or other police power ordinance or regulation to totally prevent the location and development of mobile home park facilities within their respective borders. Municipalities shall provide a range of suitable locations for these developments as soon as possible, but not later than January 1, 1984.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The State Planning Office has estimated that Maine lacks approximately 50,000 units of housing, and that that figure is growing by 5,000 units each year. Because of the high cost of housing construction and housing financing, manufactured housing has become the only affordable means of home ownership for many Maine families. This bill requires Maine communities to make provisions for the location of manufactured housing in at least some residential areas within their borders; it enables municipalities to set their own local standards, such as design or aesthetic standards and certification of manufacturing standards, thus preserving a significant degree of local control.
