STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-ONE

AN ACT Establishing Sheriff, Register of Probate, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts in Androscoggin County as Full-time.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., T. 4, § 551, amended. Section 551 of Title 4 of the Revised Statutes, as last repealed and replaced by section 1 of chapter 229 of the public laws of 1969, is amended by adding a new paragraph at the end to read as follows:

The office of clerk of courts in Androscoggin County is designated a fulltime county office.

Sec. 2. R. S., T. 18, § 251, amended. Section 251 of Title 18 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

The office of register of probate in Androscoggin County is designated a full-time county office.

Sec. 3. R. S., T. 30, § 605, additional. Title 30 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 605, to read as follows:

§ 605. Full-time

The office of county treasurer in Androscoggin County is designated a fulltime county office.

Sec. 4. R. S., T. 30, § 909, additional. Title 30 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section 909, to read as follows:

§ 909. Full-time

The office of sheriff of Androscoggin County is designated a full-time county office.

Sec. 5. R. S., T. 33, § 604, amended. Section 604 of Title 33 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

The office of register of deeds in Androscoggin County is designated a fulltime county office.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The workload in the offices of sheriff, register of probate, county treasurer, clerk of courts and register of deeds in Androscoggin County has increased to such an extent that such offices should now be full-time.
