17 AN ACT to Create Boothbay Region Water-
18 fowl Sanctuary.
19

20 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as
21 follows:

22 12 MRSA §7651, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1979, c.
23 420, §1, is amended to read:

24 1. Designation of wildlife sanctuaries. The fol-
25 lowing described territories are designated as wild-
26 life sanctuaries and are subject to the commission-
27 er's authority under section 7653:

28 Back Bay Sanctuary, Portland: Back Bay, so called, in
29 Portland, in the County of Cumberland, above the
30 Grand Trunk Railway bridge or within the area
31 enclosed by a boundary line drawn as follows: Begin-
32 ning at Fish Point at the easterly end of the Eastern
33 Promenade in the City of Portland, thence extending

1 about northeasterly to Pomeroy's Rock, thence about
2 northeasterly to Mackworth or Half-way Rock southerly
3 of Mackworth or Mackey Island, thence in a northerly
4 direction to a point marked by a buoy 1,000 feet from
5 the most easterly point of Mackworth Island, so
6 called, thence in a northwesterly direction 700 yards
7 more or less to the northernmost point of the large
8 ridge on the north side of Mackworth Island, thence
9 in a north northwesterly direction in a straight line
10 about parallel to the Town of Falmouth shore to the
11 point on the shoreline where the property known as
12 the Berry Estate meets the property known as the
13 Portland Country Club, thence northwesterly and
14 southwesterly along the shore line of the Town of
15 Falmouth including that of the salt water pond adja-
16 cent to the property known as the Portland Country
17 Club to Mackworth or Mackey Point, thence about
18 southwesterly along the easterly side of Martin Point
19 bridge to the shore of East Deering (United States
20 Marine Hospital) Portland, thence about southwesterly
21 and southerly along said East Deering shore to the
22 Grand Trunk bridge, thence along the easterly side of
23 said Grand Trunk bridge to the shore of the Eastern
24 Promenade, Portland, thence about southerly along
25 said shore of the Eastern Promenade to the said Fish
26 Point, the point of beginning.

27 Baxter State Park: The following described tracts of
28 territory situated in the Counties of Penobscot and
29 Piscataquis W. E. L. S. the same being in unorganized
30 townships, to wit: That portion of Township 6, Range
31 8, Penobscot County in the southwest corner of said
32 township bounded and described as follows: Beginning
33 at the southwest corner of said township thence north
34 along the west line of said township to First Grand
35 or Matagamon Lake; thence easterly, southeasterly and
36 southerly along the western shore of said lake to the
37 point where the said western shore intersects the
38 north line of the Dam Lot, so called, which was con-
39 veyed to the East Branch Dam Company by deed dated
40 October 28, 1902 and recorded in Penobscot County
41 Registry of Deeds in book 727, page 335 and reputed
42 to be now owned by the East Branch Improvement Com-
43 pany; thence running west along the north line of
44 said Dam Lot to the northwest corner thereof; thence
45 running south along the west line of said Dam Lot to
46 the southwest corner thereof; thence running east

1 along the south line of said Dam Lot to the East
2 Branch of the Penobscot River; thence running south
3 by said East Branch to a point in the south line of
4 said township where the said East Branch intersects
5 the same; thence running west along the said south
6 line of said township to the southwest corner thereof
7 and the point of beginning; all of Township 3, Range
8 9, Piscataquis County now the property of the State
9 of Maine: All of Township 4, Range 9, Piscataquis
10 County: All of Township 5, Range 9, Piscataquis
11 County: That portion of Township 6, Range 9,
12 Piscataquis County lying south of Trout Brook and
13 south of Wadleigh Brook and extending from the east
14 line of said township across said township to the
15 west line thereof: All of Township 3, Range 10,
16 Piscataquis County: All of Township 4, Range 10,
17 Piscataquis County: All of Township 5, Range 10,
18 Piscataquis County, excepting therefrom an area of 20
19 acres in the southwesterly quarter thereof, formerly
20 owned by and belonging to Charles A. Daisey, now
21 owned by Arnold R. Daisey, which was excepted and
22 reserved from a deed from Percival Proctor Baxter to
23 the State of Maine, as set forth in chapter 91 of the
24 private and special laws of 1943. The said within de-
25 scribed 8 tracts or parcels of land contain 149,506
26 acres, more or less.

27 Beauchamp Sanctuary: The following described ter-
28 ritory situated in Rockport and Camden, in the County
29 of Knox: Beginning at the mouth of Goose River in
30 Rockport; thence in a northerly direction along
31 number 1 highway to the mouth of the Megunticook
32 River in Camden; thence in a southerly direction
33 along the coast around Metcalf Point and Beauchamp
34 Point and thence in a northerly direction to the said
35 Goose River.

36 Boothbay Region Waterfowl Sanctuary: The following
37 area in the tidewaters of Southport and Boothbay Har-
38 bor, Maine: Commencing at Cameron Point lighted
39 structure and by the northeasterly shore to high
40 high-water mark to the westerly end of Capitol Island
41 bridge; thence easterly to Number 6 buoy; continuing
42 on approximately the same line to a red painted spot
43 near high high-water mark on Spruce Point shore; and
44 by high high-water around Boothbay Harbor's harbor
45 via Mill Point, MacFarland's Point, Railway Point,

1 McKowan's Point, Juniper Point, Oak Point and to a
2 red painted spot on the shore at high high-water
3 mark; and thence true west to the point of beginning;
4 as shown on the United States Department of Commerce
5 Chart Number 13296, Boothbay Harbor to Bath.

6 Carver's Pond Waterfowl Sanctuary: The waters of
7 Carver's Pond, so called, in the Town of Vinalhaven,
8 County of Knox or 100 feet from the mean high water
9 mark of said pond. Carver's Pond for the purpose of
10 this sanctuary shall be considered all the waters of
11 said pond above the bridge on Main Street of the Town
12 of Vinalhaven.

13 Drake's Island Game Sanctuary: All that part of
14 Drake's Island, so called, in the Town of Wells,
15 which is bounded as follows: Northerly by the game
16 sanctuary established by chapter 31 of the public
17 laws of 1927; easterly by the Atlantic Ocean; south-
18 erly by the Wells River; and westerly by said river
19 and creek flowing under Dyke's Bridge, so called.

20 Dry Pond Sanctuary: On Dry Pond or from the shores of
21 said pond, which pond is situated in the Town of
22 Gray, in the County of Cumberland.

23 Fairfield Sanctuary: The following described ter-
24 ritory situated in the Town of Fairfield, in the
25 County of Somerset: Good Will Farm, so called; the
26 Girls' Farm, so called, of Good Will Farm; land of G.
27 W. Hinckley; land of John Connor; land of J. Russell
28 Barrett, which land is bounded as follows: On the
29 north by land of Edwin Hicks and N. E. Bessey; on the
30 east by the Kennebec River; on the south by land of
31 Fred Tobey, Frank Moore, H. B. Hamm and C. B. Tuttle,
32 also by the Fairfield town farm; on the west by land
33 of L. P. Gifford, Alonzo Hoxie, Edwin Marcou and also
34 by Martin Stream; said territory being Good Will Farm
35 proper, so called, the Girls' Farm, so called, and
36 land of G. W. Hinckley, John Connor and J. Russell
37 Barrett, adjacent to the above-named farms. For
38 provisions relating specifically to Fairfield
39 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
40 A, subparagraph (4).

41 Glencove Sanctuary; Rockport: Glencove, so called, in
42 Penobscot Bay, which cove is situated in the Town of

1 Rockport, in the County of Knox, and which cove is
2 bounded as follows, to wit: On the north, west and
3 south by the main land, on the east by a line extend-
4 ing from Smith's Point to Ram Island and from Ram
5 Island to the easterly point of Pine Hill in said
6 Rockport.

7 Gray Game Sanctuary: The following described ter-
8 ritory situated in the Town of Gray in the County of
9 Cumberland: Beginning at Gray Corner following the
10 Poland Spring Road to Dry Mills, thence following the
11 North Raymond Road to the guidepost at intersection
12 of East Raymond Road, thence following the East
13 Raymond Road to Douglass Mill Road; thence following
14 the Douglass Mill and Furbush Road to "Sand Brook,"
15 so called, on shore of Little Sebago Lake, thence
16 following shore of Little Sebago Lake to Foster
17 Shore, so called, at intersection of Foster and
18 Ramsdell Road, so called, near camp of Dr. Cushing
19 following last named road in easterly direction to
20 intersection of Ramsdell Road near homestead of Edgar
21 Foster, thence in a southerly direction following
22 said Ramsdell road to intersection of road leading
23 from Gray to West Gray, thence following last named
24 road to Gray Corner to point of beginning.

25 Hog Island Game Sanctuary: Hog Island in the Town of
26 Bremen, Lincoln County.

27 Jefferson and Whitefield Sanctuary: The following de-
28 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Jefferson
29 and Whitefield, in the County of Lincoln, which land
30 is bounded as follows: On the north by the highway
31 leading from Weary Pond to South Jefferson; on the
32 east by Sterns Brook and by Little Dyer's Pond and
33 the inlet stream and marsh of said pond and by the
34 highway leading from South Jefferson to Alna; on the
35 south by the Alna town line; on the west by the road
36 leading from Alna to said Weary Pond, in the Town of
37 Whitefield.

38 Kineo Point Sanctuary: Kineo Point, in Kineo, in the
39 County of Piscataquis.

40 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary: The fol-
41 lowing described territory situated in the Towns of
42 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro, in York County;

1 beginning at a point where the Little Ossipee River
2 joins the Saco River in the Town of Limington, thence
3 westerly and southerly along said Little Ossipee
4 River to the highway at Edgecomb's bridge, so called,
5 in Waterboro, thence southerly and easterly along
6 said highway to North Hollis, in the Town of Hollis,
7 thence easterly and northerly along the road next
8 west of Killick Brook to the road leading from Nason
9 Mills to Bonney Eagle, thence northeasterly along
10 said Bonney Eagle Road to the town line between
11 Limington and Hollis, thence northerly along said
12 town line to the Saco River, thence northerly along
13 said Saco River to the point of beginning. All roads
14 which serve to bound said Limington, Hollis and
15 Waterboro game sanctuary shall be a part of said
16 sanctuary. For provisions relating specifically to
17 Limington, Hollis and Waterboro Sanctuary, see
18 section 7654, subsection 5.

19 Megunticook Lake and Vicinity Sanctuary: The waters
20 of Megunticook Lake, formerly called Canaan Lake, and
21 its tributary lakes, ponds and streams, and upon the
22 land bordering on the same included within the fol-
23 lowing roads: Beginning at Hopkins' Corner, so
24 called, in the Town of Camden; thence via the Turn-
25 pike Road, so called, to Lincolnville Center; thence
26 to Wiley's Corner in Lincolnville, thence to the
27 Mansfield schoolhouse in the Town of Camden; thence
28 via the Fish Hatchery to place of beginning; all of
29 said lake, its tributaries and shores being located
30 in the Towns of Camden, Lincolnville and Hope, in the
31 Counties of Knox and Waldo. For provisions relating
32 specifically to Megunticook Lake and Vicinity
33 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, paragraph
34 C, subparagraphs (1) and (2).

35 Merrymeeting Bay Game Sanctuary: Merrymeeting Bay in
36 the Towns of Bowdoinham and Woolwich bounded as fol-
37 lows: Commencing at the high tension tower on
38 Kelley's Point, so called, in Bowdoinham; thence
39 westerly by a line approximately 100 feet above the
40 high water mark designated by a series of posted
41 signs over the field lands and by posted signs and a
42 single strand of wire through the wooded area thus
43 southerly 100 feet more or less to a red stake at the
44 high water mark of Merrymeeting Bay; thence southerly
45 approximately 400 yards to a red stake or marker on

1 range between the first mentioned red stake and
2 Butler's Head, so called, this stake or marker shall
3 also be on range between the iron pin on the south-
4 easterly corner of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife
5 camp lot on the west shore of the Abagadasset River
6 and the eastern support tower on the southern high
7 tension power line in Woolwich; thence southeasterly
8 across the flats and waters of Merrymeeting Bay
9 approximately 1,900 yards to a red stake or marker
10 located near high water mark on Elliott's Point, so
11 called, on the Woolwich shore; thence northeasterly
12 following high water mark approximately 1,250 yards
13 to a red stake or marker under the overhead high ten-
14 sion power cables; thence westerly by a straight line
15 to the point of beginning.

16 For provisions relating specifically to Merrymeeting
17 Bay Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 4.

18 Monroe Island Game Sanctuary: Monroe Island, in the
19 Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

20 Moosehead Lake Game Sanctuary: The following de-
21 scribed tracts or territory situated in the County of
22 Piscataquis: Moose Island and Farm Island, in
23 Moosehead Lake, and the territory bounded as follows:
24 Beginning on the shore of Moosehead Lake at a point
25 nearest to the easterly end of the state road leading
26 westerly from Greenville Junction, so called, to the
27 state fish hatchery on Squaw Brook, thence westerly
28 by said state road to said hatchery, thence north-
29 easterly down said brook to the shore of Moosehead
30 Lake, thence by the shore of said lake to the point
31 of beginning.

32 Moosehorn Game Sanctuary: The right-of-way of the
33 Maine Central Railroad from St. Croix Junction in
34 Calais, southerly to the Charlotte town line.

35 Narragansett Game Sanctuary: The following described
36 territory situated in the Town of Gorham, in the
37 County of Cumberland: Bounded on the north by the
38 right-of-way of the W. N. & P. division of the Boston
39 & Maine railroad; on the east by the Black Brook Road
40 or Scarboro Road, so called, in said Town of Gorham;
41 on the south by the Stroudwater River; and on the
42 west by South Street or South Gorham Road, so called,

1 in said Town of Gorham, containing 3,600 acres, more
2 or less. For provisions relating specifically to
3 Narragansett Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, sub-
4 section 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (4).

5 Ocean Park Game and Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
6 scribed territory situated in the Town of Old Orchard
7 Beach, in the County of York: Beginning at a point on
8 the easterly side of Fresh Water Cove Brook, so
9 called, where the same intersects the Boston and
10 Maine Railroad right-of-way; thence southerly along
11 said brook to its mouth where it joins the Goose Fare
12 Brook; thence southeasterly along said Goose Fare
13 Brook to its mouth; thence easterly and parallel with
14 the Atlantic Ocean and 50 feet in front of all bulk-
15 heads and houses fronting on the beach to the east-
16 erly side of Tunis Avenue; thence northwesterly along
17 said avenue to the Boston and Maine Railroad right-
18 of-way; thence by said Boston and Maine right-of-way
19 to point of beginning.

20 Orrington Game Sanctuary: The following described
21 territory beginning at a point on the state aid road
22 No. 4, in Orrington, at the East Bucksport turn,
23 extending in a southerly and southeasterly direction
24 to the county line; on the road leading to Thurston
25 Pond, to the Hancock County line; thence southwest-
26 erly along said county line to the land of Harry
27 Byard; north along said line to the land of E. F.
28 Bowden; west on said line to the land of Frank Betts;
29 northerly on line of E. F. Bowden to land of Fred
30 Bowden; west on Fred Bowden's line to land of J.
31 Betts; northerly on line of Fred Bowden and J. Betts
32 to line of H. Byard; westerly on Byard's line and
33 line of Mary Gray to land of P. W. Gray; northerly on
34 Gray's line to land of J. Bowden heirs; northerly
35 across said land to the line of E. F. Bowden and J.
36 W. Bowden heirs; easterly on J. W. Bowden heirs' line
37 to the first mentioned bound. The commissioner may
38 add adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon
39 application of said adjacent property owners.

40 Pittston Farm Sanctuary: Pittston Farm, so called, in
41 Pittston Township, in the County of Somerset, being
42 all the fields, pastures and cultivated lands of said
43 farm.

1 Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape Elizabeth
2 Sanctuary: The following described territory: On the
3 112 acres of land, more or less, comprising Prout's
4 Neck, so called, in the Town of Scarborough, in the
5 County of Cumberland; or on Richmond's Island, so
6 called, in the Town of Cape Elizabeth, in said County
7 of Cumberland; or on the tract of land comprising
8 1,600 acres, more or less, situated in said Town of
9 Cape Elizabeth, and bounded as follows: Southeasterly
10 and southerly by the low low watermark of the Atlan-
11 tic Ocean, westerly by the low low watermark of the
12 Spurwink River, northerly by the Spurwink Road, so
13 called, leading from Spurwink Bridge to Bowery Beach,
14 easterly by a certain private road or way which runs
15 in a southerly direction from the aforesaid Spurwink
16 Road to said Bowery Beach, being the road which runs
17 in front of the dwelling house of one Charles L.
18 Jordan and along the easterly boundary of land of
19 said Charles L. Jordan, and along the westerly bound-
20 ary of land of the Great Pond Club, but not including
21 any portion of said Bowery Beach. For the purpose of
22 this paragraph, Richmond's Island shall include only
23 that portion of land above the mean high watermark
24 and the easterly portion, as defined by red painted
25 markers, of the causeway between Richmond's Island
26 and the mainland. For provisions relating specifi-
27 cally to Prout's Neck; Richmond's Island; Cape
28 Elizabeth Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8,
29 paragraph A, subparagraphs (3) and (4).

30 Rangeley Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin:
31 The following described tract or territory, situated
32 in Rangeley, in the County of Franklin, to wit: So
33 much of said Town of Rangeley as is bounded as fol-
34 lows: Southwesterly by Rangeley Lake; northwesterly
35 and northeasterly by route No. 16; and southeasterly
36 by the inlet to Rangeley Lake leading from Haley
37 Pond, so called. The territory above described being
38 so much of said Town of Rangeley, as lies between
39 Rangeley Lake, the outlet of Rangeley Lake, route No.
40 16 and said inlet to Rangeley Lake from Haley Pond.
41 This paragraph shall apply to that part of Hunter
42 Cove, so called, lying northerly of Hunter Cove
43 Bridge, so called.

44 Rangeley Lake Sanctuary: Rangeley Lake bounded as
45 follows: Beginning at Gilman's Point on the northerly

1 shore of Rangeley Lake; thence southerly across said
2 lake to the southwesterly corner of land of the
3 Rangeley Lake Hotel Corporation; thence northerly,
4 westerly and southerly around the shore of said
5 Rangeley Lake back to the original starting point.
6 Boats may pass through without incurring any penalty.

7 Rangeley Plantation Sanctuary: The following tracts
8 of land situated in Rangeley Plantation in the County
9 of Franklin: Land of the Maine Conference Association
10 of Seventh-day Adventists and the adjoining land now
11 or formerly owned by Mrs. Franklin B. Stahl, said
12 parcels laying southerly of Rangeley Lake. The com-
13 missioner may, after notice and public hearing, add
14 adjacent property to said game sanctuary upon appli-
15 cation of the owners of said adjacent property. For
16 provisions relating specifically to Rangeley
17 Plantation Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8,
18 paragraph B, subparagraph (1).

19 Readfield and Winthrop Sanctuary: The waters of
20 Carleton Pond, so called, in the Towns of Readfield
21 and Winthrop in the County of Kennebec, and the lands
22 of the Augusta Water District adjacent to said pond
23 and located in said Towns of Readfield and Winthrop,
24 now owned or which may be hereafter acquired by said
25 district in furtherance of its chartered purposes.
26 For provisions relating specifically to Readfield and
27 Winthrop Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 7,
28 and subsection 8, paragraph B, subparagraphs (2) and
29 (3).

30 Salmon Pond Sanctuary: That territory lying within a
31 distance of 1/4 of a mile of Salmon Pond, which pond
32 is situated in the Town of Guilford, in the County of
33 Piscataquis, said pond being the source of water
34 supply for the Dover-Foxcroft Water District, also
35 all the lands now owned by said Dover-Foxcroft Water
36 District in Lots 3 and 4, Range 7, which lie outside
37 of the above 1/4 of a mile limit.

38 Somerset Game Sanctuary: The following described
39 tract or territory situated in Somerset County, the
40 same being in unorganized territory, and taking in
41 parts of Sapling Town, Misery Gore, Taunton and
42 Raynham Township, and including the whole of Sandbar
43 Tract, bounded and described as follows: The ter-

1 ritory from the highway, being route 15, east to low
2 watermark on Moosehead Lake between East Outlet and
3 West Outlet, bounded as follows: Beginning at the
4 junction of the low watermark of Moosehead Lake and
5 the northerly side of the East Outlet of said lake;
6 thence westerly by the northerly side of said East
7 Outlet to the highway, being route 15; thence nor-
8 therly by said highway to the southerly side of the
9 West Outlet of said Moosehead Lake; thence easterly
10 by the southerly side of said West Outlet to low
11 watermark of Moosehead Lake; thence southerly by said
12 low watermark of Moosehead Lake to the point of
13 beginning.

14 Standish Sanctuary: The following described territory
15 in the Town of Standish in the County of Cumberland:
16 Beginning at the point where the Maine Central rail-
17 road crosses the Pequaket Trail in Steep Falls;
18 thence southerly and easterly by said Pequaket Trail,
19 the Oak Hill Road, so-called, and the so-called back
20 road from Steep Falls to Richville to its junction
21 with the Rich Mill Road, so-called; thence by said
22 Mill Road northeasterly to its junction with the road
23 leading from Sebago Lake to East Sebago; thence by
24 the last named road northerly to a point approxi-
25 mately 1 1/4 miles north of the Maine Central rail-
26 road crossing; thence by a certain wood road westerly
27 to its junction with the Maine Central railroad;
28 thence by said railroad northwesterly to the point of
29 beginning. All roads and the Maine Central railroad
30 right-of-way which serve to bound said Standish Game
31 Sanctuary shall be a part of said sanctuary. For
32 provisions relating specifically to Standish
33 Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 6.

34 Thorncrag-Stanton Bird Sanctuary: The following de-
35 scribed territory, situated in the City of Lewiston,
36 County of Androscoggin, and the Town of Monmouth,
37 County of Kennebec, to wit: Bounded on the north by
38 land of H. Osmond Wood; on the east by land formerly
39 owned by Benjamin Thorn; on the south by the road
40 leading from Barker's Mills schoolhouse to Thorne's
41 Corner; on the west by land of H. Osmond Wood and
42 George H. McGibbon; said tract being wholly situated
43 within the City of Lewiston in said County of
44 Androscoggin and containing 45 acres, more or less.
45 The most northerly corner of land of the estate of

1 George K. Davis, bounded and described as follows, to
2 wit: On the northwest by land of the so-called Ham
3 Farm; on the northeast by Pleasant Street; on the
4 southwest by land of Joseph Breault; and on the
5 southeast by a line extending northeasterly from the
6 easterly corner of said Breault's land and being a
7 continuation of the southeast boundary of said
8 Breault's land, containing 2 acres, more or less,
9 situated in the City of Lewiston, in the County of
10 Androscoggin. Beginning at a maple tree at the south-
11 east corner of the Ricker farm, now or formerly so
12 called, thence running west, northwest 244 rods to a
13 stooping cedar in what is now or was formerly a
14 swamp, thence south 22 1/2° west, 122 rods to a stake
15 near Wyman Pond now or formerly so called; thence
16 east, southeast 244 rods to the lot first conveyed by
17 a deed from Benjamin Woodbury to Mary A. Davis;
18 thence by said lot above described as first conveyed
19 by said deed, 122 rods to the point of beginning,
20 containing about 132 acres, more or less, situated in
21 the Town of Monmouth, in the County of Kennebec.

22 Tomhegan Game Sanctuary: The following territory in
23 Township 1, Range 2, N. B. K. P., commonly known as
24 Tomhegan Town, in the County of Somerset, described
25 as follows: Beginning at a cedar post and stones, the
26 post being marked PRESERVE C/W 1931, standing on the
27 line which is the division line between the land
28 owned by the Great Northern Paper Company and that
29 owned by the trust estate of F. W. Rollins, standing
30 on the westerly shore of Socatean Bay in Moosehead
31 Lake; thence westerly on said division line 1 mile
32 and 160 rods to a cedar post and stones, the post
33 being marked PRESERVE C 1931; thence southerly at
34 right angle to said division line 250 rods to a cedar
35 post and stones, the post being marked PRESERVE C/W
36 1931 and standing on the northerly shore of Tomhegan
37 Bay in Moosehead Lake; thence easterly and northerly
38 along the shore of Moosehead Lake around Socatean
39 Point, so called, to the point of beginning and con-
40 taining 700 acres, more or less.

41 Wells Sanctuary: The following described tract or
42 territory, situated in the Town of Wells, in the
43 County of York:

1 A certain tract of land, bounded and described as
2 follows: On the east by the Atlantic Ocean; on the
3 south by the Drake Island Road, so called; on the
4 west by the U. S. Number 1 highway, so called; on the
5 north by the town line of Kennebunk and Wells.

6 Wells and York Game Sanctuary: The following de-
7 scribed territory situated in the Towns of Wells and
8 York in York County; beginning at a point on highway
9 No. 1 where the Josias River meets said highway No. 1
10 in the Town of Wells, thence southwesterly along said
11 Josias River to the Maine Turnpike in the Town of
12 York, thence northerly along said Maine Turnpike to
13 the Agamenticus Road overpass; thence westerly across
14 said overpass by Agamenticus Road to the North
15 Village Road; thence northerly along said North
16 Village Road to Ogunquit-North Berwick Road, thence
17 easterly along said Ogunquit-North Berwick Road to
18 highway No. 1 in the Town of Wells, thence southerly
19 along highway No. 1 to the point of beginning in the
20 Town of Wells.

21 Willow Water Game Sanctuary: The following named ter-
22 ritory, on the following described properties, locat-
23 ed in the Town of Perry:

24 Beginning on the county road on the westerly line of
25 the Reed Farm, so called, now or formerly owned by
26 Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail, and thence running north 4°
27 east, following said line, 32 rods to a marked tree;
28 thence 75° west 20 rods to a stake; thence south 4°
29 east 32 rods to the county road; thence easterly by
30 the county road to the place of beginning. The same
31 being the building lot formerly owned by the late
32 John W. Trott and containing 4 acres, more or less.

33 And one other lot or parcel of land lying and being
34 on the northerly side of the county road leading from
35 the Eastport-Perry Bridge to Pembroke and bounded and
36 described as follows, to wit: Beginning at the south-
37 west corner of land formerly of the John W. Trott
38 estate and thence running northerly on the west line
39 of said Trott land to the northwest corner thereof;
40 thence easterly on the north line of said Trott land
41 to land now or formerly of Mrs. J. Abiah McPhail,
42 formerly of John Reddington; thence north 1° east
43 along the west line of said McPhail land to land now

1 or formerly of the Charles J. Trott estate; thence
2 westerly on the south line of said Trott land 62
3 rods; thence northerly on the westerly line of said
4 Trott land 48 rods to the Morrison lot, so called;
5 thence westerly on the said Morrison lot to land now
6 or formerly of W. W. Brown; thence south $1/2^{\circ}$ west
7 200 rods to the county road; thence easterly on said
8 county road 77 rods to the place of beginning, con-
9 taining in all 107 acres, more or less, being part of
10 lots numbered 29 and 30 according to the plan of the
11 Town of Perry.

12 And one other lot or parcel of land known as the pas-
13 ture lot formerly the Wm. H. Brown Farm, bounded
14 generally as follows, to wit: On the north by land
15 formerly of S. Frost; on the east by land of Trott,
16 on the south by the county road leading to Pembroke
17 and on the west by land of M. Conley and land of
18 others, names unknown, the above described lots being
19 known as the Elijah Loring Farm in said Perry.

20 And a certain lot of land bounded on the north by
21 land of the late John McCarty; on the east by Frost's
22 Cove; on the south by lands formerly of Lucinda Frost
23 and of Lewis D. Frost; and on the west by lands of
24 the late John Morrison, William Anderson and the late
25 John McCarty, containing 75 acres, more or less.

26 And one other lot or parcel of land bounded and de-
27 scribed as follows, to wit: On the east by lots num-
28 bered 19 and 20; southerly by land of the late John
29 Loring and the Russell lot, so called; westerly by
30 lots numbered 10 and 11; and northerly by the William
31 Anderson lot, and land formerly owned by the late
32 Aaron Frost.

33 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
34 and described as follows, to wit: Bounded on the
35 north by road leading from county road, to the field
36 on the west; on the east by the county road leading
37 from Eastport to Calais, on the south and the west by
38 land of Lucinda Frost, afterwards conveyed to Jennie
39 Frost; said lot being 10 rods on the county road and
40 8 rods back from the road.

41 And one other certain lot or parcel of land bounded
42 and described as follows, to wit: On the east by the

1 county road leading from Eastport to Robbinston; on
2 the south by land formerly owned by John A. Frost, on
3 the west by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost and on
4 the north by land formerly of Sidney S. Frost.

5 The owner of the properties included within the
6 Willow Water Game Sanctuary shall enclose the same
7 with a suitable fence and shall cause the erection of
8 suitable signs on or near said sanctuary indicating
9 that no hunting is permitted thereon. Near the center
10 of said game sanctuary such owner is authorized to
11 construct a 15-acre pond for the propagation of
12 waterfowl, principally wood duck, teal and blacks.
13 For provisions relating specifically to Willow Water
14 Game Sanctuary, see section 7654, subsection 8, para-
15 graph A, subparagraph (1).

16 York Game Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin: The
17 following named territory; on the property of the
18 following named persons, to wit: On land of J. Lewis
19 York and on land of Yorks; said game sanctuary being
20 in the northwest corner of Dallas Plantation, and
21 bounded as follows, to wit: West by the east line of
22 the Town of Rangeley; north by the south line of Lang
23 Plantation; east by the west line of the public lot
24 in Dallas Plantation; and south by land of Furbish,
25 Goodspeed Company and land of the heirs of Henry
26 Bliss, containing 539 acres, more or less. This game
27 sanctuary shall be called the York Game Sanctuary.

28 For provisions relating specifically to York Game
29 Sanctuary, in the County of Franklin, see section
30 7654, subsection 8, paragraph A, subparagraph (2).

31 STATEMENT OF FACT

32 The purpose of this bill is to designate an area
33 within the tidewaters of Southport and Boothbay Har-
34 bor as a waterfowl sanctuary.

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
