Whereas, income to the Low-level Waste Siting Fund has been about 1/2 the amount anticipated; and

Whereas, it is anticipated that continued operation of the commission will be necessary at least through June 30, 1984, yet no funds have been allocated for fiscal year 1983-84; and

Whereas, there are no public members on the commission at present; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

- Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- 17 Sec. 1. 10 MRSA §151-A, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 18 1981, c. 439, §5, is amended to read:
- 22 Sec. 2. 10 MRSA §175, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 23 1981, c. 439, §9, is amended to read:
 - 2. Membership; appointment. The commission shall consist of 9 11 members, who shall be appointed as follows. The Commissioners of Environmental Protection and Human Services, and the State Geologist, or their designees, shall be members of the commission. The President of the Senate shall appoint 2 Senators and, one person from an organization that is a low-level waste licensee and one person from the general public. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint 2 Representatives and, one person from an organization that is a low-level waste licensee and one person from the general public. The members shall be appointed in a timely manner to serve for terms of 2 years ending January 31st of each odd-numbered year, except that ex officio members shall serve while holding their offices. The Chairman of

- the Legislative Council shall call the first meeting of the commission, and at this meeting the commission shall elect a chairman and a vice-chairman from its
- 4 membership.
- 5 Sec. 3. 10 MRSA §176, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 439, §9, is amended to read:
- 7 2. Service fee. In the fiscal years 1982 1983 a A service fee of \$1 \$10 per cubic foot shall 8 be levied on all low-level radioactive waste gener-9 ated in this State and shipped to commercial disposal 10 facilities. The revenue from this service fee shall 11 12 be credited to the fund established in subsection 1 13 and used to carry out the purposes of this subchap-14 ter.

- 17 Not less than 24 hours in advance of transporting any shipment of low-level waste over any public way, 18 the person transporting the shipment shall notify the 19 20 Chief of the State Police of the shipment, its contents, destination, route and such other information 21 as the Department of Public Safety may, by regula-22 tion, require. Failure to make that notification 23 24 shall be a Class D crime.
- Sec. 5. Transitional provisions. Except for exofficio members, the terms of the present members of the Low-level Waste Siting Commission shall expire January 31, 1985.
- Sec. 6. Allocation. In addition to allocations made previously, the following funds are allocated from the Low-level Waste Siting Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

5 STATEMENT OF FACT

The 5-year average volume of low-level radioactive waste shipped from Maine is about 15,000 cubic feet, but in 1982 that fell to 7,800 cubic feet as result of volume reduction and a change in packaging methods. The projected volume for calendar year 1983 is about 7,500 cubic feet.

The annual budget for the Low-level Waste Commission, including travel, materials and necessary studies has been \$15,000. The reduced volume has resulted in a \$7,000 shortfall in income in 1982. a result, the fund still owes the Maine Geological Survey \$3,500 for the statutory geological area screening study conducted in 1983, and the commission has been unable to provide financial support to the Department of Environmental Protection for alternative small site design concept studies.

In order to actively participate in low-level waste planning, certain technical assistance engineering studies are required. The Department Environmental Protection has made preliminary estimates of \$67,000 per year for this program.

Based on the projected volumes, a fee of \$10 cubic foot should be sufficient to provide insurance that the budget and the outstanding bills will be covered, and that the Department of Environmental Protection technical studies can be funded. This fee will be reasonable compared to the average total cost of waste disposal and transportation of \$500,000 year.

The proposed Northeast Regional Interstate Radioactive Waste Compact is expected to have a June 3, 1984, initial ratification cutoff date. Ιt is prudent at this time to allocate funds for the commission through fiscal year 1984.

The bill modifies the commission by adding 2 public members. There are no public members now. It makes the term of members 2 years. Appointments are not for a specified time now.

The bill gives the Department of Public Safety new responsibility for the safe transportation of low-level waste. The Chief of the State Police is to be notified 24 hours prior to any shipment of low-level waste. The responsibility for coordination of transportation of low-level waste with the Federal Government is transferred from the Department of Transportation to the Department of Public Safety.
