30 This bill is proposed in order to reflect current 31 practice, since 1977, within the Traffic Violations

1 Bureau of the District Court. Raising the limit to 29 miles per hour makes it possible for a person to 3 plead guilty and pay the prescribed fine without hav-4 ing to appear in court so long as the motorist has 5 not exceeded the posted speed limit by more than this 6 amount. This is a convenience to the motorist as 7 well as expediting the work of the District Court.
