# STATE OF MAINE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 111TH LEGISLATURE SECOND REGULAR SESSION

HOUSE AMENDMENT "H" to 7 H.P. 710, L.D. 901, Bill, "AN ACT to Extend and Amend the Statute enti-8 tled Purchase of Foodstuffs from Maine Concerns." 9

10 Amend the bill by inserting before the enacting 11 clause the following:

12 'Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis-13 lature do not become effective until 90 days after 14 adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

15 Whereas, it is imperative to provide the authori-16 ty to increase institutional and school purchases of 17 food produced and harvested in Maine; and

18 Whereas, it is necessary to establish an adminis-19 trative capability within State Government to accomplish this purpose in advance of the year's growing 20 21 season; and

22 Whereas, this bill advances the objectives which 23 are promulgated in a proposed food policy for the 24 State; and

25 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of 26 the Constitution of Maine and require the following 27 legislation as immediately necessary for the preser-vation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 28 29 therefore, 30

31 Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§213." in the first paragraph, 4th and 32 5th lines by striking out the underlined words "with-33 34 out competitive bidding"

Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part

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#### HOUSE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 710, L.D. 901 1 designated "§213." in the first paragraph by insert-2 ing at the end the following new sentence: 3 'In the event that more than one producer, broker or 4 wholesaler can supply a given foodstuff, the institu-5 tional or school purchaser may require competitive 6 bidding. 7 Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§213." subsection 2, by striking out all 8 of the 2nd sentence and inserting in its place the 9 following: 'Savings in unit meal costs, as a result of buying foodstuffs from Maine food producers, may 10 11 remain in the school district's food service account 12 13 and be used for the same purposes specified in sub-14 section 1 with the approval of the superintendent. Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part 15 designated "§214." by inserting after subsection 1 16 17 the following: '2. Annual meeting. The coordinator prime be held an annual meeting which brings together huvers and food service pro-18 19 to producers, wholesalers, buyers and food service pro-fessionals to enhance opportunities for cooperation 20 21 22 and expand the purchase of local foodstuffs by state 23 institutions and public schools. 24 Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§215." in subsection 4 by striking out in 25 the first line the underlined word "Food" and insert-26 27 in its place the following: 'In the event that ina 28 foodstuffs of Maine origin are not available in suf-29 ficient quantities to meet demand, food' 30 Further amend the bill by inserting at the end 31 the following: 32

32 'Emergency clause. In view of the emergency 33 cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect 34 when approved.' HOUSE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 710, L.D. 901

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

Legislative document 901 was enacted in the First Regular Session of the 111th Legislature, but not signed by the Governor because of a concern about competitive bidding. The legislation will be recalled in the early days of the 2nd Regular Session and submitted for recommendation as an emergency. The reason for acting swiftly on this legislative measure is related to the need to hire a coordinator in the Bureau of Purchases immediately to begin work in advance of this year's growing and marketing season.

The purpose of this bill is to increase food pur-14 chases between state institutions, schools and Maine farmers and other food harvestors. In fiscal vear 1983, less than \$5,000 worth of business was done between institutional food buyers and Maine farmers, excluding milk and eggs. This figure represents only about 1% of the amount expended by state institutions on food purchased in that time frame, excluding milk While there is little comprehensive data and eggs. to prove the amount of buying between schools in Maine and farmers, evidence collected indicates that statewide very little business is being done.

25 life To recapitulate, this bill extends the of the old institutional marketing law, Title 7, chapter 26 27 and amends the law in several significant re-8, 28 spects.

29 1. It removes the coordination responsibility 30 from the Department of Agricultural, Food and Rural 31 Resources to the Bureau of Purchases where supplies 32 and foodstuffs are bought for state institutions.

33 It establishes spending targets 2. for both 34 state institutions and schools to encourage more pur-35 chases of food produced or harvested in Maine, ex-36 cluding milk and eggs:

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1 2	A. 30¢ per day multiplied by the average number of persons in the institution; and
3 4	B. 7¢ per day multiplied by the total enrollment eating meals at school during the school year.
5	3. It adds a half-time coordination position to
6	the Bureau of Purchases to establish connections be-
7	tween food purchasers and local food producers.
8	4. It recognizes the important role food brokers
9	could play in supplying institutions and schools with
10	food grown locally, and it allows split shipment of
11	food, Maine and non-Maine foods, to meet orders.
12	5. It clearly states that local food does not
13	have to be purchased if the supply is inadequate, the
14	quality is not acceptable or the price is not compet-

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
