ritory, as defined in Title 30, section 6205. No distributor shall may lease or loan or otherwise distribute free of charge any gambling apparatus or implements to any organization eligible to operate a game of chance.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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The purpose of this bill is to remove the prohibition against licensed distributors of gambling equipment used in games of chance from selling this merchandise to certain unlicensed organizations. Presently, games of chance distributors may sell only to organizations licensed with the State Police under Title 17, chapter 14. Because state licensing jurisdiction does not extend to military bases or, arguably, to Indian territory, organizations operating games of chance on those premises are "unlicensed," and, consequently, licensed games of chance distributors in Maine cannot sell to them. These organizations end up purchasing their gambling equipment from out-of-state distributors.

This bill corrects this problem by permitting sales to organizations operating on Indian territory and on federal military bases.

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
