21 22	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:	
23 24	Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §1811, sub-§8, as enacted by PL 1967, c. 492, is amended to read:	
25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33	8. <u>Municipal purchasing</u> . To permit any political subdivision or School Administrative District in the State of Maine to make purchases of <u>foodstuffs</u> , mate- rials, equipment and supplies through the State Bureau of Purchases, subject to such procedures, rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the State Purchasing Agent. This subsection shall apply to a municipality notwithstanding any provision in its municipal charter to the contrary.	:

## CHAPTER 8-A

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## PURCHASE OF FOODSTUFFS FROM MAINE CONCERNS

4 §211. Statement of policy

5 It is the policy of the State to encourage food 6 self-sufficiency for the State. State institutions 7 and school districts in the State shall purchase food 8 produced by Maine farmers or fishermen, provided that 9 food is available in adequate quantity and meets ac-10 ceptable quality standards.

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11 §212. Definitions

12 1. Brokers or wholesalers. "Brokers or whole-13 salers" means any person representing an enterprise, 14 either for profit or nonprofit, whose objective is to 15 purchase or collect available supplies of food from 16 Maine food producers for subsequent distribution to 17 state institutions, school districts and other food 18 businesses.

19 2. Maine food producer. "Maine food producer" 20 means any person who is a resident farmer or 21 fisherman, or an association of farmers or fishermen 22 in a cooperative or producer group.

3. State or school purchaser. "State or school
 purchaser" means any person who purchases foodstuffs
 for any state institution or agency, the
 vocational-technical institutes or the school dis tricts of this State.

28 <u>§213.</u> Implementation of state policy to purchase 29 foodstuffs from Maine concerns

30	Notwithstanding any other provision of law and
31	assuming reasonable similarity in quality, quantity
32	and availability with other foodstuffs offered for
33	sale, state or school purchasers shall buy without
34	competitive bidding meat, fish, dairy products,
35	excluding milk and eggs, and species of fruits and
36	fresh vegetables, directly from Maine food producers
37	or from food brokers who assist in the distribution

1 <u>of foodstuffs produced or harvested by Maine food</u> 2 <u>producers.</u>

3 1. Amounts to be expended by institutional 4 facilities. The total amount that must be expended 5 by any institutional facility in Maine in any fiscal year pursuant to this section shall not exceed an 6 7 amount equal to 30¢ multiplied by 365, multiplied by the average number of persons served in that institu-tional facility's feeding program during the pre-8 9 ceding fiscal year, provided foodstuffs produced by 10 Maine food producers is available in adequate supply 11 12 and meets quality standards. If the state purchaser 13 can reduce his meal costs as a result of purchasing foodstuffs from Maine food producers, then savings 14 15 realized will revert back to the institution's food service account, and those savings may be used to 16 improve the facility's food service department, 17 including the acquisition of necessary equipment and 18 the hiring of food service personnel. The state pur-19 20 chaser shall seek the approval of the administrator 21 in charge of his facility before using savings for 22 improvements.

23 2. Amounts to be expended by a school district. 24 The amount that may be expended by a school district 25 in any fiscal year pursuant to this section shall not exceed an amount equal to 7¢ multiplied by the total 26 number of days in the school year multiplied by the 27 total enrollment of that school district participa-ting in the school meal programs, provided foodstuffs 28 29 30 produced by Maine food producers is available in ade-31 quate quantity and acceptable quality. If the school purchaser can realize savings in unit meal costs as a 32 33 result of buying foodstuffs from Maine food producers, then savings will remain in the school dis-trict's food service account and shall be used for 34 35 36 the same purposes specified in subsection 1. The 37 school purchaser will seek the approval of superintendent before using savings in the food service ac-38 39 count for improvements.

4 §215. Standards

5 Quality standards to be established. Quality 6 standards for meat, fish , dairy products, excluding 7 milk and eggs, and species of fresh fruits and vegetables shall be established in writing and copies of 8 9 these standards shall be made available to all Maine 10 food producers and brokers and wholesalers who are interested in selling food to institutions 11 and schools in Maine. 12

13 2. Coordination of development of quality standards. The Bureau of Purchases will coordinate the 14 15 development of quality standards with state institutions and the Department of Educational and Cul-16 17 tural Services. The coordinator will collaborate 18 with the state purchasing agent in assisting state 19 and school purchasers in formulating consistent, although not necessarily uniform, quality standards. 20 21 In the event there are differences of opinion about the quality of foodstuffs supplied institutions or 22 23 schools, final authority for resolution rests with 24 the state purchasing agent.

3. Certification of food of Maine origin. Food
 brokers and wholesalers or any person who sells
 directly to the state institutions and schools of
 Maine shall certify to purchasing agents that ship ments of food intended to be of Maine origin are pro duced or harvested by Maine food producers.

4. Split shipments of food. Food brokers and wholesalers or any person selling directly to the 31 32 33 state institutions or schools may supply split shipments of food, mixing food items of Maine origin with 34 35 the same food items from outside Maine, provided the 36 consolidated order is of comparable quality and the broker specifies the percentage of the mixed shipment 37 38 that is of Maine origin

39 Sec. 3. Appropriation. The following funds are 40 appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the 41 purposes of this Act.

20	This bill extends the life of a public law com-
21	monly called the "Institutional Marketing" statute.
22	This bill amends the expired law significantly by:

25	Maine food producers; and
26	2. Establishing a coordination position within
27	the Bureau of Purchases to develop commercial connec-
28	tions between purchasing agents in institutions and

30	salers.
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
