STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to exclude wages paid primarily to temporary Jamaican apple pickers from unemployment compensation tax. It applies only to temporary farm workers and will have no appreciable or significant effect on the Unemployment Compensation Fund. The rationale for the exclusion of this group of workers is that the unemployment insurance premium is being paid for benefits that could never be collected on because we have no reciprocal agreement with Jamaica.

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
