AN ACT to Prohibit Skiing in Out-of-bounds Areas.
Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
<pre>Sec. 1. 26 MRSA §472, sub-§13, as enacted by PL 1977, c. 543, §4, is amended to read:</pre>
13. Skier. "Skier" shall mean means any person while wearing skies, and any person while actually on a ski slope or trail located at a ski area for the purpose of skiing, including those persons engaged in cross-country, nordic or norpine skiing.
Sec. 2. 26 MRSA §489, sub-§6 is enacted to read:
6. Out of bounds. Ski or otherwise use any por-

Sec. 3. 26 MRSA §490, as enacted by PL 1977, c. 543, §4, is amended by adding at the end 2 new paragraphs to read:

Any violation of section 489, subsection 6, shall constitute a civil violation under Title 17-A, section 17.

In the event that it is necessary to commence a rescue operation as a result of a violation of section 489, subsection 6, any person who has committed the violation will be liable for the cost of that rescue operation.

## 16 STATEMENT OF FACT

More and more skiers are participating in the sport of cross-country and norpine skiing, frequently using the facilities of ski areas. The skiers often leave the regular network of trails to ski in undeveloped areas closed to the public. Their risk of injury and the potential for a skier to become lost creates the potential for high liability exposure for Maine ski areas. This law would be a tool to be used by ski areas to prevent a skier from skiing in out-of-bound areas.
