### AN ACT to Repeal Certain Laws Relating to Conservation.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. 12 MRSA c. 304-A, as last amended by PL 1975, c. 497, § 3, is repealed.

Sec. 2. 12 MRSA § 2052, as last amended by PL 1971, c. 598, § 11, is repealed.

Sec. 3. 12 MRSA § 2153, 1st sentence is amended to read:

The commissioner may authorize, alter and remove the screening of any inland waters and shall, upon application, make suitable provisions for the passage of logs, lumber and pulpwood in any floatable waters of the State so screened.

Sec. 4. 12 MRSA §§ 2251 and 2252 are repealed.

Sec. 5. 12 MRSA § 2951, 2nd sentence is amended to read:

The warden shall investigate and, if he finds the damage has been done as alleged, he shall give a certificate to such person entitling such person to the ownership of the carcass to be possessed and consumed only within the immediate family of the owner of said vehicle.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill repeals certain laws relating to conservation which are no longer needed, including a provision establishing "junior guides," restrictions on fish

and game possession in camps, a chapter concerning airmobiles, a provision for the passage of logs on screened waters, and a provision permitting consumption of a deer killed in a collision with a car only within the immediate family of the car's owner.
