STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-ONE

AN ACT to Appropriate Moneys for the Expenditures of State Government and for Other Purposes for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1972 and June 30, 1973.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and Resolves passed by the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the said 90-day period will not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of departments and institutions will become due and payable on or immediately after July 1, 1971; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Appropriations for necessary expenditures of government. In order to provide for necessary expenditures of government and for other purposes for the next two fiscal years—from July I, 1971 to June 30, 1972 and from July I, 1972 to June 30, 1973—the following sums or as much thereof as shall severally be found necessary, as designated in the following tabulation, are appropriated out of any moneys in the General Fund not otherwise appropriated. Upon receipt of allotments duly approved by the Governor and

Council based upon work programs submitted to the State Budget Officer, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures of these appropriations and revenues accruing thereto, together with expenditures for other purposes necessary to the conduct of State Government on the basis of such allotments and not otherwise.

Allotments for personal services, capital expenditures and amounts for all other departmental expenses shall not exceed the amount shown in the budget document or as they may be revised by the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs unless recommended by the State Budget Officer and approved by the Governor and Council.

The figures in parentheses shown just before each dollar amount provided for Personal Services in this Act, or as adjusted by legislative action, shall represent the total number of persons employable on a permanent basis at any one time. The appropriations made for Personal Services are made with the provision that the total number of permanent positions in any account shall not be increased during either year of the biennium over the total numbers shown in parentheses and used by the Legislature in computing the total dollars to be made available for Personal Services. Savings accruing within appropriations made for permanent positions may be used for other non-recurring personal services when recommended by the department head and the Budget Officer, and approved by the Governor and Council. To provide some degree of flexibility, each department, institution or agency may apply to the Personnel Board for an exchange between job classifications, and such action may be approved if by so doing the total amount determined to be made available for Personal Services, in such account, for any one year is not exceeded and also providing that certification is made, in writing, that such action will not result in an increased request for Personal Service moneys from the next Legislature. Copies of all Personnel Board action relating to such changes shall be furnished to the Legislative Finance Office.

The Budget Office, during the next biennium, shall continually review with all departments the status of their personnel with the purpose of determing that all departments are expending Personal Service moneys within the intent of the Legislature, and shall report any expenditures contrary to such intent to the Governor and Council and the Legislative Finance Officer.

The Personnel Board is directed to require merit ratings on each individual who is recommended for a salary increase on a form prescribed by the board. Department heads are directed that the granting of merit increases be scrutinized and documented carefully. It is the intent of the Legislature that in instances where merit increases are not earned and warranted they should be denied.

The Governor and the Budget Officer when next preparing a Budget Document may at their discretion adjust the figures in parentheses, representing numbers of permanent employees to reflect the number of employees which in their opinion is necessary to the proper operation of each department, institution or agency.

The State Purchasing Agent is directed to require that requisitions for replacement motor vehicles include the age and total mileage of the motor vehicles being replaced. For the purposes of this paragraph, motor vehicles are defined as passenger cars, panel and pickup trucks, excluding those vehicles operated by the State Police. It is the intent of the Legislature that motor vehicles shall have been in service for at least 5 years or 50,000 miles before they are replaced. This policy shall also be adopted by the Budget Officer when next preparing a Budget Document. Exceptions to the established replacement policy shall require the prior approval of the Governor and Council.

No state department, institution or agency shall establish new programs or expand existing programs beyond the scope of those programs already established, recognized and approved by the Legislature, until such program and the method of financing shall be submitted to the Department of Finance and Administration—Budget Office—for evaluation and recommendation to the Legislature, and until funds are made available therefor by the Legislature.

It is the intent of the Legislature that out-of-state travel be limited. Any State employee who travels out-of-state on State business (such as law enforcement, collecting, bidding, industrial or recreational development, loans, etc.) may continue to do so.

However, the Legislature is concerned about the increase in out-of-state travel and because of the State's financial circumstances, the Legislature directs that Department Heads hold down cost of all travel where it is not absolutely needed.

The Budget Office shall inform the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs through the Legislative Finance Office of significant action recommended by it in the performance of the budget responsibilities hereby assigned.

It is further provided that the Controller is authorized to close his books as soon as practicable after the close of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1972 and June 30, 1973. Any bills presented after those dates may be paid from appropriations for the ensuing year on recommendation of the Controller if within the amounts of approved allotments.

Whenever it appears to the Commissioner of Finance and Administration that the anticipated income of the State will not be sufficient to meet the expenditures authorized by the Legislature, he shall so report to the Governor and Council and they may temporarily curtail allotments equitably so that expenditures will not exceed the anticipated income.

The Commissioner of Finance and Administration through the State Purchasing Agent or such other agent as he may choose, shall conduct a thorough review of all types of equipment, owned, leased or otherwise available to the several departments and agencies of the State, regardless of the source of supporting funds, with the intent of combining their use, providing centralized facilities, or of eliminating existing equipment and facilities,

as he believes to be in the most economical, most efficient and best interests of the State.

At the end of each fiscal year of the biennium, all unencumbered appropriation balances representing state moneys, except those that carry forward as provided by law, shall be lapsed to Unappropriated Surplus as provided by the Revised Statutes of 1964, Title 5, section 1544. At the end of each fiscal year of the biennium, all encumbered appropriation balances shall be carried forward to the next fiscal year, but in no event shall encumbered appropriation balances be carried more than once.

There shall be paid from the General Highway Fund the cost of accounting, auditing, purchasing and legal services furnished from the General Fund appropriations. This revenue shall be credited to the General Fund.

It is the intent of the Legislature that in the event matching federal funds are not available as anticipated for programs in this Act, there is no obligation to provide state funds in excess of the appropriations listed in this Act.

Personnel employed by programs partially funded by fedeal funds shall be considered limited appointment employees, notwithstanding the figures in parentheses representing numbers of employees, should federal funds be withdrawn or reduced.

It is intended that the language in this section shall apply to all other appropriation measures enacted by the Legislature.

Section C

R. S., T. 5, § 641, repealed. Section 641 of Title 5 of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 1 of chapter 445 of the public laws of 1967 and as amended, is repealed.

Section D

R. S., T. 12, c. 201, sub-c. II, additional. Chapter 201 of Title 12 of the Revised Statutes, as amended, is further amended by adding a new subchapter II, to read as follows:

SUBCHAPTER II

SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY AND MINERAL RESOURCES

§ 531. Powers and duties

The Division of Science, Technology and Mineral Resources shall be established to administer the programs of the Maine Geological Survey and other natural resource functions of the State as directed by law; and to provide administrative and fiscal assistance to the Maine Mining Bureau.

The commissioner may employ a director of the division and an assistant director. The director shall act as administrator of the Maine Mining Bureau and as State Geologist. The assistant director shall act as assistant administrator of the Maine Mining Bureau and as assistant State Geologist. The director may employ, with the approval of the commissioner and subject to the Personnel Law, such employees as may be necessary to carry out the duties of the division.

The division is empowered to:

- 1. Geologic information. Gather and compile geologic information of both the bedrock and surficial features of the State; present this information in printed maps and reports for the general public and the mining industry; assist existing mining operations in the State; and promote the development of the mineral potential of the State.
- 2. Professional geologist; publications. Employ professional geologists, subject to the limitations hereinbefore set forth, to perform geologic mapping on specific projects in Maine, to provide basic geologic information and the location and environment of mineral deposits. The results obtained from the projects shall be compiled and published, the cost of such publication to be borne by the printing fund, as established.
- 3. Advisory assistance. Provide advisory assistance to any mining company interested in exploring the mineral resources of the State. Members of the division staff may visit the executive offices of mining companies from time to time in order to maintain the interest of company executives in mineral development within the State.
- 4. Research projects. Initiate and develop research projects in the field of economic geology and basic geology which are necessary to advance the total geologic knowledge of the State.

- 5. Investigations. Conduct investigations of natural and physical resources so as to assist the department and other state agencies in providing information on the physical environment of the State. Such investigations shall include geological marine studies, environmental geological studies and geological studies for industrial plant location.
- 6. Printing fund. There is established within the division a revolving fund for the use of the division to cover printing and distribution costs for geological and related technical literature. The commissioner is authorized to fix the price at which publications of the division may be sold and delivered. The department shall receive without charge 10% of all such publications for complimentary distribution.

The commissioner is further authorized to fix the price at which the United States Geological Survey and other United States Government maps, charts and other publications may be sold and delivered, provided such publications are specifically authorized for resale by the originating agency and are specifically concerned with technical information on the State of Maine. Income from the sale of publications shall be credited to the revolving fund to be used as a continuing carrying account to carry out the purposes of the printing fund.

- Sec. 2. R. S., T. 10, § 661, repealed. Section 661 of Title 10 of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 12 of chapter 442 of the public laws of 1969, is repealed.
- Sec. 3. R. S., T. 12, § 501-A, sub-§ 9, additional. Section 501-A of Title 12 of the Revised Statutes, as enacted by section 3 of chapter 226 of the public laws of 1965, is amended by adding a new subsection 9, to read as follows:
- 9. Science, technology and mineral resources. A Division of Science, Technology and Mineral Resources.
- Sec. 4. Transitional provisions. It is the intent of the Legislature to transfer existing personnel and budget of the Division of Science, Technology and Mineral Resources of the Department of Economic Development as a division without reclassification to the Forestry Department.

Section E

R. S., T. 22, § 3502, amended. The next to the last sentence, as amended by chapter 232 of the public laws of 1969, and the last sentence of section 3502 of Title 22 of the Revised Statutes, are amended to read as follows:

The sums necessary for the support and instruction of such pupils in such school, including all traveling expenses of such pupils attending such school, shall may be paid by the State. Nothing herein contained shall be held to prevent the voluntary Department of Health and Welfare from securing whole or partial payment of the whole or any part of such sums by from the parents or guardians of such pupils or from local school systems.

Emergency clase. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect July 1, 1971.
