IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED

AN ACT Relating to Rental of Space in County Buildings by State Departments.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 89, § 17-A, additional. Chapter 89 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 17-A, to read as follows:

'Sec. 17-A. State department occupying space in county buildings to pay rent. Whenever a department of the State Government shall occupy space in a county building, the State shall pay a reasonable rent to the county for the space used, as determined by agreement between the county commissioners and the head of the state department using the space. The rent shall be paid by the State in quarterly installments on the 15th days of July, October, January and April.

This section shall not apply to rooms now used by the Supreme Judicial Court, the Superior Court, the justices of said courts or the offices of the county attorneys. It shall include the Department of Mental Health and Corrections and all courtrooms, office space, record rooms, conference rooms and waiting rooms used in connection with any district court system.'

Sec. 2. Appropriation. There is appropriated from the Unappropriated Surplus of the General Fund the sum of \$6,060 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962 and the sum of \$6,060 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963 for the rent of offices in buildings in the several counties now occupied by the Probation and Parole Division of the Department of Mental Health and Corrections.
