STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-ONE

AN ACT Defining the Crime of Theft Known as Shopstealing and Establishing Rights and Penalties.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., T. 17, c. 114, additional. Title 17 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new chapter 114, to read as follows:

CHAPTER 114

SHOPSTEALING

§ 3511. Definition

Shopstealing is the wrongful taking of goods, wares or merchandise offered for sale or on display in any retail store or other mercantile establishment.

§ 3512. Right of detention

Any store proprietor, his agent or employee, who has reasonable grounds to believe that a person is in the act of committing the crime of shopstealing may detain such a person in a reasonable manner and for such a reasonable length of time as shall be necessary to summons a police officer.

§ 3513. Penalty

Any person found guilty of the crime of shopstealing shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment of not more than one year, or by both.
