**AN ACT Relating to Tuition for Pupils Attending Secondary Schools in
Other States or Countries.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., T. 20, § 1292, amended. The last sentence of the first paragraph of section 1292 of Title 20 of the Revised Statutes is repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

Any administrative unit not maintaining a high school or contracting for secondary school privileges may pay tuition for any student who with parent or guardian resides in said administrative unit and who attends an approved school of secondary grade in another state or country, but such tuition payment shall not exceed the average cost per pupil in all secondary schools of the State of Maine as determined in section 1293; or for any student who attends an approved school of secondary grade in another state when said school specializes in the correction of physical defects and when by reason of a disability the individual requires a specialized type of training available in said school but not obtainable in any approved secondary school in the State of Maine. Any pupil for whom tuition payment has been denied by the school committee or board of directors may appeal to the State Board of Education for a decision and any payment found to be rightly due shall be adjusted as provided in this section.
