COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 1120, L.D. 1337,

Bill, "AN ACT to Require Periodic Reapportioning of Districts
for Election of Representatives to Congress."

Amend the Bill in section 2 in that part designated "S1571-A." by striking out all of the first paragraph of subsection 3 and inserting in its place the following:

'3. Redistricting, change in the number of Congressional seats. Whenever, by notification under the United States

Code, Title 2, section 2-A (b), there is a change in the number of Representatives to Congress, the Legislature shall establish a commission as described in the Constitution of Maine, Article IV,

Part Third, section 1-A, for the purpose of reapportioning the State into a number of Congressional districts equal to the number of Representatives to Congress. If the notification is received during a regular session, the commission shall be established within 3 legislative days of notification. If the notification is received at another time, the commission shall be established within the first 3 legislative days of notification.

In making such a reapportionment, the commission shall insure that each Congressional district is formed of contiguous and compact territory and crosses political subdivision lines the least number of times necessary to establish as nearly as practicable equally populated districts.'

Statement of Fact

This amendment details the procedure by which the reapportionment commission is to be established.
