25	STATEMENT OF FACT
26 27 28 29 30 31	Under present law, workers whose earnings are from industries determined to be seasonal are eligible for unemployment benefits only if they are unemployed during the season in which that industry customarily operates even if they are able, available and actively seeking work outside of that season.

Only 9 other states have such a provision. In most states no distinction is made in determining an individual's benefit rights between wages received from employers whose operation is seasonal in character and those whose is not.

Other provisions of our present law are sufficient to prevent persons whose attachment to the labor force is clearly limited to a brief period of seasonal work from receiving unemployment compensation benefits. Earnings, durational employment standards and requirements that claimants be able, available and actively seeking work, insure that only persons with a genuine attachment to the labor force receive benefits.

This bill repeals the seasonality provision of the employment security law.
