STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-ONE

AN ACT Permitting Medical Laboratory Technicians to Administer Blood Tests to Determine Alcoholic Content.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., T. 29, § 1312, sub-§ 7, amended. The last sentence of subsection 7 of section 1312 of Title 29 of the Revised Statutes, as last repealed and replaced by section 1 of chapter 439 of the public laws of 1969, is amended to read as follows:

A duly licensed physician, medical laboratory technician or registered nurse, acting at the request of a law enforcement officer with the consent of the defendant, may collect specimens of blood only for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content therein.

Sec. 2. R. S., T. 29, § 1312, sub-§ 8, amended. The first sentence of subsection 8 of section 1312 of Title 29 of the Revised Statutes, as last repealed and replaced by section 1 of chapter 439 of the public laws of 1969, is amended to read as follows:

No physician, medical laboratory technician, registered nurse, or person certified by the Department of Health and Welfare, shall be held liable in damages or otherwise for any act done or omitted to be done in performing the act of collecting or withdrawing specimens of blood at the request of a law enforcement officer pursuant to this section.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to permit blood tests in certain motor vehicle violations to be administered by medical laboratory technicians in addition to physicians and registered nurses.
