STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-THREE

AN ACT Relating to Powers of Ogunquit Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- P. & S. L., 1913, c. 203, § 2, sub-§ (5), additional. Section 2 of chapter 203 of the private and special laws of 1913, as last amended by chapter 166 of the private and special laws of 1955, is further amended by adding a new subsection (5) to read as follows:
- (5) Rights, powers and privileges. The corporation, within its territorial limits, shall have and is hereby granted all the rights, powers and privileges which towns have, or which the municipal officers of towns have, under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of 1964, Title 30, chapter 209, sections 2151 to 2156 relating to ordinances; Title 30, chapter 239, subchapter V, section 4956 relating to land subdivisions, and sections 4961 to 4963, planning and zoning; Title 38, chapter 1, subchapter I, section 1 to section 6, relating to harbormasters; and all Acts amendatory thereof, or additional thereto, are hereby specifically granted to and invested in the corporation and its municipal officers.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Over the years the Ogunquit Village Corporation has adopted bylaws and ordinances relating to police power, planning and zoning and harbormasters. This was done by authority of the wording of its Charter and by the authority of the general law at the time. The purpose of this bill is to update its authority because of the many changes in the general law.
