## STATEMENT OF FACT

 Under the Maine Sardine Law, Title 32, sections 4151 to 4161, every sardine packer must pay a monthly fee which is used to underwrite the cost of state inspection. That fee is, at present, statutorily set not to exceed 12¢ per case of sardines packed. That rate is insufficient to cover inspection costs. Rather than increase the fee, thereby placing a substantial burden on packers, this bill institutes a pilot program which requires each packer to employ a qualified inspector for grade and quality control. The department would employ 2 supervisors to oversee the level of inspection and ensure compliance with

the law. These supervisors will be paid from General Fund moneys rather than the fund generated by fees. General Fund money is also allocated to pay laboratory personnel for grading and analysis. Should the program prove successful, the fee account will be repealed.

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
