IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-NINE

AN ACT to Permit a Resident of an Intermediate Care Facility who Receives Aid for the Medically Needy to Give at Least \$250 a Month from His Income to a Dependent Spouse.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

22 MRSA § 3174, as last amended by PL 1977, c. 714, § 3, is further amended by adding after the 4th paragraph, which begins with the words "The application of any available," a new paragraph to read:

If a recipient of assistance under this chapter who resides in an intermediate care facility has a spouse dependent on that recipient for support, the department shall permit the recipient to transfer at least \$250 a month, or \$3,000 a year, from his income to that spouse.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill permits a person who lives in an intermediate care facility such as a nursing home, and who receives aid for the medically needy, to turn over to a dependent spouse at least \$250 a month, or \$3,000 a year, to that dependent spouse. At the present time, a recipient of aid to the medically needy who resides in a

nursing home is permitted to give a dependent spouse no more than \$187.80 monthly of his income. This figure is clearly insufficient to support a dependent spouse and forces the spouse to seek state or federal assistance.

This bill, by providing that a recipient may turn over at least \$250 monthly of his income to his spouse, will perhaps enable that spouse to stay off state or federal assistance, while enabling the recipient to stay in the intermediate care facility and receive the medical care he needs.
