10 11	Amend the bill by inserting before the enacting clause the following:
12 13 14	'Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis- lature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
15 16 17	Whereas, it is imperative to provide the authority to increase institutional and school purchases of food produced and harvested in Maine; and
18 19 20 21	Whereas, it is necessary to establish an administrative capability within State Government to accomplish this purpose in advance of the year's growing season; and
22 23 24	Whereas, this bill advances the objectives which are promulgated in a proposed food policy for the State; and
25 26 27 28 29 30	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
31 32 33 34	Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§213." in the first paragraph, 4th and 5th lines by striking out the underlined words "without competitive bidding"
35	Further amend the bill in section 2 in that part

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- designated "§213." in the first paragraph by inserting at the end the following new sentence:
- 'In the event that more than one producer, broker or wholesaler can supply a given foodstuff, the institu-
- tional or school purchaser may require competitive bidding.'.

Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§213." subsection 2, by striking out all of the 2nd sentence and inserting in its place the following: 'Savings in unit meal costs, as a result of buying foodstuffs from Maine food producers, may remain in the school district's food service account and be used for the same purposes specified in subsection 1 with the approval of the superintendent.'

Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§214." by inserting after subsection 1 the following:

- '2. Annual meeting. The coordinator shall cause to be held an annual meeting which brings together producers, wholesalers, buyers and food service professionals to enhance opportunities for cooperation and expand the purchase of local foodstuffs by state institutions and public schools.'
- Further amend the bill in section 2, in that part designated "§215." in subsection 4 by striking out in the first line the underlined word "Food" and inserting in its place the following: 'In the event that foodstuffs of Maine origin are not available in sufficient quantities to meet demand, food'
- Further amend the bill by striking out all of section 3 and inserting in its place the following:
- 'Sec. 3. Allocation. The following funds are allocated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

32	The purpose of this bill is to increase food pur-

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- chases between state institutions, schools and Maine farmers and other food harvesters. In fiscal year 2 3 1983, less than \$5,000 worth of business was done between institutional food buyers and Maine farmers, 5 excluding milk and eggs. This figure represents only about 1% of the amount expended by state institutions 6 7 on food purchased in that time frame, excluding milk and eggs. While there is little comprehensive data to prove the amount of buying between schools in 8 9 Maine and farmers, evidence collected indicates that 10 statewide very little business is being done. 11
- To recapitulate, this bill extends the life of the old institutional marketing law, Title 7, chapter 8, and amends the law in several significant respects.
- 16 1. It removes the coordination responsibility 17 from the Department of Agricultural, Food and Rural 18 Resources and transfers the program to the Bureau of 19 Purchases where supplies and foodstuffs are bought 20 for state institutions.
- 21 2. It establishes spending targets for both 22 state institutions and schools to encourage more pur-23 chases of food produced or harvested in Maine, ex-24 cluding milk and eggs:
- A. 30¢ per day multiplied by the average number of persons in the institution; and
- 27 B. 7¢ per day multiplied by the total enrollment 28 eating meals at school during the school year.
- 30 3. It adds a coordination position to the Bureau of Purchases to establish connections between food purchasers and local food producers.
- 4. It recognizes the important role food brokers could play in supplying institutions and schools with food grown locally, and it allows split shipment of food, Maine and non-Maine foods, to meet orders.

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5. It clearly states that local food does not have to be purchased if the supply is inadequate, the quality is not acceptable or the price is not competitive.
