2. Penalty. Violation of this section shall result in a fine of not less than \$20 nor more than \$50 dollars for each violation. Every hour or part of an hour during which a person engages in conduct prohibited by subsection 1 constitutes a separate violation.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to prohibit the free distribution of cigarettes and other tobacco products in public places. Currently, distribution of cigarettes or tobacco to a child under 16 constitutes endangering the welfare of a child and is a Class D crime. The problem is that cigarettes are now being given away to adults who discard them, and they end up being used by children anyway. This bill would eliminate that problem.
