AN ACT Relating to the Harbor Project in the Town of Wells

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the Congress of the United States has appropriated money for the improvement of rivers and harbors; and

Whereas, federal funds are available for the Wells Harbor District; and

Whereas, in order to comply with federal and state requirements, the following legislation is immediately required in order to commence work on the Wells Harbor Project; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

State funds. There is appropriated from the Unappropriated Surplus of the General Fund the sum of \$100,000 to the Town of Wells, to aid said town to complete the Wells Harbor Project, so called. Such appropriation shall not be available until a like or greater amount has been appropriated by the Town of Wells for the same purpose.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this act shall take effect when approved.
