STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SIXTY-THREE

RESOLVE, Appropriating Moneys to State Board of Education to Match Federal Funds Under the Manpower Development and Training Act.

State Board of Education to match Federal Funds under the Manpower Development and Training Act; appropriation. Resolved: That the State Board of Education is authorized to continue to participate in carrying out the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962, and in accordance with the provisions of the Act, to provide 50% of the cost of conducting such training; and be it further

Resolved: That there is appropriated, out of any moneys in the General Fund not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$405,000 for the above purpose.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The Congress of the United States enacted the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962 (Public Law 87-415) establishing a broad program of occupational training designed to equip workers with new and improved skills required for employment. Pursuant to that Act, the Maine State Board of Education has entered into an agreement with the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare of the United States whereby the State Board of Education assumes the responsibilities for the provision of education and training programs needed in accordance with the provisions of the Act. Section 231 of the Act provides that after July 1, 1964 the State agency shall pay 50% of the cost of providing such training.
