20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22	7 MRSA §3407 is enacted to read:
23	§3407. Dogs; vaccination required
24 25	A person commits a civil violation if he owns or keeps any dog 6 months of age or older, if such dog
26	has not been vaccinated with antirables vaccine
27	within 24 months preceding the date on which the dog
28	is owned or kept. Proof of vaccination shall be
29	filed with the municipal clerk within 10 days after
30	the vaccination or within 10 days after the dog is
31	brought into the municipality. A filing fee of \$1
32	shall be paid to the municipal clerk if the dog is
33	not licensed in the municipality. Proof of vaccina-

1 tion shall be affixed to the dog in an acceptable manner. Failure to file proof of vaccination or failure to produce proof of vaccination upon demand of any law enforcement officer, animal control officer or other public official authorized for these purposes, shall be prima facie evidence that the dog has not been vaccinated.

A forfeiture of not less than \$25, nor more than \$100, shall be adjudged for a violation of this section.

The purpose of this bill is to reduce the danger of rabies infection being transmitted to beings, or to domestic animals, by unvaccinated dogs which have a high degree of exposure to infected wild animals due to the fact that most dogs in rural areas are hitched out-of-doors all through the year. a rabies vaccination is a requirement for dog licensing, it is only partially successful due to the fact that the municipalities are not enforcing the dog licensing law during the first 4 months and the last 3 months of the year.
