20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22 23 24	Sec. 1. 21 MRSA §701, sub-§2, ¶B, as amended by PL 1973, c. 414, §30, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32	B. Name and residence of candidate. The ballot must contain the name, without any title, and place of residence of each candidate arranged under the proper office designation. Names of candidates shall be arranged surname first in alphabetical order. Starting with elections in 1984, and every other year thereafter, the names of candidates shall be arranged surname first in

1 2 3	reverse alphabetical order. The name of each candidate may be printed on the ballot in only one space.

15	STATEMENT OF FACT
16 17 18 19 20 21	The purpose of this bill is to establish an alternating system for the arrangement of names on primary and general election ballots. Presently, names appear in alphabetical order only. This bill requires names to appear in reverse alphabetical order every other year.
