## IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-ONE

AN ACT to Allow Wardens to Take a Cash Bond from any Nonresident or Alien Found in Violation of the Fish and Wildlife Laws.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

12 MRSA  $\S$  7053, sub- $\S$  2,  $\P$  C, sub- $\P$  (1), as enacted by PL 1979, c. 420,  $\S$  1, is amended to read:

(1) Any game warden making an arrest of any nonresident or alien for any violation of chapters 701 to 721 and Title 38, chapter 3, subchapter I, Article I A, at a point more than 50 miles distant from the nearest District Court having jurisdiction may accept the personal recognizance of the prisoner in an amount not to exceed \$500 for his appearance before the nearest District Court on a specified date and a deposit in money to the amount of that recognizance;

#### STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this legislation is to allow wardens to take a cash bond from any nonresident or alien found in violation of the fish and wildlife laws.

The bill removes residents from the provisions of the cash bond system; saves nonresidents and alien violators the inconvenience of having to be taken before a bail commissioner; solves the problem of nonresidents and aliens leaving the jurisdiction of the State without paying their fines; and eliminates the necessity of wardens having to drive numerous miles and use up valuable time transporting violators to locations where bail can be posted.
