferred private life. He preferred not to receive those merited civil honors which the Republic would so willingly have conferred upon him. He was content to remain a leader of the American army and of those soldiers of whom he had led many to victory. Unlike many of his comrades, he lived to enjoy the blessings resulting from the victories which he helped to win. He lived to reap the fruits of his well-earned conquests. He has been recognized by the country, for the last quarter of a century, as a leader in many well-fought battles for the very existence of the nation; and during all these years he

has endeared himself to the people by his superior qualities, by his manliness, and has been loved by the soldiers whom he led.

No greater honor can be paid to his memory than to present his life as an example to the young men of the country. He needs no monument to perpetuate his memory, for it is enshrined in the hearts of a loyal and grateful people. And now, sir, I wish to express the sentiment of this Senate and of the people of Maine, by presenting to the Senate the following resolutions:

Resolved: That the Legislature of Maine learns with deep regret of the death of Gen. William T. Sherman, a great general, a true patriot and a citizen whom the nation has loved to honor and learned to love.

Resolved: That the tenderest sympathies of the people of Maine are present with his family in its time of grief, and that a copy of these resolutions be transmitted by the Secretary of State to the family of the deceased.

Resolved: That both branches of the Legislature, the House concurring, do now adjourn as a further mark of respect to the deceased.

Mr. WALTON of Somerset said:

Mr. President: Within a few moments I have been notified that I should be expected to second the resolutions just presented to this honorable body.

It is not and will not be necessary, Mr. President, for me to suggest that I am entirely unprepared for so important a matter. The remarks made by the Senator from Penobscot have been able and eloquent, and it only remains for me to second the resolutions presented by him.

I have to suggest, however, in addition to what the Senator has said, that during the dark hours of the Rebellion, while the issue of the great war, which was to settle the question as to whether this government of the people, for the people and by the people should stand as a government now and forever, was still undetermined, General Sherman in connection with General Grant planned a great and decisive campaign. While General Grant held the army of Lee upon the Potomac, General Sherman, the man who, a few days ago, yielded to the pale reaper, Death, cut loose from the base of his supplies, from the Government that supported him, from the friends that surrounded him; and commenced that famous march to the sea, an event which has never been paralleled in the history of mod-

ern war. For days the great heart of the mighty, loyal people of this country almost stood still, and they listened for every rumor which came upon the southern breeze, as to what might be the fate of General Sherman and that valiant army under his command.

The issue was not doubtful. We all know that through the efforts of such men as Gen. Sherman and Gen. Grant and others I have not time to name, the mightiest rebellion of history was crushed to the earth never to rise again. For several days past the great Gen. Sherman has been struggling with another great enemy, death, and has succumbed. His family now mourn him as a dead hero. The nation mourns him as a dead hero. The people keep his memory in tender recollection as a dead hero. Therefore I second the resolutions offered by the Senator from Penobscot and their reference and disposition.

And it was not a vote to accept the minority report.

On motion by Mr. LIBBY of Androscoggin, the majority report was accepted in concurrence.

Bill "An Act to amend section 54 of chapter 40 of the Revised Statutes, relating to the transportation of trout, togue and land-locked salmon, as amended by chapter 271 of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-five," which was passed to be engrossed by the Senate, March 10th, and sent to the House, came back from that branch amended by sheet "A," and the bill as amended indefinitely postponed.

Resolved: That both branches of the Legislature after due notice given according to the constitution will proceed to consider the adoption of an address to the Governor for the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, Judge of the Municipal Court of the city of Biddeford, Maine, for the causes following:

First: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety one, publicly appeared intoxicated.

Second: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine was, and to the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, continues to be notoriously subject to habits of intemperance.

Third: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine was, and to the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred

and ninety-one, continues to be notoriously subject to habits of immorality and licentiousness.

Fourth: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, held, presided over said municipal court of the city of Biddeford, determined causes and rendered judgments therein, heard complaints and issued warrants under the seal of said court, and his signature officially as judge thereof, for the arrest of divers people while in a state of intoxication himself.

Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, signed as judge of said court certain blank forms called jurats attached to forms prepared for the use of and in said court for complaints for violations of the laws of the State of Maine, in which forms and complaints the commission of crime or misdemeanor was alleged and complained against and of no person, and by no person complainant, signed and sworn to, and also signed officially as judge aforesaid certain blank forms called warrants, ensealing the same with the seal of said court, said forms for warrants being attached to said complaints, and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford and in Saco in the county of York, Maine, authorized to serve legal precepts issued by said court, to use as said officers saw fit and to meet the wishes of such officers, some of said pretended warrants appearing to authorize the entry and search of buildings and premises.

Sixth: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, signed and attested as judge aforesaid certain blank forms of certificates of bills of costs of and from the municipal court of the city of Biddeford aforesaid, in which no complainant was named, no respondent mentioned, no witnesses or officers stated as entitled to fees from the county of York and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford, authorized to serve legal precepts issued by said court, to use and fill as such officers thought fit.

Seventh: Because the said Charles S. Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, as judge of said court, signed and ensealed with the proper seal of said court certain mittimuses as issued from and by said court by virtue of the authority of said Hamilton as judge aforesaid, in which the name of no respondent appeared and in which no decree and adjudication of said court were stated, said mittimuses being in blank so far as names of respondents and decree of said court effecting respondents were concerned, and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford, authorized to execute legal precepts and mittimuses issued by and from said court, to hold and use as such officers wished.

Eighth: Because the continuance of such habits, acts and proceedings nullify the proper and just operation of law and its due execution and brings judicial proceedings into contempt and excites the disrespect of all.

Ninth: Because the safety of all legitimate pursuits of happiness and of those rights of life and liberty inalienable depends upon the personal integrity, purity and uprightness of character of the judges of the various courts of the State to a great degree.

Resolved: The House concurring, that these resolutions and statements of causes of removal be entered on the journal of the Senate. And that a copy of the same be signed by the President of the Senate and served on said Charles S. Hamilton by such person as the President of the Senate shall appoint for that purpose, who shall make return of such service upon his personal affidavit without delay, and that the twenty-seventh (27th) day of March, A. D. 1891, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, be assigned as the time when the said Charles S. Hamilton may be admitted to a hearing in his defense.

The resolutions were read, and Mr. ROGERS of Washington moved that they lie upon the table and be assigned for consideration on Monday next, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon.

The motion did not prevail.

They were then adopted and ordered entered upon the Journal of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. RYDER of Penobscot,

Ordered, That a copy of the resolutions adopted by the Senate on the 20th inst. declaring certain causes for the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, judge of the municipal court of the city of Biddeford, and providing for notice and hearing thereon, be transmitted to the House of Representatives for the information of that body and action thereon.

The resolutions with the action of the Senate endorsed thereon, were sent to the House of Representatives.

Subsequently they were returned from that branch indefinitely postponed.

IN JOINT CONVENTION, 11 O'CLOCK A. M.

Agreeably to the vote of the two branches of the Legislature, a joint convention was formed in the hall of the House of Representatives, for the purpose of considering the adoption of an address to the Governor for the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, judge of the municipal court of the city of Biddeford, Maine.

Hon. Charles F. Libby, President of the Senate, called the Convention to order and presided, agreeably to the rules adopted by both branches of the Legislature on March 25th.

The Secretary read the resolutions, comprising the charges preferred by the petitioners; and the president laid before the convention the order of service issued by him on Judge Charles S. Hamilton, and the return of the officer thereon, which were read by the Secretary and are as follows:

H. M. Heath of Augusta requested that there be entered on the records of the convention the names of Josiah H. Drummond of Portland, Benjamin F. Hamilton and Geo. F. Haley of Biddeford and himself as counsel for the respondent.

James O. Bradbury of Saco requested that there be entered on the records the names of Orville D. Baker of Augusta and himself as counsel for the petitioners.

And the convention so directed.

Mr. Heath then filed the following motion:

STATE OF MAINE.

In Joint Convention of the Senate and House of Representatives.

March 27, A. D. 1891.

In re, the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, judge of the municipal court of the city of Biddeford.

And now comes Charles S. Hamilton above named, and before making answer to the statement of causes of removal served upon him and recorded upon the Journal of the Senate, says:

First—That the first cause as set out, contains a statement of more than one offence, and save as to the first date therein alleged he has no sufficient or reasonable notice and in fact no notice whatever of the offences of which he is accused under said item.

Second—That the fourth cause alleges more than one offence, and save as to the misdemeanor in office alleged on the first date therein named, he has no notice whatever of the misdemeanors therein charged against him.

Third—That the fifth cause alleges several offences all of which should be distinctly and independently averred. As stated, your respondent has no notice of the number of offences, nor the time of their alleged commission, save only as to the first date therein stated.

Fourth—That the sixth and seventh causes, for the reasons above stated, give your respondent no notice of the misdemeanors of which he is accused, so that he may prepare his defence. Wherefore, inasmuch as the offences sought to be alleged in causes first, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh are not in their nature continuing offences, but, on the contrary, are distinct, single and independent, your respondent says that they should be averred with such distinctness and precision that he may have reasonable notice of the charges against him.

Your respondent prays that the petitioners may be ordered to forthwith file a bill of particulars of the various offences charged under causes first, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh.

Mr. Heath claimed that the causes set up in the resolutions were not such as to give a fair and reasonable notice to the defense. The first cause, in relation to the appearance of the defendant in public in an intoxicated condition, he claimed should be accompanied by a bill of particulars. The fourth cause in relation to Judge Hamilton's administration of justice in court while in an intoxicated condition, should also be accompanied by a bill of particulars. The same thing was true of causes 5th, 6th and 7th.

Mr. Baker claimed that the first charge was alleged with all the precision of a criminal indictment. At the same time there was no objection on the part of the counsel for the petitioners to giving the defense the fullest information. Of course the important thing in the case was to get at the facts, and the dates of the offenses charged would be ascertained as nearly as possible and furnished to the convention.

Mr. Heath said that he only asked for the selection in the causes of a certain number of offences and as close an approximation to the dates as possible. He simply asked that the number of offences should be specified in the bill of particulars and the dates for the same given as nearly as possible. He stated that in view of the unspecific nature of the charges the defense had not as yet summoned witnesses.

The President of the convention stated that he would give his ruling in regard to these preliminaries at the afternoon session.

At 11.55 o'clock A. M., the convention took a recess until 2 30 o'clock P. M.

Mr. RYDER of Penobscot offered amendment "B" to the "Rules of procedure at the joint hearing in the matter of Charles S. Hamilton," as follows: Amendment "B"—By adding after the word "evidence" in the sixth line in rule 4 the following words: "Procedure, practice and pleading;" which was adopted;

Sent down for concurrence.

Consideration of bill "An Act to provide a more perfect collection of taxes," was resumed, and pending the discussion at 1.15 P. M.,

On motion by Mr. POWERS of Aroostook the Senate took a recess until 2.15 o'clock P. M.

2.15 O'CLOCK, P. M.

On motion by Mr. THATCHER of Penobscot, "Resolve establishing a valuation of the State of Maine," was taken from the table and the same Senator offered amendments "F," "G," "H," "I" and "J," which were adopted;

Mr. WALTON of Somerset offered amendment "K," which was rejected;

The resolve was then read the second time and passed to be engrossed as amended by sheets "A," "B," "F," "G," "H," "I," and "J."

At 2.30 o'clock the session was suspended and the Senate proceeded to the hall of the House of Representatives.

IN JOINT CONVENTION—AFTERNOON.

Called to order by the President.

Mr. Heath stated that the counsel for the petitioners had agreed to file with him the specific charges as fast as received. He desired the secretary to enter on the records a general denial on the part of the respondent of each and all the charges.

Mr. Bradbury opened the case for the petitioners. Following is a brief abstract of his remarks:

"The only barrier between us and wrong and injustice is the purity of the judiciary of the State, and it is our boast and pride that that great department of government is composed of pure, upright, incorruptible citizens of Maine. In view of this fact, our fathers provided a way by which, if a man elevated to that high position proved unworthy of his trust, he might be removed. If the charges alleged in the case under consideration are true, the judge is not fit for the position he holds. If the charges are not true it is due to the respondent that they be swept away, and his high name and char-

acter re-established. This court over which the respondent presides, a municipal court, is one that demands with even more emphasis than a police court, that it should be presided over by a man of purity and uprightness. One of the highest and most solemn duties rests upon you. We shall offer in evidence facts which will go to prove that the respondent has publicly appeared intoxicated. witnesses may not be able to give the exact dates of these occurrences, but while, gentlemen, you may be able to recall that last summer was a rainy season, you may not be able to give the exact date of any particular shower, because they were of such common We shall be obliged in the course of the evidence to occurrence. introduce testimony to show that the respondent has been seen in the company of common women of the street in the Biddeford House and in other places; that he has been seen walking and driving in the streets with women of that description. We shall call your attention to another feature of the case. Under our constitution the liberty of our citizens is jealously guarded. We shall introduce evidence to show you that the respondent not only signed jurats attached to complaints, but signed blank warrants attached to the same and officers have taken those warrants as if filled out and signed in legal form. We shall also show you that mittimuses have been signed and sealed by the judge and handed to the officers to fill out, and such officers have been improperly allowed to take such mittimuses carry them away. Ι you and it rests with you to say presented the facts to whether, acting upon the responsibility of your oaths as legislators of the State of Maine, you shall either set the seal of your condemnation upon the respondent in an address to the Governor, or say 'We approve and we give to the world and say to the respondent, you the endorsement of the highest court and the most solemn tribunal that can be convened in the State of Maine."

The following witnesses, summoned in behalf of the petitioners, were then duly sworn before the president of the convention, and gave in their testimony, viz:

On motion by Senator Ryder of Penobscot, at 5.45 P. M., the convention adjourned until 11 o'clock A. M., Saturday.

IN SENATE, 5.50 P. M.

Mr. RYDER of Penobscot gave notice that to-morrow morning he should offer an amendment to section 90 of chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes.

Mr. SPEAR of Kennebec presented "Resolve for the expenses of the Committee on Education in visiting Normal schools," and on motion by same Senator the rules were suspended, the resolve read twice and passed to be engrossed;

Mr. CHAPIN from the Committee on Mines and Mining, submitted their final report;

Mr. MALLET from the Committee on Financial Affairs on "Resolve in favor of delegates to Farmers National Congress," reported that the same ought not to pass;

Which reports were each accepted.

The same Senator from the same committee on "Resolve for the purchase of Fort Kent in the county of Aroostook, and to repair and preserve the same," reported that the same ought not to pass.

On motion by Mr. POWERS of Aroostook, the Senate refused to accept the report, and passed the resolve to be engrossed;

The same Senator from same committee, on "Resolve making an appropriation for furnishing certain rooms assigned to State officers," reported that the same ought to pass;

Which report was accepted, the resolve read the second time and passed to be engrossed.

Severally sent down for concurrence.

Mr. HAINES from the Committee on Legal Affairs on bill "An Act to legalize the doings of school district number five in the town of Eddington," reported that the same ought to pass,

Which report was accepted, the bill read once and Monday assigned for its second reading.

Mr. ADAMS from the Committee on Public Buildings, to which was referred the report of the commission upon the enlargement of the State House, submitted the following report:

First—They referred the legal questions involved in the report of the commission to Senator Spear, as a sub-committee, whose opinion has been adopted as the report of the committee and is submitted herewith:—

To the Chairman of the Committee on Public Buildings:

In accordance with the instruction of your committee to me, to inquire into the legality of the expenditures of the Commission created by the laws of 1889, to supervise the enlargement of the State House, I have performed that duty, and herewith submit my report:

The report of the Commission to the Legislature would, upon its face indicate an overdraft of the appropriation for the enlargement of the State House, but upon investigation I find as a matter of fact that the Commission did not overdraw the appropriation, and that the apparent overdraft results from the expenditure from the contingent fund and the appropriation for furniture and repairs, said overdraft being expended principally for the boiler house and furnishing the house of representatives.

This leaves but two questions for consideration: First, did the Commission have a legal right, under the clause in the resolve which says "and for the reasonable expenses of the Commission," to take salaries? Whether the expenses were "reasonable," that is, too high or too low, is a question of fact, not of law, which I am not required to discuss. The question then arises: Is the phrase "reasonable expenses," or so far as the law is involved, the term "expenses," as used in the resolve, limited merely to the money actually paid out by the Commission, or is it broad enough to cover the salaries of commissioners? I think it covers both.

This is undoubtedly the construction the two able lawyers on the Commission put upon the resolve, and probably without any examination of the authorities, but on the generally accepted principle that neither states nor individuals expect to receive the benefit of a valuable service without due compensation therefor. In the absence of any authority to the contrary, this proposition might properly be left with the construction placed upon it by the lawyers on the Commission, on the ground that in the absence of such authority the opinion of the lawyers on the Commission is as good as the opinion of equally good lawyers off. But there is both authority and precedent for the action of the Commission in taking salaries.

Volume 4, Opinions of the Attorneys General of the United States, page 577, Nathan Clifford, Attorney General, says: act of March 3, 1847, the warrant to which my attention has been drawn declares that the sum of \$6,000 is appropriated to defray the expenses of the Commission now sitting under the treaty between the United States and the Cherokee Indians, and the fact that the money is placed at the discretion of the President. The first act under which that Commission sat appropriated a certain sum for compensation to two commissioners and pay of secretary and for contingent expenses. The word 'contingent' is dropped in the act of 1847, and the language is 'that the sum of \$6,000 be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated, placed at the discretion of the President, to defray the expenses of the Commission now sitting under the treaty,' etc. The words are general, to pay the expenses of the Commission, and must be understood to include the salaries of the board, as well as incidental expenses. When Congress appropriates a sum to pay the salary of an officer and expenses, they must mean those expenses which are necessarily incident to the work to be done, and where a duty is placed upon an officer, the performance of which necessarily involves travel, clerk hire, office rent, etc., a broad provision for expenses will include the cost of such travel, clerk hire, office rent, etc.," 22 Court of Claims, 269-277, Dunwoody's Case.

Salary and compensation for services are expenses.

During the entire administrations of Washington, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and the first term of Madison, sometimes by special act and sometimes in the general appropriation acts, the provisions for the diplomatic corps consisted of so much money "for the expenses of foreign intercourse," to be expended in the discretion of the President. Under these acts, the President fixed the salaries of all our foreign ministers, consuls and envoys, and these salaries were paid out of the sums thus appropriated, 7 Attorneys Gen. Ambassadors and other public ministers of the Opinion, 186. United States. William L. Marcy, Secretary State, Caleb Cushing, Attorney General. In Byers vs. U. S., 22, Court of Claims, 125, the court, (Davis, Judge,) refers to this opinion in defining the term expenses and says "during the whole of Jefferson's term and part of the terms of other early presidents, Congress annually appropriated a sum in gross for the expenses of intercourse with

foreign nations, leaving it to the executive to fix the salaries of its several appointees.

In Dixon vs Bell, 1st Starkey, N. P. C, 287, in a case involving the services of a physician in an allegation that the plaintiff had been put to great expense for medicines, etc., the Court says, the word "expense" does not necessarily mean expense of money, for "expense of his moneys" is a phrase well known to the law, and if the plaintiff had been a solicitor and had spent his time in personally investigating the title, he might have truly alleged that he had been put to expense. There are numerous other decisions which show that when money is appropriated "to pay expenses," it must mean "those expenses which are necessarily incident to the work to be done."

I deem these citations sufficient to establish the legal proposition that the Commission had a right to pay themselves salaries under the resolve of 1889.

The second question involved in connection with this report is, whether the Governor of the State could legally take compensation for his services as a member of the Commission, even admitting that the other members of the Commission could legally do so.

No objection can be based on section 6, article 4 of the Constitution which says, "the Governor shall at stated times receive for his services a compensation, which shall not be increased or diminished during his continuance in office." "Receive for his services" as what? As Attorney General? No. As Secretary of State? No. Simply and solely for his services as Governor. This section, then, can have reference to no other office or employment.

He received as Commissioner no addition to his salary as Governor. In Lowe vs. Brackett, 47 Cal. 364, the Court say in regard to the right of the Attorney General to receive compensation for services as examiner, in addition to his salary, under a constitutional provision in substance like ours, that "after having thus performed his service which under the constitution is wholly foreign to his office and which is not and cannot become a part of his official duty as Attorney General, and if the legislature has seen fit to compensate him for this unofficial service, there is no constitutional impediment to hinder them from so doing." Article 5, Part first, Sect. 5 of the Constitution reads, "No person holding any office or place under the United States, this State, or any other power, shall exercise the office of Governor."

Was a position on the commission under the resolve of 1889, an "office or place" within the meaning of the Constitution? I think not.

It is obvious that office and place are used in the Constitution as synonymous terms, and apply to a constitutional office. Art. 9, Sec. 1 of the Constitution reads: "Every person elected or appointed to either of the places or offices provided in this Constitution, etc.," which very clearly confirms the above interpretation.

In Brown vs. The People, 45 Ill. 397, the Court says: "The only question presented by the record is this 'Are the commissioners appointed by the Act of Feb. 25, 1867, entitled "An Act to provide for the erection of a new State House," officers within the meaning the 2 sect. of the 4th Art. of the 23 Sect. of the 5th Art. of the Constitution of the State?"

After making a distinction between an office and employment, and that the commission came under the latter, the Court further says: "No tenure of office is fixed by the act, no permanency is attached to it, nor is there the slightest connection with the exercise of any portion of the Executive power, and no intention manifested in the act itself to establish an office. The appointees are to perform a duty single in itself, which the legislature could not of and by itself perform, that is, to superintend the erection of a State House and disburse moneys the legislature may appropriate to such purpose. No power is given to levy taxes and no government act is to be performed by them. It is only by the advance of civilization and refinement that costly edifices are erected for worship or legislation. Government can be administered without such structures, and an agent who superintends their erection cannot with any propriety be said to perform a function of government."

There are numerous decisions which make the distinction between an office and an employment.

Land Agent not an officer but an employee, 3rd Maine, 481. Liquor Agent same, 67, Me., 63.

An officer for service rendered in his official character can charge nothing in excess of his salary, but for services performed in his individual capacity he is on equal footing with other individuals. See Harris & Gill, Md. 57th p. Same principle cited and confirmed 60th Md., 309. State vs. Weston, 4th Neb., 234. Secretary of State acting as Adjutant General held he was entitled to compensation therefor as well as salary of Secretary of State. In Crossman

vs. Nightingill, in 1st Nev., 323, the Lieut. Gov. was made ex officio warden of the State Prison by the legislature. Held he was entitled to pay for services as warden in addition to salary as Lieut. Governor.

It seems to me very clear from the numerous authorities on the subject that a position on the State House Commission was an employment and not an office, and that the Governor in serving thereon was in no way acting within the scope of his office as Governor, and that he was clearly entitled to compensation for his services.

In conclusion I will cite one more precedent which I think will, by implication, be conclusive of the whole question at issue.

Article VI, section 2 of the Constitution reads, "The justices of the Supreme Judicial Court shall, at stated times receive a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward." Section 6 reads, "The justices of the Supreme Judicial Court shall hold no office under the United States, nor any state, nor any other office under this State, except that of justice of the peace."

It will not be questioned that these two sections as closely confine a justice of the supreme court within the lines of his office as the sections before cited confine the Governor within the lines of his.

Still under these restrictions Chief Justice Appleton, on the twenty-ninth of December, 1876, received from the State \$250, under a resolve approved February 24, 1875, appointing him to arrange the constitution as amended, under appropriate titles, etc. It is worthy of notice in this connection that the chief justice suggested the propriety of payment for his services. In a letter to the Secretary of State, dated September 18, 1876, he says:—"Whatever the honorable council shall deem a suitable and sufficient compensation will be entirely satisfactory to me."

I think this case furnishes a strong and, in the absence of direct authority to the contrary, conclusive precedent in establishing the constitutional right of the Governor to perform any service in an employment which does not fall within his official duties, and receive compensation therefor.

IN JOINT CONVENTION.

Called to order by the President.

The following witnesses summoned in behalf of the petitioners, were duly sworn before the President of the convention and gave in their testimony, viz:

Miss Letina Genn of Kennebunkport, Fred H. Page of Kennebunk, James W. Small, (a deputy sheriff) of York county.

Mr. Baker stated that this closed the case for the petitioners.

Mr. Heath then opened the defense. Following is an abstract of his remarks:

This is the first time, I believe, in the history of the State of Maine, that any cause raising questions of fact under this constitutional clause has been submitted to the Legislature. Thirty-five years ago this proceeding was used against a distinguished judge of the Supreme Court, but in that case there were no issues of fact, and at this time it may be safe to say that there were no issues of law. So that you have no precedents for the trial of a case like

this. It is a matter of serious question how far, under the constitution, it is within the province of the Legislature to inquire into the private life of any of its civil officers. There are some remarkable features of this case. I think it stands as a conceded fact that for seven years Judge Hamilton has presided over this court with fairness, justice, honor and integrity—a court with broad jurisdiction and of more than ordinary responsibility. And yet, with all its vast amount of criminal and civil business for seven years, no living being comes here or will come here to say that in a single judicial act has Judge Hamilton done the State or a respondent injury, that there has been aught of wrong, of corruption, of partiality in a single judicial act from the time he took the oath of office down to the present day.

Further than that, he has a record for accuracy of judgment, measured by the result of the few appeals taken from his decisions, that any judge, municipal, superior, or even supreme, might well envy. So much for the public side of this case. Now against this, what charges of misdemeanor in office are made? I must confess that I am surprised that charges five, six and seven have ever been laid before this Legislature. Charge five, that he had issued blank warrants and had armed the officers of Biddeford and Saco with power to go out and arrest, right and left, whomsoever they might desire; and charge six, that he had armed them with blank bills of cost; and charge seven, that he had armed them with blank mittimuses, in order that you might have before you the idea that officers armed with blank warrants, blank mittimuses and blank bills of cost had all the machinery of the court and could set up and do criminal business upon the highway or wherever they pleased. it was a serious charge, out as proven, it is pitiful that the charge should ever have been made. I take it that you all understand what a search warrant is that runs against a railroad corporation. sel for the petitioners, innocently, I have no doubt, stated that warrants had gone out into the hands of officers that endangered the personal liberty of the citizens of Biddeford and Saco. lawyer sitting upon the floor of this Legislature knows that in every city of this State where there is a municipal court where freight trains are coming in by night and depositing their liquors, in order to curtail that business in the slightest degree it is necessary for blank warrants to be lodged in the hands of the officers, precisely as they were in this case. Now as to the bills of cost, where are they?

evidence is offered in regard to them and why should the charge ever have been put in here? I think it will be difficult for my learned brother to suggest any possible use to which any officer could put the blank bill of costs that had been signed by the judge. It is matter of familiar knowledge that bills of cost go to the county commissioners, but behind it has to be produced the original warrant, and, if the county commissioners call on for it, the docket of the court. Their bills of cost go to the supreme or superior court, or appellate criminal court, and go up as a part of the appeal papers of the case. some person in their ingenuity tell me how a blank bill of costs signed by the judge, even if it was in the possession of the city marshal, could ever be used by him? It is an utter impossibility. I need not refer to the matter of mittimuses. That is so fresh in your minds that you see every mittimus has been produced here as the usual thing laid over into the hands of the committing officer, he agreeing, as matter of accommodation to the judge, as he went on to try another case, to fill it out from another warrant on which there had just been a conviction, but in all these cases the parties afterwards paying their fines there was no use for the paper. to the matter of intoxication I have this to say: I don't believe that this convention will be satisfied after the evidence is all in, that Judge Hamilton has sat intoxicated in court. I don't believe this convention will be satisfied that Judge Hamilton has been publicly intoxicated or subject to habits of intoxication during the past two Some three or four years ago—the Judge will state it to you in his own way-he did commence to use intoxicating liquors more Up to that time, except when he was a boy, after he had arrived at the age of manhood and after he was married he had not, I say, for a great many years used intoxicating liquors at all, but has to some extent during the past three years. The first time of intoxication that is selected under the petitioner's case is upon this election day of March, 1890. Now, gentlemen, we shall carry you by witnesses through the entire day into the evening and show you, although the burden is not upon us, that he was not intoxicated privately or publicly or in court. They had a day of great excitement, and out of the excitement and the animosities and the malice of that day have grown these charges and this bill, and I think of that you will be satisfied. We shall satisfy you that Judge Hamilton has never been intoxicated in court and that he has not publicly

appeared intoxicated, and certainly is not in the city of Biddeford or in the county of York to day notoriously subject to habits of intemperance. The charges with relation to licentic sness we shall meet with flat and emphatic testimony. This is a matter of life and death to my client. No greater issue could be put to a Legislature. We must ask you to be patient and to give us so much of your time as is reasonably necessary in order to get at what may be the truth, and after the determination of the truth, in order that you may do only what is just.

IN JOINT CONVENTION—2 O'CLOCK P. M.

Called to order by the President.

Hon. H. M. Heath of Augusta, counsel for the respondent, addressed the convention. An abstract of his remarks follows:

Gentlemen of the Convention: It is a matter of a good deal of regret to me that so great a responsibility should be put upon me in the trial of this cause, because it involves so much for the State and so much for the respondent that if I had my choice in the matter I should prefer that this part of the duty should have fallen into other Here is a young man 34 years of age, standing upon the very threshold of life, brilliant in intellect, cultured in mind, well born, well connected, with every prospect for a life of usefulness to himself, to society and to the State, who finds himself confronted with an issue which, if decided against him, assuredly blasts all hopes that he and his family and those about him may have, arising from the fact that before these charges were made here, at a time when the sincerity and honesty of his motives could not be questioned, he had put aside for all time to come the vice which, if persisted in and not conquered in his early life, would of itself have ruined him and made him a useless and unworthy member of society. Mr. President, the respondent is not on trial for what he has done. He is not on trial here to be punished. This is not an impeachment trial, but a hearing that addresses itself to the legislative discretion of each of these branches, and after you have heard the testimony, after you have dissolved this convention, and after, in the executive and secret session of your rooms that the constitution contemplates, each branch shall then take up whatever address may be submitted to you, and then when the responsibility falls upon you, I submit that the one issue to be addressed to your minds is not what has the respondent done, but what is the respondent to-day; what do we believe that he will be in the months and years to come? Mr. President, is there anything in these charges, is there anything in the proof that compels this Legislature to say that there is anything in the respondent to-day or will be in his life to come that makes it a matter of absolute and stern duty upon your part to say that you will meet him at this hour of his life and say to him that you will not reach out a helping hand to him, but that you will apply the doctrine of an eye for an eye and a tooth for

The learned counsel who formulated these charges, either a tooth? from study or instinctively, has framed them upon that line that there are limits to the moral right of this Legislature in the application of proof to the charges and in the application of the charges to the subsequent address. Grouped, the charges are notorious habits of intoxication, not mere habits of intoxication, because the counsel said that mere habits of intoxication alone would not be sufficient, and formulates his charges upon the notoriety of the habits of intoxication, and with like reasoning he formulates his third charge not upon habits of licentiousness and immorality but upon the notoriety of those habits, because there could be nothing in the vice committed in secret with which the public or the State could have aught to do or aught to complain of. The fourth charge comes with the allegation of a grave and weighty misdemeanor in office-that he has sat upon the bench and has issued warrants, has heard complaints, has adjudicated causes when himself in a state of intoxication, an offense which, if true, would subject the incumbent of the office to impeachment and would weigh heavily upon your conscience as legislators in the matter of the exercise of that broad legislative discretion, which, after all, must be the rule to govern this case. And then the consolidated charges, fifth, sixth and seventh, that he has issued blank warrants and that he had endangered the personal liberties of the citizens of Biddeford and Saco by so doing, and that he had issued blank bills of costs and blank mittimuses to the officers of Biddeford and Saco, thereby endangering the liberties of the people of those two good cities. These three charges, of course, if true, are charges of misdemeanor and malfeasance in office. I propose to consider just what to my mind is the most serious and the most grave charge in the entire list, and that is that Judge Hamilton has sat upon the bench in a state of intoxication. Is there a member of this Legislature who can honestly believe that the petitioners have even approached the outermost limits of the necessities of proving that grave and weighty charge? I admit the power of this convention to do as it pleases, because you are judges of the law and of the facts. I admit that there is no restraining influence over you save that sense of justice that you must have for the respondent, and upon the other side a stern sense of duty that always influences a Maine Legislature. * * The notoriety is the gist of the offence, for, of course, if a judge of any court was publicly and notoriously a violater of law, and if it were a matter of notoriety and a matter

of common knowledge, respect for his decisions would cease. And if he stood up in it defiantly and unrepentant, and said, "I have done it and will do it," why, manifestly it would be the duty of the Legislature to see to it that the ulcer was removed from the body politic. I wish, Mr. President, there were some precedents or some better definition of your powers in this matter, but of course, what I say I qualify and intend qualify with the statement that they are simply my opinions. How far can the State of Maine go in the application of facts connected wholly with the private life of one of its officials? Suppose one of the members of this Legislature is on trial before. the bar of this House to be expelled, what are the limits of your Suppose the highest officer of this State were on trial before the only body that could try him, the Senate of the State, how far could that Senate inquire into his private life? It is an important consideration in this case. As I stated to you in my opening, and the close of it confirms me, there is no litigant to come here to say that for seven years has Judge Hamilton ever sat or decided upon his cause save with honor, integrity and impartiality. That is true, is it not? It stands here as a conceded fact that during these years, although he has had broad jurisdiction, that no lawyer has taken exception from his rulings to the law court-not one. He is a brilliant man intellectually, standing at a time in his professional life when most men are first beginning to learn that law is a science, a philosophy and a system, and seeming to have been gifted with a mind that has early taken in the broad principles of the great system of law that has made English speaking people the masters of civilization. So much so that he has carried on during all these years an extensive private practice, facing the best lawyers of the State and the greatest criminal causes of that county, employed in more than one capital cause, where the life of a human being is hanging in the balance, trusted by his people with their honor, their fortunes and their business, and no client to come here and say that he ever did him wrong, no business man of York county to come here and say that any advice that he ever gave in his office of counsellor at law has ever done his neighbor wrong, and with the thousands of criminal cases that he has had, no man can come here and say that he has dealt out justice save with honor, with integrity, with fair-No man comes here to say that he has at any time violated his oath of office. It is not claimed that he has ever

wounded the State. Now he wants to know why, having committed no offense against the dignity of his office, having done the public no wrong, having honestly, faithfully, impartially, accurately and brilliantly performed the judicial duties of his office, at this hour of his life when the scales have fallen from his eyes, when his father, his aged mother, his wife, stand by him; when the best people of his city surround him with strong protecting arms, testifying by their presence they have faith in him, he wants to know whether, because of past offences, past indiscretions, acts that were of the dead ages gone, he is not to be met half way by the loving, charitable sentiment of the people of this State. There are crimes that are unpardonable. If the hand of justice be crossed with the silver and gold of bribery, it must be because the nature of that judge is so wicked that in the contest between good and evil the latter con-Judge Hamilton stands before you, as I say, tinually triumphs. guilty of no offerse save that of having at times drank intoxicating liquors. I thank the convention for the dignity, fairness and patience with which this case has been tried, and I leave to you a young man's life for you to say whether it shall be saved or wrecked.

Hon. Orville D. Baker of Augusta, addressed the convention in behalf of the petitioners. He said:

"Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Convention—If this were a matter affecting or concerning only a private individual, I should certainly not have troubled you with my presence here. The criminal courts of this State would have been sufficient to pass upon and settle that question, and this great convention, representative of the common purity and sobriety of the citizens of this whole State, would not need to have gathered, or to have withdrawn itself from its appropriate and ordinary business to sit here in grave assembly.

But, Mr. President, this convention is gathered to discharge a far different duty. I cannot quite agree with the spirit of the argument of my learned friend upon the other side, that this question involves nothing more or higher than the guilt or innocence of a single individual under specified charges. The question here is, shall the reserved right sheathed within this clause of the constitution under which you are assembled—shall that sleeping sword of justice which the framers of our constitution put there, be drawn when the testimony before you proves that the public justice of this State is being affronted and betrayed? Shall it be drawn when evidence before

you shows that the cleanly and pure administration of the law in this State is in peril? What is it upon which the State of Maine depends for the execution of her laws? These great tribunals called judicial, which stretch at once their arm and shield across and over the people of this State, depend for the execution of their decrees upon—what? Not upon the force of arms or armies, not upon the mere power that is reserved to summon to their execution the sheriff or his posse, but upon an unshaken public confidence which lies beneath and behind the decisions of the tribunals that utter them, and gives respect to those decisions and certainty to their enforcement.

What is the effect and consequence of the thing you are asked to do here? You cannot by any action taken here under this clause of the Constitution, pass upon and determine the absolute guilt or innocence even of this respondent. But these two branches in joint convention now, and separately afterwards, are to be called on to pass on this question: Do the interests of public justice, does the need to have the law administered by law-observers, and not by law-breakers, demand that we should lay this case before the Governor and Council for their calm consideration and judgment, advising that this judge should be removed? If you refuse upon your consciences to set up a standard of judicial life and conduct in this State which shall be open to the charge of wantonness, of lack of sobriety, of lust, and finally of crime, then it will be in your power to adopt such form of address as you shall see proper, and lay that before a co-ordinate branch, the Governor and his Council, for their deliberate consideration.

Now under what Constitutional power does this convention act? Under the clause of the Constitution that authorizes the two branches to request the removal by address of any public officer upon cause specified."

Mr. Baker referred to the importance of the Biddeford municipal court and its broad jurisdiction, and said that this convention must look scrupulously into the conduct of the judge presiding over so august a tribunal. He went over the matter of the alleged illegally-executed papers, reviewing the testimony on that point and claiming that the liberties of the people are endangered when a judge permits such papers in blank to pass into the hands of a subordinate officer, bearing the judge's signature. Passing to the charge of public intoxication on the streets of Biddeford, he stated that he proposed to consider a class of testimony that stands undisputed by any out-

side witness. Reputable citizens of the city of Biddeford had testified to seeing this judge of their court, whose duty it was to observe and enforce public order, upon the main thoroughfare of the city of Biddeford, in the broad daylight, publicly intoxicated, staggering, as the witnesses describe it, in his walk. "Is it possible it has come to this, that a judge upon the bench of the State of Maine can be seen upon the public streets of his own city where he is to enforce order—in violation of that order, staggering intoxicated. and yet that there is no power, or, as the counsel upon the other side says, no 'moral right' to exercise this great constitutional prerogative and pronounce that course of conduct unfitting, unsuitable, and indecent to the administration of public justice?" Mr. Baker then referred to the charges of gross immorality and licentiousness, and recapitulated the testimony in relation to the judge's walking and driving with common women of the town. "Judge Hamilton had sworn as to one of these girls, that he never knew her reputation until February of this current year, when every man, woman and child in the whole community of Biddeford and Saco and the neighboring towns knew by common report and repute that she was a woman of the street; and yet the judge of this municipal court, whose business is with the criminal end of society, testified that he was innocent of knowledge of the character of the woman whom he was driving notoriously through the public streets. testimony of the various witnesses in relation to the judge's occupying the same room with prostitutes and women of the town, is strong and unimpeachable, and sufficient testimony has been introduced to convict him of adultery in any court of law."

In closing Mr. Baker said: "Now that the clamor of this great debate and cause will soon be still, as of old after the wind, the earthquake and the storm, there is to come that still, small voice in the conscience of every one of you, which is to pass upon and decide this question. The State, no individual, is on trial here. Individuals come and go, but justice and the State endure. Even fame is a candle almost as brief as life itself, and ho or and disgrace alike will soon be put to sleep by the sprinkled poppy of oblivion; but there remains with us the majesty of the eternal justice. You have it in your power to choose between two things and their images—between Justice the Divine, of austere and noble countenance, clad in the simple robes of sobriety, decency and order, and Justice the

Wanton, bedecked and bedizened, with skirts bedraggled and befouled with the mire of lust, of scandal and of crime!

"If immorality, if lust, if crime even, must exist, surely they may not flaunt themselves from the bench of justice! If both the moral and the statute law must be trampled down, if the public order and decency must be outraged, surely it may not be by the judge who is set to watch over both, and to see that neither is infringed! The State of Maine wants no man who comes fresh from the roysterer's revel, from deep debauch, nay, even from the strumpet's shame, to ascend the solemn judgment seat, and be set before the people's eye as an examplar of chaste and sober living!

The eyes of your State are upon you. The good name of your State is at issue. What you are to do, you do not to punish, but to prevent. In sorrow, not in anger, with pity, with pain at youth misspent and talents tarnished—and yet unflinchingly -you pass from this convention to do your duty to your State. You are here, in the broad and noble spirit of the old Roman Senate, to see that the Republic takes no harm. If you should omit this duty, if you should betray this trust,

"Not poppy nor mandragora, Nor all the drowsy syrups of the world Shall ever medicine thee to that sweet sleep, Which thou ow'dst yesterday."

"You are the watchers on the coast. Beneath you are the rocks. One fair ship, with its freight of talent and of promise, has just sunk before your eyes. In front and far out at sea, stretching beyond the horizon's edge, through the stress of the dark and the night, down drives the fleet of the future, straight toward the rocks which split and sink. Your vote must light the signal. Once alight, it will blaze there through all time for rescue or for ruin! The good ships wait for you! What shall the signal be—false lights to beckon, or a beacon to warn and save?

"Gentlemen of the Convention, I have to thank you for the kind attention you have paid to the cause of these petitioners. I beg you to represent here by your votes, each man according to his own conscience, that great moral sense which I believe is not yet dead in the State of Maine. If you would have justice which is pure and not defiled, if you would have that public and private behavior which is seemly and not indecent, if you would have judgments which shall

be honored and not despised, then I pray you to move this address, and to stamp your reprobation on the long course of public scandal that has brought the judicial office of Biddeford into contumely and contempt."

At 5.55 P. M., the purpose for which the convention was formed having been accomplished, the President announced that it was dissolved finally.

SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATURE—AN ADDRESS TO THE GOVERNOR:

The Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled present this address to the Governor for the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, judge of the municipal court of the city of Biddeford, Maine, for the causes following:

Because the said Charles S. Hamilton, at Biddeford, aforesaid, on the first day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, was, and to the thirteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, continues to be notoriously subject to habits of intemperance.

Because the said Charles S. Hamilton, at Biddeford, aforesaid, on the first day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, was and to the thirteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, continues to be notoriously subject to habits of immorality and licentiousness.

Because the said Charles S. Hamilton, at Biddeford, aforesaid, on the first day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one held, presided over, said municipal court of the city of Biddeford, determined causes and rendered judgments therein, heard complaints and issued warrants under the seal of said court and his signature officially as judge thereof for the arrest of divers people while in a state of intoxication himself.

Hamilton at Biddeford aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, signed as judge of said court certain blank forms called jurats attached to forms prepared for the use of and in said court for complaints for violations of the laws of the State of Maine, in which forms and complaints the commission of crime or misdemeanor was alleged and complained against and of no person, and by no person complainant, signed and sworn to, and also signed officially as judge aforesaid, certain blank forms called warrants ensealing the same with the seal of said court, said forms for warrants being attached to said complaints, and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford and in Saco, in the county of York, Maine, authorized to serve legal precepts issued by said court, to use as said officers saw fit and to meet the wishes of such officers, some of said pretended warrants appearing to authorize the entry and search of buildings and premises.

mittimuses as issued from and by said court by virtue of the authority of said Hamilton as judge aforesaid in which the name of no respondent appeared and in which no decree and adjudication of said court were stated. Said mittimuses being in blank so far as names of respondents and decree of said court affecting respondents were concerned and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford, authorized to execute legal precepts and mittimuses issued by and from said court, to hold and use as such officers wished.

Because the continuance of such habits, acts and proceedings nullify the proper and just operation of law and its due execution, and brings judicial proceedings into contempt and excites the disrespect of all.

Because the safety of all legitimate pursuits of happiness and of those rights of life and liberty unalienable depends upon the personal integrity, purity and uprightness of character of the judges of the various courts of the State to a great degree.

Report of the Committee on Library on the petition of the selectmen of the town of Beddington, that they be furnished with Maine reports, that the petitioners have leave to withdraw,

Which was read and accepted in concurrence.

Report of the Committee on Financial Affairs on "Resolve appropriating two thousand dollars to pay expenses of the Governor and staff at installation of World's Fair at Chicago," that the same ought to pass,

Which was read and accepted in concurrence.

Mr. SWANTON of Sagadahoc moved the indefinite postponement of the resolve.

The motion did not prevail.

On motion by Mr. MALLET of Cumberland, the resolve was read twice under suspension of the rules and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Bill "An Act to provide for a more perfect collection of taxes," which was passed to be engrossed by the Senate April 1, and sent to the House, came up from that branch referred to the next Legislature.

On motion by Mr. SMITH of Lincoln, the Senate receded from its former action and referred the bill to the next Legislature in concurrence.

Mr. MALLET of Cumberland presented "Resolve providing for the payment of the contingent expenses of the Legislature;" and on motion by the same Senator, the rules were suspended, the resolve read twice and passed to be engrossed;

Each sent down for concurrence.

Mr. POWERS from the Committee of Conference on the disagreeing action of the Senate and House on bill "An Act in relation to the organization of corporations chartered by special statute," reported that the committee recommend that the Senate recede and concur with the House,

Which report was accepted.

On motion by Mr. POWERS of Aroostook, the vote whereby the bill passed to be engrossed was reconsidered; House amendments "B" and "C" were adopted and the bill as amended passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Mr. HAINES of Kennebec arose in his place and said:

"Mr. President: It is the ambition of all statesmen that their speeches shall be printed, whether they are delivered or not. During this session of the Legislature the Senate has been favored with the services of a gentleman whose services the Senate fully appreciate. I think I may say there never has been a session of the Legislature in which the legislative proceedings have been so fully reported or so fully printed as the present session of the Legislature. This gentleman stands high in his profession, and through his untiring labors from the beginning of the session until late at night this work has been successfully accomplished, and as a token of respect to this gentleman and of the high esteem

in which he is held by the Senate, I desire to present in behalf of the officers and members of this body this testimonial."

At the conclusion of his remarks Mr. HAINES presented the reporter with a gold watch, chain and guard, the inner case inscribed, "Maine Senate, 1891, to Edward K. Milliken."

Mr. POOR of Cumberland said:

Mr. President: I rise to second the remarks of Mr. Haines of Kennebec, and to suggest the unanimous expression of the Senate be given by rising.

Every Senator thereupon arose in his place.

The reporter, Edward K. Milliken, requested and was allowed permission to address the Senate as follows:

Mr. President and Gentlemen: I am not a speech maker but a speech taker; and although I have a barrel of speeches on hand, they would probably not be appropriate to this occasion. When I was "so high" I was instructed to say "thank you," and in remembrance of that instruction, although the manner of my saying it may not be all that could be desired, and though "I am even poor in thanks, yet I thank you," and I thank you most earnestly and sincerely, and assure you that I shall appreciate not alone the gift, but the kindly expressions which have accompanied it, to the end of my life.

At this time a life-sized crayon portrait, suitably framed, of Hon. Charles F. Libby, President of the Senate, was brought into the chamber, and Mr. SPEAR of Kennebec said:

Mr. President: I rise at this time to perform a duty upon which there will be no division in the Senate of Maine, a duty which will receive the unanimous consent of every Senator. It is a pleasant, yet a sad one; pleasant because it enables thirty men who have been associated with you for the past three months to give expression of their high regard, their esteem and appreciation of the uniform courtesy, kindness and ability with which you have presided over the work of this session; a sad duty, Mr. President, because it reminds us that the pleasant hours which we have spent together are drawing to a close; that we are to sever these pleasant associations which we have formed and to-day to bid each other "goodbye." In behalf of the Senate of Maine I present this likeness of

yourself and ask you to accept it, not for its intrinsic value alone but as evidence of the kindness and affection which every Senator upon this floor entertains toward you. Memory is that faculty of the mind which connects the past with the present and enables us to anticipate the future. Memory is aided by association; and in the future whenever your eye shall rest on this picture you will recall to mind thirty faces which have become familiar to you during this session, and will hear the sound of thirty voices which, at some times may have been discordant, but in the future hours when you look back upon this session in calm moments will only be pleasant sounds. We ask you, Mr. President, to accept this picture as a token of regard, esteem and appreciation of the whole Senate of Maine, every member of which claims to be your friend, and every one of whom claims you to be his friend.

President LIBBY responded as follows:

Senators: For the kindly feelings which have prompted the presentation of this token of your regard, I wish to make my most grateful acknowledgments. I shall prize it for the associations and sentiments which connect it with the Senate of 1891. has also this gratification in it for me, that it conveys the assurance that my efforts to discharge fairly and impartially the courtesies and duties of this office, have been at least so far successful as to secure the confidence and good will of my associates. It may not be amiss to east for a moment a retrospect on the work that has been accomplished. No Legislature for many years has been called upon to consider so many and so important measures as the Legislature of the year 1891. I feel that the confidence that I expressed at the opening of this session has been amply justified in the results. I believe that this Legislature has given to all measures a calm, dispassionate and intelligent consideration, that it has attempted to legislate for the interests of the whole State in a wise and considerate manner. We may not have accomplished all that many have desired, but we have, at least, shown a disposition to deal carefully with all matters that have been presented and to pass such measures as seem to be demanded by urgent public cen-The registration and the Australian ballot bills are proofs of that disposition. The bill establishing a State board of assessors is an important step in the direction of a more equable and efficient system of taxation. Some important measures have necessarily

been referred to the next Legislature, as time was lacking for their adequate consideration, and the work of this session has been already unduly extended. I believe that this delay will be salutary, and that it will tend to focus public attention upon these matters and work out more beneficial results. As the hour approaches for me to surrender the gavel which you have placed in my hands, I should not be doing justice to my own feelings did I not express to the members of this body my sincere appreciation of the uniform courtesy and consideration which they have extended to me as their presiding officer. To you all, Senators, I offer my most heartfelt thanks and my best wishes for your future health and prosperity.

Mr. SHERMAN of Knox presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That we hereby tender to the Hon. Charles F. Libby our thanks for the distinguished ability, the uniform courtesy and the dignity and impartiality with which he has presided over the deliberations of this Senate.

Mr. SHERMAN said:

It gives me great pleasure, Senators, to present this resolve and express the feeling of kindly regard which all members of this body entertain for its presiding officer; and now gentlemen of the Senate I return my sincere thanks to every member and officer of this body for the kind and courteous manner in which we have been treated. I rejoice that when we say good-bye to-day, we can say good-bye as friends and brothers.

Mr. WADLIN of Waldo said:

Mr. Secretary and Gentlemen of the Senate: The final adjournment of the Sixty-fifth Legislature is at hand, and as a member of the minority party I rise in my place to second the resolve of the Senator from Knox. There are times in our lives when it is our duty and privilege to rise above party consideration and take a more comprehensive and conservative view of our surroundings. True it is, we owe our positions here to party organizations, but we only honor our position by ignoring party in the interest of the people. Gentlemen of the Senate, I feel that in the deliberations of this body, whatever of difference there has been, the division has not

been on party lines, and further that the results of our labors are such that henceforth the dominance of party must give place to the dominance of principle.

Mr. President—I know I voice the wishes of the minority party, when I extend to you, the President, my sincere thanks for courtesies and favors received at your hand. And now, fellow Senators, as we leave this chamber to return to our families and our homes, allow me to say, that the impressions which we have received through our intercourse with each other will ever be fruitful themes for pleasant contemplation, and let me assure you that we shall carry to our homes none other than the kindliest feelings.

Mr. GRINDLE of Hancock said:

Mr. Secretary: I desire to make the motion that when the vote is taken, it be taken by the yeas and nays. You may think this a singular motion to be made at this time. It is a question upon which there may be no division of opinion, and it may be sentimental, but that old familiar roll-call, beginning with Adams and ending with Wilbur, has become a thing familiar with me, the memory of which will last as long as I live. This is the last time we shall hear that call, and I hope the vote will be taken for that purpose.

The Secretary then read the resolution offered by the Senator from Knox, and called the roll upon its adoption.

The resolution was unanimously adopted by the following vote:

The Secretary: Mr. President—It gives me great pleasure to place in your hands this resolution, which has been adopted by an unanimous vote of the Senate.

At 12.10 P. M., on motion by Mr. SMITH of Lincoln, the Senate took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

Called to order by the President.

On motion by Mr. ADAMS of York,

Ordered, The House concurring, that the room third floor, north center, be assigned to the State Board of Assessors; also room third floor, northwest, when the Legislature is not in session.

The resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Mr. GRINDLE of Hancock said:

Mr. President: As the time comes for final adjournment we all feel as though we wanted to say a word. We have been talking to each other all winter upon matters of business. We want to say a word to each other in the presence of a company that will never again assemble on the shores of time. When a person has definite thoughts upon a subject, it is not difficult to find language to express those thoughts, but there are times when we have feelings and emotions of such intensity that no language can express them. It is useless for me to undertake to describe that feeling. You all know what it is. You experience it now and yet if we undertake to put

it into words and formulate it in language we find those words and that language so flat and so perfect a failure that we do not try to repeat them. I judge your feelings by my own. I was called home last week. I had exchanged photographs with half the Senators here, perhaps. I had been in my house but a very little time. In the morning, when I was preparing to return here, I found my wife had laid those photographs out on a stand, and as I looked into those faces I had a feeling which I knew would be repeated within one week after the time of final adjournment. There were those faces, those countenances, those expressions, if you like-but it was no use to speak; it was no use to call the "yeas and nays" Those lips were silent. These are feelings that we have in common and which we cannot get rid of or suppress. I do not know as it is desirable to get rid of them, but I can say this, we have not been as strangers, the record of every man has been the record of a gentleman and our treatment of each other has been such that while we met as strangers we part as friends.

Mr. GILES of Oxford said:

Mr. President, Gentlemen of the Senate:—I am not a public speaker and I have no words with which I can express my emotions and feelings, touched as they are in view of our near separation. My thoughts turn back to the past weeks of the session of this Legislature, your kind words come again—I hear them; your cheerful and smiling countenances return—I behold them. You have treated me with that true and courteous kindness which I can never forget. I came to this Senate with no experience in legislative life; and while I have not attempted to make any argument or debate upon the floor of this Senate, yet you have regarded my opinions and suggestions in matters of legislation with more consideration and weight than I should have dared hoped or expected.

My relation with you has been a pleasant relation—one which, the separation at this time, although sad and bitter, does not—cannot dissolve. As we go from this Senate chamber to day in different directions, to different pursuits, I know that human life is such, that doubtless I shall not meet all of you again in this life; but I shall ever remember your kind and gracious words. My acquaintance with you formed during the weeks spent here in session is not an acquaintance to die with no hope of a resurrection, but it is an acquaintance I trust to live, to increase in that higher, broader and eternal life

God has given us. Mr. President, I thank you for your fairness and I believe I voice the sentiment of every member of this Senate when I say your conduct as a ruling officer has been high, dignified, straightforward and impartial.

Mr. POOR of Cumberland said:

Mr. President: As the hour draws near when we must dissolve the crescent that for twelve long weeks has been wont to gather from day to day in your presence, and to sit in deliberation under your manly, courteous and impartial rulings, I cannot go away without expressing the sentiments of my heart. I have formulated nothing in words to sav. I can simply speak from the spontaneous emotions of my heart. I feel that I owe my grateful thanks to the members of this Senate for the kindliness they have shown me. am mindful of the friendly and sympathetic spirit they manifested to me when I came here; and it was a great consolation and comfort to me, which I treasure up in my heart of hearts, during a short absence from the Senate, to look daily at the pictures I had received of the Senators, looking into the faces of which seemed to me like looking into the faces of brothers. To be sure they were silent witnesses, but I felt that I was looking upon a reproduction of faces of those who, if they could have uttered the sentiments of their hearts, would have spoken to me in all kindliness. And if I go away from this Senate and return to my home and sever the golden links that have tied us together in such fraternal and harmonious relations, still I shall think as long as I live of the friends I have met here and of the kindliness that has existed between us and I trust if we never meet again in this world we may have a meeting in a better world with more kindly and affectionate sentiments than we could express to each other in life. In my own behalf and in behalf of all the mempers of the Senate, I wish to thank our President for his courtesy, for his wise, gentlemanly and upright rulings and for the ability with which he has discharged the duties of his office, and to thank all the officers of the Senate for their kindly expressions.

Mr. HAINES of Kennebec said:

Mr. Secretary: I have a motion which I will make orally, and which I desire shall be unanimously adopted by the Senate, viz: That when this body adjourn, the gavel, which has been wielded with so much impartiality, firmness and courtesy by our honored Presi-

dent during the present session of the Legislature, shall be presented to him.

The motion was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

The President—I thank you for this renewed expression of your confidence and good wishes.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county which he represents.

The senator presenting an order should put his name thereto, on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county which he represents.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

RULES.

- 1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president pro tempore be chosen.
- 2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.
- 3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.
- 4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of senator, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.
- 5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.
- 6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.
- 7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.
- S. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.
- 9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time b fore a decision, or any amendment be made to it.
- 10. No senator shall address the senate ustil recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without

leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debute, and not then more than three times without leave.

- 11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree.
- 12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.
- 13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.
- 14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.
- 15. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.
- 16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.
- 17. Every paper shall be once read at the tible before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.
- 18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.
- 19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.
- 20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.
- 21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property, shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

- 22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
- 1st. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.
- 4th. Reports of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc., offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.
- 5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the house, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

- 23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.
- 24. After question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.
- 25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.
- 26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.
- 27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.
- 28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.
- 29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- 30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.
- 31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leaver unless there be a quorum left present.

- 32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot,) and appointed by the senate.
- 33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading. On engrossed bills.

To consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

- 34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.
- 35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.
- 36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.
- 37. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

JOINT RULES.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

On the judiciary, On legal affairs, On financial affairs, On federal relations, On education, On railroads, telegraphs and expresses, On commerce. On mercantile affairs and insurance, On banks and banking, On manufactures, On agriculture, On military affairs, On interior waters, On state lands and state roads, On ways and bridges. On fisheries and game, On counties, On towns, On Indian affairs, On claims, On pensions, On insane hospital, On reform school, On state prison, On public buildings, On library, On state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, On mines and mining, On temperance, On labor.

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

- 2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.
- 3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the

senate, or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

- 4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly endorsed on the back of the same.
- 5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.
- 6. The titles of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.
- 7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section 1."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

- 8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.
- 9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.
- 10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, and every bill or resolve appropriating money, or disposing of state lands or other state property, reported in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.
- 11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

- 12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.
- 13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.
- 14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.
- 15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.
- 16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.
- 17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

RULES.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon:

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result:

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct:

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS.

- 4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.
- 5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

MONITORS.

- 6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.
- 7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On ways and means,
On leave of absence,
On change of names,
On bills in the third reading,

On engrossed bills,
On elections,
To consist of seven members each.
On county estimates,
To consist of one member from each county.
On business of the house,

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

To consist of three members.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

- 10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.
- 11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.
- 12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.
- 13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.
- 14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.
- 15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.
- 16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.
- 17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.
- 18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.
- 19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any

member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

- 20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.
- 21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.
- 22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.
- 23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.
- 24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

- 6th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.
 - 7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.
 - 8th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration,

and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

- 27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.
 - 28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but-
 - 1st. To adjourn.
 - 2d. To lay on the table.
 - 3d. For the previous question.
 - 4th. To commit.
 - 5th. To postpone to a day certain.
 - 6th. To amend.
 - 7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.
- 29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.
- 31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.
- 32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.
- 33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

- 34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.
- 35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- 36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.
- 37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.
- 38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.
- 39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the years and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.
- 40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.
- 41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.
- 42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.
- 43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.
- 44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.
- 45 A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.
- 46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall

be endorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.

- 47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.
- 48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.
- 49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.
- 50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.
- 51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.
- 52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corp rations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.
- 53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.
- 54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.
- 55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor? and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.
- 56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions, shall govern

the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

- 57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless two-thirds of the members present shall consent thereto.
- 58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

MEMORANDA.

- 1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a report of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the order or other paper appointing said committee to consider the subject.
- 3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of —," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be indorsed thus, "Petition of ——— and others of the town of ———," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "Petition of _____," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county in which he resides.
- 7. The member presenting an *order* should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county in which he resides.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which leave to withdraw was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The original, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented de novo.
- 9. Bills and resolves refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.


