STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
SIXTY-THREE

RESOLVE, Authorizing the Disposal of Western Maine Sanatorium.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, since Western Maine Sanatorium is no longer used as a state facility and is being maintained by the State on a stand-by basis; and

Whereas, the cost of such maintenance amounts to approximately \$30,000 annually; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine, and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Director of Public Improvements authorized to dispose of Western Maine Sanatorium. Resolved: That the Director of Public Improvements is authorized to dispose of the interest of the State in and to the real estate and appurtenances comprising Western Maine Sanatorium. Such disposal shall be made under terms and conditions deemed by the Governor and Council to be in the best interests of the State.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Maintenance of the real estate and appurtenances comprising Western Maine Sanatorium, on a stand-by basis, is costing the State approximately \$30,000 annually.
