IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED

**AN ACT Relating to Territorial Limits, Quorum and Powers of South
Freeport Water District.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. P. & S. L., 1947, c. 7, § 1, amended. The 2nd paragraph of section 1 of chapter 7 of the private and special laws of 1947 is repealed and the following paragraph enacted in place thereof:

'The area within the district shall be that part of the Town of Freeport bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the westerly shore of Har-raseeket River, so called, which is the most southerly boundary line of Porter's Landing Water District as set forth in the private and special laws of 1951, chapter 104 entitled 'An Act to Incorporate the Porter's Landing Water District'; thence west $7\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ north along said boundary line twelve hundred (1200) feet to a point; thence west 13° south along said boundary line seven hundred fifty (750) feet to a point; thence northwesterly in a straight line nineteen hundred (1900) feet, more or less, to the center line of the old Brunswick and Portland Street Railway location and the most easterly corner of land now owned by South Freeport Water District; thence continuing along the northeasterly boundary line of land owned by South Freeport Water District northwesterly seven hundred eighty-five (785) feet, more or less, to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company aerial toll cable line; thence in a general southwestwardly and southerly direction following along said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company aerial toll cable line sixteen thousand (16,000) feet, more or less, to the easterly bank of the Cousin's River; thence in a general southerly, south-easterly and then easterly course along said shore of Cousin's River to the waters of Casco Bay; thence following the westerly shore of said Casco Bay to

the northeasterly end of Stockbridge Point, so called, and the Harraseeket River, so called; thence in a general southwesterly, westerly, northwesterly, northerly and northeasterly course following the westerly shore of the Harraseeket River to the point of beginning.'

Sec. 2. P. & S. L., 1947, c. 7, § 7, amended. The 3rd paragraph of section 7 of chapter 7 of the private and special laws of 1947 is repealed and the following paragraph enacted in place thereof:

'Ten per cent of the number of users as appears on the records of the district shall constitute a quorum.'

Sec. 3. P. & S. L., 1947, c. 7, § 8, repealed and replaced. Section 8 of chapter 7 of the private and special laws of 1947 is repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

'Sec. 8. Trustees granted certain powers of selectmen. After the meeting of the voters of the district, for acceptance of this charter, and after the organization of the board under section 6, the trustees shall have the same powers and perform the same duties as otherwise are exercised and performed by the selectmen of towns in correcting and preparing lists of the persons qualified to vote in said district, and for that purpose they shall be in session at the place designated for holding the meeting $\frac{1}{2}$ hour before the opening of the meeting, and notice thereof shall be given in the call of the meeting. All meetings of the district shall be presided over by a moderator chosen in the same manner and with the same authority as moderators of town meetings.'
