**AN ACT to Establish Thirty-three Districts for the Election of Senators in the
State of Maine and Report in Support Thereof.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. Apportionment of Senators to the Legislature. For the 104th and 105th Legislatures the following districts are established and shall each elect one Senator:

District Number 1 shall consist of the municipalities of Acton, Berwick, Cornish, Eliot, Kittery, Lebanon, Newfield, Parsonsfield, South Berwick and York.

District Number 2 shall consist of the municipalities of Alfred, Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Limerick, North Berwick, Sanford, Shapleigh, Waterboro and Wells.

District Number 3 shall consist of the municipalities of Arundel, Biddeford, Dayton, Hollis, Lyman and Saco.

District Number 4 shall consist of the municipalities of Andover, Bethel, Brownfield, Buckfield, Byron, Canton, Denmark, Dixfield, Fryeburg, Gilead, Greenwood, Hanover, Hartford, Hebron, Hiram, Lincoln Plt., Lovell, Magalloway Plt., Newry, Norway, Oxford, Paris, Peru, Porter, Roxbury, Stoneham, Stow, Sweden, Sumner, Upton, Waterford, West Paris, Woodstock and all of the unorganized territory in Oxford County.

District Number 5 shall consist of the municipalities of Baldwin, Bridgton, Buxton, Gorham, Harrison, Limington, Naples, Old Orchard Beach, Otisfield, Scarborough, Sebago and Standish.

District Number 6 shall consist of the municipalities of Cape Elizabeth and South Portland.

District Number 7 shall consist of the precincts numbered 1-1, 1-2, 1-3, 1-4, 1-5, 2-1, 2-2, and 3-2 of the City of Portland as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 8 shall consist of the precincts numbered 3-1, 4-1, 4-2, 5-1, and 5-2 of the City of Portland as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 9 shall consist of the municipalities of Casco, Freeport, New Gloucester, Pownal, Raymond, Westbrook and Windham.

District Number 10 shall consist of the municipalities of Cumberland, Falmouth, Gray, North Yarmouth and Yarmouth and the precincts numbered 6-1 and 6-2 of the City of Portland as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 11 shall consist of the municipalities of Arrowsic, Bowdoin, Bowdoinham, Brunswick, Harpswell, Phippsburg, Richmond, Topsham, West Bath and all of the unorganized territory in Sagadahoc County.

District Number 12 shall consist of the municipalities of Auburn, Durham, Mechanic Falls, Minot and Poland.

District Number 13 shall consist of the precincts numbered 1, 2-1, 3, 4-1, 5 and 6-1 of the City of Lewiston as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 14 shall consist of the municipalities of Greene, Leeds, Lisbon, Livermore, Livermore Falls, Turner, Wales and Webster and the precincts numbered 2-2, 4-2, 6-2, 7-1 and 7-2 of the City of Lewiston as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 15 shall consist of the municipalities of Chelsea, Farmingdale, Gardiner, Hallowell, Litchfield, Manchester, Monmouth, Pittston, Randolph, Readfield, Wayne, West Gardiner and Winthrop.

District Number 16 shall consist of the municipalities of Oakland, Waterville and Winslow.

District Number 17 shall consist of the municipalities of Augusta, Belgrade, Fayette, Mount Vernon, Rome, Sidney, Vassalboro, Vienna and Windsor.

District Number 18 shall consist of the municipalities of Alna, Bath, Boothbay, Boothbay Harbor, Bremen, Bristol, Damariscotta, Dresden, Edgecomb, Georgetown, Jefferson, Monhegan Pt., Newcastle, Nobleboro, Somerville Pt., South Bristol, Southport, Waldoboro, Westport, Whitefield, Wiscasset, Woolwich and all of the unorganized territory in Lincoln County.

District Number 19 shall consist of the municipalities of Albion, Belfast, Belmont, Benton, Brooks, Burnham, China, Clinton, Frankfort, Freedom, Islesboro, Jackson, Knox, Liberty, Lincolnville, Monroe, Montville, Morrill, Northport,

Palermo, Prospect, Searsmont, Searsport, Stockton Springs, Swanville, Thordike, Troy, Unity, Waldo, Winterport and all of the unorganized territory in Kennebec County.

District Number 20 shall consist of the municipalities of Appleton, Camden, Cushing, Friendship, Hope, Isle au Haut, Matinicus Isle Plt., North Haven, Owls Head, Rockland, Rockport, St. George, South Thomaston, Thomaston, Union, Vinalhaven, Warren, Washington and all of the unorganized territory in Knox County.

District Number 21 shall consist of the municipalities of Avon, Carthage, Chesterville, Coplin Plt., Dallas Plt., Eustis, Jay, Kingfield, Madrid, Mexico, Phillips, Rangeley, Rangeley Plt., Rumford, Sandy River Plt., Strong, Temple, Weld, Wilton and all of the unorganized territory in Franklin County.

District Number 22 shall consist of the municipalities of Anson, Dennistown Plt., Embden, Fairfield, Farmington, Highland Plt., Industry, Jackman, Madison, Mercer, Moose River, New Portland, New Sharon, New Vineyard, Norridgewock, Pleasant Ridge Plt., Skowhegan, Smithfield, Starks, West Forks Plt. and all of the unorganized territory in Somerset County except those listed in District Number 23.

District Number 23 shall consist of the municipalities of Abbot, Athens, Atkinson, Barnard Plt., Bingham, Blanchard Plt., Bowerbank, Brighton Plt., Brownville, Cambridge, Canaan, Caratunk Plt., Cornville, Dover-Foxcroft, Detroit, Elliottsville Plt., Greenville, Guilford, Harmony, Hartland, Kingsbury Plt., Lake View Plt., Milo, Monson, Moscow, Palmyra, Parkman, Pittsfield, Ripley, St. Albans, Sangerville, Sebec, Shirley, Solon, The Forks Plt., Wellington, Willimantic and all of the unorganized territory in Piscataquis County and the following unorganized territory in Somerset County: T1 R5; T1 R6; T2 R2; T2 R3; T2 R4 and T2 R5.

District Number 26 shall consist of the municipalities of Blaine, Bridgewater, Castle Hill, Chapman, Easton, E Plt., Fort Fairfield, Littleton, Mapleton, Mars Hill, Masardis, Monticello, Presque Isle, Wade, Westfield, and the following unorganized territory in Aroostook County: T9 R3, T9 R4, T9 R5, T10 R3, T10 R4, T11 R4, TD R2 and Cox Patent.

District Number 27 shall consist of the municipalities of Amity, Bancroft, Benedicta, Carroll Plt., Cary Plt., Crystal, Drew Plt., Dyer Brook, East Millinocket, Glenwood Plt., Hammond Plt., Haynesville, Hersey, Hodgdon, Houlton, Island Falls, Lakeville Plt., Lee, Lincoln, Linneus, Ludlow, Macwahoc Plt., Mattawamkeag, Medway, Merrill, Moro Plt., Mount Chase Plt., New Limerick, Oakfield, Orient, Patten, Prentiss Plt., Reed Plt., Sherman, Smyrna, Springfield, Stacyville, Webster Plt., Weston, Winn, Woodville, and all of the unorganized territory in Penobscot County, except those listed in District Number 33, and all of the following unorganized territory in Aroostook County: T1 R4, T1 R5, T2 R4, T3 R2, T3 R3, T3 R4, T4 R3, T7 R3, T7 R4, T7 R5, T8 R3, T8 R4, T8 R5, TA R2, TA R5, TC R2, Benedicta and Silver Ridge Twp.

District Number 28 shall consist of the municipalities of Carmel, Corinna, Dexter, Dixmont, Etna, Glenburn, Hampden, Kenduskeag, Levant, Newburgh, Newport, Orono, Plymouth, Stetson and Veazie.

District Number 29 shall consist of the precincts numbered 3-1, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of the City of Bangor as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 30 shall consist of the municipalities of Brewer, Eddington, Hermon, Holden, Orrington, and the precincts numbered 1, 2 and 3-2 of the City of Bangor as the precinct lines of that city existed on the first day of January, 1967.

District Number 31 shall consist of the municipalities of Amherst, Aurora, Bar Harbor, Blue Hill, Brooklin, Brooksville, Bucksport, Castine, Cranberry Isles, Dedham, Deer Isle, Eastbrook, Ellsworth, Franklin, Gouldsboro, Hancock, Lamoine, Long Island Plt., Mariaville, Mount Desert, Orland, Osborn Plt., Otis, Penobscot, Plantation #33, Sedgwick, Sorrento, Southwest Harbor, Stonington, Sullivan, Surry, Swans Island, Tremont, Trenton, Verona, Waltham, Winter Harbor, and all of the unorganized territory in Hancock County.

District Number 32 shall consist of the municipalities of Addison, Alexander, Baileyville, Baring Plt., Beals, Beddington, Calais, Centerville, Charlotte, Cherryfield, Codyville Plt., Columbia, Columbia Falls, Cooper, Crawford, Cutler, Danforth, Deblois, Dennysville, East Machias, Eastport, Grand Lake Stream Plt., Harrington, Jonesboro, Jonesport, Lubec, Machias, Machiasport, Marshfield, Meddybemps, Milbridge, Northfield, Passamaquoddy Indian Res., Pembroke, Perry, Plantation #14, Plantation #21, Princeton, Robbinston, Roque Bluffs, Steuben, Talmadge, Topsfield, Vanceboro, Waite, Wesley, Whiting, Whitneyville, and all of the unorganized territory in Washington County.

District Number 33 shall consist of the municipalities of Alton, Argyle Plt., Bradford, Bradley, Burlington, Charleston, Chester, Clifton, Corinth, Edinburg, Enfield, Exeter, Garland, Grand Falls Plt., Greenbush, Greenfield, Howland,

Hudson, LaGrange, Lowell, Maxfield, Milford, Millinocket, Old Town, Pas-sadumkeag, Penobscot Indian Res., Sebocis Plt., and all of the following un-organized territory in Penobscot County: T1 R7, T1 N.D., T2 R8, T2 R9, T3 R9, T4 and T3, TA R7, TA R8 and R9, Hopkins Academy Grant and Veazie Gore.

Sec. 2. Residents of unorganized territory. If all other legal requirements are complied with, residents of unorganized territory shall be allowed to register and vote in the nearest accessible organized municipality with the same Senate District and within the same county.

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TO THE MEMBERS OF THE 103rd LEGISLATURE
OF THE STATE OF MAINE:

We have the honor to submit herewith the report of a majority of the Members of the Joint Select Committee on Senatorial Reapportionment, established by the 103rd Legislature. This report is submitted to the Legislature so that each Member may understand the basic underlying principles which give rise to the proposed legislation which is attached hereto, made a part hereof and reported by a majority of said Committee.

By way of background, at the general election held on November 8, 1966, the inhabitants of the State of Maine adopted an amendment to their Constitution providing for a new method of the division of the State for the election of State Senators. The critical language of the amendment is as follows:

“Section 1. **Number of Senators.** The Senate shall consist of not less than thirty nor more than forty Senators, elected at the same time and for the same term as Representatives by the qualified electors of the districts into which the State shall be from time to time divided.

“Section 2. **Division.** The Legislature which shall convene after the adoption of this amendment shall cause the State to be divided into districts for the choice of Senators, and the Legislature, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventy-one, and every tenth year thereafter, shall do likewise. The districts shall conform, as near as may be to county lines and be apportioned according to the number of inhabitants so that each district shall have as close to a median number of thirty thousand inhabitants as possible, but in order to follow county and municipal boundaries the Legislature may deviate from this median figure so that the smallest district shall not have less than twenty-seven thousand inhabitants, and the largest district shall not have more than thirty-three thousand inhabitants. The basis of computation of the number of inhabitants shall be the Federal decennial census.

“In the event that the Legislature shall fail to make an apportionment, the Supreme Judicial Court shall, within sixty days following the end of the period in which the Legislature is required to act, but fails to do so, make the apportionment.”

The purpose of the proposed amendment to the Constitution which was adopted as above referred to, was to comply with the so-called “one-man one-vote rule” announced and established by the Supreme Court of the United States in a series of cases which we will not now outline.

The constitutional provision which became part of the Maine Constitution on the first Wednesday of January, 1967, sets forth certain specific standards by which the Legislature shall be governed in setting up Senatorial Districts. Prior to this time, under a previous provision of the Maine Constitution, Senators were apportioned according to counties, based on a mathematical formula which gave a minimum of one Senator in each county and which increased as the population of the county increased.

There are certain absolute provisions found in the above-mentioned constitutional provision which we feel should be outlined at this time.

- (1) The number of Senatorial Districts must not be less than thirty (30) nor more than forty (40).
- (2) To the extent possible, the Legislature, is required to lay out Senatorial Districts as close to a median number of thirty thousand (30,000) inhabitants as possible, but because of the fact that county and municipal boundaries are sometimes arbitrarily drawn in terms of territory, rather than people the Legislature was given the authority to deviate from the thirty thousand (30,000) norm so that the smallest district shall not have less than twenty-seven thousand (27,000) inhabitants and the largest district shall not have more than thirty-three thousand (33,000) inhabitants.
- (3) The basis of computation of the number of inhabitants in Senatorial Districts and in the State in general shall be the Federal decennial census.

After a careful consideration of a number of proposals which were presented to the Committee by Members of the Legislature and a review of these proposals by the Committee, a majority of the Committee submits the plan outlined as an exhibit entitled "Majority Plan."

We will now outline the general nature of the plan which is submitted, reserving for later discussions some of the bases upon which the plan was evolved.

The plan submitted has the following features :

1. The plan proposes thirty-three (33) Senatorial Districts, thus is in accordance with the absolute mandate mentioned above that there shall be no less than thirty (30) nor more than forty (40) Senatorial Districts.
2. The plan adheres to the absolute requirement that there shall not be less than twenty-seven thousand (27,000) or more than thirty-three thousand (33,000) inhabitants in any Senatorial District.
3. That the basis of the plan is the Federal decennial census, and the Federal decennial census used are the figures given for the 1960 census.
4. Of the thirty-three (33) districts in the plan, twenty-five (25) are wholly included within the boundaries of existing counties; in other words, only in eight (8) instances are county boundaries crossed in order to set up or compose a Senatorial District, (Districts 5 - 11 - 18 - 19 - 21 - 22 - 23 - 27).
5. The plan proposes to divide **only** those cities having a population greater than thirty-three thousand (33,000) inhabitants, namely, Portland (72,566), Lewiston (40,804) and Bangor (38,912). The City of Biddeford (19,255) is not divided under the proposed plan, although it was divided under the Minority's plan. This is consistent with our theory that a municipal unit shall be kept intact wherever possible. In no case does the boundary of a proposed district cut through a town or other municipal unit as distinguished from a city.
6. All Senatorial Districts are composed of contiguous cities, towns or city wards or precincts. Thus, in this plan, there are no so-called "islands," that is, every municipal unit adjoins some other municipal unit in the same district.

7. There appears to be no obvious disadvantage in the proposed plan. The Minority proposes a District #23 in its plan which consists of all of Piscataquis County and the most northwestern area of Aroostook County. It is impossible to travel in a direct line from any area in Piscataquis County to the most northern area in Aroostook County. The obvious disadvantage of this District has already been commented upon in the report of the Senatorial Apportionment Commission, dated January 4, 1967, at page 3. We believe that we have found a satisfactory alternative to the Minority's proposed District #23. One of our purposes has been to make the Districts so compact and contiguous that a Senatorial candidate could readily campaign in his District. We point out in passing that the Senatorial Apportionment Commission said of the Minority's proposed District #23: "The total inconvenience is probably no greater than it has been in the past when candidates-at-large for four (4) Senate seats in Aroostook County have had to campaign throughout that County." As to this statement we would reply, first, that Aroostook County has but three (3) Senators, and, secondly, the populated areas in Aroostook County are contained in several well populated areas, although the total geographic area of Aroostook County comprises approximately 20% of the State.

This Committee began its study of the problem of apportionment by analyzing its constitutional duty and limitations as set forth in the Constitution. We have already set forth these absolute mandates and will not repeat them here. The Committee did, however, take into consideration the fact that this Legislature, the 103rd, would be apportioning the Senatorial Districts to govern the 104th and 105th Legislatures and that the Legislature which convenes in the year 1971, namely, the 105th, would under the above constitutional amendment, be required to review and reapportion the Senatorial Districts in conformity with the Federal decennial census which would be taken in the year 1970. The constitutional mandate upon this Legislature is clear. It is equally clear with regard to the 105th Legislature. Because of the short period of time until the next reapportionment, the Committee considered it advisable to project population trends from the 1960 census towards the 1970 decennial census. This projection was made on a straight-line basis, analyzing the growth in population in the various cities and towns from the 1950 decennial census to the 1960 decennial census. The Committee then caused these projections to be computed and they are set forth as an exhibit to this report, entitled Majority Plan.

One could ask why this Committee thought it was within its legislative prerogative to project population trends. The answer is obvious. The Committee wishes to set forth a standard which will be applicable to the 104th and 105th Legislatures and hopefully it will require no change by the 105th Legislature, when the 1970 decennial census figures are available to the 105th. The purpose is to establish the Senatorial Districts so they will undergo no change in 1971, or, if changes are required by unforeseen population growth or shrinkage, that the adjustments in districts will be minimal. We would thereby have a stable system of Senatorial Districts through 1981 when the 110th Legislature will again have cast upon it the constitutional duty which we are now acting under.

So there will be no misunderstanding, let us state again that the basis for the apportionment plan which we submit herewith is the 1960 decennial census and

each one of the Senatorial Districts falls within the constitutional limitation, i.e., no less than twenty-seven thousand (27,000) nor more than thirty-three thousand (33,000) inhabitants. If you will look at our exhibit (Majority Plan) and the projection figures for 1970, you will see that each one of the proposed Senatorial Districts is likewise valid under this same absolute constitutional mandate. We recognize that this Legislature cannot usurp the power of the 105th Legislature. Our object is to implement a plan of Senatorial Districts that will be consistent with our projected population in 1970, recognizing the historic fact that only two (2) Legislatures (104th and 105th) will be elected under any plan adopted by this Legislature and that stability in government is of paramount importance to the people of this State.

The Minority of the Committee has proposed a reapportionment plan. This plan is set forth as an exhibit to this report and has been denominated the Minority Plan. While on its face it appears to be valid and in line with the constitutional mandates that we have discussed above, we have caused the projected population figures for the year 1970 to be applied to the Minority's Plan and as you can see, at least eleven of the Senatorial Districts which would be created by their proposal, would have to be re-done by the 105th Legislature when it convenes in 1971. This is only four years from now. This, in our view, does not lead to stability in government which we all seek.

We find two major weaknesses in the Minority Plan. In the first instance it proposes to split the City of Biddeford. Our plan does not. We would prefer and did prefer to go across a county line and to add the Town of Old Orchard with other York County towns to several Cumberland County towns rather than to split the City of Biddeford, particularly where its population did not exceed thirty-three thousand (33,000) inhabitants. In our view it is more desirable that the smallest units remain inviolate, if possible. If necessary to accomplish this purpose, county lines are not to be considered inviolate and may be crossed. In any event we do not feel that county lines have any preference over municipal boundaries, as some have suggested, and we believe that it is within the Legislature's discretion to cross a county line rather than to violate a municipal unit's territorial integrity in creating a district.

The second major weakness in the Minority Plan is their proposed District #23. The make-up of this District would encompass approximately 20% of the land area of the State of Maine and it is approximately 200 miles over existing highways through at least two other districts from the County seat of Piscataquis County, namely, Dover-Foxcroft, to the most northern population center, Fort Kent. The transportation and campaigning difficulties in such a District are obvious and require no further comment. It has been said that campaigning in this proposed District will not be more difficult than that presently required of the present Senators (3) from Aroostook County. We would point out that while Aroostook County is large in area, its population is concentrated in an area starting at Houlton in the south and ending at Caribou and its environs in the north, and in this area approximately 68,000 of Aroostook's 106,064 inhabitants now reside, or about 65%. This proposed District has such obvious failings that its proponents have already tried to excuse its existence. Our plan does not propose any district of this nature with all its inherent problems.

The undersigned Majority of the Committee endorses the Senatorial District Plan which is appended hereto as in our opinion it is the most fair and equitable plan that could be proposed for your consideration, and it is abundantly clear that this plan is in accordance with the legislative mandate cast upon us. Deeming it within the Legislature's prerogative to do so, we have projected population growth and taken these projection figures into account so that there is a distinct possibility that no change will be required in the Senatorial Districts which are described in our proposed plan when the Legislature in 1971 reviews the situation, as it must, under the constitutional mandate.

APPENDIX B

STATUS OF PROJECTION OF POPULATION FIGURES FOR THE CITY OF BANGOR AND THE TOWNS OF BRUNSWICK, LIMESTONE AND KITTERY

All of the foregoing municipalities have one factor in common which will undoubtedly have a direct effect upon their 1970 population figures and that is that there exists within each a military installation that may well have to be closed in the immediate future. In Bangor Dow Airforce Base will be closing in 1968, barring a national emergency. At Kittery, the Department of Defense has stated that the Naval Shipyard will be phased out by 1974 and all efforts to obtain a reversal of this administrative decision have failed.

At Limestone we find Loring Airforce Base and at Brunswick the Brunswick Naval Air Station. Both of these Bases have had changes in personnel and equipment, the end result of which has been a reduction of personnel and thus the removal of families from the respective towns. The fate of Limestone (Loring) and Brunswick (Naval Air Station) could and may well be the same fate as Bangor (Dow) by 1970, as the obvious policy trend of the Department of Defense is to close more and more military installations of the type under discussion.

Accordingly, it was the judgment of a majority of the Committee that the populations in Bangor and Brunswick, Limestone and Kittery would be held static when projecting population trends to 1970. Thus, out of approximately 500 cities, towns, plantations, wards, precincts and other recognized local municipal entities involved in either plan, we have held only four (4) municipal units at a static (1960) population figure, or approximately .008%.

The majority of the Committee recognize that the closing of an Air Base or military installation can be overcome. We recognize the well publicized fact that the City of Presque Isle lost its Airforce Base in 1961 and in 1967 the City was honored with the All American City Award for the excellent work of all concerned in changing the economy of this City from a military footing to a sound

civilian based foundation. We note also that from shut down to award a period of 6 years elapsed. You will note that we have projected the population growth of the City of Presque Isle in our report, believing that it has fully recovered from the effect of the closing of its Air Base.
