AN ACT Relating to the Redemption Value of Trading Stamps.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., T. 10, § 1253, amended. Section 1253 of Title 10 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

§ 1253. Cash value

No trading stamp company shall distribute trading stamps in this State or shall redeem trading stamps issued therein, unless each stamp has legibly printed upon its face in cents or any fraction thereof a cash value determined by the company, and the rightful holders may, at their option, redeem the stamps in cash when duly presented to the company, **at a location within the State**, for redemption in a number having an aggregate cash value of not less than 25¢, **and unless the cash redemption value of said stamps shall be at least equal to the highest cash redemption value offered by the company in any other jurisdiction where the company does business.**

STATEMENT OF FACT

The major trading stamp companies grant different redemption rates from state to state. In Maryland, which has enacted legislation similar to this amendment, consumers are able to redeem their stamps from one major stamp firm at 80¢ per book more than the Maine consumer dealing with the same company, and \$1 per book more for the stamps of another major firm.

This inequity would be abolished with the passage of this amendment.
