STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to Color of Canes Carried by Blind Pedestrians on Public Ways.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- Sec. 1. R. S., c. 22, § 132, amended. Section 132 of chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:
- 'Sec. 132. Carrying of canes. It is unlawful for any person, unless totally or partially blind or otherwise incapacitated, while on any public street or highway, to carry in a raised or extended position a cane or walking stick which is white in color or white tipped with red or aluminum colored.'
- Sec. 2. R. S., c. 22, § 133, amended. Section 133 of chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:
- 'Sec. 133. When vehicles to stop. Whenever a pedestrian is crossing or attempting to cross a public street or highway, guided by a guide dog or carrying in a raised or extended position a cane or walking stick which is white in color or white tipped with red as described in section 132, the driver of every vehicle approaching the intersection, or place where such pedestrian is attempting to cross, shall bring his vehicle to a full stop before arriving at such intersection or place of crossing, and before proceeding shall take such precautions as may be necessary to avoid injuring such pedestrian.'
