17 AN ACT to Prohibit Hunting on Davis
18 Island, Lincoln County.
19

20 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as
21 follows:

22 12 MRSA §7651, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1979, c.
23 420, §1, is amended to read:

24 1. Designation of wildlife sanctuaries. The fol-
25 lowing described territories are designated as wild-
26 life sanctuaries and are subject to the commission-
27 er's authority under section 7653:

28 Back Bay Sanctuary, Portland: Back Bay, so called, in
29 Portland, in the County of Cumberland, above the
30 Grand Trunk Railway bridge or within the area
31 enclosed by a boundary line drawn as follows: Begin-
32 ning at Fish Point at the easterly end of the Eastern

1 Promenade in the City of Portland, thence extending
2 about northeasterly to Pomeroy's Rock, thence about
3 northeasterly to Mackworth or Half-way Rock southerly
4 of Mackworth or Mackey Island, thence in a northerly
5 direction to a point marked by a buoy 1,000 feet from
6 the most easterly point of Mackworth Island, so
7 called, thence in a northwesterly direction 700 yards
8 more or less to the northernmost point of the large
9 ridge on the north side of Mackworth Island, thence
10 in a north northwesterly direction in a straight line
11 about parallel to the Town of Falmouth shore to the
12 point on the shoreline where the property known as
13 the Berry Estate meets the property known as the
14 Portland Country Club, thence northwesterly and
15 southwesterly along the shore line of the Town of
16 Falmouth including that of the salt water pond adja-
17 cent to the property known as the Portland Country
18 Club to Mackworth or Mackey Point, thence about
19 southwesterly along the easterly side of Martin Point
20 bridge to the shore of East Deering (United States
21 Marine Hospital) Portland, thence about southwesterly
22 and southerly along said East Deering shore to the
23 Grand Trunk bridge, thence along the easterly side of
24 said Grand Trunk bridge to the shore of the Eastern
25 Promenade, Portland, thence about southerly along
26 said shore of the Eastern Promenade to the said Fish
27 Point, the point of beginning.

28 Baxter State Park: The following described tracts of
29 territory situated in the Counties of Penobscot and
30 Piscataquis W. E. L. S. the same being in unorganized
31 townships, to wit: That portion of Township 6, Range
32 8, Penobscot County in the southwest corner of said
33 township bounded and described as follows: Beginning
34 at the southwest corner of said township thence north
35 along the west line of said township to First Grand
36 or Matagamon Lake; thence easterly, southeasterly and
37 southerly along the western shore of said lake to the
38 point where the said western shore intersects the
39 north line of the Dam Lot, so called, which was con-
40 veyed to the East Branch Dam Company by deed dated
41 October 28, 1902 and recorded in Penobscot County
42 Registry of Deeds in book 727, page 335 and reputed
43 to be now owned by the East Branch Improvement Com-
44 pany; thence running west along the north line of
45 said Dam Lot to the northwest corner thereof; thence
46 running south along the west line of said Dam Lot to

1 the southwest corner thereof; thence running east
2 along the south line of said Dam Lot to the East
3 Branch of the Penobscot River; thence running south
4 by said East Branch to a point in the south line of
5 said township where the said East Branch intersects
6 the same; thence running west along the said south
7 line of said township to the southwest corner thereof
8 and the point of beginning; all of Township 3, Range
9 9, Piscataquis County now the property of the State
10 of Maine: All of Township 4, Range 9, Piscataquis
11 County: All of Township 5, Range 9, Piscataquis
12 County: That portion of Township 6, Range 9,
13 Piscataquis County lying south of Trout Brook and
14 south of Wadleigh Brook and extending from the east
15 line of said township across said township to the
16 west line thereof: All of Township 3, Range 10,
17 Piscataquis County: All of Township 4, Range 10,
18 Piscataquis County: All of Township 5, Range 10,
19 Piscataquis County, excepting therefrom an area of 20
20 acres in the southwesterly quarter thereof, formerly
21 owned by and belonging to Charles A. Daisey, now
22 owned by Arnold R. Daisey, which was excepted and
23 reserved from a deed from Percival Proctor Baxter to
24 the State of Maine, as set forth in chapter 91 of the
25 private and special laws of 1943. The said within de-
26 scribed 8 tracts or parcels of land contain 149,506
27 acres, more or less.

28 Beauchamp Sanctuary: The following described ter-
29 ritory situated in Rockport and Camden, in the County
30 of Knox: Beginning at the mouth of Goose River in
31 Rockport; thence in a northerly direction along
32 number 1 highway to the mouth of the Megunticook
33 River in Camden; thence in a southerly direction
34 along the coast around Metcalf Point and Beauchamp
35 Point and thence in a northerly direction to the said
36 Goose River.

37 Carver's Pond Waterfowl Sanctuary: The waters of
38 Carver's Pond, so called, in the Town of Vinalhaven,
39 County of Knox or 100 feet from the mean high water
40 mark of said pond. Carver's Pond for the purpose of
41 this sanctuary shall be considered all the waters of
42 said pond above the bridge on Main Street of the Town
43 of Vinalhaven.

44 Davis Island: Davis Island in Lincoln County.

1 Drake's Island Game Sanctuary: All that part of
2 Drake's Island, so called, in the Town of Wells,
3 which is bounded as follows: Northerly by the game
4 sanctuary established by chapter 31 of the public
5 laws of 1927; easterly by the Atlantic Ocean; south-
6 erly by the Wells River; and westerly by said river
7 and creek flowing under Dyke's Bridge, so called.

8 Dry Pond Sanctuary: On Dry Pond or from the shores of
9 said pond, which pond is situated in the Town of
10 Gray, in the County of Cumberland.

11 Fairfield Sanctuary: The following described ter-
12 ritory situated in the Town of Fairfield, in the
13 County of Somerset: Good Will Farm, so called; the
14 Girls' Farm, so called, of Good Will Farm; land of G.
15 W. Hinckley; land of John Connor; land of J. Russell
16 Barrett, which land is bounded as follows: On the
17 north by land of Edwin Hicks and N. E. Bessey; on the
18 east by the Kennebec River; on the south by land of
19 Fred Tobey, Frank Moore, H. B. Hamm and C. B. Tuttle,
20 also by the Fairfield town farm; on the west by land
21 of L. P. Gifford, Alonzo Hoxie, Edwin Marcou and also
22 by Martin Stream; said territory being Good Will Farm
23 proper, so called, the Girls' Farm, so called, and
24 land of G. W. Hinckley, John Connor and J. Russell
25 Barrett, adjacent to the above-named farms. For
26 provisions relating specifically to Fairfield
27 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
28 A, subparagraph (4).

29 Glencove Sanctuary; Rockport: Glencove, so called, in
30 Penobscot Bay, which cove is situated in the Town of
31 Rockport, in the County of Knox, and which cove is
32 bounded as follows, to wit: On the north, west and
33 south by the main land, on the east by a line extend-
34 ing from Smith's Point to Ram Island and from Ram
35 Island to the easterly point of Pine Hill in said
36 Rockport.

37 Gray Game Sanctuary: The following described ter-
38 ritory situated in the Town of Gray in the County of
39 Cumberland: Beginning at Gray Corner following the
40 Poland Spring Road to Dry Mills, thence following the
41 North Raymond Road to the guidepost at intersection
42 of East Raymond Road, thence following the East
43 Raymond Road to Douglass Mill Road; thence following

1 the Douglass Mill and Furbush Road to "Sand Brook,"
2 so called, on shore of Little Sebago Lake, thence
3 following shore of Little Sebago Lake to Foster
4 Shore, so called, at intersection of Foster and
5 Ramsdell Road, so called, near camp of Dr. Cushing
6 following last named road in easterly direction to
7 intersection of Ramsdell Road near homestead of Edgar
8 Foster, thence in a southerly direction following
9 said Ramsdell road to intersection of road leading
10 from Gray to West Gray, thence following last named
11 road to Gray Corner to point of beginning.

12 Hog Island Game Sanctuary: Hog Island in the Town of
13 Bremen, Lincoln County.

14 Jefferson and Whitefield Sanctuary: The following de-
15 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Jefferson
16 and Whitefield, in the County of Lincoln, which land
17 is bounded as follows: On the north by the highway
18 leading from Weary Pond to South Jefferson; on the
19 east by Sterns Brook and by Little Dyer's Pond and
20 the inlet stream and marsh of said pond and by the
21 highway leading from South Jefferson to Alna; on the
22 south by the Alna town line; on the west by the road
23 leading from Alna to said Weary Pond, in the Town of
24 Whitefield.

25 Kineo Point Sanctuary: Kineo Point, in Kineo, in the
26 County of Piscataquis.

27 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary: The fol-
28 lowing described territory situated in the Towns of
29 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro, in York County;
30 beginning at a point where the Little Ossipee River
31 joins the Saco River in the Town of Limington, thence
32 westerly and southerly along said Little Ossipee
33 River to the highway at Edgecomb's bridge, so called,
34 in Waterboro, thence southerly and easterly along
35 said highway to North Hollis, in the Town of Hollis,
36 thence easterly and northerly along the road next
37 west of Killick Brook to the road leading from Nason
38 Mills to Bonney Eagle, thence northeasterly along
39 said Bonney Eagle Road to the town line between
40 Limington and Hollis, thence northerly along said
41 town line to the Saco River, thence northerly along
42 said Saco River to the point of beginning. All roads
43 which serve to bound said Limington, Hollis and

1 Waterboro game sanctuary shall be a part of said
2 sanctuary. For provisions relating specifically to
3 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary, see
4 section 7654, subsection 5.

5 Megunticook Lake and Vicinity Sanctuary: The waters
6 of Megunticook Lake, formerly called Canaan Lake, and
7 its tributary lakes, ponds and streams, and upon the
8 land bordering on the same included within the fol-
9 lowing roads: Beginning at Hopkins' Corner, so
10 called, in the Town of Camden; thence via the Turn-
11 pike Road, so called, to Lincolnville Center; thence
12 to Wiley's Corner in Lincolnville, thence to the
13 Mansfield schoolhouse in the Town of Camden; thence
14 via the Fish Hatchery to place of beginning; all of
15 said lake, its tributaries and shores being located
16 in the Towns of Camden, Lincolnville and Hope, in the
17 Counties of Knox and Waldo. For provisions relating
18 specifically to Megunticook Lake and Vicinity
19 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
20 C, subparagraphs (1) and (2).

21 Merrymeeting Bay Game Sanctuary: Merrymeeting Bay in
22 the Towns of Bowdoinham and Woolwich bounded as fol-
23 lows: Commencing at the high tension tower on
24 Kelley's Point, so called, in Bowdoinham; thence
25 westerly by a line approximately 100 feet above the
26 high water mark designated by a series of posted
27 signs over the field lands and by posted signs and a
28 single strand of wire through the wooded area thus
29 southerly 100 feet more or less to a red stake at the
30 high water mark of Merrymeeting Bay; thence southerly
31 approximately 400 yards to a red stake or marker on
32 range between the first mentioned red stake and
33 Butler's Head, so called, this stake or marker shall
34 also be on range between the iron pin on the south-
35 easterly corner of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife
36 camp lot on the west shore of the Abagadasset River
37 and the eastern support tower on the southern high
38 tension power line in Woolwich; thence southeasterly
39 across the flats and waters of Merrymeeting Bay
40 approximately 1,900 yards to a red stake or marker
41 located near high water mark on Elliott's Point, so
42 called, on the Woolwich shore; thence northeasterly
43 following high water mark approximately 1,250 yards
44 to a red stake or marker under the overhead high ten-
45 sion power cables; thence westerly by a straight line
46 to the point of beginning.

1 For provisions relating specifically to Merrymeeting
2 Bay Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 4.

3 Monroe Island Game Sanctuary: Monroe Island, in the
4 Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

5 Moosehead Lake Game Sanctuary: The following de-
6 scribed tracts or territory situated in the County of
7 Piscataquis: Moose Island and Farm Island, in
8 Moosehead Lake, and the territory bounded as follows:
9 Beginning on the shore of Moosehead Lake at a point
10 nearest to the easterly end of the state road leading
11 westerly from Greenville Junction, so called, to the
12 state fish hatchery on Squaw Brook, thence westerly
13 by said state road to said hatchery, thence north-
14 easterly down said brook to the shore of Moosehead
15 Lake, thence by the shore of said lake to the point
16 of beginning.

17 Moosehorn Game Sanctuary: The right-of-way of the
18 Maine Central Railroad from St. Croix Junction in
19 Calais, southerly to the Charlotte town line.

20 Narragansett Game Sanctuary: The following described
21 territory situated in the Town of Gorham, in the
22 County of Cumberland: Bounded on the north by the
23 right-of-way of the W. N. & P. division of the Boston
24 & Maine railroad; on the east by the Black Brook Road
25 or Scarboro Road, so called, in said Town of Gorham;
26 on the south by the Stroudwater River; and on the
27 west by South Street or South Gorham Road, so called,
28 in said Town of Gorham, containing 3,600 acres, more
29 or less. For provisions relating specifically to
30 Narragansett Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, sub-
31 section 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (4).

32 Ocean Park Game and Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
33 scribed territory situated in the Town of Old Orchard
34 Beach, in the County of York: Beginning at a point on
35 the easterly side of Fresh Water Cove Brook, so
36 called, where the same intersects the Boston and
37 Maine Railroad right-of-way; thence southerly along
38 said brook to its mouth where it joins the Goose Fare
39 Brook; thence southeasterly along said Goose Fare
40 Brook to its mouth; thence easterly and parallel with
41 the Atlantic Ocean and 50 feet in front of all bulk-
42 heads and houses fronting on the beach to the east-

1 erly side of Tunis Avenue; thence northwesterly along
2 said avenue to the Boston and Maine Railroad right-
3 of-way; thence by said Boston and Maine right-of-way
4 to point of beginning.

5 Orrington Game Sanctuary: The following described
6 territory beginning at a point on the state aid road
7 No. 4, in Orrington, at the East Bucksport turn,
8 extending in a southerly and southeasterly direction
9 to the county line; on the road leading to Thurston
10 Pond, to the Hancock County line; thence southwest-
11 erly along said county line to the land of Harry
12 Byard; north along said line to the land of E. F.
13 Bowden; west on said line to the land of Frank Betts;
14 northerly on line of E. F. Bowden to land of Fred
15 Bowden; west on Fred Bowden's line to land of J.
16 Betts; northerly on line of Fred Bowden and J. Betts
17 to line of H. Byard; westerly on Byard's line and
18 line of Mary Gray to land of P. W. Gray; northerly on
19 Gray's line to land of J. Bowden heirs; northerly
20 across said land to the line of E. F. Bowden and J.
21 W. Bowden heirs; easterly on J. W. Bowden heirs' line
22 to the first mentioned bound. The commissioner may
23 add adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon
24 application of said adjacent property owners.

25 Pittston Farm Sanctuary: Pittston Farm, so called, in
26 Pittston Township, in the County of Somerset, being
27 all the fields, pastures and cultivated lands of said
28 farm.

29 Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape Elizabeth
30 Sanctuary: The following described territory: On the
31 112 acres of land, more or less, comprising Prout's
32 Neck, so called, in the Town of Scarborough, in the
33 County of Cumberland; or on Richmond's Island, so
34 called, in the Town of Cape Elizabeth, in said County
35 of Cumberland; or on the tract of land comprising
36 1,600 acres, more or less, situated in said Town of
37 Cape Elizabeth, and bounded as follows: Southeasterly
38 and southerly by the low low watermark of the Atlan-
39 tic Ocean, westerly by the low low watermark of the
40 Spurwink River, northerly by the Spurwink Road, so
41 called, leading from Spurwink Bridge to Bowery Beach,
42 easterly by a certain private road or way which runs
43 in a southerly direction from the aforesaid Spurwink
44 Road to said Bowery Beach, being the road which runs

1 in front of the dwelling house of one Charles L.
2 Jordan and along the easterly boundary of land of
3 said Charles L. Jordan, and along the westerly bound-
4 ary of land of the Great Pond Club, but not including
5 any portion of said Bowery Beach. For the purpose of
6 this paragraph, Richmond's Island shall include only
7 that portion of land above the mean high watermark
8 and the easterly portion, as defined by red painted
9 markers, of the causeway between Richmond's Island
10 and the mainland. For provisions relating specifi-
11 cally to Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape
12 Elizabeth Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8,
13 paragraph A, subparagraphs (3) and (4).

14 Rangeley Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin:
15 The following described tract or territory, situated
16 in Rangeley, in the County of Franklin, to wit: So
17 much of said Town of Rangeley as is bounded as fol-
18 lows: Southwesterly by Rangeley Lake; northwesterly
19 and northeasterly by route No. 16; and southeasterly
20 by the inlet to Rangeley Lake leading from Haley
21 Pond, so called. The territory above described being
22 so much of said Town of Rangeley, as lies between
23 Rangeley Lake, the outlet of Rangeley Lake, route No.
24 16 and said inlet to Rangeley Lake from Haley Pond.
25 This paragraph shall apply to that part of Hunter
26 Cove, so called, lying northerly of Hunter Cove
27 Bridge, so called.

28 Rangeley Lake Sanctuary: Rangeley Lake bounded as
29 follows: Beginning at Gilman's Point on the northerly
30 shore of Rangeley Lake; thence southerly across said
31 lake to the southwesterly corner of land of the
32 Rangeley Lake Hotel Corporation; thence northerly,
33 westerly and southerly around the shore of said
34 Rangeley Lake back to the original starting point.
35 Boats may pass through without incurring any penalty.

36 Rangeley Plantation Sanctuary: The following tracts
37 of land situated in Rangeley Plantation in the County
38 of Franklin: Land of the Maine Conference Association
39 of Seventh-day Adventists and the adjoining land now
40 or formerly owned by Mrs. Franklin B. Stahl, said
41 parcels laying southerly of Rangeley Lake. The com-
42 missioner may, after notice and public hearing, add
43 adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon appli-
44 cation of the owners of said adjacent property. For

1 provisions relating specifically to Rangeley
2 Plantation Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8,
3 paragraph B, subparagraph (1).

4 Readfield and Winthrop Sanctuary: The waters of
5 Carleton Pond, so called, in the Towns of Readfield
6 and Winthrop in the County of Kennebec, and the lands
7 of the Augusta Water District adjacent to said pond
8 and located in said Towns of Readfield and Winthrop,
9 now owned or which may be hereafter acquired by said
10 district in furtherance of its chartered purposes.
11 For provisions relating specifically to Readfield and
12 Winthrop Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 7,
13 and subsection 8, paragraph B, subparagraphs (2) and
14 (3).

15 Salmon Pond Sanctuary: That territory lying within a
16 distance of 1/4 of a mile of Salmon Pond, which pond
17 is situated in the Town of Guilford, in the County of
18 Piscataquis, said pond being the source of water
19 supply for the Dover-Foxcroft Water District, also
20 all the lands now owned by said Dover-Foxcroft Water
21 District in Lots 3 and 4, Range 7, which lie outside
22 of the above 1/4 of a mile limit.

23 Somerset Game Sanctuary: The following described
24 tract or territory situated in Somerset County, the
25 same being in unorganized territory, and taking in
26 parts of Sapling Town, Misery Gore, Taunton and
27 Raynham Township, and including the whole of Sandbar
28 Tract, bounded and described as follows: The ter-
29 ritory from the highway, being route 15, east to low
30 watermark on Moosehead Lake between East Outlet and
31 West Outlet, bounded as follows: Beginning at the
32 junction of the low watermark of Moosehead Lake and
33 the northerly side of the East Outlet of said lake;
34 thence westerly by the northerly side of said East
35 Outlet to the highway, being route 15; thence nor-
36 therly by said highway to the southerly side of the
37 West Outlet of said Moosehead Lake; thence easterly
38 by the southerly side of said West Outlet to low
39 watermark of Moosehead Lake; thence southerly by said
40 low watermark of Moosehead Lake to the point of
41 beginning.

42 Standish Sanctuary: The following described territory
43 in the Town of Standish in the County of Cumberland:

1 Beginning at the point where the Maine Central rail-
2 road crosses the Pequaket Trail in Steep Falls;
3 thence southerly and easterly by said Pequaket Trail,
4 the Oak Hill Road, so-called, and the so-called back
5 road from Steep Falls to Richville to its junction
6 with the Rich Mill Road, so-called; thence by said
7 Mill Road northeasterly to its junction with the road
8 leading from Sebago Lake to East Sebago; thence by
9 the last named road northerly to a point approxi-
10 mately 1 1/4 miles north of the Maine Central rail-
11 road crossing; thence by a certain wood road westerly
12 to its junction with the Maine Central railroad;
13 thence by said railroad northwesterly to the point of
14 beginning. All roads and the Maine Central railroad
15 right-of-way which serve to bound said Standish Game
16 Sanctuary shall be a part of said sanctuary. For
17 provisions relating specifically to Standish
18 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 6.

19 Thorncrag-Stanton Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
20 scribed territory, situated in the City of Lewiston,
21 County of Androscoggin, and the Town of Monmouth,
22 County of Kennebec, to wit: Bounded on the north by
23 land of H. Osmond Wood; on the east by land formerly
24 owned by Benjamin Thorn; on the south by the road
25 leading from Barker's Mills schoolhouse to Thorne's
26 Corner; on the west by land of H. Osmond Wood and
27 George H. McGibbon; said tract being wholly situated
28 within the City of Lewiston in said County of
29 Androscoggin and containing 45 acres, more or less.
30 The most northerly corner of land of the estate of
31 George K. Davis, bounded and described as follows, to
32 wit: On the northwest by land of the so-called Ham
33 Farm; on the northeast by Pleasant Street; on the
34 southwest by land of Joseph Breault; and on the
35 southeast by a line extending northeasterly from the
36 easterly corner of said Breault's land and being a
37 continuation of the southeast boundary of said
38 Breault's land, containing 2 acres, more or less,
39 situated in the City of Lewiston, in the County of
40 Androscoggin. Beginning at a maple tree at the south-
41 east corner of the Ricker farm, now or formerly so
42 called, thence running west, northwest 244 rods to a
43 stooping cedar in what is now or was formerly a
44 swamp, thence south 22 1/2° west, 122 rods to a stake
45 near Wyman Pond now or formerly so called; thence
46 east, southeast 244 rods to the lot first conveyed by

1 a deed from Benjamin Woodbury to Mary A. Davis;
2 thence by said lot above described as first conveyed
3 by said deed, 122 rods to the point of beginning,
4 containing about 132 acres, more or less, situated in
5 the Town of Monmouth, in the County of Kennebec.

6 Tomhegan Game Sanctuary: The following territory in
7 Township 1, Range 2, N. B. K. P., commonly known as
8 Tomhegan Town, in the County of Somerset, described
9 as follows: Beginning at a cedar post and stones, the
10 post being marked PRESERVE C/W 1931, standing on the
11 line which is the division line between the land
12 owned by the Great Northern Paper Company and that
13 owned by the trust estate of F. W. Rollins, standing
14 on the westerly shore of Socatean Bay in Moosehead
15 Lake; thence westerly on said division line 1 mile
16 and 160 rods to a cedar post and stones, the post
17 being marked PRESERVE C 1931; thence southerly at
18 right angle to said division line 250 rods to a cedar
19 post and stones, the post being marked PRESERVE C/W
20 1931 and standing on the northerly shore of Tomhegan
21 Bay in Moosehead Lake; thence easterly and northerly
22 along the shore of Moosehead Lake around Socatean
23 Point, so called, to the point of beginning and con-
24 taining 700 acres, more or less.

25 Wells Sanctuary: The following described tract or
26 territory, situated in the Town of Wells, in the
27 County of York:

28 A certain tract of land, bounded and described as
29 follows: On the east by the Atlantic Ocean; on the
30 south by the Drake Island Road, so called; on the
31 west by the U. S. Number 1 highway, so called; on the
32 north by the town line of Kennebunk and Wells.

33 Wells and York Game Sanctuary: The following de-
34 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Wells and
35 York in York County; beginning at a point on highway
36 No. 1 where the Josias River meets said highway No. 1
37 in the Town of Wells, thence southwesterly along said
38 Josias River to the Maine Turnpike in the Town of
39 York, thence northerly along said Maine Turnpike to
40 the Agamenticus Road overpass; thence westerly across
41 said overpass by Agamenticus Road to the North
42 Village Road; thence northerly along said North
43 Village Road to Ogunquit-North Berwick Road, thence

1 easterly along said Ogunquit-North Berwick Road to
2 highway No. 1 in the Town of Wells, thence southerly
3 along highway No. 1 to the point of beginning in the
4 Town of Wells.

5 Willow Water Game Sanctuary: The following named ter-
6 ritory, on the following described properties, locat-
7 ed in the Town of Perry:

8 Beginning on the county road on the westerly line of
9 the Reed Farm, so called, now or formerly owned by
10 Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail, and thence running north 4°
11 east, following said line, 32 rods to a marked tree;
12 thence 75° west 20 rods to a stake; thence south 4°
13 east 32 rods to the county road; thence easterly by
14 the county road to the place of beginning. The same
15 being the building lot formerly owned by the late
16 John W. Trott and containing 4 acres, more or less.

17 And one other lot or parcel of land lying and being
18 on the northerly side of the county road leading from
19 the Eastport-Perry Bridge to Pembroke and bounded and
20 described as follows, to wit: Beginning at the south-
21 west corner of land formerly of the John W. Trott
22 estate and thence running northerly on the west line
23 of said Trott land to the northwest corner thereof;
24 thence easterly on the north line of said Trott land
25 to land now or formerly of Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail,
26 formerly of John Reddington; thence north 1° east
27 along the west line of said McPhail land to land now
28 or formerly of the Charles J. Trott estate; thence
29 westerly on the south line of said Trott land 62
30 rods; thence northerly on the westerly line of said
31 Trott land 48 rods to the Morrison lot, so called;
32 thence westerly on the said Morrison lot to land now
33 or formerly of W. W. Brown; thence south 1/2° west
34 200 rods to the county road; thence easterly on said
35 county road 77 rods to the place of beginning, con-
36 taining in all 107 acres, more or less, being part of
37 lots numbered 29 and 30 according to the plan of the
38 Town of Perry.

39 And one other lot or parcel of land known as the pas-
40 ture lot formerly the Wm. H. Brown Farm, bounded
41 generally as follows, to wit: On the north by land
42 formerly of S. Frost; on the east by land of Trott,
43 on the south by the county road leading to Pembroke

1 and on the west by land of M. Conley and land of
2 others, names unknown, the above described lots being
3 known as the Elijah Loring Farm in said Perry.

4 And a certain lot of land bounded on the north by
5 land of the late John McCarty; on the east by Frost's
6 Cove; on the south by lands formerly of Lucinda Frost
7 and of Lewis D. Frost; and on the west by lands of
8 the late John Morrison, William Anderson and the late
9 John McCarty, containing 75 acres, more or less.

10 And one other lot or parcel of land bounded and de-
11 scribed as follows, to wit: On the east by lots num-
12 bered 19 and 20; southerly by land of the late John
13 Loring and the Russell lot, so called; westerly by
14 lots numbered 10 and 11; and northerly by the William
15 Anderson lot, and land formerly owned by the late
16 Aaron Frost.

17 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
18 and described as follows, to wit: Bounded on the
19 north by road leading from county road, to the field
20 on the west; on the east by the county road leading
21 from Eastport to Calais, on the south and the west by
22 land of Lucinda Frost, afterwards conveyed to Jennie
23 Frost; said lot being 10 rods on the county road and
24 8 rods back from the road.

25 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
26 and described as follows, to wit: On the east by the
27 county road leading from Eastport to Robbinston; on
28 the south by land formerly owned by John A. Frost, on
29 the west by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost and on
30 the north by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost.

31 The owner of the properties included within the
32 Willow Water Game Sanctuary shall enclose the same
33 with a suitable fence and shall cause the erection of
34 suitable signs on or near said sanctuary indicating
35 that no hunting is permitted thereon. Near the center
36 of said game sanctuary such owner is authorized to
37 construct a 15-acre pond for the propagation of
38 waterfowl, principally wood duck, teal and blacks.
39 For provisions relating specifically to Willow Water
40 Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, para-
41 graph A, subparagraph (1).

1 York Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin: The
2 following named territory; on the property of the
3 following named persons, to wit: On land of J. Lewis
4 York and on land of Yorks; said game sanctuary being
5 in the northwest corner of Dallas Plantation, and
6 bounded as follows, to wit: West by the east line of
7 the Town of Rangeley; north by the south line of Lang
8 Plantation; east by the west line of the public lot
9 in Dallas Plantation; and south by land of Furbish,
10 Goodspeed Company and land of the heirs of Henry
11 Bliss, containing 539 acres, more or less. This game
12 sanctuary shall be called the York Game Sanctuary.

13 For provisions relating specifically to York Game
14 Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin, see section
15 7654, subsection 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (2).

16 STATEMENT OF FACT

17 This bill establishes a wildlife sanctuary on
18 Davis Island. Davis Island is an 80-acre island
19 located in Edgecomb, Lincoln County. Route 1 goes
20 across the island, and there are several farms and
21 houses on the island, and it is no longer safe to
22 hunt there.

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
