IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED

AN ACT Relating to Retirement Benefits for Institutional Heads, Deputies and Assistants and Correctional Officers and Employees of the Bureau of Corrections under State Retirement System.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., T. 5, § 1121, sub-§ 4, ¶ E, additional. Subsection 4 of section 1121 of Title 5 of the Revised Statutes, as amended, is further amended by adding a new paragraph E, to read as follows:

E. Any member who is the warden or superintendent, deputy warden or assistant superintendent of the Maine State Prison, or the Men's Correctional Center, any officer or employee of any such institution employed as a correctional officer or guard, or engaged in any like employment, or as the supervising officer of any such officers or employees, and in any case, who has at least 20 years of creditable service in his respective capacity, or cumulatively in any combination of such correctional employment capacities, may be retired on or after the attainment of age 55 on a service retirement allowance, which will be equal to $\frac{1}{2}$ of his average final compensation, but must be retired at the attainment of age 60.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

It is estimated that this Act will require about \$60,000 per year.
