only until such time as the applicant receives actual notice of the denial of his eligibility for benefits. Any benefits received by the claimant during this interim period to which he is found not entitled after a determination is finally made shall not constitute an overpayment.

8 STATEMENT OF FACT

Both federal and state law place great emphasis on paying unemployment compensation benefits as expeditiously as possible; however, there is presently no relief available for an individual claimant who is made to wait an excessively long period of time for his benefit determination.

Federal policy requires that eligibility be determined within 14 days from the end of the week in which a person makes his first claim for benefits. The federal desired level of achievement for meeting this standard is for 75% of all determinations to be timely. Maine's performance as determined in the 1982 Quality Performance Appraisal was substantially less than this, or 60%.

Delays in receiving benefits create substantial hardship for unemployed workers and their families, many of whom rely on unemployment benefits as their only source of support. This bill provides benefits immediately to unemployed workers who have waited 30 days, more than twice the time established by federal standards, for a benefit determination.

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
