32	Sec. 2. 14 MRSA §8111, sub-§1, ¶C, as enacted by PL 1977, c. 2, §2, is amended to read:

C. The performance or failure to exercise or perform a discretionary function or duty, whether or not the discretion is abused; and whether or not the statute, charter, ordinance, order, resolution, regulation or resolve under which the discretionary function or duty is performed is valid. Employees of governmental entities, in the performance of their discretionary duties or functions, shall be liable for tortious conduct, including their negligent and intentional acts or omissions, in all instances except those involving damage to real or personal property, bodily injury or death, unless otherwise permitted under this chapter.

STATEMENT OF FACT

State and municipal agencies, officials and employees are intruding more and more into the private sector at public expense. They are at present shielded from responsibility for their actions while engaged in the performance of their duties. This bill places the same burden of responsibility on the public sector as now exists in the private sector.

This bill makes it possible for the public to bring suit against public agencies, officials or employees for making libelous or slanderous statements or for irresponsible acts, errors or omissions, torts, just as members of the public may be sued.

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
