COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A " to S.P. 289, L.D. 915, Bill, "AN ACT to Permit 17 Year Olds to Donate Blood Without Parental Consent."

Amend the Bill by inserting before the enacting clause the following:

'<u>Emergency preamble</u>. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergències; and

Whereas, during the summer months the supply of blood is lower than it is at other times of the year; and

Whereas, many high schools will sponsor blood drives between now and June to help relieve the blood shortage the State will experience during the summer; and

Whereas, enacting this bill as an emergency will enable 17year old high school students to donate blood without parental permission during the blood drives this spring and will thereby increase the number of potential donors and, hopefully, the amount of blood actually donated; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,' COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A " to S.P. 289, L.D. 915

> Further amend the Bill by inserting at the end before the Statement of Fact the following:

'<u>Emergency clause</u>. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.'

Statement of Fact

The purpose of this amendment is to add an emergency preamble and emergency clause to the bill. The bill needs to be passed by the Legislature as an emergency because the supply of blood is lower during the summer months. If the bill becomes effective upon approval, the number of potential blood donors will increase for the blood drives sponsored by high schools around the State this spring.
