STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
SIXTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to Disposition of Fines and Costs of Imprisonment Under
Sea and Shore Fisheries Laws.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 37-A, § 94, sub-§ II, amended. Subsection II of section 94 of chapter 37-A of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 1 of chapter 331 of the public laws of 1959, is amended to read as follows:

II. Disposition of fines, fees and forfeitures; commissioner's records. ~~All~~ **One-half** of them, except where otherwise expressly provided in this chapter, accrue to the commissioner, and he shall pay them to the Treasurer of State. **The other ½ shall accrue to the treasury of the county where the offense is prosecuted.**

A. The commissioner shall also make and keep in his office an itemized record of the amount of each fine, fee, forfeiture, penalty and collection with the name of the payer of each.'

Sec. 2. R. S., c. 37-A, § 95, repealed. Section 95 of chapter 37-A of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 1 of chapter 331 of the public laws of 1959, is repealed as follows:

'Sec. 95. State to pay costs of imprisonment. ~~The State shall pay to the county involved the costs of imprisonment in the county jail for violation of any provision of this chapter or any regulation authorized by this chapter. The costs for any single imprisonment may not, however, exceed the average amount paid for board of federal prisoners.'~~
