COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "B" to H. P. 260, L. D. 342, Bill,
"AN ACT Providing for Scholarships for North American Indians
Residing in Maine."

Amend said bill by striking out all of that part designated "§ 1484." of section I (same in L.D.) and inserting in place thereof the following:

'§ 1484. Application

Any student meeting the requirements of section 1482 may apply for a grant not exceeding \$800 per year for purposes of paying his or her board, room, books and other costs for secondary school and \$1500 per year for purposes of tuition, books, board, room and other costs for post-secondary schools meeting the requirements of section 1483.'

Further amend said bill by striking out in the 3rd and 4th lines of that part designated "§ 1485." of section 1 (3rd line in L.D.) the underlined words and figure "not to exceed \$1,000 per enrolled grant recipient"

Further amend said Bill by striking out in the 3rd line of section 2 (same in L.D.) the figure "\$225,000" and inserting in place thereof the figure '\$70,000'

Further amend said Bill by striking out in the 8th line of section 2 (7th in L.D.) the figure "\$100,000" and inserting in place thereof the figure '\$25,000'

Further amend said Bill by striking out in the 8th line of section 2 (7th in L.D.) the figure "\$125,000" and inserting in place thereof the figure '\$45,000'

Statement of Fact

The purpose of this amendment is to change the scholarship amount, eliminate the ceiling on institutional grants and decrease the appropriation from \$225,000 to \$70,000.
