**AN ACT** Relating to Retirement of Attorney General, Deputy Attorneys  
General and Assistant Attorneys General.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., T. 5, § 1121, sub-§ 12, additional. Section 1121 of Title 5 of the Revised Statutes, as amended, is further amended by adding a new subsection 12 to read as follows:

12. **Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General and assistant attorneys general.** Any member who is Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General or assistant attorney general who has at least 20 years of creditable service in such capacity, or in any combination of any of these capacities, may be retired on a service retirement allowance which is equal to  $\frac{1}{2}$  of his average final compensation.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill implements Recommendation #5, Attorney General, of the Maine Management and Cost Survey Report.

The purpose of the bill is to provide a sufficiently attractive retirement opportunity as an incentive to induce capable, public-service minded, young assistant attorneys general to remain in the Department of Attorney General for at least 20 years, thereby providing that department with greater depth of experience, skill and continuity. The recommendation was supported by the Governor in his Special Message to the 106th Legislature on January 10, 1974.
