IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-ONE

AN ACT to Remove Location Restrictions on Burial Sites.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

13 MRSA § 1181, as last amended by PL 1973, c. 537, § 18, is further amended to read:

§ 1181. Restrictions and conditions

The municipal officers of any town may on petition of 10 voters enlarge any public cemetery or burying ground or incorporated cemetery or burying ground within their town by taking land of adjacent owners, to be paid for by the town or otherwise as the municipal officers may direct, when in their judgment public necessity requires it. The limits thereof shall not be extended nearer any improved land used for recreational purposes or dwelling house or well, from which the water is used for domestic purposes, than 25 rods, against the written protest of the owner made to said officers at the time of the hearing on said petition. Nor shall any person, corporation or association establish, locate or enlarge any cemetery or burying ground by selling or otherwise disposing of land so that the limits thereof shall beextended nearer any improved land used for recreational purposes or dwelling house or well than 25 rods against the written protest of the owner. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the sale or disposition of lots within the limits of any existing cemetery or burying ground, nor the extension thereof away from any improved land used for recreational purposes or

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dwelling house or well. This section shall not apply to land acquired under Title 37-A, section 15

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to permit cemeteries to be enlarged closer than what present restrictions allow, which are 25 rods from improved land used for recreational purposes or dwelling house or well. The bill removes those restrictions.
