SENATE AMENDMENT "A" to H. P. 514, L. D. 727, Resolve,
Permitting R. Dean Seguin of South Paris to Take the Examination
for Admission to Practice Law.

Amend said Resolve by striking out all of the Title and
inserting in place thereof the following:

'An Act Relating to Qualifications of Applicants for
Examination for Admission to Practice Law.'

Further amend said Resolve by striking out everything after
the Title and inserting in place thereof the following:
'Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., T. 4, §804, amended. The 2nd paragraph of
section 804 of Title 4 of the Revised Statutes is amended by
adding after the first sentence, a new sentence, as follows:

Notwithstanding the foregoing educational and study requirements,
an applicant who suffers from polio or other similarly disabling
disease and who has a high school education or possesses a
certificate of equivalency of a high school education and who
has studied law diligently and in good faith for at least 4 years,
which study shall be by instruction and completion of a course
in law from a correspondence law school, shall, if otherwise
qualified, qualify to take the bar examinations.

Sec. 2. Application. This Act shall be effective for
only 4 years.'
