AN ACT to Permit the Commissioner of Transportation to Designate Certain Highways for the use of Twin-Trailer Trucks.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. 29 MRSA § 1, sub-§ 18, is amended to read:

18. Trailer. "Trailer" shall mean any vehicle without motive power, designed for carying persons or property and for being drawn by a motor vehicle, not operated on tracks, and so constructed that no part of its weight rests upon the towing vehicle and may include a semitrailer with a detachable converter dolly.

Sec. 2. 29 MRSA § 244, 6th ¶, is amended to read :

Only one trailer or semitrailer shall be drawn by a motor vehicle; provided that a tractor may draw a semi-trailer in combinations on ways designated by the Department of Transportation and provided further that driveaway, towaway operations, as defined by the Public Utilities Commission, may include a combination of saddlemount vehicles not to exceed 3 units in contact with the surface of the highway.

Sec. 3. 29 MRSA § 244, 7th ¶, sub-§ 2-A, is enacted to read:

2-A. Combination tractor, semitrailer, trailer. A combination consisting of a tractor, a semitrailer and a trailer shall not exceed 65 feet in length.

Sec. 4. 29 MRSA § 531, sub-§ 1, as enacted by PL 1973, c. 587, § 2, is amended to read:

1. Class 1. Any motor vehicle or combination of vehicles, including "Class 2 or 3," except school bus, motorcycle or motor driven cycle provided that no person shall drive combinations consisting of a tractor, semitrailer and trailer until such driver has held this Class 1 license for a period of at least 3 years;

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to permit the Commissioner of Transportation to designate certain highways within the State where the use of twin-trailers, not to exceed 65 feet in length, will be allowed.

It is estimated that the use of twin-trailers will save over \$2,000,000 gallons of diesel fuel per year, resulting in the conservation of valuable petroleum. The use of twin-trailers will also lower transportation costs to Maine industries, putting them in a better competitive position.

Over 30 states allow twin-trailers to operate on certain of their highways.

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
