**AN ACT** Authorizing the Town of New Portland to vote on Certain Liquor  
Local Option Questions.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Town of New Portland authorized to vote on certain liquor local option questions. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the selectmen of the Town of New Portland, Somerset County, are empowered and directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of New Portland to meet at a special town meeting to be held not less than 30 days nor more than 60 days following the effective date of this Act, to give in their votes upon the following questions:

1. Shall licenses be granted in this town for sale herein of wine and spirits to be consumed on the premises of Class A restaurants?
2. Shall licenses be granted in this town for sale herein of malt liquor (beer, ale and other malt liquors) to be consumed on the premises? (Beer and Ale in Restaurants, Hotels and Clubs)

The result of the vote shall be declared by the municipal officers of the Town of New Portland and due certification thereof shall be filed by the town clerk with the Secretary of State.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to allow the citizens of the Town of New Portland to vote on these liquor questions prior to the next local option election in 1974.
