23	Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §1664, last ¶, as amended by PL
24	1981, c. 444, §1, is further amended to read:
25	Part 3 shall embrace complete drafts or summaries

Sec. 2. 36 MRSA §5284 is enacted to read:

§5284. Nongame wildlife voluntary checkoff

- 1. Legislative finding. The Legislature finds that endangered, threatened and other nongame wildlife need special management and that it is in the public interest to preserve, protect, perpetuate and enhance the nongame wildlife resources of this State. This section provides financing for this management through a voluntary checkoff designation on state individual income tax return forms, which financing shall be supplemental to and not in lieu of any funding that would otherwise be appropriated for this purpose. For the purposes of this section, "nongame wildlife" includes all unconfined terrestrial and aquatic species which are not ordinarily collected, captured or killed for sport or profit.
- 2. Voluntary checkoff. The following procedure shall be used to contribute to the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund.
 - A. An individual who is entitled to a refund under this Part may designate that any specified portion of that refund be paid into the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund. An individual who is entitled to no refund under this Part may add any specified amount to his tax liability to be paid into the fund.
- B. Each individual income tax return form shall contain a designation in substantially the following form: "Contribution to Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund: () \$1, () \$5, () \$10 or () Other \$___."
- 3. Contributions credited to Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund. The State Tax Assessor shall determine annually the total amount contributed pursuant to subsection 2 and shall, prior to the begin-

ning of the next fiscal year, report that amount to the Treasurer of State, who shall credit that amount to the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund, which is established in the State Treasury. All money deposited in the fund, and the earnings thereon, shall remain in the fund to be used for the management of nongame wildlife, and for necessary administrative and personnel costs associated therewith, and shall not be deposited in the General Fund or any other fund except as specifically provided by statute.

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- 4. Report and allocation. The Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife shall include a report on the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund as part of the report submitted to the Governor pursuant to Title 12, section 7034. The commissioner shall also submit a budget for each biennium in accordance with Title 5, sections 1663 to 1666. The State Controller shall authorize expenditures from the fund as approved by the commissioner.
- 5. Grants. Any person, organization or agency of the State may apply to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for a grant to undertake research and nongame wildlife management activities. The department may award grants out of the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund.
 - Sec. 3. Effective date. This Act shall take effect 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature and shall apply to income tax returns filed on and after January 1, 1984.

31 STATEMENT OF FACT

The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife is charged by law with the authority and responsibility for the management of all of the state's wildlife resources, including nongame species. State funds for nongame wildlife management have never been appropriated.

This bill permits individuals filing Maine income tax returns to make contributions to a fund designated for management of the endangered and nongame

wildlife species of the State. The contribution will decrease the individual's refund or increase his liability.

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The Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund will be used by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for management of nongame wildlife accordance with the legislative finding of the Revised Statutes, Title 36, section 5284, subsection intended that the term "management of It is nongame wildlife" include, without limitation, enforcement of laws enacted to protect nongame species and activities undertaken pursuant to the Revised Statutes, Title 12, chapter 713, subchapter V, Endangered Species. Any start-up costs incurred by the department in anticipation of implementing this program may be reimbursed from the fund.

Twenty states now have nongame checkoffs on their income tax forms. Experience in these states has shown that a large number of taxpayers are willing to donate funds for nongame management.

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
